

## Snow Covers Area Twice Last Week

Winter weather has held sway in Cross Plains for the past week.

Twice last week snow covered the ground in this section of Texas. Local residents awoke Wednesday of last week to a two-inch covering of the fluffy white stuff. Some said more than that fell. Temperatures were just under the freezing mark and street and highways remained clear. Most of the snow melted that day.

Temperatures began to drop late Thursday, and on Friday local persons again awoke to a white covering Friday morning. Conditions grew worse that morning, causing hazardous driving. Schools dismissed at 1:30 p.m., about two hours earlier than normal.

Although moisture in both snows was minimal, it benefitted winter pastures and small grain crops.

Friday's white mantle consisted of sleet mixed with snow. Some melting occurred on Friday, but it was Sunday afternoon before most of the white was gone from shaded areas.

Temperatures dipped to a reported 10 degrees early Saturday morning. Temperatures in the mid to low twenties greeted area residents Sunday through Tuesday morning.

## March 1 Deadline For Mail Auto Tags

Texas motorists were advised today that the deadlines for renewing 1977 motor vehicle registrations by mail is March 1.

R. W. Townsley, Director of the Motor Vehicle Division of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, pointed out that it is taking longer to register vehicles this year because of the new staggered registration system.

As a partial offset of slow moving registration lines county tax offices began accepting registration applications January 1 this year instead of February 1, as in previous years. Many motorists have taken advantage of the earlier registration date to avoid waiting lines.

Renewal by mail offers a very convenient method of obtaining registrations without waiting lines or personal visits to the tax offices. Mail applications must include \$1 for each registration to cover handling and postage.

Some metropolitan counties are offering Bank America Visa Card and Master Charge service for registration payments. Others have a "no-check" policy which requires taking cash to the tax offices, although most accept checks for mail-order registrations.

Neighborhood substation service also is available in some metropolitan areas.

Although deadline for mail registration is March 1, final date for affixing new validation stickers to existing plates is April 1 this year, as usual.

To avoid the last minute delays and long waiting lines, register your vehicle today.

## Callahan Citizens Spend \$741,000 On Cigarettes

The campaign against cigarette smoking, which has taken on a new intensity recently, brings up the question of cigarette consumption in Callahan County.

How much are local residents smoking these days compared with people in other communities?

The new campaign, launched last month by Secretary Joseph Califano of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, is to combat what he calls "slow motion suicide."

It will include a \$23 million per year drive, under a new "Office of Smoking and Health," to coordinate anti-smoking efforts. A major public information and education crusade will be launched. Consideration will also be given to an increase in federal taxes on cigarettes.

To a large degree, the campaign will be aimed at young people—teen-agers especially—to encourage them to quit smoking.

The current level of cigarette consumption in each section of the country is indicated in figures compiled by the American Cancer Society, the Tobacco Tax Council and others.

In Callahan County, according to a breakdown of these findings, an estimated total of 1,254,000 packs smoked in the past year.

This was equivalent to 183 packs in the year for every local resident over age 16.

In some parts of the country the rate was much greater than this and, in other areas, much smaller.

Nationally, the average rate for the over-16 population was approximately 204 packs per

capita in the West Central State it was 194.

Although most health authorities contend that the number of lung cancer deaths has been on the increase because of cigarette smoking, the tobacco industry maintains that the evidence is merely statistical and that there has been no properly documented cause and effect relationship to prove that.

How much does the average Callahan County smoker spend per year for cigarettes? Approximately \$108, it is estimated.

The total bill for the community as a whole, was close to \$741,000 last year.

Although the cost of smoking has been going up, it appears to have little effect on consumption.

### THE RAPTURE

Perhaps you have seen bumper stickers which read, "In case of a Rapture somebody grab the wheel." "In case of a Rapture this car will be vacated." "Will I see you in the Rapture?" And many are puzzled by them. Have you wondered just what "The Rapture" is? Is it Biblical doctrine or false doctrine? Are its teachings in harmony or in conflict with the Bible?

Let us begin by saying, the word "rapture" is not in the Authorized Version of the Bible. It is not listed in Vine's Expository Dictionary of New Testament Words. It does not appear in the International Standard Bible Encyclopedia. Therefore, one must turn to other sources for information on the subject.

WHAT IS THE RAPTURE? It is supposed to refer to a time when the Lord will come and take his people somewhere up in the air for a period of seven years. The pre-millennial idea of "the rapture" doesn't mean just the lifting up of the saints to meet Christ in the air at his coming. It means the secret catching away of the church, the resurrected and living saints, who will rise from the earth to meet the Lord who has secretly appear in the air just before the beginning of a great tribulation period on earth. The tribulation period is to last seven years, at the beginning of which the Jews shall have returned to their land in unbelief, and at which time they have either rebuilt their temple or are in the process of rebuilding it. In unbelief in Christ, they will enter into a seven year agreement with the Antichrist. After three and one-half years the true nature of the Antichrist will be revealed. He will stop the daily sacrifice which has been resumed, and have his own image set up in the holy place. The Devil and his angels are then to be cast into the earth, having great wrath, because their time is short. During the final three and one-half years Jerusalem is to be trodden under foot. A third of the Jews are to assemble in Jerusalem. The nations are to unite against the city and overcome them. Great suffering is to be inflicted on the inhabitants and half of them are to be carried into captivity. Those remaining are to turn to Christ. The kings of the earth then gather to battle against Jehovah and Christ. When this occurs the Lord and his saints descend to deliver the faithful and destroy the enemy. This is to bring the tribulation period to a close. The martyrs are raised to reign over the earth with Jesus and their fellow saints in a millennial kingdom which is to be set up when Jesus comes again. The tribes of Israel are to be restored to their land and the Lord is to make a new covenant with them. They are to come in full possession of their land and are to rebuild the temple and the city after the Divine plan. The Levitical sacrifices are to be re-established, with some modifications, to be continued for a thousand years. A final judgment is to come at the close of the millennial reign. The "rapture" is a vital link in premillennial doctrine. The word is an identifying word among those who hold to the premillennial view. And is based on many suppositions.

All who are acquainted with the Bible teaching on the fulfilling of God's promises to Israel, the second coming of Christ, his kingdom, and his reign as King of kings and Lord of lords are well aware of the fallacy of the "rapture" doctrine. More to follow.

## Treat Cattle For Pests Agent Says

Livestock producers in Callahan County should be ready to spray livestock as soon as the weather warms up says Greg Gerngross, County Extension Agent at Baird.

Numerous cattle observed in the last two weeks are infected with lice and ticks Gerngross noted. Heavy winter tick infestation which develop on cattle during the winter months cause the loss of blood and reduces feed conversion efficiency and weakened cattle are more susceptible to disease and nutritional disorders, he continued. A number of small baby calves examined in the last few weeks also are infected with ear ticks, the agent said. When calves are worked in the next few weeks these young calves should be individually treated with a dust or spray insecticide he advises. Calf growth will be reduced if this problem is not corrected.

Control measures are presented in MP-691 "Suggestions for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry". Read and follow restrictions and precautions printed on the label when applying material for control of any livestock pests.

"The administration of justice is the firmest pillar of government."

"It is our true policy to steer clear of permanent alliances, with any portion of the foreign world."

"The great rule of conduct for us, in regard to foreign nations, is, in extending our commercial relations, to have with them as little political connection as possible."

"It is folly in one nation to look for disinterested favors from another"

"... history and experience prove that foreign influence is one of the most baneful foes of republican government."

"If to please the people, we offer what we ourselves disapprove, how can we afterwards defend our work? Let us raise a standard to which the wise and honest can repair. The event is in the hand of God."

## Tax Form Due Soon For Some Farmers

Farmers may have to file their 1977 federal income tax return and pay any tax due by March 1, the Internal Revenue Service said today.

Farmers who did not file a declaration of estimated federal individual income tax and pay the amount of estimated tax by January 16 must file their 1977 tax return and pay all tax due by March 1 to avoid a penalty, according to the IRS.

By definition, farmers are those persons who earned at least two-thirds of their 1977 gross income from farming.

IRS Publications 225, "Farmer's Tax Guide," and 505, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," provide additional information and are available free at local IRS offices.

## February Ideal For Fruit Pecan Tree Transplanting

February is an ideal time to buy and transplant fruit and pecan trees while they are still dormant, says Greg Gerngross, Callahan County Extension Agent. Some timely tips in doing this are:

1. Don't let the roots dry out during the transplanting process.
2. Cut from 1/3 to 1/2 off the top of the tree at transplanting.
3. Plant the same level as the tree originally was.
4. Make sure the holes are large enough.
5. Water good immediately after transplanting.
6. You may use a root stimulator but do not fertilize the first year.

Choose varieties carefully as you will have to live with them a long time, the Baird agent advises. Some of the newer recommended varieties for West Central Texas are:  
Pecan: Chocklaw, Wichita, Mohawk.

Peaches: Cling; Dixie Red ripens first part of June; Early-red ripens first part of June; Sentinel (semi-freestone) ripens mid-June.

Freestone: Ranger ripens last of June; Redglobe ripens first of July; Redskin ripens mid-July; Loring (May bloom early) ripens first of July.

Plums: Bruce-large, red, tart,

good for jellies but must have other plum trees to pollinate; Methley—good pollinator tree—purple and good for eating; Santa Rosa—large, red, good eating quality; Ozark Premier—very large, mottled red, eating plum.

Pear: Orient—good spreading tree, large, russeted pear with white flesh; Kieffer—most dependable bearer, pears hard and must store for a while before eating—good eating; Moonglow—good eating pear.

Apples: Holland—early apple, red, good eating; Spur Type Delicious; red apple, very good eating; Johnathon—red and tart, good for jellies and baking.

Grapes: Siebel 9110—white, almost seedless and good eating; Fredonia—black grape, good for juice and jellies.




