

Erosion-Control Work Slated For Callahan

Bids for an erosion-control project on Interstate Highway 20 in Callahan County will be opened at the regular monthly letting of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. The letting, February 15, calls for planting of erodible slope areas with soil, grass seed and fertilizer on IH 20 from 2.0 miles west of Baird to the Eastland city limits, approximately 14.0 miles. N. A. Billingsley, Jr., will supervise the project under the general guidance of District Engineer Roger G. Welsch of Abilene.

M-44 Training Class Set In Brownwood

Training in the proper use of the M-44 sodium cyanide device for the control of coyotes will be sponsored Thursday, Feb. 2, in Brownwood by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA), Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced. Training will begin at 7 p.m. at the Brown County Fairgrounds. Included in the session will be the safe handling of the capsules and device, proper use of the antidote kit, proper placement of the device, and necessary record keeping. Any individual buying and/or using the M-44 device in Texas must be certified first by TDA as required by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).
