County Named In Lawsuit

Callahan County Commissioners, in a regular meeting Monday, May 13, discussed a lawsuit that has been filed against Callahan County by a Clyde couple.

Commissioners discussed a lawsuit filed against the county by John and Mildred Rowan of Clyde. The Rowans filed a suit against Century 21 real estate agency of Abilene, PMI Mortgage Co., and Callahan County.

In the part of the lawsuit pertaining to Callahan County, they allege the county cut or built a drainage ditch on property near their property which resulted in the altering of the natural flow of flood waters, thereby diverting same causing flooding on their proper-

County Judge Bill Johnson informed the commissioners that he had filed an answer to the lawsuit, but the county would need to retain an independent lawyer to represent the county. County Attorney Brad Harris is unable to defend the county in the lawsuit due to a conflict of interest.

Texas Department Of Human Services 1990 Annual Report

The state spent a total of \$3,295,430 last year for major welfare programs in Callahan County, according to Ray L. Dunavant, Regional Administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

"Medical assistance had the biggest impact with \$983,619 spent for hospitals, physicians, laboratory, X-ray and other services. Also, \$133,767 was spent in Callahan County for prescribed medicines. Nursing home costs of approximately \$1,179,921 were paid for aged and disabled residents," Dunavant said.

Food stamps worth \$832,378 were issued for the fiscal year which ended August 31, while Aide to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) totaled \$165,745. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of applicants and issues the food coupons.

The state and federal governments share in the cost of AFDC to families where needy children are deprived of support because of the absence or disability of one or both parents.

In addition to services and assistance to low-income residents of the county, the department extended protective services to 59 abused and neglected children and their parents or caretakers. These services, furnished without regard to family income, were designed to reduce or eliminate danger to children.

There were 30 investigations in adult protective services. These investigations concerned reports of abuse, neglect, or exploitation of elderly or disabled adults.

Carbon Couple Visit Washington

WACO — Federal wetlands regulations, international trade and a tax deduction for self-employed persons were the key issues Texas farmers and ranchers discussed with federal officials on a four day trip to the nation's capitol

A group of 118 farmers and ranchers traveled to Washington, D.C. on April 15-18 as part of the Texas Farm Bureau's National Affairs Award trip. Dale and Tena Walker of Carbon

were among the participants in the Farm Bureau program. The Texas farmers and ranchers

made several Capitol Hill visits, holding meetings with congressmen and both Texas Senators, Lloyd Bentsen and Phil Gramm.

Group meetings were held with USDA representatives for discussion of federal wetlands policy, the 1990 Farm Bill, and other areas under the USDA's jurisdiction.

Representatives of the Environmental Protection Agency were also on hand to brief the participants on EPA's agricultural regulations.

"This was a great opportunity to tell our elected leaders how we feel about important issues," said Dale Walker, Eastland County rancher.

"We are deeply concerned about the fairness of the federal wetlands policy," he said. "We also support granting the President fast track authority to negotiate trade agreements."

National Toll-Free Helpline Provides Medical Eye Care To Elderly Americans

More than 164,000 needy elderly have been referred to volunteer ophthalmologists in their communities since the inception of the National Eye Care Project five years ago. Nationwide, more than a quarter-million people have called the Helpline for assistance.

The toll-free Helpline of the National Eye Care Project: 1-800-222-EYES (1-800-222-3937) is an information and referral service, providing brochures on many common eye diseases of the elderly and for eligible callers, a referral to a local volunteer ophthalmologist. (Ophthalmologists are the physicians who specialize in all types of eye care: medical, surgical and optical.)

For this program, the physician has agreed to provide a comprehensive medical eye examination and care for any condition diagnosed, at no out-ofpocket expense to the patient.

To qualify for a referral, the patient must be a U.S. citizen or legal resident, 65 or older, who does not have access to an ophthalmologist he or she has seen in the past. This is not an eyeglasses program, and prescription drugs or hospital care are not covered.

The Helpline operates weekdays, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Pacific time.

In Texas, the following numbers of potentially blinding eye diseases have been diagnosed and treated in 4,483 patients for whom records are available:

- 2,382 cases of cataract - 235 cases of glaucoma

- 504 cases of macular degenera-

- 99 cases of diabetic retinopathy It is estimated that more than half of all blindness is preventable, and the elderly are particularly vulnerable to eye disease, noted M. Coleman Driver, Jr., MD, president of the Texas Ophthalmological Association.

### **Property Owners** Load To **Get Heavier**

"Texas has got the sorriest tax structure of any state in the nation." That's how I feel, but those are not my words.

Those are the exact words of Jim Oliver, director of the Legislative Budget Board.

Oliver spoke early this month at a meeting in Austin of the State Legislative Committee of AARP, which I attended.

For me to make such a statement wouldn't be surprising, but wouldn't hold much water, either. You would simply say: "What makes you the ex-

But Oliver is the chief tax expert for the entire state legislature so when he talks, you've got to listen.

Oliver told us, rightly so, that the legislature was merely killing time in the last weeks of the regular session, knowing there would be a special session called this summer to deal with the state budget and its projected \$5 billion shortfall.

Idle minds are in the devil's workshop, so I shudder to think of the nefarious legislation the solons may have passed in the wee hours of that regular session which ended at midnight Monday.

Incidentally, most of the Austin insiders feel it will take a series of special sessions to bring about a new budget and aren't expecting final approval until late in the year.

Why does Oliver give such a low rating to our tax structure? It's because it relies so much on LOCAL property taxes. He cited figures showing that while the overall ratio of state taxes in Texas is falling compared to other states, local tax rates are growing rapidly.

Texas is now number one in the nation in the growth of local property taxes, he said.

But there's more. He said, given our present tax structure, "you ain't seen

nothing yet." And, he spoke the dreaded "IT" words...income tax. The sooner we have one, the sooner we can have relief in property and sales taxes, he

said. But, he really doesn't expect that to happen this year.

The guy is a pragmatist, and when we pressed him on his opinion of what will finally come from the legislature, here's what he said:

Expect a few economies in government spending, some "smoke and mirrors" in budget paperwork to cut the deficit to \$3 billion, another onecent sales tax, more taxes on cigarettes and liquor and possibly a corporate income tax.

In other words, the load on the backs of property owners is going to get heavier.

### Increased Housing Assistance Targeted

A spirited two-year effort to increase housing assistance to America's most needy rural counties is now under way, said Neal Sox Johnson, State Director of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA). Fourteen counties in Texas have been targeted under the program, authorized by recent housing legislation. The counties are as follows: Crosby, Dimmit, Edwards, Grimes, Hudspeth, Kenedy, La Salle, Maverick, Presidio, Real, Reeves, San Jacinto, Webb and Zavala.

The counties targeted in Texas are part of 100 counties in 20 states selected by FmHA to participate in the program. We are taking actions to make loans under this new authority as quickly as possible," Johnson said.

The program sets aside 3.5 percent of FmHA's housing funds for fiscal year 1991 and 5 percent in FY 1992 and includes the major single family housing and multi-family housing loan programs as well as farm labor housing, housing site loans, repair loans and grants, and rental assistance payments. That translates to more than \$65 million nationwide for FY 1991.

\$3,512,635 has been allocated for the program in Texas, said Johnson.

Counties were selected to participate in the program, based on high concentrations of poverty and substandard housing. In addition, the counties selected have received substantially less FmHA housing assistance than other counties within the same state for the past five fiscal years.

"Special emphasis is being placed on meeting the housing needs in Colonias," Johnson said. A colonia is any identifiable community lacking water and sewer facilities and safe, decent and adequate housing in Arizona, California, New Mexico, or Texas. Colonias are within 150 miles of the U.S./Mexico border, but cannot be in a standard metropolitan statistical area with more than 1 million population. The colonia must have been in existence and generally recognized before the Act was passed in November 28, 1990.

"To ensure a meaningful amount of assistance for each participating state, minimum funding levels were established," Johnson said.



AUSTIN - Gov. Ann Richards recently signed into law a bill which will allow the Texas Veterans Land Board (VLB) to increase the loan amounts on home and land loans made to Texas veterans.

"Texas veterans will now find it easier to purchase land and homes because this legislation brings our loan amounts more in line with today's economy," said Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, who chairs the VLB.

The new law gives the VLB authority to boost the maximum loan for home purchases to \$45,000 from \$20,000. Mauro anticipates the VLB will take action to increase the loan amount so that it is effective September 1.

The new law also gives the board the authority to boost the land loan to \$40,000 from \$20,000. However, changes in federal tax law will be required to increase the ceiling. Mauro said he is currently working with the Texas congressional delegation to accomplish this.

He said the loan ceilings needed to be raised because veterans were finding it more and more difficult to put together financing packages under the present limits.

Mauro said boosting the home loan limit to \$45,000 will "provide a financing alternative for low-to-moderate income veterans who are currently locked out of the housing market."

"It's hard to find a house in Texas for \$20,000. And if you could, Wichita Falls is now the state's only known financial market where mortgage bankers will finance a home sold for under \$45,000," Mauro said.

When the rural land program was initiated in 1949, the Veterans Land Board set the loan limit at \$7,500. On the average that was good for the purchase of about 150 acres.

"If you apply a conservative inflation rate to that real estate value of four decades ago, the equivalent figure in today's market would be \$39,000. And that representative 150-acre tract now goes for \$103,000," Mauro said.

The land loan ceiling was last raised in 1979, from \$15,000 to \$20,000. The home loan program was created in 1983 with a \$20,000 ceiling.

Currently the Texas Veterans Land Program lends eligible Texas veterans up to \$20,000 at 7.99 percent interest to purchase at least five acres of land. The Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program currently lends eligible Texas veterans up to \$20,000 at 8.5 percent interest to purchase a home. The loan can be used in conjunction with a conventional, FHA or VA loan to give Texas veterans a lower overall interest rate.

AUSTIN — The boards of directors of the Farm Credit Bank of Texas (FCBT) and the Farm Credit Bank of Wichita (FCBW) today announced plans to study the feasibility of a merger of the two agricultural lending organizations.

The two boards have met informally over the past several months. The purpose of these meetings, according to FCBT Board Chairman Robert G. Vanwinkle of Sulphur Springs, was to gain a better understanding of operating philosophies and credit and financial conditions of the two banks and their related Federal Land Bank Associations (FLBAs) and Production Credit Associations (PCAs).

The Texas bank provides long-term agricultural lending through FLBAs in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas, and provides short- and intermediate-term credit through PCAs in New Mexico and Texas.

The Wichita bank serves FLBAs and PCAs in Colorado, Kansas and Oklahoma, and provides long-term lending through the FLBA in New Mexico. Chairman of the FCBW board is Lyle Gray of Leon, Kansas.

"Our preliminary discussions indicate that the potential benefits to our stockholders of a merger warrant a more thorough study," said Vanwinkle.

"Like many boards throughout the Farm Credit System, the Texas bank has analyzed proposed changes in the financial services industry," he said. "The effect of these changes could severely impede our ability to provide competitively-priced agricultural credit in the future. A formal business relationship with another Farm Credit bank could help position the district to meet the changes ahead."

A work group of association and bank representatives from both districts will evaluate alternative business relationships and recommend issues for further consideration by the two bank boards. No timetable has been established for completion of the study. Stockholder approval is needed to formalize any business relationship.

The FCBT has approximately \$4.9 billion in assets and gross loan volume of \$3.6 billion, at March 31, 1991. The Wichita Bank has assets of more than \$3.6 billion and gross loans outstanding of more than \$3.4 billion, as of March 31, 1991.

Merchants collect the state and local sales tax and send it to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its 6 percent share and returns the local one percent sales tax each month to local governments. Cities and counties may levy a combined tax of up to two percent above the state's sales tax, however, all Callahan County towns only levy a one percent city sales tax, Sharp said.

This month's checks reflect taxes collected on March sales and reported in late April by businesses filing monthly returns, and also includes taxes reported by those filing quarterly returns for sales made in January. February, and March.

All local sales taxes must be approved by local voters and may be used for any legal city or county expenses. Most areas put the money in their General Fund and use it for normal operations like fire fighting, maintaining roads and law enforcement, Sharp said. Some cities use an additional 1/2 percent city sales tax to help fund local economic development and to reduce property taxes.

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
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
