





The Beggs didn't answer — they all were in church on Sunday.











County Approves Septic Tank On-Site Inspections

Individuals or businesses in Callahan County wanting to have private wastewater treatment systems installed on new construction must now have the system inspected before construction work can begin.

Callahan County Commissioners, in a regular meeting Monday, January 28, voted to hire Don Burns of Baird as the county's private septic tank system inspector for Callahan County. Instead of hiring a private inspector, commissioners voted to have the county be the official inspector.

Commissioners set the fee of \$125 for three visits by the inspector for all new septic tank systems constructed on new residential or commercial buildings in the county. Of the \$125 fee, Burns will receive \$100, the state will receive \$10 and Callahan County will get \$15. The county will not charge a fee for a valid complaint made after the inspection.

The septic tank system inspection charge for upgrading or repairing a current wastewater system will be \$75. Of the fee, the inspector will receive the full amount.

The county will charge \$50 for the inspector to make a visit for an individual applying for a loan application with a private septic system. Burns will receive all the amount from

the loan application charge.

County commissioners voted to become the septic system inspector after rejecting several bids from private inspectors for performing the on-site sewage inspection for the county. The county received several bids for a private inpection in November before deciding to do the on-site inspection itself.

A new state law requires that all private wastewater treatment systems be inspected before construction can

In other items brought before commissioner's court:

-Commissioners voted to rescind an order deleting the penalty and interest owed the county from delinquent taxes of Nicholas Petroleum in Cross Plains. County commissioners in August 1990 voted to delete the penalty and interest from delinquent taxes from the company in 1981 and 1982 if the taxes would be paid. Commissioners were informed recently that the taxes still have not been paid and voted to rescind the order. County Tax Assessor/Collector Wauneta Estes told commissioners that approximately \$35,000 is owed in delinquent taxes by the company that operates oil leases in the county.

Sa,000,000 Available For Civil Legal Services To Poor

AUSTIN (SPECIAL) — The Texas Equal Access to Justice Foundation has announced that \$8,000,000 in Interest on Lawyers' Trust Account (IOLTA) monies is available for funding of programs that provide civil legal services to the poor in Texas. Nonprofit organizations applying for funding must submit preliminary request forms, which are available from the Foundation's Austin office, by February 15. Formal applications must be submitted by April 1.

The Foundation provides grants in two categories. Distribution of 85% of available funds is based on percentage of the state's poor that live in the geographic area served. The remaining 15% of available IOLTA funds is allocated to proposals addressing special unmet needs of low income Texans and projects not restricted by geographic area.

Texas was, in 1984, one of the first states to adopt a voluntary IOLTA program. In December 1988, the Supreme Court of Texas required all Texas lawyers who handle client trust funds to participate in the program by using interest-bearing trust accounts for client funds which are held for a very short period of time or are in amounts too small to earn interest for the client. The pooled interest earned on these accounts is distributed by the Foundation to help poor citizens gain access to the civil justice system.



County Approves Septic Tank On-Site Inspections

Individuals or businesses in Callahan County wanting to have private wastewater treatment systems installed on new construction must now have the system inspected before construction work can begin.

Callahan County Commissioners, in a regular meeting Monday, January 28, voted to hire Don Burns of Baird as the county's private septic tank system inspector for Callahan County. Instead of hiring a private inspector, commissioners voted to have the county be the official inspector.

Commissioners set the fee of \$125 for three visits by the inspector for all new septic tank systems constructed on new residential or commercial buildings in the county. Of the \$125 fee. Burns will receive \$100, the state will receive \$10 and Callahan County will get \$15. The county will not charge a fee for a valid complaint made after the inspection.

The septic tank system inspection charge for upgrading or repairing a current wastewater system will be \$75. Of the fee, the inspector will receive the full amount.

The county will charge \$50 for the inspector to make a visit for an individual applying for a loan application with a private septic system. Burns will receive all the amount from

the loan application charge.

County commissioners voted to become the septic system inspector after rejecting several bids from private inspectors for performing the on-site sewage inspection for the county. The county received several bids for a private inpection in November before deciding to do the on-site inspection itself.

A new state law requires that all private wastewater treatment systems be inspected before construction can

Howard Payne University Receives \$750,000 Challenge Grant From The Mabee Foundation

BROWNWOOD — A challenge grant in the amount of \$750,000 has been authorized for Howard Payne University by the J.E. and L.E. Mabee Foundation of Tulsa, Oklahoma.

The grant is to be used toward construction costs estimated at \$3.9 million for the proposed University Center, a multi-purpose facility which will include a cafeteria seating 550 persons, bookstore, conference rooms and activity areas.

To qualify for the grant, HPU must raise an additional \$1.3 million in cash and pledges during the calendar year. Some \$1.2 million for the project already has been raised, and additional commitments are pending.

Iolta Grant Process Underway \$8,000,000 Available For Civil Legal Services To Poor

AUSTIN (SPECIAL) - The Texas Equal Access to Justice Foundation has announced that \$8,000,000 in Interest on Lawyers' Trust Account (IOLTA) monies is available for funding of programs that provide civil legal services to the poor in Texas. Nonprofit organizations applying for funding must submit preliminary request forms, which are available from the Foundation's Austin office, by February 15. Formal applications must be submitted by April 1.

The Foundation provides grants in two categories. Distribution of 85% of available funds is based on percentage of the state's poor that live in the geographic area served. The remaining 15% of available IOLTA funds is allocated to proposals addressing special unmet needs of low income Texans and projects not restricted by geographic area.

Texas was, in 1984, one of the first states to adopt a voluntary IOLTA program. In December 1988, the Supreme Court of Texas required all Texas lawyers who handle client trust funds to participate in the program by using interest-bearing trust accounts for client funds which are held for a very short period of time or are in amounts too small to earn interest for the client. The pooled interest earned on these accounts is distributed by the Foundation to help poor citizens gain access to the civil justice system.
