How could you describe seeing your loved ones after 43 years of separation? The smiles beaming from the faces of Virgil Dawson and his daughters, Carolyn Young and Virginia Roby, both of Amarillo, told the whole story.

Virgil, now 71 years old, lost track of his daughters following a divorce, when the girls were only 3 and 4 years old. His efforts to contact them after they married and changed their names became even more futile.

At the same time Virginia and

Carolyn were searching for their dad. They looked through every telephone book hoping to find his name among the listings. The fact that the families worked in the oil fields and moved frequently complicated matters more.

March 29 was the magic day that Virginia called a number at Cross Plains around 11:30 p.m. and asked to speak to Virgil Dawson. Henry Dawson, Virgil's wife, answered the call and stated that he was asleep. Virginia stated, "I think I am his daughter and I would like to speak to him." Virgil hurriedly moved to the telephone and was reunited with his

Tax Collector Reports
84 Percent Of County
Taxes Are Paid

Callahan County Tax Assessor/Collector Wauneta Estes told county commissioners that 84.82 percent of 1990 taxes have been collected by her office, an increase of one-half of one percent over last year.

Mrs. Estes met with Callahan County Commissioners in a Monday, March 25, court meeting to discuss the tax collections.

She stated that as of February 28, \$584,929.68 of the 1990 taxes had been collected and that \$104,694.12 was uncollected and had become delinquent. Mrs. Estes added that \$172,357.39 had been collected in county taxes from the Farm to Market Road taxes and that \$30,553.00 was uncollected and delinquent as of February 28.

She told the Commissioner's Court that as of February 28, 1991, 84.82 percent of the 1990 county taxes had been collected. That figure was higher than 84.39 of 1989 taxes collected at this time last year.

The tax assessor/collector reported that combined delinquent taxes the county is owed amounted to \$241,374.00 and \$73,984.00 was delinquent in Farm to Market Road taxes in previous years.

Mrs. Estes told commissioners that the county's delinquent tax attorney is continuing to collect on delinquent taxes and if uncollected, will file suit and foreclose on those properties.

In other items addressed by county commissioners:

Commissioners voted to enter into an agreement with the City of Clyde to pay half the cost of materials and help with employee labor in cleaning out Kaiser Creek and install new culverts and tin horns in areas throughout the city. Commissioners agreed to help with the costs after meeting with members of the Clyde City Council concerning cleaning out the creek that runs through the community and replacement of culverts and tin horns to help eliminate the flooding problems along the creek. The motion stated that the funds for the work will come out of Commissioners Precinct #1 (Clyde) and Precinct #2 (Oplin). Roy LaFoy is Commissioner of Precinct #1 and Lowell Johnson is Precinct #2 Commissioner.

Commissioners met with Callahan Divide Soil and Water Conservation District Chairman A.H. Ringhoffer to discuss a problem with a conservation dam that the SWCD and Callahan County jointly control. Ringhoffer informed the court that the landowner, on which the conservation dam is located, had been warned several times that gates and fences surrounding the dam must be closed and no livestock be allowed to graze the area around the dam. Commissioners agreed to send a letter to the landowner, in conjunction with the SWCD, informing him of the consequences if he does not comply with the contract.

Commissioners examined the current county budget for 1991 from each department to make sure that the departments were not over spending. No action was taken.

Commissioners voted for County Judge Bill Johnson, who serves as the county's Emergency Management Director, to attend a workshop in Austin April 16-18 of Emergency Management Directors.

—Voted to allow Don Burns, Callahan County on-site sewage inspector, to attend an on-site sewage inspection school in San Angelo April 9-10.

—Voted to allow County Treasurer Dora Hounshell to attend a county treasurers' education workshop at Texas A&M University in College State April 15-18.

Bluebonnet Report

Okay, I'll give you a quick bluebonnet report.

My wife and I are currently on "spring break" in the Hill Country, having gone to Llano, Fredericksburg and are in San Antonio visiting my son, Bryan, and his family.

I am a big bluebonnet fan and I know a lot of you are too from your comments to me.

So, here's what I've seen in the past few days. From about 10 miles southeast of Brady, the road to Llano is alive with blue. They are beautiful all the way in to Burnet, a stretch of some 70 miles. Out near the little community of Tow near Lake Buchanan, we saw a 20-acre field that looked like it had actually been sowed in bluebonnets.

They are also plentiful on the road from Burnet to Marble Falls and then from Marble Falls back to Kingsland and from there back in to Llano.

The only disappointing area was in and around Fredericksburg and from Fredericksburg to San Antonio. There just aren't that many.

So, considering that Fredericksburg is currently covered up by "snow birds," I'd steer clear of there for bluebonnet-watching.

If you don't know what a "snow bird" is, it's a yankee who got out of the misery of northern climes in the winter and comes down here and borrows ours.

I didn't get to make the "Willow City Loop" that I wrote about a few weeks ago. The bluebonnets in that area are kind of patchy, so I really don't know whether they "hatched" along the loop or not. But it would be worth the drive even if they didn't.

Monday, Bryan and I had just finished playing a round of golf and this guy walked by as we were loading up our clubs.

"Have you ever seen a more perfect day?" he stated.

"Yeah, it's a beautiful day, but my golf wasn't so hot," Bryan answered. The guy, who had some hospital

Canine Parvovirus In This Area

There has been an alarming number of canine parvovirus infections diagnosed in the area. Canine parvovirus is a viral disease of dogs which is capable of causing two different sets of clinical problems. The first to be recognized, and the most common, is the "intestinal form" which is manifested by bloody diarrhea, vomiting, loss of appetite, depression and often death. The second to be recognized is the "cardiac form", which occurs in very young pups and is manifested by an acute inflammation of the heart muscle.

Any age, breed or sex of dog can be affected by parvovirus. Several factors such as age, environment, stress, parasites and general health status of each individual dog infected could affect the severity of illness.

The disease is usually more severe in young dogs, (less than 6 months of age) or old dogs. Early, vigorous treatment of the illness is imperative, since vomiting and diarrhea can lead to dehydration and chemical imbalance in the body.

Control of parvovirus by sanitation measures alone is extremely difficult because the virus is such a resistant, hardy organism and because it is so easily spread. Parvovirus is transmitted through contact with the feces of an affected dog. The virus can be carried on the dogs hair and feet, as well as on contaminated cages, shoes or other objects. Isolation of infected dogs is one method of control, although moderately effective. Just as any other virus only vaccination of susceptible animals will control the actual source of infection.

A properly immunized dog will have circulation protection in the blood that will destroy parvovirus following exposure. It is important to begin vaccinations at an early age and repeat every 2-3 weeks until the puppy is at least 14-16 weeks old. Adult dogs should receive two doses of vaccine given 3-4 weeks apart for maximum protection. All dogs should receive an annual booster vaccination to assure an enduring immunity.

Comparing the dog population in this area to the number of parvovirus patches on his arm, was beaming and just kept walking. "It's always beautiful when you don't have cancer," he said.

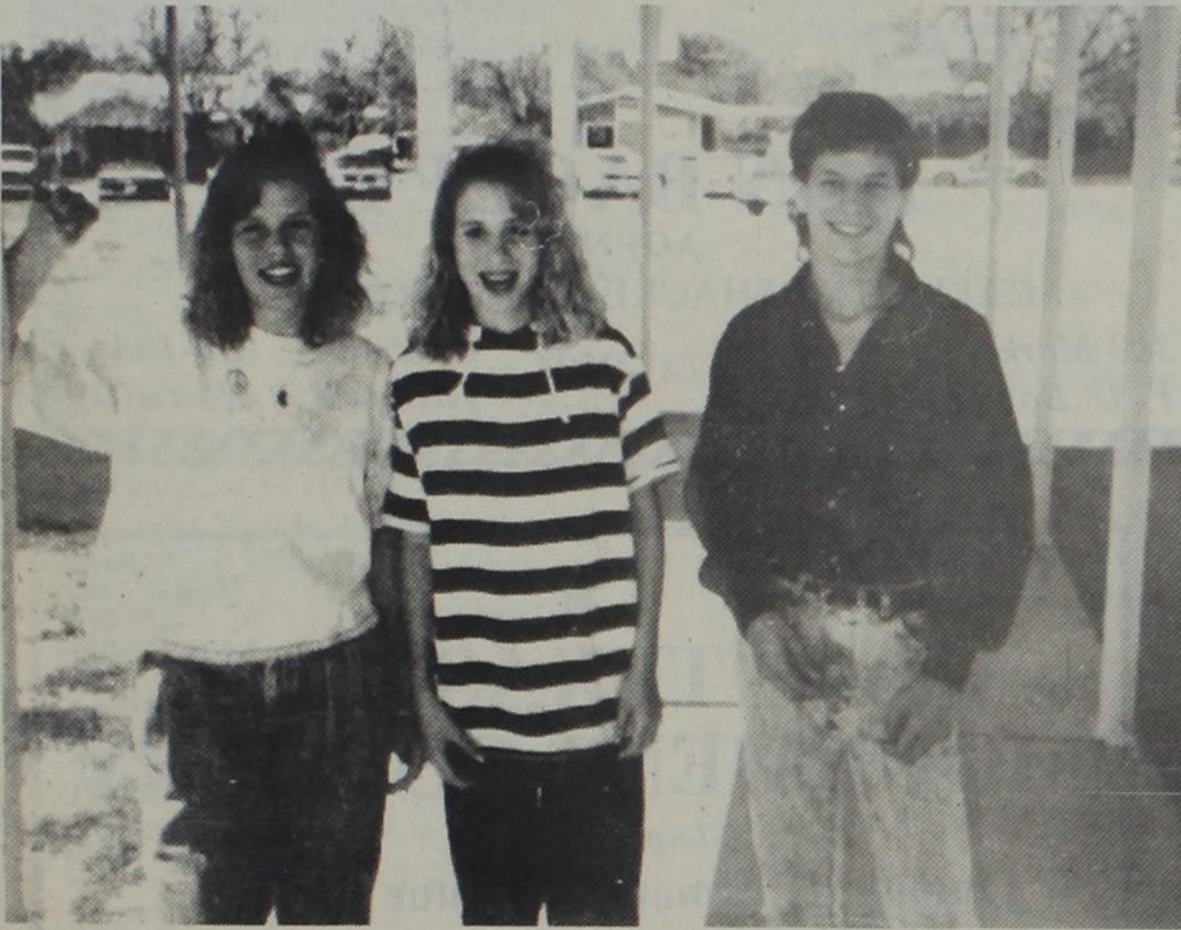

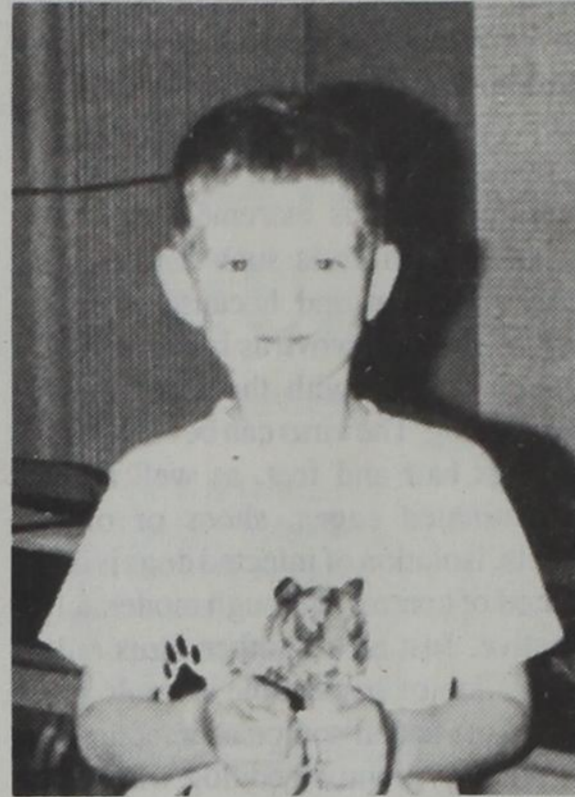

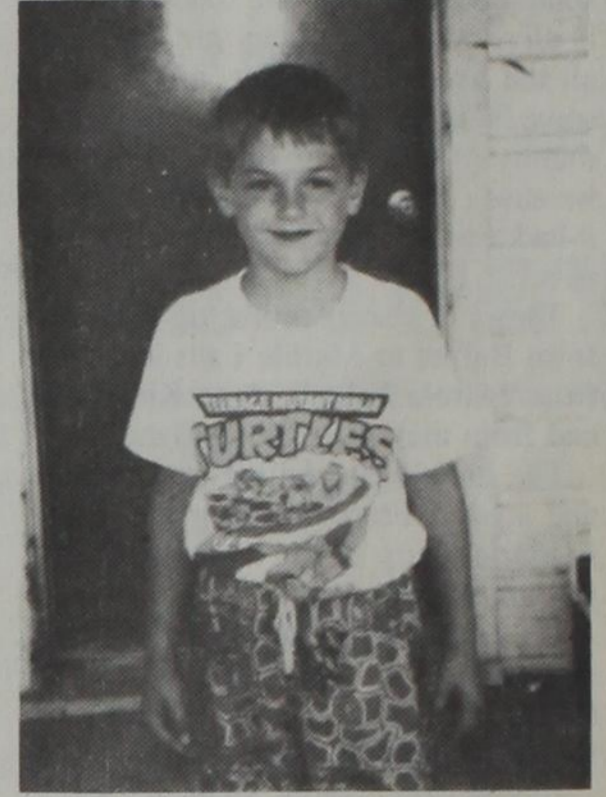

Judge Works To Keep Jail Open

Callahan County Judge Bill Johnson said that he is beginning work this week on trying to get the state's oldest working jail back in inspection compliance.

The Callahan County Jail, the oldest occupied jail in the state at over 100 years old, failed inspection by the Texas Jail Standards Commission February 12. The February 12 inspection was the third consecutive time the jail had received an unfavorable inspection.

Judge Johnson said that he will be writing Jail Standards Commission officials in Austin to try and get the jail into compliance.

According to the Jail Standards report, the jail must provide adequate separation of the different classifications of inmates in the jail. For example, separate areas must be provided for male, female, juveniles, and inmates with contagious diseases. Johnson said that the county jail needs to provide for one more classification of prisoners to be in compliance.

Johnson said that a decision on what action to take on the jail will be made by the Standards Commission after June 30.



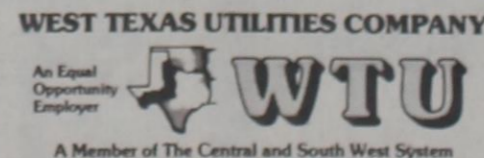
