Texas Department Of Health Announces Grants To Cross Plains EMS

Conformation has been received from the Texas Department of Health that the local EMS has been awarded a grant of \$20,000 for the purchase of a replacement ambulance.

Work on this project began in June of this year when local EMS State Coordinator Rolan Jones formed a Grant Writing Committee to apply for funds to update the Emergency Medical Service in Cross Plains.

The committee was composed of Susan Schaefer — Chairperson, Rolan Jones — Coordinator, Lucille Koenig, Sandra Jones, Wilma Lawrence, Alvin Hutchins, and Betty Lewis.

This committee met many times after working hours to discuss and plan the grant application, while working against a time deadline of June 30, to be completed and in Austin.

The committee decided that another ambulance to replace the old unit would be the top priority, with teaching aids for the local EMT classes also a high concern. Due to the need for improved and new teaching materials, the group decided to apply for two grants.

Although not yet officially confirmed, word has been received that the second grant of \$1,500 for teaching aids has also been approved.

The grant for the replacement ambulance is a matching grant, which means that the local EMS must raise an equal amount of money to satisfy

the grant. The matching funds and purchase of the replacement ambulance must be completed within the span of one year.

The grant for educational purposes is an outright grant and will be used to buy educational equipment and replace old and worn-out items.

According to statistics, it is highly unusual to receive 100% of amount requested when applying for grants and even more unusual to receive two grants upon first try at applying.

The EMS would like to thank those organizations and individuals who wrote requested letters of support and need for the grant writing committee: Jack Scott — the AARP; Project Pride; Colonial Oaks Nursing Home; Cross Plains Chamber of Commerce; Cross Plains Kiwanis Club; Judge Bill Johnson; and a special thank you to Dr. Donald Peterson of the Cross Plains Medical Center, who was very instrumental in assisting and supporting the grant committee.

Residents of 77 Texas communities will share in \$522,000 in emergency medical service grants made by the Texas Department of Health (TDH) this month. Fifty-one of the grant communities are in rural counties. EMS groups asked for nearly \$1 million in grant funding.

The grants will pay for emergency communications and ambulance

equipment, as well as training for emergency medical technicians and members of the public. Seven towns will use their grants to help buy an ambulance or other first response vehicle. TDH began notifying the EMS agencies, hospitals and training groups in August that they would receive funds through the EMS Local Projects grant program of the Bureau of Emergency Management.

This is the third year of the grant program. In 1991, the Texas Legislature began funding the program and TDH added federal block grant funds. "We are working with our state legislators to quadruple the amount of state funding for local EMS agencies," said Dr. David R. Smith, Commissioner of Health. "This is one of the most practical and cost-efficient things the state can do for local emergency medical services. It puts the money right where the need is."

"We heard some great success stories," Dr. Smith said, "as we traveled around the state last year and visited with emergency medical services who received grant funds. We expect this year's grants to improve emergency care in all these new areas."

Other communities in this section of the state to receive grants were: Comanche EMS — \$1,000; Rising Star EMS — \$1,981; and Sweetwater Fire Department — \$7,027.

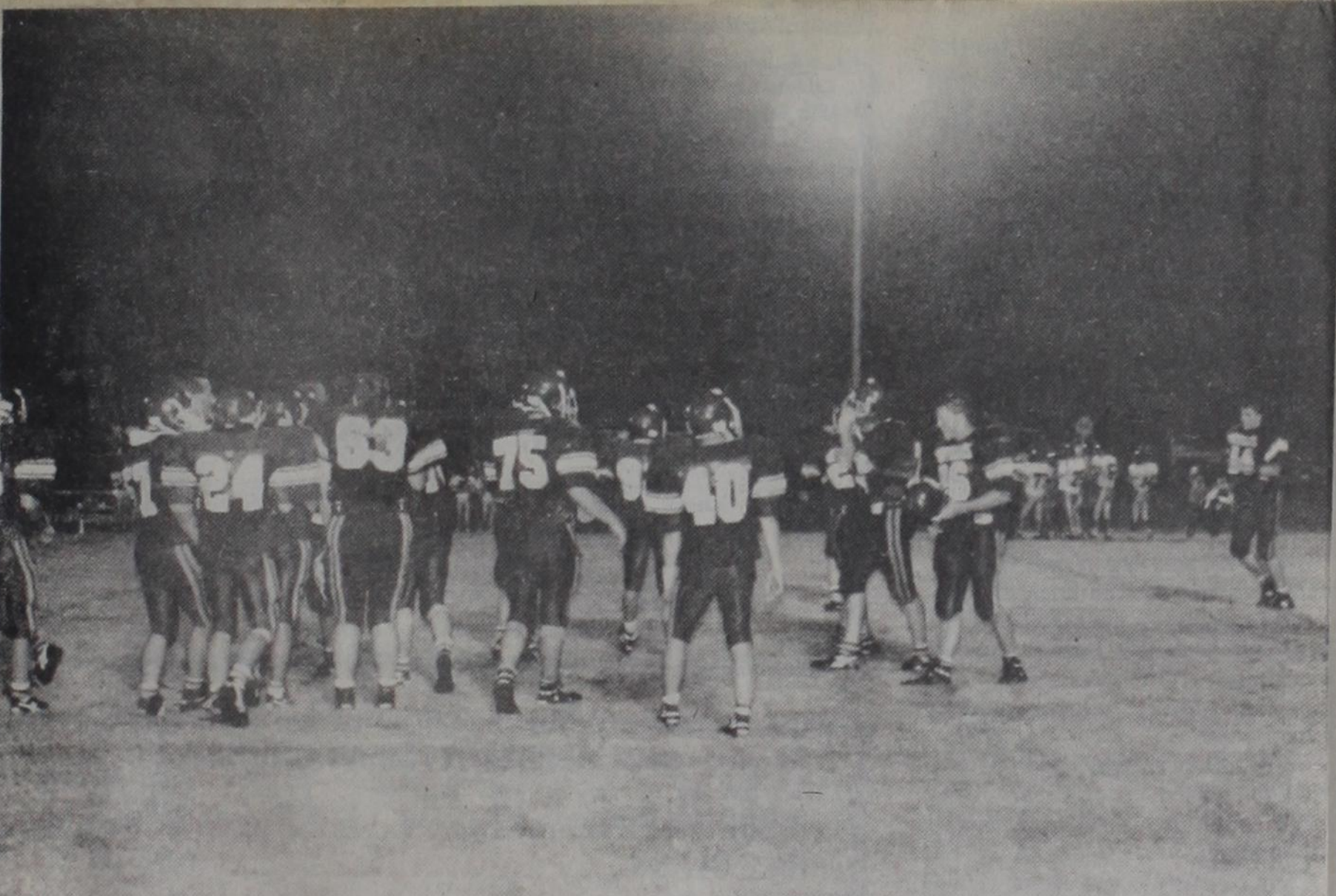

It Was Closer Than It Looks

The Cross Plains Varsity Buffaloes were thwarted again in their second outing of the young 1992 season. Although the score ended up in favor of the Roby Lions 33-20, the Buffs gained some valuable experience heading into their next two relatively tough games prior to the start of district play.

The Buffalo offense showed improvement by scoring 14 more points than last week. The passing game was particularly exciting with a total of 240 passing yards.

The first quarter was mostly defensive for both sides. The Buffs received the kickoff, but were unable to move the ball. In a later first quarter drive, the Buffs again were held and forced to punt.

Although Roby did have 6 first downs to only one for C.P., the Buffalo defense held Roby to only one score, a 32 yard field goal for 3 points.

The second quarter, there were 2 Roby touchdowns and one for the Buffs. Only 4 seconds into the 2nd quarter, the Roby Lions capped off a 45 yard drive that started in the first

quarter by scoring on a 2 yard run. The point after was good, making the score 10-0 Roby.

The Buffs' first drive of the 2nd quarter started off with a 37-yard kickoff return by Jason Fleming, but a few plays later, the Buffs were plagued by a fumble and Roby took over at C.P.'s 35 yard line.

The Lion drive ended with 7:47 left in the 2nd half when they scored on a 9 yard run. The kick for the point after was blocked by the Buffs, but Roby picked up the ball and ran it in for the 2 points, making the score 18-0.

The Buffs took the kickoff and this time determinedly moved the ball 65 yards for the TD. The drive started when Michael Cowan took the kickoff 15 yards to about the Buffalo 35 yard line. Quarterback, Brock Walker, then made 2 runs, then a run by Cowan, a penalty on Roby and finally, the TD came on a 12 yard pass from Walker to Brandon Smith. With 5:59 left in the half, the point after was good on a pass from Jason Fleming to Cowan for the 2 points, making the score 18-8.

C.P. tried the on-side kick, but Roby recovered at their own 49 yard line. With the help of a penalty and

some good tackling by Buffalo defensive players, Earl Meroney, Bucky Williams, and Willie Nickerson, the Lions were forced to make their first punt.

The Buffs received the kick at their 15, but a holding penalty on the Buffs moved the ball back to the 7. With successful passes from Walker to Billy Brown and two to Cowan, a roughing the passer penalty against Roby, the Buffs soon had the ball down to the Roby 45, but lost momentum and the Lions took over on downs with 56 seconds left in the half. Score at half-time 18-8 Roby.

Early into the 3rd quarter, Buffalo Geno Fortune recovered a Roby fumble, but the Buffs' opportunity was lost when they gave up the ball on downs.

Roby took over and the Buffs seemed to hold them as they were in a 4th and 5 situation. Roby chose not to punt and instead made a 34 yard run for another TD. The point was good...score now 25-8 with 7:02 left in the 3rd quarter.

The Buffs took the kickoff, Fleming

City Update On 911

The City of Cross Plains is currently involved in the new addressing for 911 for the residents of Cross Plains.

City Manager, Debbie Gosnell stated that the water bills with the new 911 address printed on it will be mailed to city water customers around October 31. Gosnell stated that the new 911 addresses will be printed on the service address portion of the water

statement postcard mailed by the city. Cross Plains water customers are asked to wait until the new water bills are mailed out and not to call City Hall to find out the new 911 address in advance, due to the fact that the 911 addresses are not complete at this time.

Cross Plains Now Has 911 Emergency Service

The Emergency Service Number 9-1-1 is now operating in Callahan County. Your 9-1-1 calls are answered at the Sheriff's Department in Baird.

When someone in the 725 phone exchange dials 9-1-1, they will get a recording stating, "Your emergency call is being routed, stay on the line." This message repeats approximately 4 times. PLEASE, DON'T HANG UP. YOUR CALL WILL BE ANSWERED. This delay is due to the difference in phone exchanges.

Also, for those people who have a 725 phone number, but live just across the county line in another county, your call will still be answered in Baird. The 9-1-1 call routing is done by phone exchange, not by county line.

The Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Department would like to remind everyone that Mother Nature is waiting around the corner with a basketful of cold weather to show us that good ol' summertime is on its way out. With this thought in mind, it's time to clean out the stove and furnaces, fireplaces or woodstoves, whatever it may be.

Stoves and furnaces need a thorough going over to get all the cobwebs and dust that has gathered up over the spring and summer. Fireplaces need to be cleaned and checked to make sure the chimney is clear. Woodstoves need to be cleaned and all the flues checked to make sure it's still in good working order, and check to make sure the heat insulators are in good shape. On the furnaces, make sure the pilot light is working properly. If you have problems with your pilot, please have an authorized person check it. Also, filters should be cleaned or changed before using central heaters.

Turning to the lighter side. If by chance you find yourself in our State Capitol, you might want to visit the Capitol Building while on the grounds. Check out the monument dedicated to all ex-firemen, which was erected in 1896. On this monument is a list of names of firefighters who have fallen in the line of duty.

To the best of our knowledge, no fireman from Cross Plains has lost his life in the line of duty. We have had a few injured, but thank the Lord, we haven't given up a firefighter.

Please remember to check all of your systems for heating your home or shop, and have a safe and warm winter.

**Proclamation
By The County Judge
Of Callahan County**

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:

I, Bill Johnson, County Judge of Callahan County, do hereby declare the week of September 20-26, 1992 as **Farm and Ranch Safety and Health Week in Callahan County**, for the following reasons:

WHEREAS, the President has proclaimed the 49th Annual National Farm Safety and Health Week and the Governor has proclaimed the same period as Texas Farm and Ranch Safety and Health Week; and

WHEREAS, the National Safety Council estimates indicate that in 1991 farm work accidents resulted in approximately 1,400 deaths and 140,000 disabling injuries. The death rate was 44 per 100,000 workers, having fallen slightly during the past decade, agriculture remains the highest of the major industries and four times their composite death rate. Many more farm and ranch residents and workers were killed or seriously injured in home, recreation, and roadway accidents. An undetermined number of people involved in agricultural work suffered job-related illnesses known to cause disability or death; and

WHEREAS, during this week, a statewide farm and ranch accident prevention education campaign is being undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau; the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council; the Texas Safety Association; the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the 4-H Clubs; the Texas Education Agency through the Texas Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America, the Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of America, the Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and the Callahan County Farm Bureau with the theme, "Take Charge of Your Safety and Health," and

WHEREAS, accident prevention is often a matter of common sense; putting into practice basic safety rules like always buckling your safety belt; reading and following instructions in operator's manuals and product labels; and many other simple, sensible measures that involve little or no extra time, effort or expense.

THEREFORE, I urge all those who live and work on farms or ranches to take necessary precautions to protect their safety and health on the job and off. I also urge leaders in the agricultural community to bolster safety and health efforts in your area by example and by educational programs.

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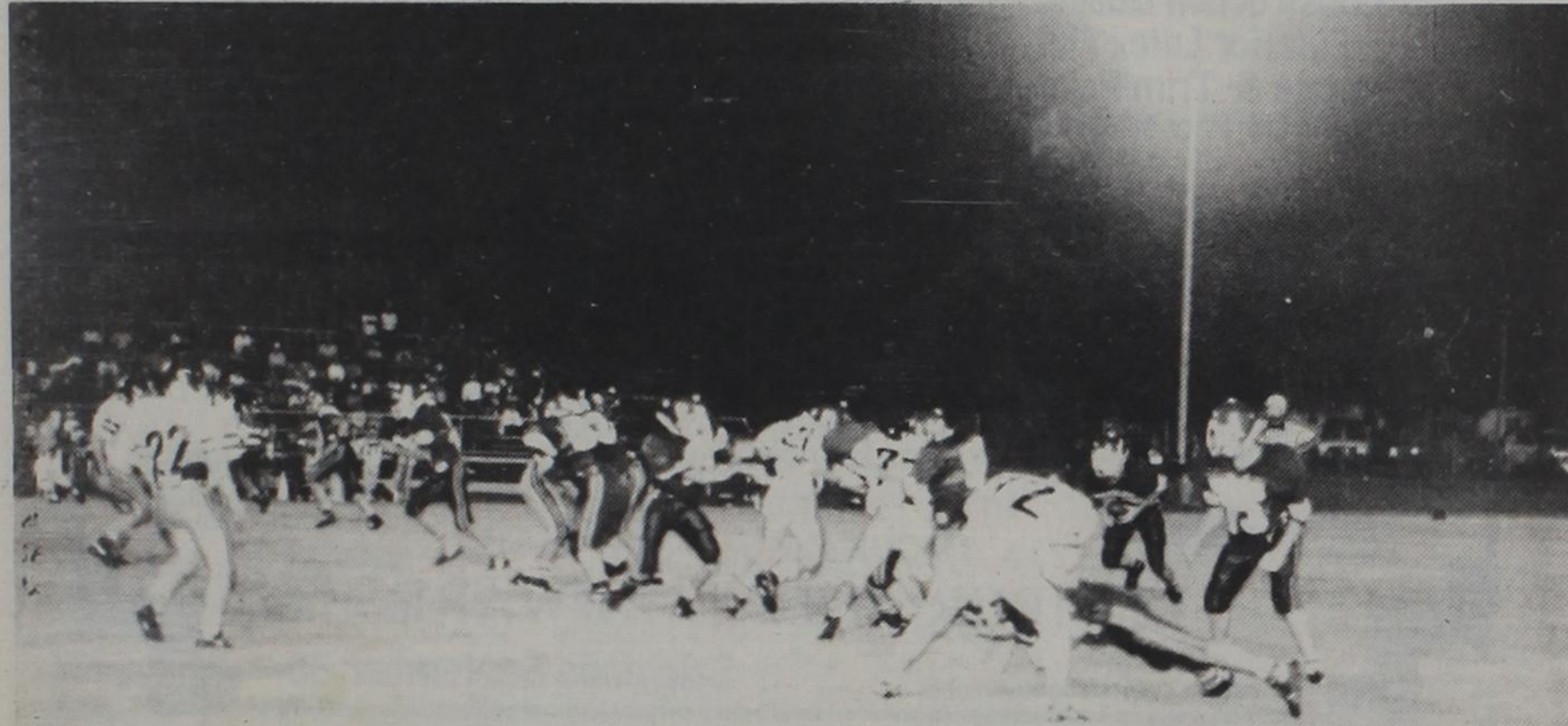

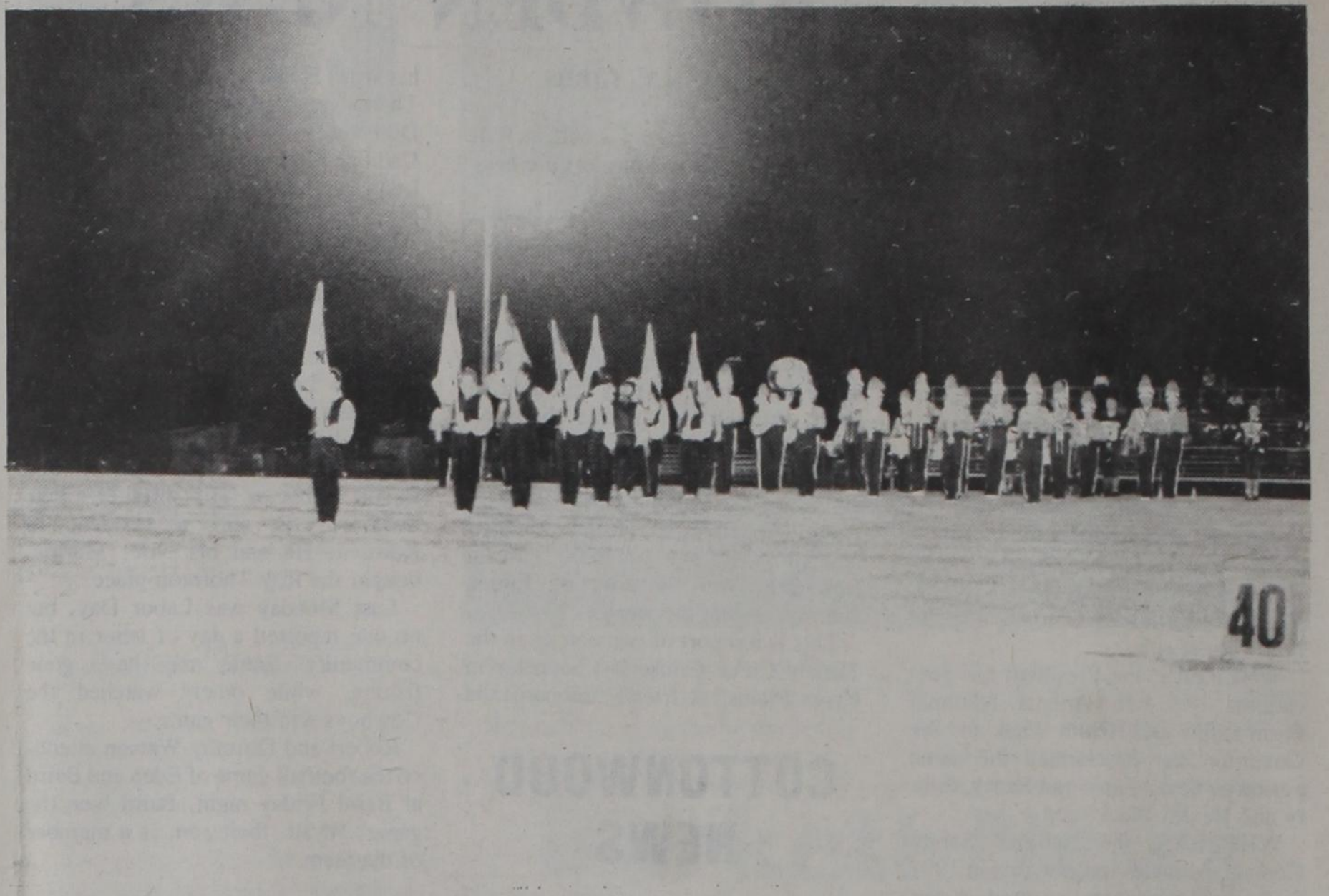

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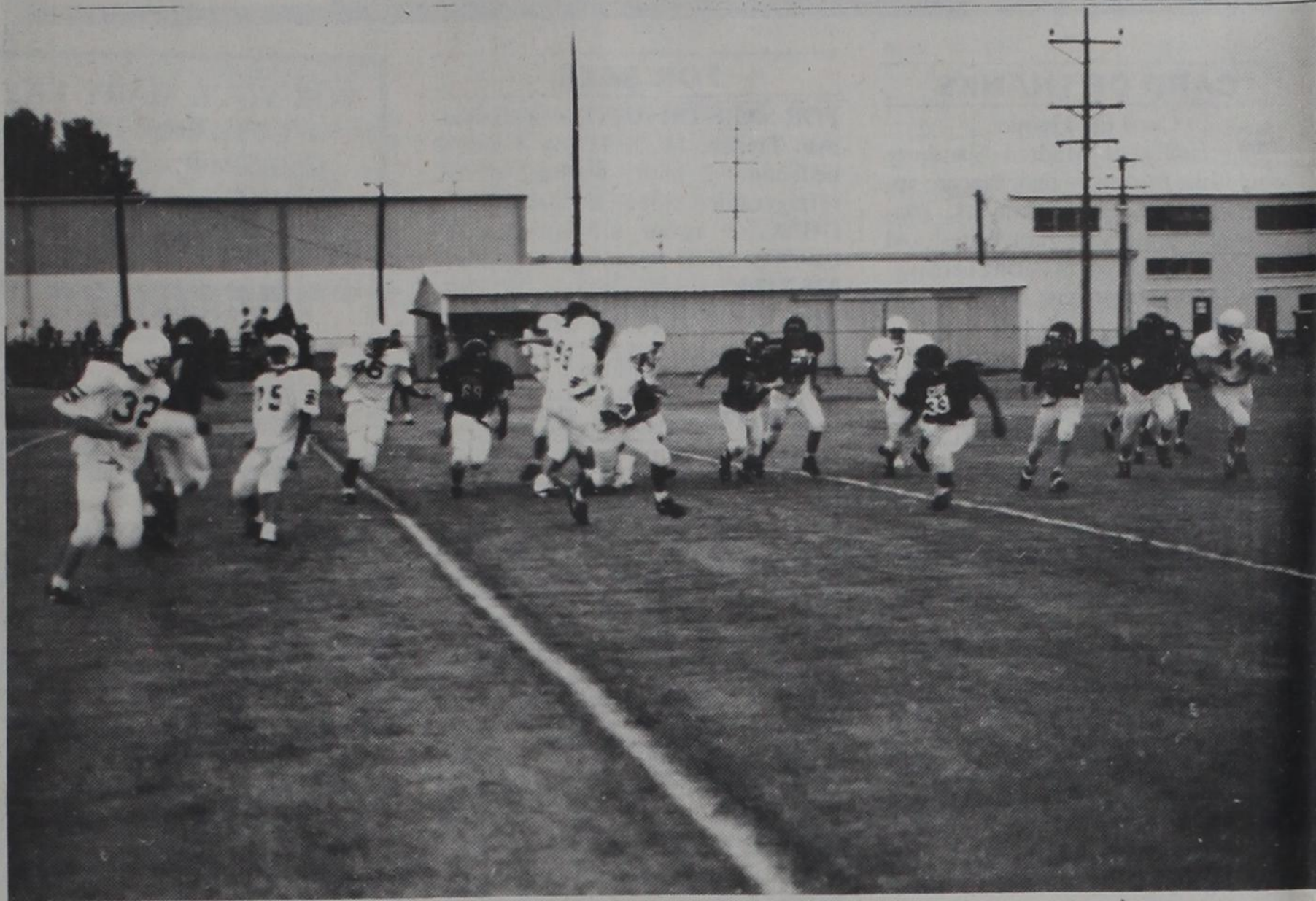

In response to the growing areas of concern regarding the elderly, the United Methodist Church has set aside an afternoon to address these needs.

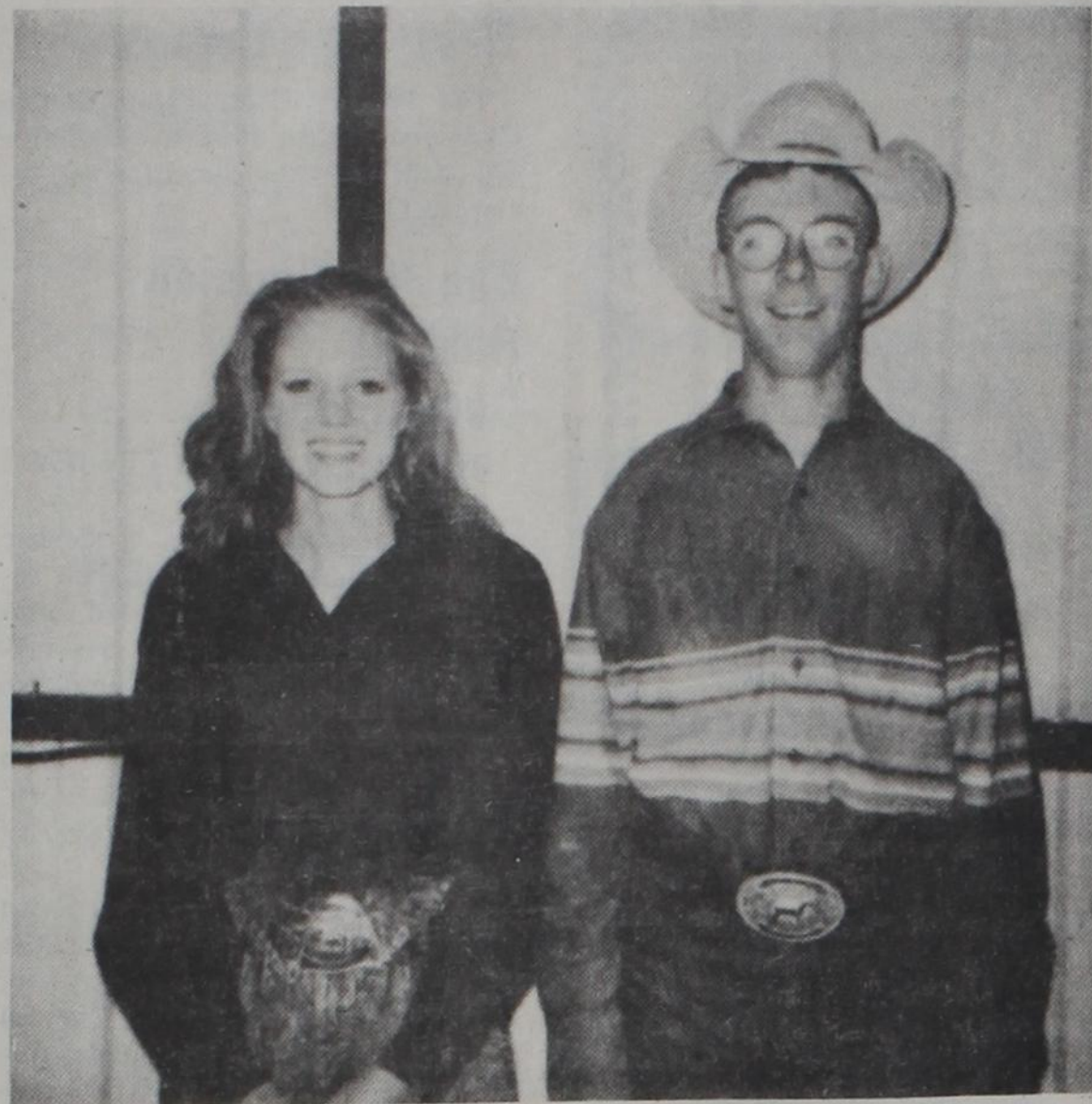
