Hounshell Hosts Reunion Of Security Guards From Atomic Bomb Days

In the late summer of 1948, a group of approximately 200 personnel was offered the opportunity to volunteer for a Top Secret assignment. After being accepted, we assembled at Kelley Field in San Antonio, Texas to await further orders.

In about October my brother, Charles Hounshell, along with approximately twenty-five others, joined the group and boarded a C-47 plane with our baggage and a rifle.

Flight time was under one hour and we landed on a runway near a mountain with what appeared to have doors in the side. This entire area of about 400 acres was surrounded by four, nine foot tall chain link fences. The middle one was sitting on insulators marked with High Voltage signs.

At this time we had not been told where we were or what we would be doing. It was easy to see that this air strip was quite different, as the control tower was the size of an outdoor toilet, with a small antenna extending up-

We dismounted the plane and were marched through the electric gates of all four fences. About a mile away we approached a large building which would be "home" for the next three and a half years. At this time we learned that our purpose was to provide security for the atom bomb plants and storage facilities.

The group was continuously reminded of the statement and oath we had made, concerning the location or what was at this base.

As time passed, we became very close. We slept, ate, and performed duties together each day.

Many of the troops assigned to the base visited my parents, Fate and Blanch Hounshell, for years and were always honored guests.

On May 8, 9, and 10 I had the privilege of having the following troops and their families in my home for refreshments and entertainment: Cecil Jones, Passchristina, Mississippi; Shirley B. Palmer, Hamilton, Alabama; William G. Thompson, Carlton, Georgia; Henry G. Totter, Edgewood, New Mexico; Calvin H. Adkins, Houston; Clarence Smyrl, Burleson; Dennis Benton, Athens; Nelson McGee, San Angelo; and Charles Hounshell, Crockett.

I-20 Exits To Close Only About 6 Months

No I-20 exit ramps at Clyde will be closed longer than approximately six months during the rebuilding of the highway, which is to begin in earnest about June 1

That clarification came Tuesday. May 5, from Blair Haynie, supervising resident engineer with the State Dept. of Highways and Public Transportation in Abilene.

He made the clarification in a meeting with Mayor Don Haley. Chamber of Commerce President Vince Scaramuzzo, Peoples State Bank President Doug Ford, and Clyde Journal Publisher Don Tabor.

Initial information from the highway department indicated exit ramps would be closed for a much longer period during the six-mile, \$5.5 million construction, which is expected to take about two years to complete.

That information brought an outcry from Clyde businesses along the highway and prompted the Chamber of Commerce to schedule a public meeting with highway department officials at 7 p.m. Thursday at the Lions Club Building. The meeting is still

Haynie explained that the project will be broken down into four sections. Work will begin about June 1 on the first section, the westbound lanes between Union Hill Rd. and Haynes Rd., a distance of about three miles. During this construction, westbound traffic will be detoured into the north lane of the eastbound lanes, making one eastbound and one westbound lane with concrete barriers separating them.

During this first phase, the westbound exits at Cherry Lane and F-M 604 will be closed but the eastbound exits and those points will not be closed. He estimated it will take about six months to complete this phase.

When this phase is completed, the procedure will be "flip-flopped" and work will begin on the eastbound lanes. At that time, the 604 and Cherry Lane exits will be closed to eastbound traffic and reopened for westbound traffic.

When both these phases are completed, the project will be shifted east

three miles and the remaining two sections will be started.

Haynie stressed that during construction, two-way traffic will still be allowed on the north and south access roads and that the overpasses at 604 and Cherry Lane will still be open to north-south traffic.

Havnie said entry ramps onto the highway at 604 and Cherry Lane will



Haynie said that construction plans call for the grinding off of all pavement down to the base material and that much of that pavement will be recycled and used in the new paving.


