## Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about: - the value placed on your property

- any exemptions that may apply to y
- the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
the local governments which should be taxing your
property
any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.
Informal Review
Contact Central Appraisal District of Callahan County 130 W. 4th Street, Baird, Texas 79504, (915) 854-1165.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board
I you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).
The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It
has the power to order the appraisal district to make the has the power to order the appraisal district to make the
necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a writen request for an ARB hearing (called anotice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representaive will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on he evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal call (915) 854-116
Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Distict Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the
decision, you have the right o appeal to district court. If you decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you
choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a choose to go to courh, you must start the process by filing a
petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at $\$ 1,000,000$ or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day befor axes become delinquuent (usuaily February 1). The ARB
