The Andulusians have the wide arched neck of the Arabian and the powerful hindquarters similar to the Quarter Horse.

Based upon the pageantry and chivalry of the Middle Ages, the audience was drawn back in time by the master of ceremony.

His appearance on a dappled gray, high-stepping Andulusian in regal costume allowed your mind to drift to another era. Even his accent was that of a nobleman.

Four Knights were formally introduced and their costume matched that of their steed. Their clothing was typical of the time and wonderfully colorful. The horses' head gear and the skirts around their entire bodies were almost elegant. Even their page escorted them, bearing the flag representing his Knight.

The audience was given paper crowns upon entering the coliseum that matched the Knight they should cheer for and were seated together in groups. There was the Red Knight, Black and White Knight, Red and Yellow Knight, and the evil Green Knight.

When the master of ceremony said, "Give me your voices!" that was your key to applaud and shout. The excitement level was high, as even the adults enjoyed the challenge to support their Knight in battle.

The first event consisted of running full speed, carrying a spear with the purpose of thrusting it through a small ring at the end of the runway. If you have seen "Return to Snowy River," it is the exhibition the Englishman performed. Only one Knight accomplished the feat. There were other displays of throwing a spear at a target on a charging horse, which exhibited the riders' skill.

The most exciting was the jousting tournament! Racing towards each other with the intent of unseating the other rider was thrilling. The jousting sticks were broken in some instances from the power of the hit. Hand-tohand fighting with swords, large type hatchets, and steel balls on chains continued until the last Knight was stan-

These duels were very real looking as you could see the sparks from the swords and hear the crashing sounds on the shields. Of course, no one was actually hurt, but it was most realistic.

The Red and Yellow Knight was victorious and he threw yellow roses to the crowd and at the end chose his maiden, a cute litle girl, in the romantic way of times past.

There were two Knights in gorgeous, shining suits who displayed horsemanship astride the Andulusian horses. The flowing manes and tails of the horses prancing and performing various gants was another impressive section. The precision of the rider and animal awed the crowd When the pair performed in harmony, it was so graceful.

Curtis Will Be Next Sheriff

Eddie Curtis will be the next Callahan County Sheriff, capturing 47 percent of the vote in the General Election results from Tuesday, November 3.

Curtis, the Democratic Party candidate, beat one Republican Party candidate and two write-in candidates.

Curtis took 2,411 votes to his nearest challenger Randy Pancake, who took 23 percent of the vote or 1,202 votes.

The Republican Party candidate Jerry Roden took 19 percent or 996 votes, while write-in candidate Bryant Barnes captured 10 percent of the total vote or 519 votes.

Curtis, who defeated incumbent sheriff Bill Skinner in the Democratic Party Primary, will take the oath of office January 1, 1993.

In other races of interest to county residents, the Republican Party candidate George Bush captured 40 percent of the total vote for President of the United States. Bush had 2,134 votes cast to 1,694 or 32 percent for Democratic Party candidate Bill Clinton. Independent candidate Ross Perot had 27 percent of the county vote, or 1,452 votes.

Charles Stenholm easily vote the U.S. Representative race for District 17. which includes Callahan County. Stenholm, the Democratic incumbent had 67 percent of the vote to Republican challenger Jeanie Sadowski's 33 percent.

In the race for Texas Railroad Com-

mission, Barry Williamson had 57 percent to incumbent Lena Guerrero's 38 percent of the county vote.

For State Senate District 25 seat, incumbent Democratic Party candidate Bill Sims garnered 53 percent of the vote in Callahan County to Troy Fraser's 47 percent of the vote.

In the State Representative District 60 seat, Democratic incumbent John Cook had 53 percent to challenger Pete Lynch's 47 percent of the county vote.

The total votes cast in Callahan County was the largest in recent memory. County officials said 5,369 voted in Callahan County. Of that total, the early voting total was also one of the largest in history. Officials said 1,683 voted by early ballot in a two week period at Baird, Clyde or Cross Plains.

Skinner Charged With Misdemeanor Offense

BAIRD - A Class A misdemeanor charge involving alteration of a document will be filed against Callahan County Sheriff Bill Skinner after action by a grand jury Friday.

County Attorney Brad Harris said he presented the case to grand jurors so that they could decide whether to indict Skinner on a felony offense involving \$250 in missing bail money and intent to defraud the county.

"They did not indict him," Harris said. "They are not charging him with theft." Instead, the grand jury instructed Harris to charge Skinner with the misdemeanor offense, the county attorney said. Skinner was not available for comment.

Harris said that on June 5 the money was discovered missing and a booking' sheet in the sheriff's office was found to have been altered. Harris asked a Texas Ranger from San Angelo to investigate, and the Ranger's report showed "practically an admission of the offense by the sheriff," Harris said.

Harris said that a line on the booking sheet showing receipt of \$250 had been marked through. An addition to the sheet said that the person had opted to sit out the fine in jail rather than pay cash. The altered sheet was signed by Skinner, Harris said.

The sheriff admitted that he altered the form and his explanation was that "it was an attempt to stall for time" until someone anonymously returned the money. "It didn't happen," Harris said, and the money is still missing.

"That sounded like a crazy excuse," Harris said. "He still violated the law." Harris said the grand jury decided no

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intent to defraud the county was involved and therefore chose not to indict Skinner on a felony offense.

The Class A misdemeanor that will be filed against the sheriff is punishable by a fine up to \$3,000 and one year in county jail.

However, Harris said it's doubtful either of those punishments would be assessed. The county attorney said he will meet with the sheriff next week to discuss the charge.

Skinner and Harris both were defeated in their try for re-election in last spring's primaries. Both men will leave office December 31.

Callahan County **Indictments**

BAIRD - A Callahan County grand jury on Friday indicted a former nursing home orderly on three counts of causing bodily injury to three residents under his care.

John Christopher Gonzales, 22, was charged with beating three elderly men in the genital area last February while they were residents of Canterbury Villa nursing home.

At the time of Gonzales' arrest in June, the home had been under investigation by the state health department for several weeks, and the director of nurses as well as the administrator had been placed on suspension.

The three indictments against Gonzales were among 20 returned Friday by the grand jury, including five sealed indictments.

Also indicted Friday for attempted capital murder was David LaDrue Brown of Abilene., who was involved in a high-speed chase in Callahan County Wednesday in which a deputy was almost run over at a roadblock.

The indictment charges that Brown intentionally tried to run down Deputy Sheriff Bryant Barnes after Barnes had set up a roadblock to stop Brown, who was involved in a chase with speeds exceeding 105 mph.

Australian Bikers Traveling Through Texas

Anne-Maree Shepherd and Peter O'Rourke of Goulburn, Australia peddled through Cross Plains and camped at Tim Dill's facility, Country Inn Motel and RV Park last week. Tim found them most interesting and jotted down some notes concerning their biking adventure.

The couple began a biking tour of South, Central, and North America about 2-1/2 years ago. He worked as a tradesman and she was a secretary when they made plans for the journey

Early into the third quarter, the Buffs made their third TD. It was a 69 yard drive in 3 plays. After a carry by





Texas Supertrain Offers Safer Travel Than Autombiles

Statistics show that travel on the new TEXAS SUPERTRAIN is dramatically safer than driving a car, and project officials say the new system should bring a sharp improvement in the state's grisly record of travel-related deaths and injuries.

Official records show that in 1990, 3,243 people were killed and 262,576 people were injured in automobile accidents in Texas. By contrast, highspeed rail in France has carried more than 180 million passengers with a perfect safety record. It has operated for more than a decade without a single fatality.

"There is no question that highspeed rail is a much safer travel alternative," Project Manager Bob Ryan

High-speed rail's promise for improving public safety in transportation was a prime consideration in the formation of a new statewide student group which is supporting the project. Members of "Future Alternatives for Safer Transportation" (FAST) have established chapters on a number of Texas college campuses.

The new train also is supported by the leaders of "Students Against Drunk Driving" (SADD), which cites the high rate of highway fatalities as the motivating factor in searching for safer transportation alternatives.

"Each year we are losing more people to alcohol-related auto collisions than make up the entire population of the University of Texas," says UT Chapter President Claudia Carroll. "If someone is drunk on a train they might be embarrassing, but they won't be deadly."


