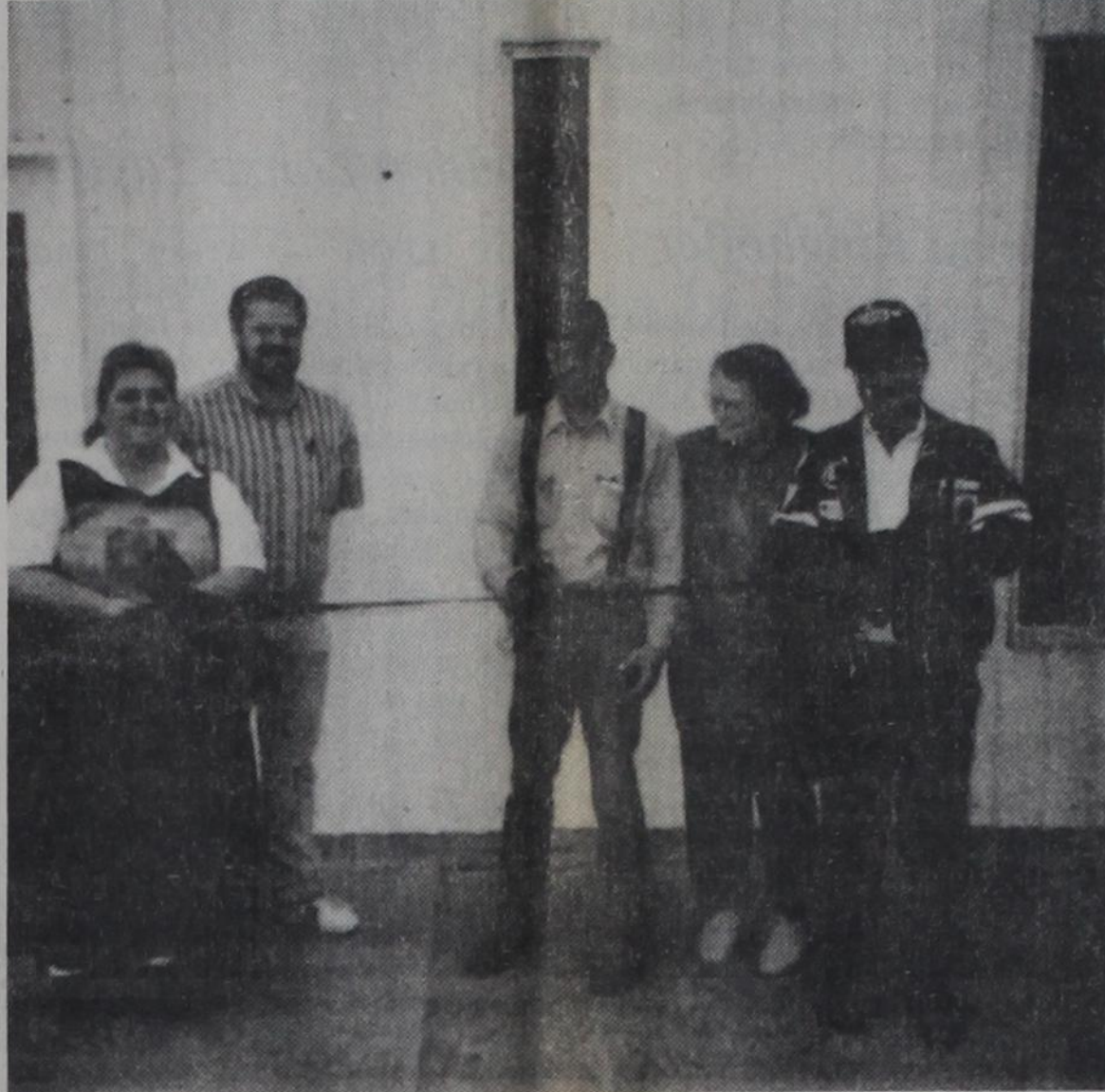


# 3 New Businesses Open In City

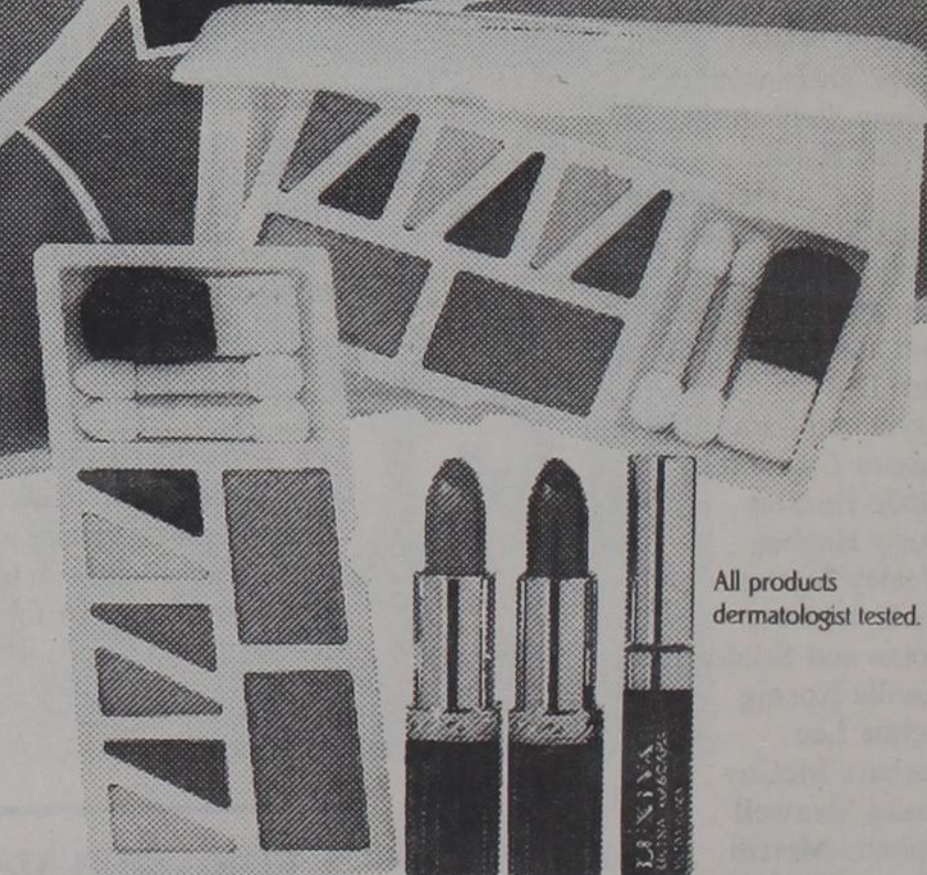

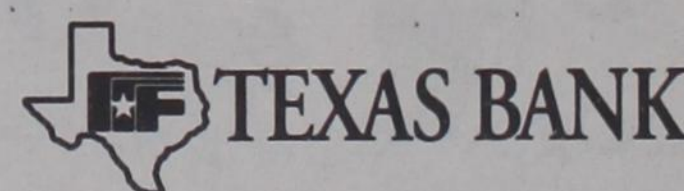
