## RRC Sets Texas Gas Production Allowables

AUSTIN — Railroad Commissioners Mary Scott Nabers and Barry Williamson forecast Texas oil production for August at 1,670,678 barrels per day, based on purchaser nominations, and set gas production allowables for prorated fields in the state to meet market demand of 176,034,141 Mcf (thousand cubic feet).

For prorated gas fields, the August 1993 allowable represents an increase of 10,650,487 Mcf when compared to actual production of 165,383,654 Mcf in August 1992. In setting the August 1993 allowable, the Commission used historical production figures from August 1992 and producer forecasts for August 1993 demand, then adjusted the figures to account for such factors as well capability, new wells in a field, etc.

Nabers and Williamson also reviewed oil companies' August nominations to buy a total of 1,670,678 barrels of Texas oil per day. The nomination total, a decrease of 29,699 barrels daily when compared to July 1993 purchaser nominations, estimates Texas oil purchases in the coming month. August 1992 nominations totaled 1,744,863 barrels daily.

Nabers reported that crude oil and petroleum products imported into the U.S. averaged 8,390,000 barrels per day for the month of May 1993. This was an increase of 567,000 barrels per day from the same period a year ago.

The next statewide oil and gas production allowable hearing will begin at 2 p.m., on Friday, August 20, at the Railroad Commission in the William B. Travis Bldg., 1701 N. Congress Avenue, in Austin.

## NEWS FOR VETERANS

### LOWER HOME LOAN RATES:

The Texas Veterans Land Board has reduced interest rates on veterans home loans to their lowest levels since 1984, when the loan program began. Effective May 21, 1993, rates are 6.40 percent on 15, 20, and 25 year notes; and 6.99 percent on 30 year notes. The previous rate was 7.30 percent. The new rates are available only to veterans who have not yet applied for loans.

**VA INSURANCE:** The Veteran's Benefits Act of 1992 has an effective date for implementation of December 1, 1992. This legislation provides for:

1. An increase in the maximum coverage available under the Servicemen's Group Life Insurance (SGLI) program to \$200,000.

2. An increase in the maximum coverage available under the Veterans Group Life Insurance (VGLI) program to \$200,000 for those individuals separated from service on or after December 1, 1992.

3. VGLI coverage will not be indefinitely renewable in 5-year term periods for life. Conversion of VGLI to a commercial policy will be available at the end of any 5-year term period.

4. An increase in the maximum coverage available under the Veterans Mortgage Life Insurance program to \$90,000.

5. Service Disabled Veterans Insurance (S-DVI) policyholders who are eligible for waiver of premiums may now apply for \$20,000 of supplemental coverage. Premiums may not be waived on the supplemental coverage.

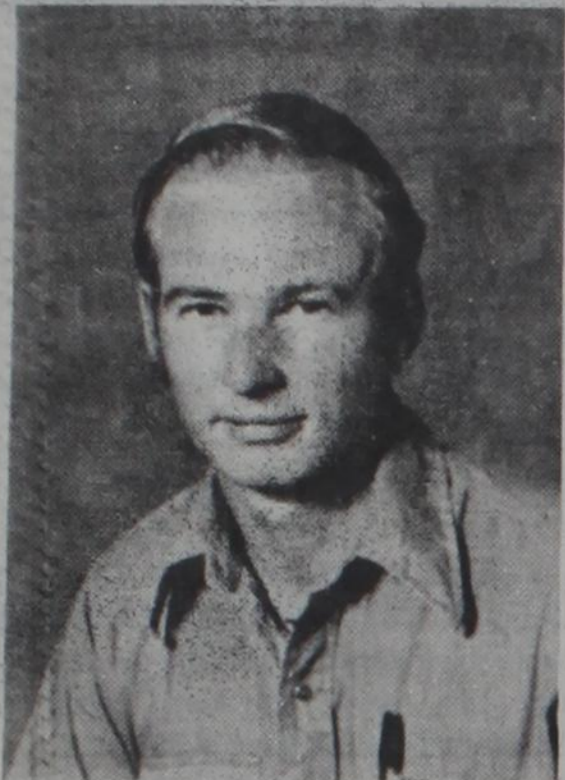

## Bench Marks 1992-93 School District Budgets in Texas

**AUSTIN** — Despite a 1.2% drop in property values, school trustees raised tax rates to produce 9.5% more revenue last year. School budgets were increased \$1.5 billion last fall for a total of \$18.7 billion. The total budget averaged \$5,284 per student. Classroom teachers received one dollar in four of the additional spending. Schools added 17,007 employees — an average of one new employee for each 4.8 additional students.

The figures come from the latest issue of *Bench Marks 1992-93 School District Budgets in Texas*, an annual publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

An average of \$4,255 per student for current operations was budgeted last year plus \$337 for repayment of debt and \$602 for capital outlay.

Cross Plains ISD's budget provided \$4,146.93 per student for current operations, \$169.31 for debt service, and \$410.65 for capital outlay based on 465 students enrolled in October 1992.

The average base salary for classroom teachers paid by Cross Plains ISD in October 1992 was \$25,237 plus supplements for the career ladder. The average for administrators was \$36,183, and \$26,103 for other professional support employees (librarians, counselors, nurses, supervisors, etc.).

Four dollars in each five were spent for salaries. Statewide payroll expense averaged \$3,439 per student, as compared to \$3,178.14 in Cross Plains ISD. Payroll expense is determined by salary levels and staffing patterns.

Taxpayers provided one teacher for 12.1 students in Cross Plains ISD while the statewide pupil-teacher ratio was 16.1 to one.

School districts and county education districts imposed a property tax at the rate of \$1.405 per \$100 of appraised value, which value averaged 98.6% of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was \$1.385 (\$1.405 times 98.6%) statewide. Locally, the Cross Plains ISD imposed a rate of \$1.078 including \$.940 by the county education district. Property was appraised at 103.1% of its market value making the true rate \$1.111 per \$100 of market value (selling price). The report points out that the calculation of a true tax rate based on market value rather than on appraised value is necessary to make a valid comparison of tax levels with other schools.

The tax on a house that would sell for \$80,000 in Cross Plains ISD would have been \$782. If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$592. That compares with statewide average tax bills of \$1,078 and \$854 respectively for an \$80,000 house.

Last year Cross Plains ISD's revenue from the property tax increased by 18.1 percent for 1992-93 as compared to a 9.5 percent increase statewide.

Local property taxes plus state aid totaled \$4,522 per student in Cross Plains ISD as compared to \$4,243 statewide.

The state and local share of the foundation program averaged \$3,144 per student last year and was \$4,237 in Cross Plains ISD. Local school districts can
