\section*{Parvovirus Diagnosed} In This Area
There has been an alarming number of parvovirus infections diagnosed in this area since the first of the year. Canine parvovirus is a viral disease of dogs different sets of clinical problems. The first to be recognized, and the most common, is the "intestinal form" which is manifested by bloody diarrhea, vomiting, loss of appetite, depression and often death. The second to be recognized is the "cardiac form", which occurs in very young pups and is manifested by an acute inflammation of the heart muscle.
Any age, breed or sex of dog can be
affected by parvovirus. Several factors affected by parvovirus. Several factors such as age, environment, stress,
parasites and general health status of each individual dog infected could affect the severity of illness. The disease is usually more severe in young dogs (less than 6 months of age) or old dogs. Early, vigorous treatment of the illness
is imperative since vor is imperative since vomiting and
diarrhea can lead to dehydration and chemical imbalance in the body. chemical imbalance in the body. measures alone is extremely difficult because the virus is such a resistant, hardy organism and because it is so
easily spread. Parvovirus is transmitted easily spread. Parvovirus is transmitted through contact with the feces of an affected dog. The virus can be carried on the dogs hair and feet, as well as on
contaminated cages, shoes, or other contaminated cages, shoes, or other
objects. Isolation of infected dogs is one objects. solation of infected dogs is one effective. Just as any other virus, only. vaccination of susceptible animals will control the actual source of infection. A properly immunized dog will have circulating protection in the blood that will destroy parvovirus following exposure. It is important to begin vaccination at an early age and repeat every \(2-3\) weeks until the puppy is at
least \(14-16\) weeks old. Adult should receive two doses of vaccine should receive two doses of vaccine
given \(3-4\) weeks apart for maximum protection. All dogs should receive an annual booster vaccination to assure an enduring immunity.

April 18th with a rapid onset of Aprorologic signs. He showed no response to treatment and was on April 20 th .

Rabies in horses can present a variety of signs and is often very difficult to diagnose. In any horse showing a rapid onset of neurologic signs or very abnormal behavior, Rabies must be considered.
Rabies vaccines approved for use in
horses are available from horses are available from your
veterinarian and yearly vaccinations are recommended in this area.
