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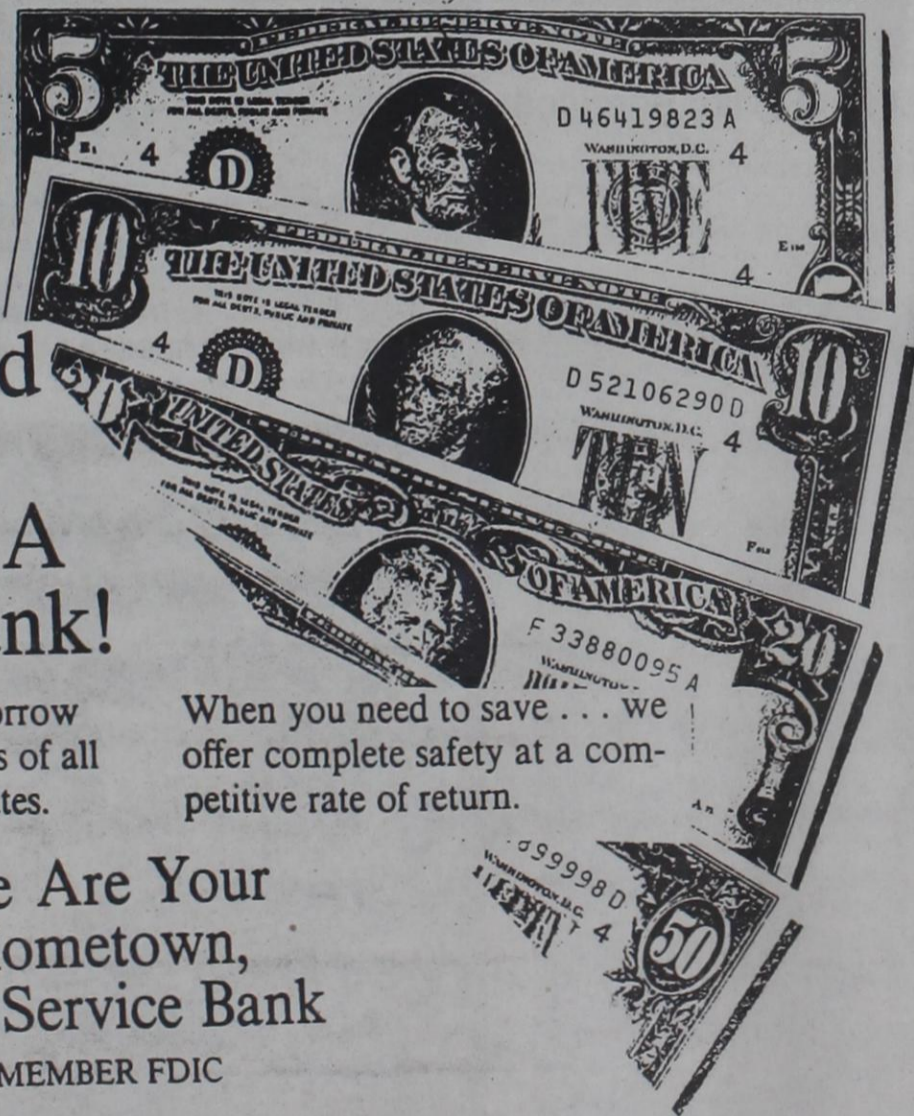
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MINUTE MUSINGS

CITY COUNCIL MINUTES

Special Meeting July 12, 1993

This was a special meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. Members present were Mayor Gene Dillard, Ray Purvis, James Nichols, Tom Clark, and Leon Nixon. Gary Childers was absent.

Joe Coppinger met with the council to discuss the possibility of closing the street next to his property and the alley across his property that are designated street and alley but have never been developed. The purpose of these closures are for the construction of 24 housing units to be built by ERC Properties, Inc. ERC has applied for funding through FHMA and if the funding is approved these units will serve the elderly and low-moderate income families. The designated street that is proposed to be closed is Avenue F. Sixteenth Street also runs along this property, but will continue to be open. Gosnell is to contact the Texas Municipal League concerning the proper procedure and legal matters concerning this endeavor. Tom Clark moved to close Avenue F and the alley across this property after all legal steps have been taken and all hearings held on the matter. Ray Purvis seconded and motion carried.

Tom Clark moved to adjourn. Ray Purvis seconded but no vote was taken at this time due to the fact that a citizen was present in the audience and had several questions he wanted to discuss with the council. The mayor recognized Frank Robertson and gave Frank the floor. Mr. Robertson asked the council why the city did not keep the old police car and use it for transportation for Roger Wilson to and from the sewer farm. The council informed Mr. Robertson that the car needed alot of work. Robertson also asked the council why they would sell the old city pickup and leave Bill Hedrick without transportation, when the council had approved \$3,000.00 in the budget to repair the pickup. The council informed Robertson that they felt like they needed the income from the sell of the two vehicles to help defray the cost of a new pickup. Mr. Robertson also wanted to know why the council would give a contract to a person who has a law suit filed against the city for \$150,000.00. James Nichols stated that he was the low bid. Mayor Dillard stated it was his opinion he had always done a good job for the city. James Nichols also stated that we got the job done for \$199.00 and if it goes to court it will plainly show that we are trying to work with him. Mr. Robertson stated that if it goes to court it could look like to a jury that we were trying to apologize to him or to mollify the situation. Mr. Robertson wanted to know why we didn't move it ourselves. The council thanked Mr. Robertson for his comments.

Leon Nixon also asked to be able to state his opinion on the contract to move the shed. Leon stated that he felt like the council had reviewed the selling of the vehicles and had made the right decisions on that particular matter. However, he did want to go on record that he opposed giving the contract for moving the storage shed to Rex Maxwell. He also stated that he apologized for not being present the night the contract was let, however, his son was involved in a Little League All-Star Tournament and he was there supporting his son.

Tom Clark moved to adjourn. Ray Purvis seconded and motion carried.

Special Meeting July 20, 1993

This was a special meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. Members present were Mayor Gene Dillard, Ray Purvis, James Nichols, and Gary Childers. Tom Clark and Leon Nixon were absent.

The council discussed the problem that the city is experiencing with an abundance of stray dogs as well as owners allowing their dogs to roam the city. The council discussed the fact that recently a dog jumped up on a citizen of Cross Plains and caused alot of injury to the individual. There have been other such injuries reported previously. The council feels the need to begin looking into a lease ordinance or some type of system that will help keep the number of dogs allowed to run loose within the community at a minimum. Debbie Gosnell informed the council that she had been talking with the Health Department concerning the implementation of an ordinance or a pound and the Department will work with the city in implementing whichever choice the city decides upon. They also informed Gosnell that they would send information on both choices.

The council discussed the survey that the city needs to do in order to apply for a grant to help with the construction of a new standpipe water tower. The survey must be completed by September 15,

1993. The purpose of the survey is to help the Department of Commerce in determining the income level for the community. Debbie Gosnell informed the council that Deanna Beauchamp was looking for some part-time work. By general consent the council agreed to allow Deanna Beauchamp to conduct the survey at \$5.00 per hour.

Ray Purvis moved to adjourn. James Nichols seconded and motion carried.

This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. Members present were Gene Dillard, Ray Purvis, James Nichols, Gary Childers, Leon Nixon, and Tom Clark.

Minutes of July 6 and 12 were approved as read with Leon Nixon moving to accept and James Nichols seconded.

Paul Neeb met with the council concerning the speed on 12th Street and also discussed the width of 12th Street. He stated traffic travelling too fast and throwing rocks in his yard. By general consent the council agreed to put up a 25 m.p.h. sign and have the chief to patrol this area and talk with some of the individuals that are speeding down 12th Street.

Tom Clark moved to accept the financial agreement between the City of Cross Plains and First Southwest Company of Abilene concerning the FHA loan the city has applied for. James Nichols seconded and motion carried.

James Nichols moved to change the charge for maps from \$2.50 to \$1.25. Tom Clark seconded and motion carried.

Public hearing #1, concerning the grant the city will apply for, was held.

The council discussed passing a dog ordinance. County Judge, Bill Johnson met with the council and stated that you would have to have an ordinance to enforce any animal control. He also stated you would have to set standards for the ordinance. By general consent the council tabled the discussion.

Tom Clark moved to have the public hearing pertaining to the closing of Avenue F between 16th and Cypress for September 7, 1993. Leon Nixon seconded and motion carried.

The council opened bids on the new pickup. Bids received were as follows:

Weatherby Motor Co.-Brownwood-\$13,551.00 F250 3/4 regular cab
Bayer Motor Co.-Comanche-\$11,356.00 4.3L EFI V6, 5 Spd.
James Nichols moved to purchase the Chevrolet Pickup from Bayer Motor Co. and to amend the budget in the amount of \$8,356.00. Tom Clark seconded and motion carried.

Ray Purvis moved to adjourn. Tom Clark seconded and motion carried.

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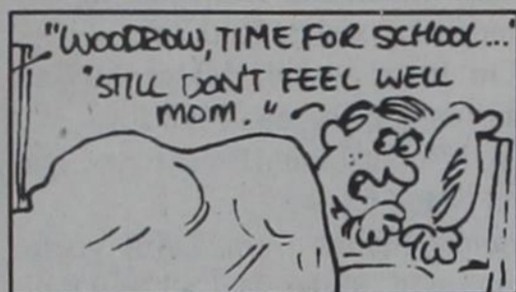

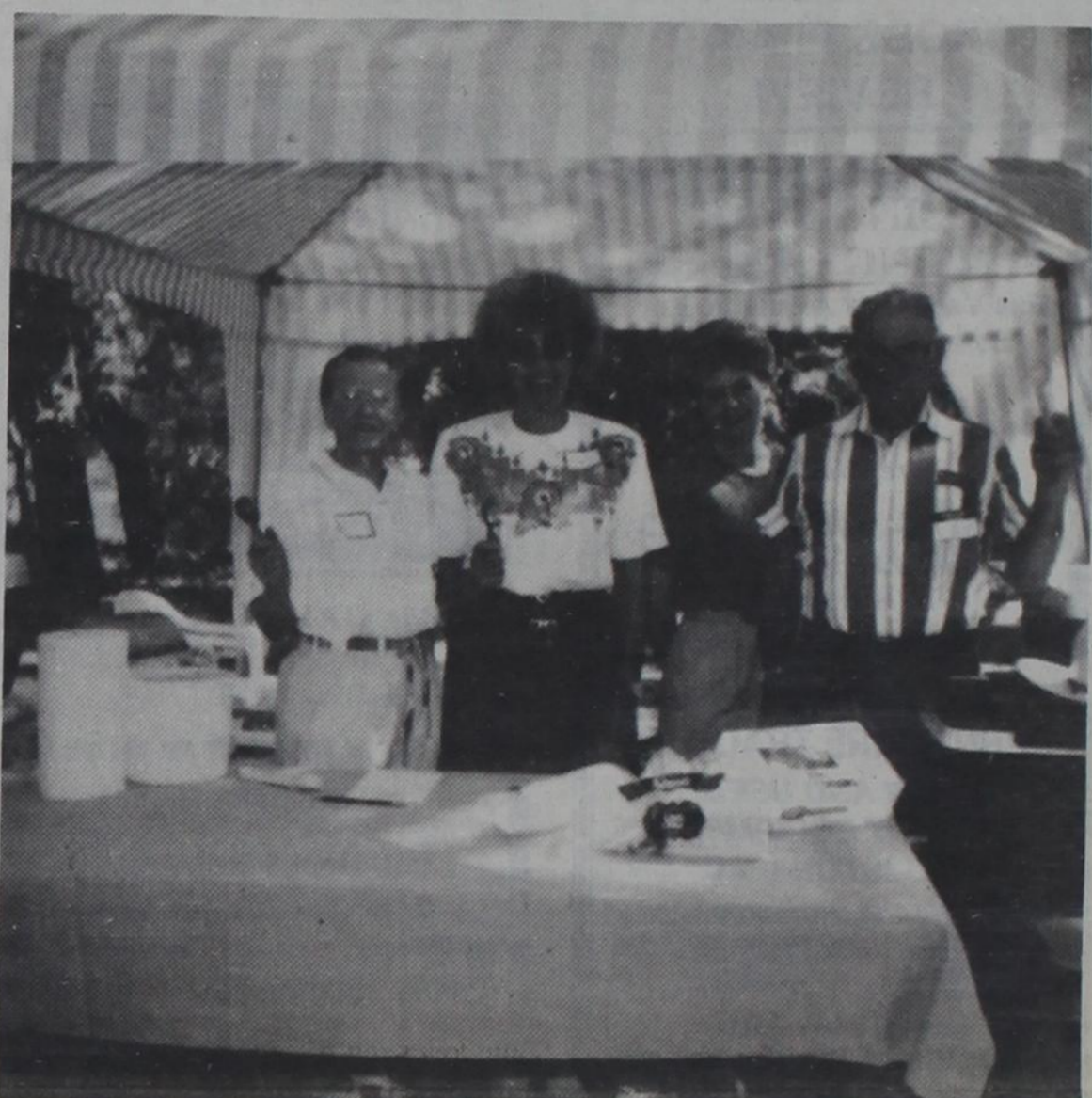

By 1910, 1,359 orphaned, abandoned, homeless children along with a few poor families had been brought to Texas in hopes of finding homes; getting a fresh start in life.

Today this era in America's history covering 75 years (1854-1929) is known as the "Orphan Trains Era." A conservative estimate of 150,000 children were relocated from orphanages in New York City and Boston to new homes in the mid-west and south.

Only a handful of survivors remain today to talk about their lives and how the Orphan Trains affected their lives.

Saturday, August 21st, a reunion of Orphan Train Riders, their families and friends will be held in Granbury, Texas. Registration will begin at 9:00 a.m. at Bodacious Bar-B-Q Restaurant, 1450 Hwy. 377 in Granbury. The meeting is open to the public, but space is limited. A charge of \$25 per person covers the entire day's activities, including a continental breakfast, lunch and entertainment.

Orphan Train Riders were, and are, America's first documented foster care children. Two major institutions were involved: the Children's Aid Society and the New York Foundling Hospital. The mass placing-out stopped in 1929 when

the government passed child welfare reforms.

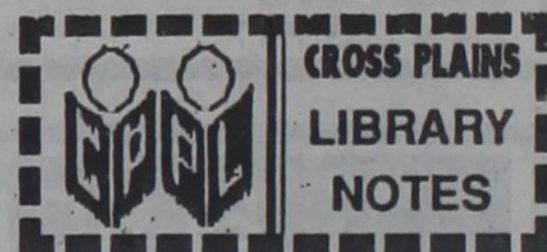

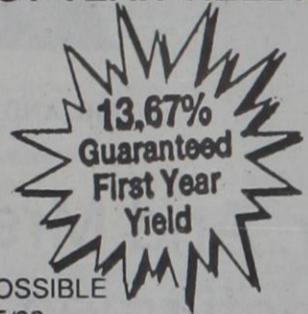
