

#### **Special Meeting** July 12, 1993

This was a special meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. Members present were Mayor Gene Dillard, Ray Purvis, James Nichols, Tom Clark, and Leon Nixon. Gary Childers was absent.

Joe Coppinger met with the council to discuss the possibility of closing the street next to his property and the alley across his property that are designated street and alley but have never been developed. The purpose of these closures are for the construction of 24 housing units to be built by ERC Properties, Inc. ERC has applied for funding through FHmA and if the funding is approved these units will serve the elderly and lowmoderate income families. The designated street that is proposed to be closed is Avenue F. Sixteenth Street also runs along this property, but will continue to be open. Gosnell is to contact the Texas Municipal League concerning the proper this endeavor. Tom Clark moved to close Tom Clark. Avenue F and the alley across this property after all legal steps have been taken and all hearings held on the matter. Ray Purvis seconded and motion carried.





Today this era in America's history covering 75 years (1854-1929) is known

# **NEWS FOR VETERANS**

**Post Traumatic** Stress Disorder

Service Connection for Post Traumatic Stress Disorder: A clear diagnosis of PTSD, credible supporting evidence that the claimed inservice stressor actually occurred, and a link established by medical evidence between current symptoms and the claimed inservice stressor establishes service-connection for Post Traumatic Stress Disorder.

If the veteran relates his inservice stressor to combat, the Purple Heart Combat Infantry Badge or similar citations would be accepted in the absence of evidence to the contrary as conclusive evidence of the claimed inservice stressor. A history of a stressor as related by the veteran is, in itself, insufficient. When seeking entitlement to serviceconnection for PTSD, it is advisable to submit the following evidence:

1. Evidence of combat with the enemy, (Commendations and decorations such as Combat Infantryman's Badge, the Purple Heart of Medals for Valor).

2. Lay evidence that supports the veterans contention that he did engage in combat with the enemy.

3. A statement from the veteran that accurately describes stressful incidents experienced during combat and attributes his present disability to these

4. A diagnosis from the veteran's treating physician to confirm the existence of the present disability and to link the disability to the incidents that occurred during combat.

Stressors produce characteristic symptoms that involve re-experiencing the traumatic incident that is generally outside the range of usual human experience. Examples of distressing experiences would be chronic illness, business loss, marital conflict, simple bereavement, military combat, serious physical

injuries, death camps, torture, taking human lives, bombing, airplane crashes, large fires, head traumas, earthquakes, or natural disasters that produce floods.

Diminished responsiveness to the external world referred to as "psychic numbing" or "emotional on esthesia" usually begins soon after the traumatic event. The individual has recurrent, painful and intrusive recollections of the event or current dreams or nightmares during which the event is re-experienced. The vast majority of Vietnam combat veterans are depressed. They have symptoms of sleep disturbances, psychomotor retardation, feelings of worthlessness, difficulty in concentrating, etc. The possibility of suicide is always present. When a Vietnam veteran recalls their combat episodes they almost invariably cry.

Our society owes a great debt to veterans of past wars. These citizens fought for their Country's freedom when they were called to duty. Many veterans faced severe problems with their families and their lives when they returned. The flashbacks, bitterness, anger, anxiety, depression, and loneliness alienated them from a society they once were well adjusted to. Assisting these individuals in successfully prosecuting claims for Post Traumatic Stress Disorder is repaying a debt long overdue.
