Jeremy Tennison Benefit Set For Saturday, July 10

Saturday, July 10, has been proclaimed Jeremy Tennison Day, in honor of a brave young man who resides in Cross Plains. A special benefit has been orchestrated to assist with medical expenses incurred during Jeremy's battle with cancer of the bone over the past year. Don Childers, Susan Maxwell, and Jack Taylor are the committee who organized the benefit, and they are most appreciative of all the excellent cooperation.

After a positive diagnosis, the malignant tumor was removed from the large bone in his lower leg and bone, received from the bone bank, was grafted into the space. The muscle from the back of his leg was then stretched around to the front to protect the graft area from injury.

Jeremy has undergone chemotherapy for the past year and only has two treatments remaining. He has met this intense physical challenge with humor and endurance. His dad, Clarence Tennison, said when they told Jeremy that he would lose his hair due to the chemotherapy, he just remarked, "Well, that will save on haircuts!" His dad came back with, "Yes, but that Turtle Wax is sure expensive."

At this time Jeremy has already lost his hair twice, and is anticipating the last treatment. The white blood count and various other factors determine if the treatment may be given. We certainly hope all goes well.

Currently, he is traveling to Abilene for physical therapy at the West Texas Rehabilitation Center to strengthen his muscles so that he can walk without crutches. He is looking forward to being free from the crutches and returning to school. His dad said, "You don't hear too many kids that are wanting to get back to school, but Jeremy has worked with the homebound school teacher, Betty Barclay, all year to keep up with his studies."

He is attending summer school at the Cross Plains High School in order to remain with his classmates and be classified as a Sophomore this fall.

Jeremy's main motivation has been a desire to play football once again. He was a lineman on the Junior High team and briefly played as a Freshman. His main

goal is to play in the 1995 Homecoming game as a Junior. You have to admire this youth's spirit.

He is also very proud of his mother, Tammy Tennison, and dad's accomplishments during this difficult year. The couple were attending classes at Texas State Technical College in Abilene when Jeremy was diagnosed and they chose to continue their education. Clarence has completed a course in drafting and design technology and is presently working at Texas Tanks, Inc. in Albany. Tammy is now a medical records transcriptionist. They will receive their official diplomas at a ceremony in August at Sweetwater. The couple had determined that the first one to secure employment would start to work and the other remain at home to care for Jeremy.

The Tennisons have a nine-year-old daughter, Rebecca, who is also learning to be understanding of her brother's illness. She remarked, "I will be glad when he gets off his crutches so he can aggravate me."

Jeremy has also attended Driver's Education this summer to obtain his driver's license timely. His dad said they

Wall Of Liberty Campaign

Texas Veterans Commission Journal
— May/June 1993

The Battle of Normandy Foundation kicked off an 18-month national educational program earlier this year to celebrate and commemorate the 50th Anniversary of D-Day. At the launch event in New York City, a large group of veterans, politicians and entertainers joined together to unveil the design for The Wall of Liberty — a major new monument honoring ETO (European Theater of Operations) WWII veterans. The Wall of Liberty Campaign's Chairman Pierre Salinger of ABC News, is currently working with Foundation to reach out to veterans and their descendants to register names for the monument, in time for its dedication on the actual 50th Anniversary, June 6, 1994.

The Wall of Liberty, will be the first monument in the world to honor all American veterans, living or deceased, who served in the European Theater of Operations during World War II, including North African, Mediterranean and Italian Campaigns. It will be built in Caen, the Capital of Normandy, France, near the invasion beaches where the liberation of Europe began. Following its dedication next June, plans are to build the monument in time for the fiftieth anniversary of V-E Day, May 8, 1995.

Anne Eisenhower placed her grandfather's name, General Dwight D. Eisenhower, on the Wall of Liberty first, to officially launch the national registration campaign. Pierre Salinger registered Joseph P. Kennedy, Jr. Other guests at the event included WWII veteran and past commander of the VFW Earl Stock, WWII veteran and 1976 National Commander of the DAV, Frank Randazzo, Chairman of the National WWII Commemoration Committee for The American Legion, Herman G. Harrington, and past president of the Medal of Honor Society Nicholas Oresko. All of these guests registered names of veterans close to them for The Wall of Liberty.

Pierre Salinger, Chairman of the Wall of Liberty Campaign, is currently touring the county to reach veterans and their descendants about The Wall of Liberty. The concept for The Wall of Liberty was initiated by concerned American citizens and veterans and will be paid for by the people who believe in and support this effort. A \$40 registration fee per name will cover building costs since there are no government funds allocated for this project. Veterans, their families, relatives and friends can register a name for The Wall of Liberty by calling 1-800-WWII-VETS. Those patriots who may not know a particular veteran, but would like to help build this historic wall can also call and pledge their support.

Founded in 1985, The Battle of Normandy Foundation is a non-profit organization assigned by the 50th Anniversary Commission of Congress to lead

national commemorative events in the private sector. The Foundation's first accomplishment was contributing to the establishment of Le Memorial, the world's largest World War II museum located in Caen, France. Other Foundation projects include: The Normandy Scholar Program, World War II Commemorative Coin Programs, The United States Armed Forces Memorial Garden, and The Freedom Tour, a mobile World War II exhibition.

Cow-Calf Workshop Schedule July 12-13

If you are operating a cow-calf enterprise, mark your calendar for Monday and Tuesday, July 12 and 13. An IRM-SPA, "Integrated Resource Management — Standardized Performance Analysis" shortcourse is open to all cow-calf producers.

Instructors for this two-day shortcourse are Dr. Steve Hammack, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist and Dr. Stan Beavers, Extension Economist.

The morning session on July 12 is open to all cow-calf producers — while the afternoon session is limited to those who pre-register for the SPA computer session (which will continue on Tuesday, July 13th). The July 12 session only requires pre-registration while the computer sessions on July 12 and 13th requires a \$70 registration fee.

What is SPA? SPA is a standardized cow-calf enterprise production and financial performance analysis system developed by Texas A&M in cooperation with the National Cattleman's Association. SPA helps cow-calf producers of any size who are willing to spend time assembling the necessary data to do the SPA analysis to monitor performance. SPA helps producers, consultants, lenders and advisors to effectively analyze the cow-calf enterprise to identify opportunities for profitable change and to monitor progress over time. The morning session on Monday, July 12, is free and open to the public. Beginning with the afternoon session on the 12th and continuing through the 13th, the program

will instruct participants in gathering data, entering this information into the computer program, and evaluating the results. The cost of this session will be \$70, which includes the computer software and printed materials. The workshop will be held in the Mrs. J.A.B. Miller Library Building on the Courthouse square, beginning at 8:30 a.m. on Monday, July 12.

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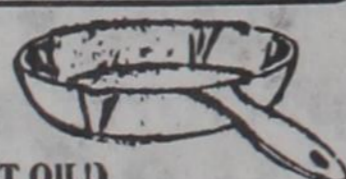
