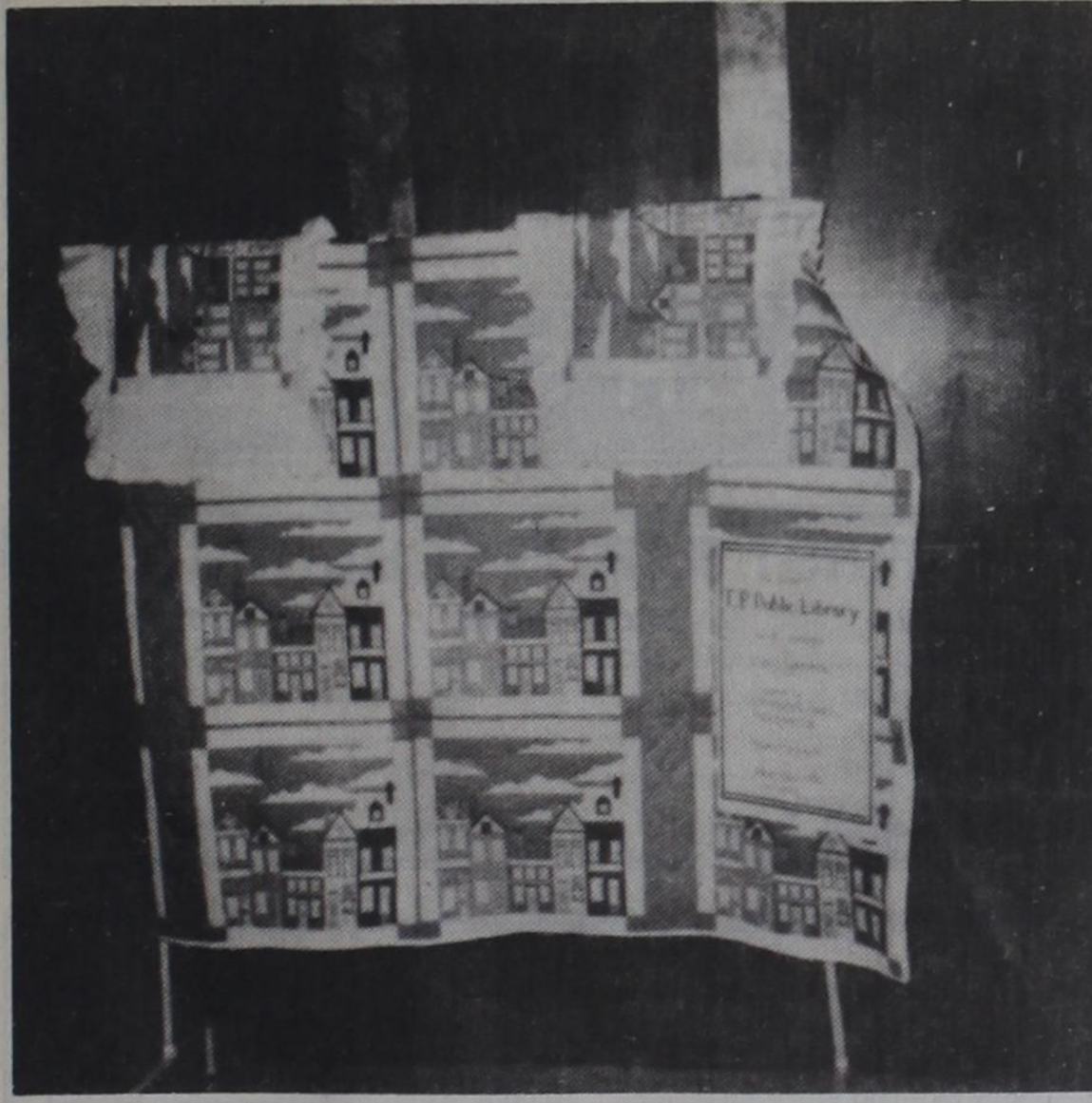

Follow-Up To The PAY Conference

A meeting was held in the high school library, Monday, April 5, at 7 p.m. During this session, former participants of the PAY Conference went over suggestions that might create positive action. It was reported that plans were being made for a summer theater workshop for elementary students. Softball for girls was being organized. Approximately sixty-eight girls had signed up to play. There was discussion that art lessons may be provided for students this summer. The committee for the Christmas Village has agreed to involve students with their community project. There will be more effort made by the community and school to involve students in the activities and life of the community. The student council will serve as a liaison group between the students and the community.

It was also noted that dances for the middle school and high school students will continue. Also, Project Graduation continues for the 5th year.

Pat Socia's sex education curriculum was available for viewing. Although there was no mandates for sex education at this time, her viewpoints are those embraced by the majority of participants at the conference. Also, available was conflict resolution materials. Plans are to begin this program next year.

Many other subjects and ideas were discussed. Among those were more recognition for positive behavior (a new student of the month program, Buffalo Bucks), the DARE program (an alcohol/drug support program), stress management (program materials will try to be implemented next year), more parents involved in the non-acceptance of alcohol with their teenagers (the idea is that the more parents who disapprove, the stronger the message).

Volunteers agreed to work on two programs that had been suggested for students. Those are adopt-a-class and a career mentoring program.

At the PAY Conference in February, one of the suggestions was an open forum with administrators. Mr. Wood has agreed to share his opinions on school issues with us. There will be an open ended, question and answer, forum on Monday, May 17, in the high school library. Attention Deficit Disorder is a specific behavioral disorder characterized by chronic problems with attention, impulsiveness, and/or hyperactivity or restlessness which are inappropriate for a child's age. The ADD child experiences an inability to filter out extraneous noises or visual distractions and therefore has difficulty focusing in stimulating environments. Most children, for example, can ignore such common classroom sounds as pencils dropping, chairs scraping and feet shuffling. An ADD child, however, hears all sounds equally and may not be able to adequately screen irrelevant noise to concentrate on a teacher's instructions. The condition is believed to be neurologically based and first appears in early childhood. Left untreated, ADD can significantly interfere with an individual's self-esteem, ability to learn, and social development. Although estimates vary regarding the number of individuals with the disorder, ADD widely is believed to affect approximately 2-5% of school age children.

The PTO strongly urges anyone who has a child with ADD or who is interested in finding out more about ADD to attend. Parents, teachers, grandparents, uncles and aunts, or even just a friend of the family are welcomed to come and hear Dr. Brinkman. The information you receive here could make a difference in a child's school and everyday life.

COTTONWOOD NEWS

The Cottonwood Volunteer Fire Department was kept busy assisting the Cross Plains Fire Department with the fire between the two areas. 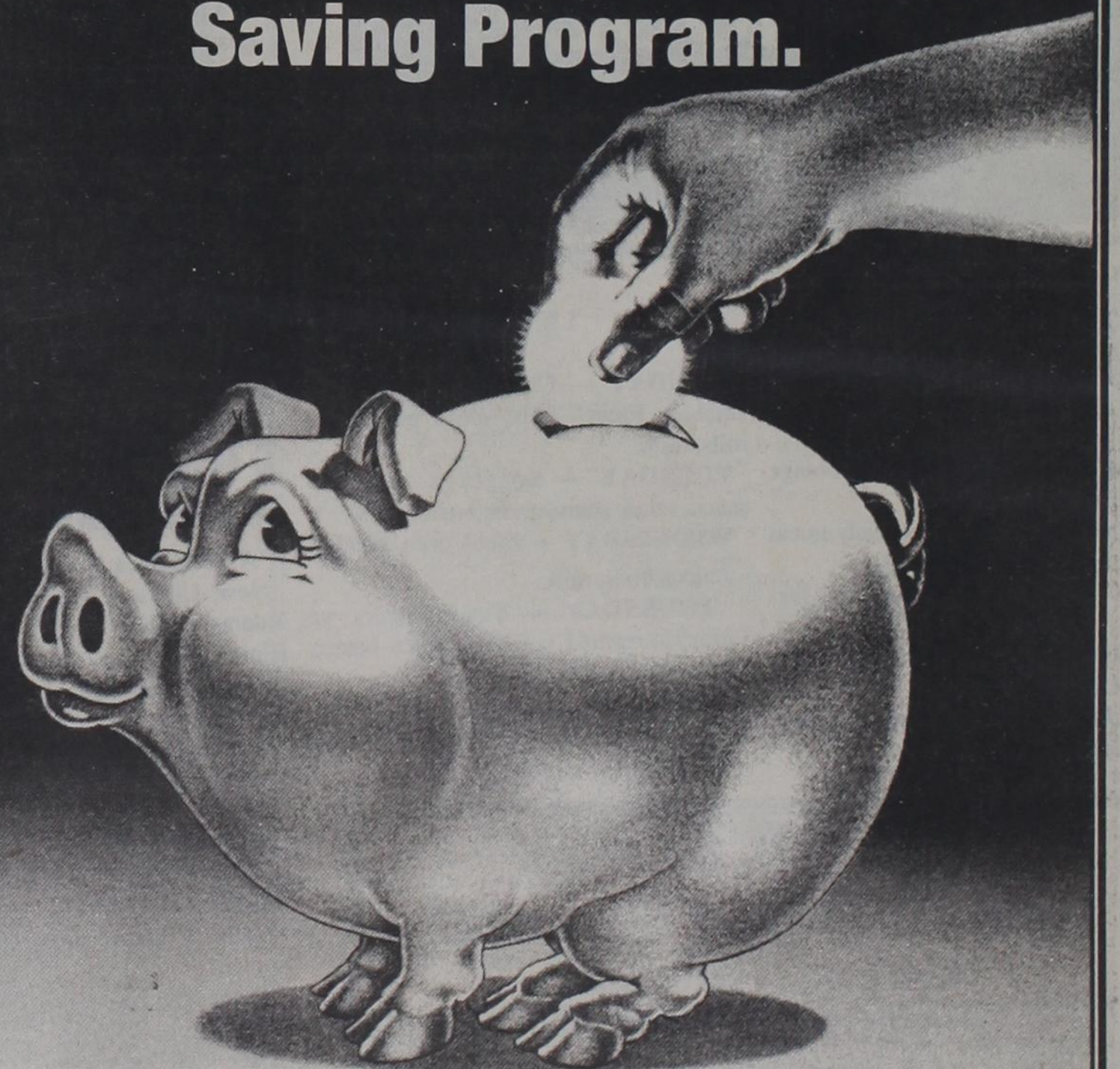

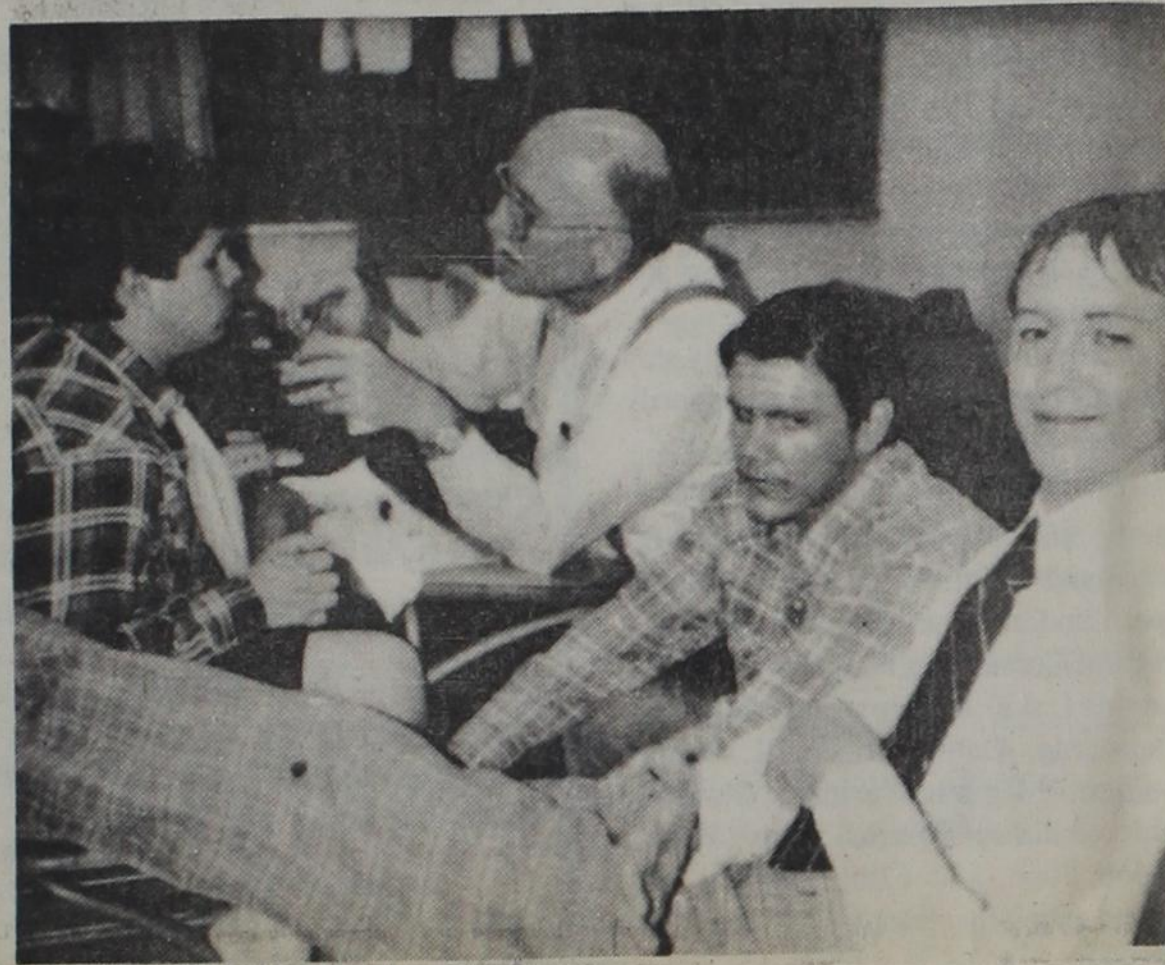

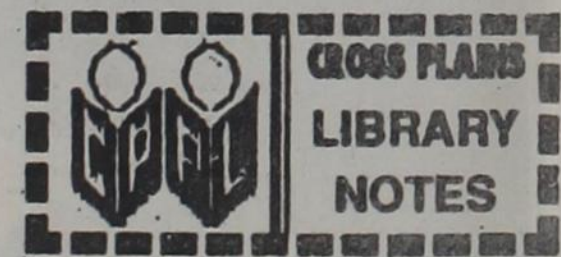
student have to pass in order to graduate, but it is an assessment test checking the students' progress. It does correlate closely to the TAAS thought.

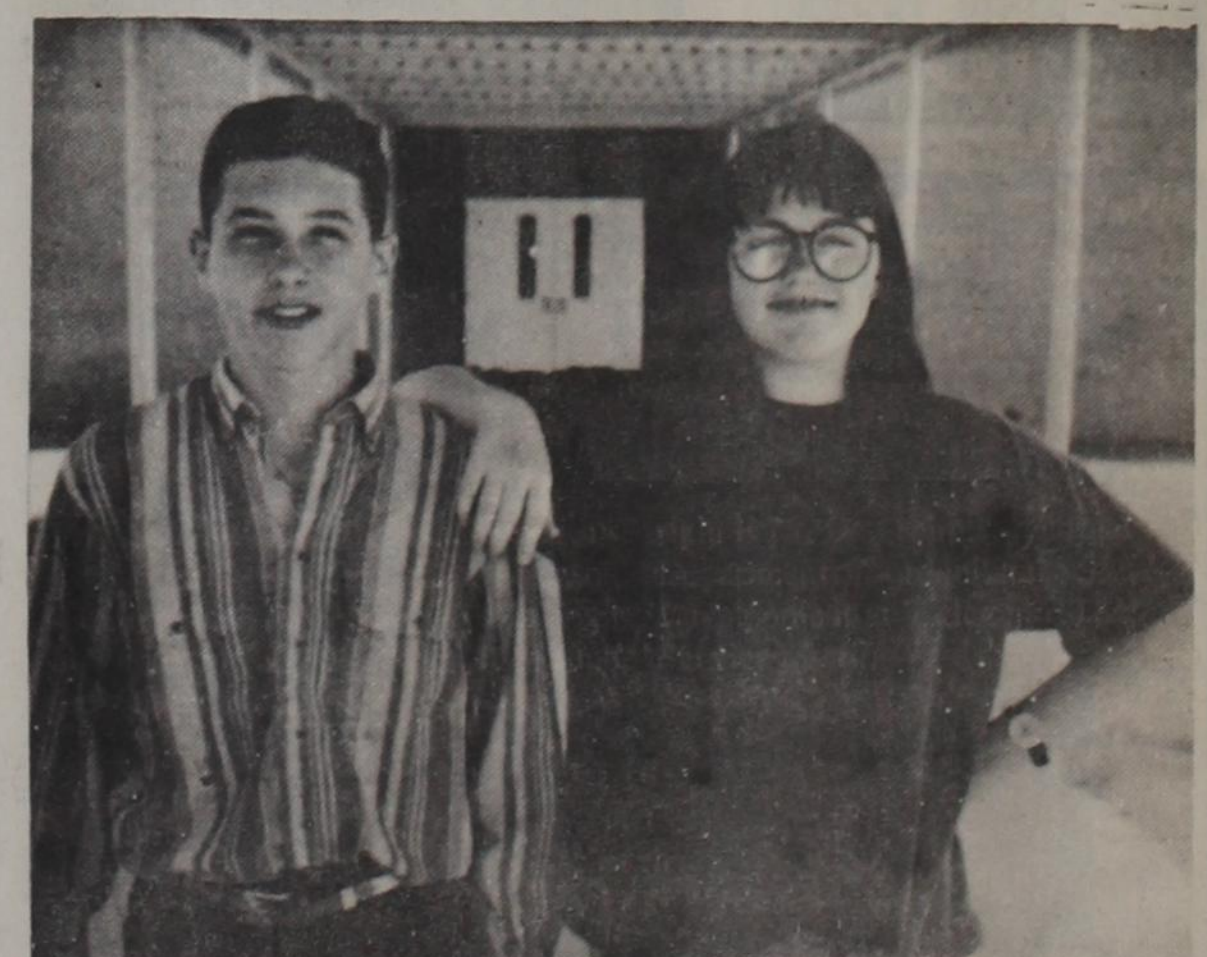

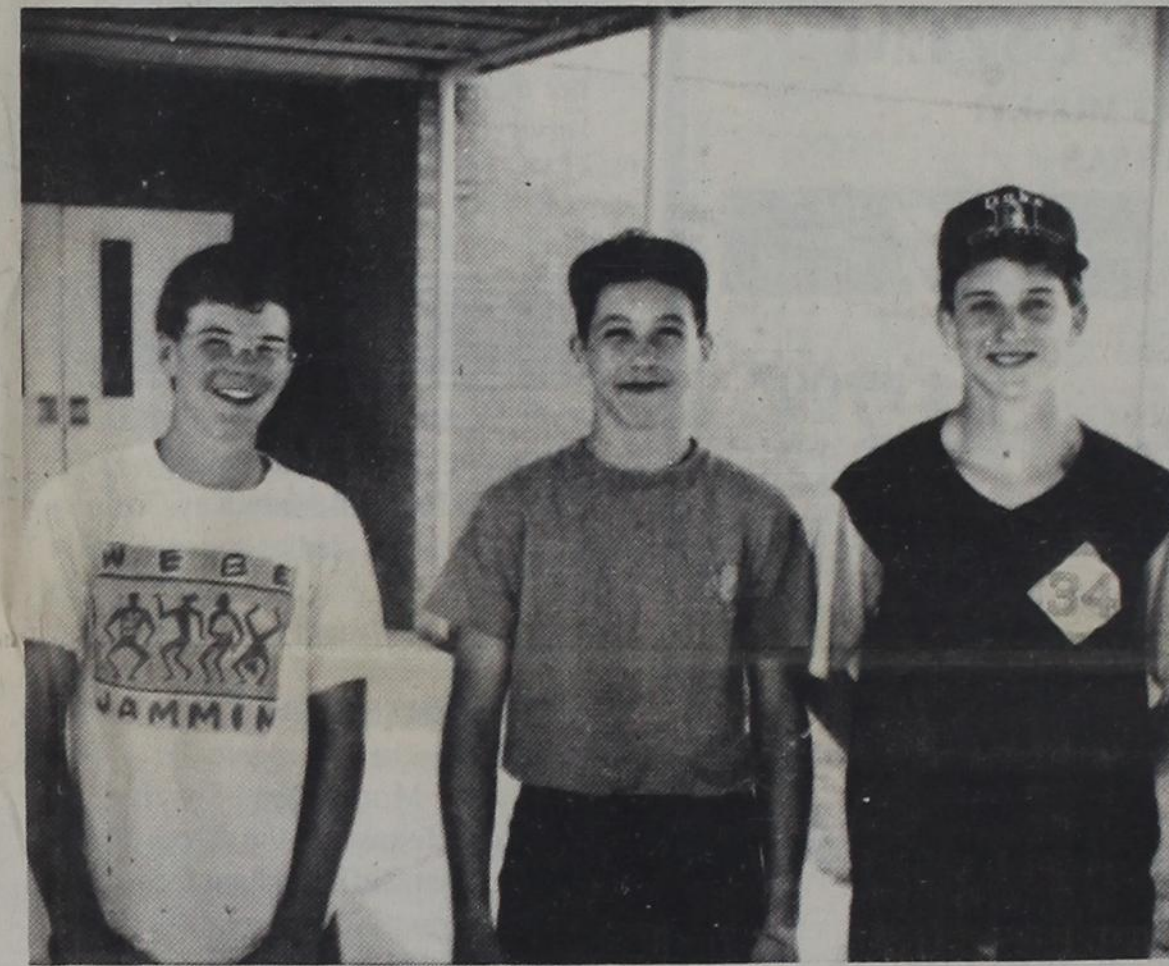
