FmHA tries to find members of those groups who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA farm ownership loan. The agency can sell or lease to those who are eligible, a farm purchase of land on the open market purchase of land on the open market Mr. Bailey said.
FmHA can also provide other loan assislance, including operating loans, borrower get started.
People who think they may be eligible, whether they already are in farming or would like to become farmers, are urged to contact the Farmers Home Administration county office in their
