

The state spent a total of \$4,984,147 last year for major welfare programs in Callahan County, according to David Maberry, Regional Administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

"Medical assistance had the biggest impact, with \$1,042,458 spent for families and children and \$492,124 for the aged and disabled for hospitals, physicians, laboratory, x-ray and other services. Also, \$72,771 was spent for families and children and \$226,425 for the aged and disabled in Callahan County for prescribed medicines. Nursing home costs of approximately \$1,502,170 were paid for aged and

Bids For The Reconstruction Of Highway 36 For April 1993

Bids for the rehabilitation of State Highway 36, from FM 603 to U.S. Highway 283, in Callahan County are expected to be opened in April 1993, according to Bill Jackson, district design manager of the Department of Transportation in Abilene.

Jackson stated the reconstruction of State Highway 36 will involve the recycling of four to five inches of the roadway. The job is estimated to cost \$3.56 million.

He added State Highway 36, from the Taylor County line Farm to Market Road 603, will be rehabilitated. Jackson said the project will involve a two inch hot mix overlay on the roadway at a projected cost of \$500,000. Bids for that project are expected to be opened in March 1994.

Jackson said the State Highway 36 reconstruction will not include any overpass features at the intersections of FM 603 and FM 604 and U.S. Highway 283. He said overpass bids for Highway 36 have been denied by Austin officials because of the lack of traffic along the

The district design manager named several other roadway reconstruction projects in Callahan County the Department of Transportation is expecting to bid for in the coming years.

He said the reconstruction of Farm to Market Road 604, from the Clyde Lake road to State Highway 36, will be let sometime in January 1994. The Department of Transportation estimates the job to cost \$1.6 million.

Jackson said bids for the reconstruction of Interstate 20, from FM 604 to the Taylor County line, will be opened in the spring or summer of 1994.

Jackson said the reconstruction of Farm to Market Road 603 will not come before bidders for a couple of years. Because trucks working on the I-20 reconstruction use FM 603 now, Jackson said the roadway would not be rehabilitated until after the I-20 reconstruction is complete. He said the heavy truck traffic on FM 603 would destroy any new road construction there. Jackson said the Department of Transportation hopes to reconstruct FM 603 in the 1995 bid letting process.

Predator Management Training Session Set For February 22


LLANO - A Predator Management Training Session is set for 6:30 p.m. February 22 in the Llano County Community Center. The Center is located on Ranch Road 152, two miles west of Llano.

Session sponsors are the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The session is designed to certify producers on the M-44 Sodium Cyanide Applicator, a device used to control coyotes, feral dogs and foxes preying on livestock.

Producers wishing to continue using M-44 Sodium Cyanide who were certified prior to April 18, 1988 must take this course and be recertified. Proper certification to use M-44 Sodium Cyanide also requires possession of a private applicator certificate or license, a non-commercial applicator license or a commercial applicator license to purchase restricted-use and statelimited-use pesticides. Information on getting these licenses will be covered at the training session. The training and following certification test should last about three hours.




