Approximately 150 fans from sixteen cities in the United States and London, England attended Saturday's open house at the Howard House Museum, located on West Highway 36. Project Pride is in the process of restoring the home. The event, held Saturday, was in commemoration of Robert E. Howard, who is known worldwide for his literary works of fantasy. He is probably best known as creator of Conan, The Barbarian. Howard made

his home here with his parents, Dr. and Mrs. I.M. Howard, until his death in June, 1936. Among those in attendance were Mrs. Alla Ray Morris of Ranger, who is heir to the Howard Estate. Other guests included: Glenn Lord of Pasadena, Literary Agent for the Estate; Richard Toogood, a fan, of London, England; and LeRoy Butler, Abilene, who was a boyhood neighbor of the Howards.

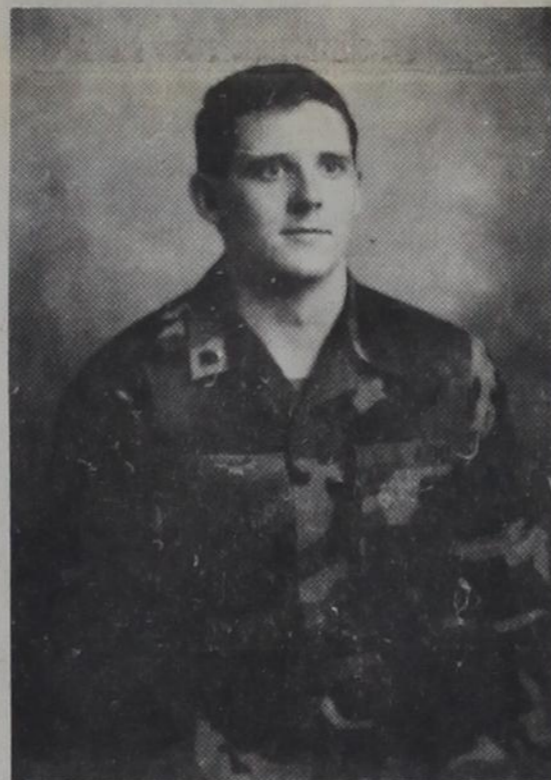

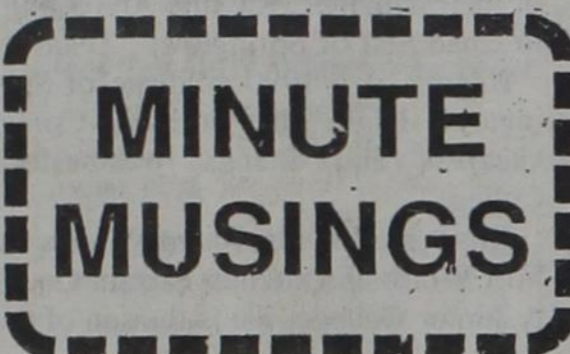
