## OUTDOOR BURNING BAN IMPOSED IN CALLAHAN COUNTY

An outdoor burning ban has been reinstated in Callahan County until further notice.

The burning ban was imposed by Callahan County Commissioners during a regular commissioners' court meeting held Monday, January 22 at the Callahan County Courthouse in Baird.

Callahan County Judge Bill Johnson said commissioners imposed the outdoor burning ban because of the lack of winter rainfall and the dry conditions throughout the county.

Judge Johnson said the burning ban will stay in effect in the county "until conditions improve and there is no long a hazard of wildfires."

The county judge said all types of outdoor burning are being banned immediately by the ordinance. Judge Johnson said those who dis-

obey the burning ban will face a misdemeanor criminal charge as well as be liable for civil damages resulting from a fire.

Other action taken Monday, January 22 by county commissioners included:

—Commissioners voted to appoint Kevin Weiss as county constable in precinct #4 (Cross Plains). Weiss will fill the constable post vacancy until January 1, 1997. He's taking the constable position of Ernest Cortez, who resigned when he moved from the county. Weiss is running unopposed for the constable position in the Democratic Primary Election.

—Commissioners reported receiving no new information from a committee assigned to report on a countywide beeper system.

The Annual Callahan County Jr. Livestock Show will open with the judging of rabbits and poultry Thursday, January 25, at 6:00 p.m.

Judging will begin at 8:30 a.m. on Friday, January 26, with the Breeding Sheep Show followed by the Market Lamb Show.

The Dairy Goat and Meat Goat Show will follow the Lamb Show on Friday.

Judging of the Breeding Swine followed by the Market Swine will

commence at 1:00 p.m. Friday.

Friday afternoon from 1:00 - 4:00 p.m. all steers and heifers will be classified and weighed. Judging of the Beef Cattle will get under way at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday, January 27, beginning with the Heifer Show. Steer judging will begin at 9:00 a.m.

A barbecue lunch will be served after the steer show and the Premium Auction is scheduled for 2:00 p.m.

The Awards Presentation of all the trophies for the champion animals

will be held prior to the premium sale auction.

## CALLAHAN COUNTY COMMISSIONERS HELD PUBLIC HEARING

After holding a public hearing Monday, January 8 on a proposal to reduce the speed limit on County Road 120, Callahan County Commissioners decided to take no action to reduce the speed limit.

Only one person attended the public hearing and he was in favor of reducing the speed limit.

County Road 120 runs east and west between Clyde and Baird, north of Interstate 20.

After discussing the speed limit at length, commissioners decided not to erect any speed limit signs or impose any speed limits on the county road.

Other items brought before county commissioners Monday, January 8 during a regular commissioners' court meeting included:

—County commissioners voted to select a Salary Grievance Committee. Members of the committee include: County Sheriff Eddie Curtis, County Tax Assessor/Collector Bun Barry, County Clerk Darlene Walker, District Clerk Cubelle Harris and County Attorney Allen Wright.

Also three public members were chosen to the committee from a list

of grand jury members from the previous year. Those public members include: David Nichols, Albert Gonzales and Larry Pittman.

—Commissioners voted to appoint County Precinct #2 Commissioner Bryan Farmer as county judge pro-tem.

—Commissioners voted to approve the county's liability insurance bid from Greenwood Insurance Agency in Cross Plains. The bid from Greenwood was the only bid received.

—Commissioners voted to adopt the 1996 holiday schedule for county employees. The holiday schedule for 1996 includes: January 15 for Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday, February 19 for Presidents' Day, April 5 for Good Friday, May 27 for Memorial Day, July 4 for Independence Day, September 2 for Labor Day, October 14 for Columbus Day, November 11 for Veterans' Day, November 28 and 29 for Thanksgiving, December 24 and 25 for Christmas and January 1, 1997 for New Year's Day.

—Commissioners voted to sign the minutes of the previous meeting and voted to pay approved bills.

## SERVICES HELD MONDAY FOR FORMER CALLAHAN COUNTY SHERIFF BILL SKINNER

BAIRD—Former Callahan County Sheriff Bill W. Skinner, 62, died Friday morning, January 19, 1996 at his home following an illness of 2 1/2 months.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p.m. Monday, January 22, 1996 in the First Baptist Church in Baird with the Rev. Riley Fugitt officiating, assisted by the Rev. Jack Willoughby. Burial was in Ross Cemetery Annex, directed by Parker Funeral Home.

He was born Nov. 13, 1933 in Harleton, Texas. He had lived in Baird since 1959, moving there from Marshall, where he was raised. He was a farmer, rancher and milk distributor. He was elected sheriff in 1976 and remained in the post for 16 years. He also worked as an investigator for Knowles Investigation Service in Baird. He served in the U.S. Army for two years and spent two years in the Army Reserve. He was a member of the First Baptist Church in Baird, Sheriff's Association and the Peace Officers Association. He married Beverly Lowrey in Baird July 23, 1988.

Wayne Knowles, who was Skinner's chief deputy, said he was "more than a lawman—he was a friend to the residents of Callahan County."

"He was a fine and honest lawman," he said. "He was devoted to his community. He went way above and beyond the call of duty as a law officer. He was a friend, and he really cared for the people of Callahan County. He was a really fine fellow."

Skinner said after his defeated in 1992 that he was proud of the professionalism he brought to the office of sheriff, emphasizing education among deputies and a case clearance rate of 70 to 75 percent.

Survivors include his wife, Beverly Skinner of Baird; one daughter, Tammy Schneider of Clyde; one son, Kerry Skinner of Baird; one stepdaughter, Beverly Miller of San Angelo; one brother, Ray Skinner of Diana, Texas; three sisters, Pat Skinner of Marshall, Joyce Taylor of Levelland, Bettie Barber of Marshall; 10 grandchildren; and numerous nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by one daughter, Robyn Skinner in 1975, and one brother, Neill Skinner in 1985.

## LOCAL FREE TAX SERVICES TOLD

Through the Tax-Aide program, volunteers provide free personal income tax assistance to the Senior Citizens, low-income families and the general public with basic tax returns. Individuals with complicated tax returns will be advised to seek professional tax assistance.

Volunteers are specially trained, in cooperation with the U.S. Internal Revenue Service (IRS), to understand those provisions of the tax code that affect Senior Citizens as well as the low and middle income families. Tax-Aide volunteers provide personal, one-on-one assistance to help you complete your federal tax returns, including special rebate programs.

Tax-Aide volunteers are available from February 1 to April 15 each year. There will be only one volunteer working the Cross Plains area using the Multi-Purpose Center on East 8th Street as headquarters. Tax returns will be prepared by APPOINTMENT ONLY so you will need to call the volunteer (Pauniece Oglesby, 817-725-6772) for an appointment. The volunteer in Cross Plains is Pauniece Oglesby. Mrs. Oglesby prefers to volunteer on Tuesday, but will make appointments on other days if necessary.

When you meet with a Tax-Aide volunteer, you should bring the following: (1) a copy of last year's (1994) income tax return, (2) any W-2 forms you have received showing your income from working, (3) all 1099 forms you have received which show the interest and/or dividends, (4) all 1099-R forms which show all pension monies paid to you, (5) form SSA-1099 which shows the Social Security paid to you, (6) records of any other income you have received, and (7) receipts or cancelled checks for any of your medical/dental expenses and any contributions you have made to charities.

This is a community service available to those stated above the Tax-Aide volunteers are eager to be of assistance, so please call for an appointment and let me assist you.

Edith Pearl Dillard, 80, died Monday, January 22, 1996, in a Brownwood hospital.

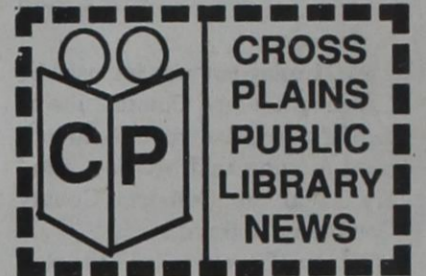

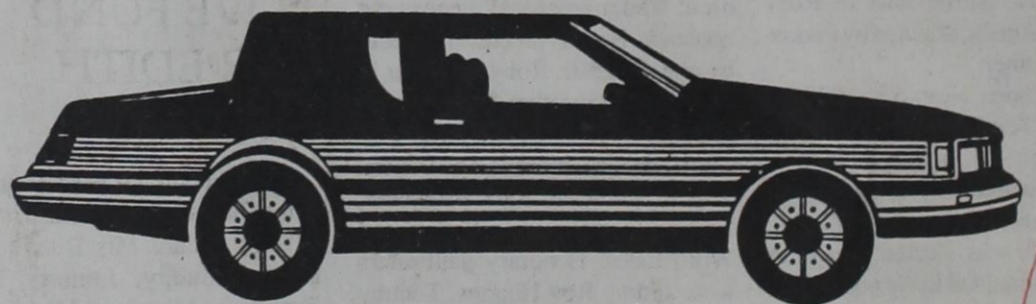

## SPECIAL TAX CREDIT FOR LOW- INCOME FAMILIES

By PAUNIECE OGLESBY

The EIC (Earned Income Credit) is a special credit for certain workers. It reduces tax you owe, and it may give you a refund even if you don't owe any tax.

To be eligible for the credit, you must meet the following situations:

- (1) Have a qualifying child under 18 years of age or 21 and a full time student.
- (2) And your taxable income is less than \$24,350 for one child and \$26,650 for two or more children.
- (3) If you don't have a qualifying child and yo (or your spouse if filing a joint return) is at least 25 years old but under age 65 at the end of 1994.
- (4) You cannot be claimed as a dependent on another claim.
- (5) And you lived in the United States more than half of 1994.
- (6) Your taxable earned income is less than \$9,000.

This year there is an EIC available for taxpayers without children if you meet the guidelines stated above.

The credit can be as much as \$314 if you don't have a qualifying child. If you have a qualifying child, the credit can be as much as \$2,094, and \$3,110 with two or more qualifying children.

The Earned Income Credit was provided to give low-income parents an extra incentive for working and staying off welfare rolls.

Earned Income Credit is the only credit that is refundable. That means it can go to a family whose income is so low that it owes no tax but can receive a refund check of up to \$3,110.

Energy Saving Tips You N.E.E.D. To Know

- \* Never boil water in a pan that is not covered. Water will boil faster and use less energy in a covered pan.
- \* Whenever possible, use a toaster oven or microwave instead of a regular oven. These smaller appliances take less time to cook food so you save energy.
- \* When baking, keep the oven door closed rather than opening it to look inside. An open door lets valuable heat escape; maintain the heat by keeping the door shut.
- \* Clean range pans regularly. A clean range pan reflects more heat than a dirty one.
- \* Only preheat the oven for five minutes or not at all. It's also a good energy practice to cook several dishes in the oven at once to make maximum use of this concentrated heat source.
- \* Use the right size pan for each burner. A small pan on a large burner wastes energy because the air surrounding the pan will be heated too.

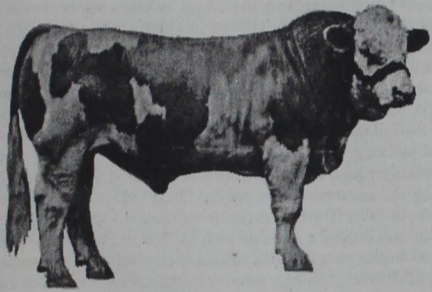

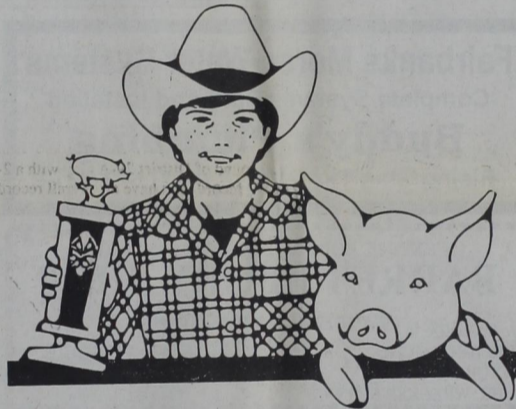
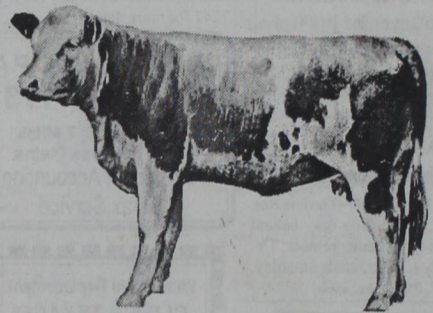

(CCTC) has filed a request with the Public Utility Commission Of Texas (PUC) seeking approval to implement rates, terms and conditions for new Optional Caller ID Service offerings, including Calling Number Delivery Service and Anonymous Call Rejection. This request has been assigned Tariff Control Number 15146. Caller ID service will be offered in connection with residence and business one-party service where available. This service is not provided in connection with Public, Semi-Public and Private Pay Telephone Services, and trunk side PBX Service.

Both of the proposed features are optional. Calling Number Delivery Service is a service which allows subscribers to see the phone number of most local calls and some types of long distance calls on a display unit, before they answer the phone. The display unit must be provided separately by the subscriber. Anonymous Call Rejection is a service which permits a subscriber to automatically reject calls from callers who have blocked the delivery of their number.

In connection with the provision of Caller ID Services, CCTC will also offer per-call and per-line blocking to callers, free of charge. "Blocking" prevents the caller's number from appearing on the Caller ID display unit. Per-call and per-line blocking will be available when the service is deployed. CCTC will automatically establish per-call blocking free of charge to all customers when Caller ID is offered in their area. Any customer who wishes to block his or her number on a per-call basis simply needs to press \*67 on their touch-tone phone, or dial 1167 on his or her rotary phone before dialing the telephone number. Per-line blocking automatically blocks a customer's number on every call without the need to press \*67 or dial 1167. If a customer selects per-line blocking, he or she can unblock their number free of charge on a single call by dialing \*82 or 1182 on their phone before dialing the telephone number. This feature turns off per-line blocking for only the call placed after \*82 or 1182 is dialed and will result in your number being received by subscribers of Caller ID. Once the call is ended, per-line blocking will be restored. Per-line blocking will be offered at no charge to anyone, upon receipt by the PUC of written certification by the customer of a compelling need for per-line blocking. CCTC will be sending each customer a postage prepaid per-line blocking request before Caller ID will be offered. All requests for per-line blocking will automatically be granted free of charge. It is not necessary to subscribe to Caller ID to have per-call or per-line blocking. Per-call or per-line blocking will display a message such as "private" or "anonymous" on the Caller ID display unit. Blocking will not be provided on calls from payphones. Detailed information on these services will be sent to each customer during the next few weeks.

The following rates have been proposed for these new optional services. The proposed effective date for the tariff is March 15, 1996. The estimated annual revenue impact to the Cooperative is an increase of \$2,538.00 for the first year of service.

## Time Running Out To Order Windbreak Trees

"Time is running out fast for people interested in ordering the windbreak trees offered by Callahan Divide Soil & Water Conservation District", says Clint Rollins, District Conservationist for the Natural Resources Conservation Service in Baird. Orders will be taken until February 13th and will be sold to the general public on a first come, first serve basis.

This year's selection of Evergreens includes the Afghanistan Pine, Arizona Cypress, Austrian Pine, Pinyon Pine and Eastern redcedar. These evergreen seedlings are being offered for \$2.50 each or 30 for \$65.00.

In addition to the evergreens, several varieties of bare-rooted hardwoods are being offered this year. These varieties include Russian Olive, Catalpa, Green Ash, Hackberry, Shumard Oak, Chinkapin Oak and Manking Cherry. The bare-rooted hardwood seedlings are sold in bundles of 100 for \$35.00 or 25 for \$10.00.

There is still a good selection of all varieties offered, but those persons interested in a particular variety of tree should place their order as soon as possible before supplies run out. Tree orders will be taken until 4:30 p.m. on February 13th or until supplies run out, whichever comes first. The expected date of delivery will be February 14th. All orders are pre-

paid with a check or money order and delivery is guaranteed. These trees are delivered fresh from the Texas Forest Service Nursery located in Lubbock. The pick-up location for the trees will be at the Natural Resources Conservation Service Office in Baird.

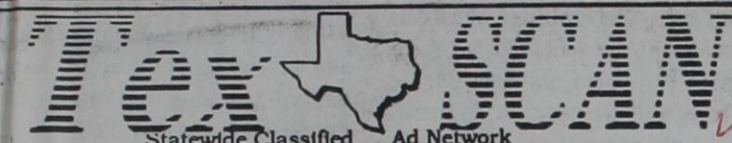

**STATE COMMISSION ON JUDICIAL CONDUCT**

AUSTIN--Chief Justice William G. "Bud" Arnot, III, of the 11th Court of Appeals in Eastland has been re-appointed to a six-year term to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct.

The Commission is the constitutional agency which investigates allegations of misconduct by judges and is authorized to issue appropriate sanctions for ethical violations of the Texas Code of Judicial Conduct. If a violation of the judicial code of conduct is found the Commission may issue a private sanction, a public sanction, or initiate procedures to remove the Judge from public office.

The Commission has 11 members; four are private citizens appointed by the Governor, two are lawyers appointed by the State Bar of Texas, and five are judges, one representative each from the Appellate, District, County Court at Law, Justice of the Peace and Municipal benches.

The Commission is currently chaired by Judge Tom Lawrence, who was elected Chair at the December meeting. Lawrence succeeded Houston attorney Charles R. "Bob" Dunn. Of Arnot's appointment and serve to the Commission, Dunn said, "Chief Justice Arnot has ren-

dered extremely valuable service to the Commission on Judicial Conduct. He has been regular in his attendance, is well-informed and participates fully in Commission discussions. His foresight, excellent reasoning and splendid preparation certainly confirm his appointment to the Commission by the Texas Supreme Court."

Arnot was appointed by the State Supreme Court which chose him from among the 80 eligible appellate judges in Texas.

Born and raised in Breckenridge, Chief Justice Arnot obtained his B.B.A. degree from the University of Texas, J.D. law degree from Baylor University Law School, and L.L.M. law degree from the University of Virginia.

He was appointed to the Appeals Court in 1986, elected in 1988, re-elected 1990, and elected as Chief Justice of the Court in 1994.

Chief Justice Arnot and his wife, Emily, and their three school-age children live in Abilene. He served there as a Deacon of First Baptist Church and also on the Board of Trustees at Hardin Simmons University.
