

History Of Callahan Co. First Jail Told

The following article was submitted by Lee Abernathy of Abilene, a member of Callahan County Historical Committee,

COUNTY'S FIRST JAIL

In 1879, Callahan County officials called for bids to construct the first jail for the county. During the two years that the county had no jail, prisoners were housed in Shackelford County.

On January 19, 1880 contractors Martin, Byrne and Johnson of Comanche began construction on a new jail in Belle Plaine; estimated cost: \$6500. These contractors were also building the Taylor County Jall In Buffalo Gap at the same time. Construction took over two months; delays resulted from lack of stone and one of the contractors being injured in a railroad accident.

The cut stone walls were twenty inches thick on the first story and eighteen inches on the second story with a covering of threeeights inch jail plate. Every joint contained a cannon ball two and one-half inches in diameter. Flooring was two inch planking.

The building was 28 x 30 feet; the lower floor contained a three room apartment for the sheriff/jailer. and the upper floor had one cage,

a misdemeanor room, and the main jail. Iron work for the construction came from Cincinnati, Ohio.

JANUARY 18, 1996

The Callahan County Clarendon proclaimed that the jail was "built in the style of buildings already gracing our little city on the plains." But with change of the county seat to Baird in 1883, commissioners decided to move the jail rather than build another one. On July 16, 1883, J.H. Milliken and Company received the contract to move the jail on a

Belle Plaine Today, the county's first jall is still standing, having served its original purpose for less than twenty years. It is located across the street north of the courthouse. After one hundred fifteen years, the building is still in remarkably good

Grandson Charged With Murdering Fisher of Lubbock, Jack Fisher of Tuscola and Sandy Fisher of Arling- 84-Year-Old Man

The grandson of an 84-year-old Clyde man has been arrested and charged with first-degree murder following a possible shooting Thursday afternoon, January 4 in Clyde.

A call came in to the Callahan County Sheriff's Office around 5:00 p.m. Thursday of a possible shooting at a home on the north access road of Interstate 20 and FM 604 in Clyde.

Earl Edwin Huddleston, 84, was with his murder is Ronald Edwin Huddleston, 36, a gradson. The younger Huddleston remains in Callahan County Jail on an \$100,000 bond The suspect, Ronnie Huddleston,

is a 1978 graduate of Clyde High School, Many residents here may younger remember the Huddleston as an oustanding high school 400 meter runner in track. He helped lead CHS to a district track title his senior year in school.

He also advanced to the state track meet his senior year at CHS.

"We're not even sure it's a shooting," said Callahan County Deputy Darroll Ratto, "But it appears to be Ratto said an investigation is con-

tinuing, and he wouldn't comment on whether a weapon was confiscated. He did say blood was found at the scene. The two men and Ronald's father

lived together in the home at authorities, Ratto said.

Huddleston's body was sent to Fort Worth for an autopsy and investigators are awaiting the results before announcing the cause of death, Ratto said.

Assisting in the investigation are the Clyde Police Department, Texas Ranger Calvin Cox, Deputy Buddy Croft and the Department of Public Safety.

If approved, the program would be funded by mandatory assessments. Domestic producers and feeders would be assessed 1 cent per pound on sales of live sheep and 2 cents per pound on sales of greasy wool. Importers would be assessed 1 cent per pound or the equivalent on imported degreased wool and wool products.

Details of the voting procedures are published in the December 15 Federal Register. Copies of the final referendum rules, the proposed order and additional information will be available at Callahan County office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

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

(CCTC) has filed a request with the Public Utility Commission Of Texas (PUC) seeking approval to implement rates, terms and conditions for new Optional Caller ID Service offerings, including Calling Number Delivery Service and Anonymous Call Rejection. This request has been assigned Tariff Control Number 15146. Caller ID service will be offered in connection with residence and business one-party service where available. This service is not provided in connection with Public, Semi-Public and Private Pay Telephone Services, and trunk side

Both of the proposed features are optional. Calling Number Delivery Service is a service which allows subscribers to see the phone number of most local calls and some types of long distance calls on a display unit, before they answer the phone. The display unit must be provided separately by the subscriber. Anonymous Call Rejection is a service which permits a subscriber to automatically reject calls from callers who have blocked the delivery of their

In connection with the provision of Caller ID Services, CCTC will also offer per-call and per-line blocking to callers, free of charge. "Blocking" LUNCHEONS prevents the caller's number from appearing on the Caller ID display unit. Percall and per-line blocking will be available when the service is deployed. CCTC will automatically establish per-call blocking free of charge to all customers when Caller ID is offered in their area. Any customer who wishes to block his or her number on a per-call basis simply needs to press *67 on their touch-tone phone, or dial 1167 on his or her rotary phone before dialing the telephone number. Per-line blocking automatically blocks a customer's number on every call without the need to press *67 or dial 1167. If a customer selects per-line blocking, he or she can unblock their number free of charge on a single call by dialing *82 or 1182 on their phone before dialing the telephone number. This feature turns off per-line blocking for only the call placed after *82 or 1182 is dialed and will result in your number being received by subscribers of Caller ID. Once the call is ended, per-line blocking will be restored. Per-line blocking will be offered at no charge to anyone, upon receipt by the PUC of written certification by the customer of a compelling need for per-line blocking. CCTC will be sending each customer a postage prepaid perline blocking request before Caller ID will be offered. All requests for per-line blocking will automatically be granted free of charge. It is not necessary to subscribe to Caller ID to have per-call or per-line blocking. Per-call or per-line blocking will display a message such as "private" or "anonymous" on the Caller ID display unit. Blocking will not be provided on calls from payphones. Roberts To Address Farm **Bureau Conference**

WACU-U.S. House Agriculture Chairman Pat Roberts will explain the provisions of the 1995 Farm Bill at the Texas Farm Bureau Leadership Conference in Abilene this month.

Roberts is scheduled to address the Farm Bureau meeting at Abilene's Kiva Inn at 9:30 a.m., January 30. He is from Dodge City, Kansas, and was the primary author of the Freedom to Farm Act, which most farm policy experts agree will be part of the final 1995 farm package. Roberts will discuss the future of farm programs and the 1995 Farm Bill in his address.

Texas Farm Bureau Bob Stallman praised the Kansas lawmaker for his insight on farm issues and his relationship with farmers all over the

"Representative Roberts has been a real leader on agricultural issues for many years," Stallman said. "He has taken some political risks in trying new approaches to farm policy."

The 1995 Farm Bill has been stalled by the impasse over budget reconciliation. Roberts' Freedom to Farm Act is the centerpiece of that farm bill. The bill gives farmers much more freedom to plant while still providing a price support safety net. The act runs for a seven-year period, after which farm program benefits to farmers could be sharply reduced or eliminated.

The Texas Farm Bureau Leadership Conference will feature meetings on commodity activities, legislative priorities, member services and communications.


