Tornado Damage Widespread

The path of the tornadoes reached from West Caddo Peak to the Pioneer Community to the east and from Cottonwood south to Cross Cut and Burkett. It is a general opinion if the tornadoes had been on the ground it would have destroyed every community in this area. Thank God the winds were clipping roof tops and taller trees.

Stories abound as everyone relates their individual experiences. Your heart goes out to those with complete loss of homes and drastic damage.

Last week it was not noted that Cross Cut and Burkett were affected by the severe weather. Robert "Pee Wee" and Donna Pickett related damage in their community. Residents there have lost mobile homes, roofs, out buildings, porches and landmark trees. Even the old Cross Cut School lost most of the north side with bricks pulled from the wall.

The Burkett Community was also hard hit. The Bill and Shirley Hunter place experienced their second tornado in two weeks. Following the second hit, their barn will have a completely new roof. Two huge hundred year-old Oak trees where destroyed at the R.T. Watson home. The Tommy Connellys lost a sheep barn and cattle pens were wrecked. The Chris Connelly home had a window blown out and Charles Coburn's mobile home was damaged.

This disaster has pulled our community together as everyone had worked diligently to restore their businesses and residences.

Cross Plains Grain and Peanut is back in operation selling feed, seed and fertilizer, but their elevators have been severely damaged. A great deal of repairs must be completed before peanut season.

Lawrence Farm and Ranch Supply, Inc. has a new roof but ceilings have not been replaced. They will have to rebuild their warehouse, but they are back in business. Lakeway Grocery plans to replace their

bait house and has been open as usual. Jack's Place is under construction but open for carry-outs and patio service.

Village Market has temporarily repaired their hole in the west wall but have been open for customers.

Just about every business and home received major hail damage and loss of windows. Many have water damage to walls, carpet and furnishings. The City of Cross Plains and Callahan County are presently surveying all businesses and residents to assess the damage. Governor Ann Richards and the state agencies are cooperating in an effort to obtain disaster assistance through the Small Business Administration. Three programs that would be available under the Small Business Administration disaster declaration would be: 1. Home disaster loans. 2. Business physical disaster loans. 3. Economic injury disaster loans.

Joe Crabtree, representative of the Bureau of Emergency Management, said the reports are being compiled at the Justice of the Peace Office and additional details may be available next week.

Praise reports continue noting the good work of Jean Wilson and staff at P.K.'s on the night of the tornado. They cooked all night to serve breakfast to the residents of Colonial Oaks Nursing Home and for crews and individuals who ate with the American Red Cross Monday, May 30. The Abilene Red Cross volunteers are still serving snacks and cold drinks to those cleaning debris. They are assessing cases that may qualify for assistance through their agency.

United Fund To Assist With Storm Damage

At a special meeting held June 6, John Swift, president of the United Fund Board of Directors, announced that the Fund has received donations in addition to the annual budget which are to be allocated for storm relief. So that these funds may be distributed in an equitable manner, Mr. Swift requests that all individuals who can show need please contact the treasurer, Dannes Turner, at Citizens State Bank by calling 725-6141 by June 15.

The United Fund Directors will meet the afternoon of June 15 to consider all applications for assistance.

It was also brought to my attention that the youth of the community, as young as six-years-old, assisted in the cleanup process volunteering their aid from house to house. The kids have been helpful and we are proud of them.

The Cottonwood Ladies Quilting Club have supplied snacks and drinks to the crews and volunteers helping clean their community. A list of good deeds would be endless.

Contractors Must Register With City Or County

The City of Cross Plains and Callahan County require the following of all construction or service contractors who contract work to be done in the City of Cross Plains and/or in the rural areas of Callahan County which was hit by the severe storm and tornadoes Sunday, May 29.

1. To register with the City of Cross Plains for contract work within the city limits of Cross Plains.
 2. Have a written "contract of services to be provided" signed by property owner or authorized person.
 3. To register with Callahan County, County Judge office for contract work in the county.
- This is to be done before any work is complete.

The City of Cross Plains stresses that you be very careful when hiring one of these contractors to do work. Be sure to get the work to be performed in writing, along with the cost of the project. NEVER PAY FOR WORK IN ADVANCE! If you have questions concerning one of the contractors, please call City Hall to see if they have registered.

He remembered while awaiting shipment back home, he heard someone call his name and when he turned around it was W.B.

Temporary Move For Cross Plains Medical Center

Due to damage caused by the May 29 storm, the Cross Plains Medical Center will be moving to temporary location on East Highway 36 until decisions are made about the clinic's permanent location.

According to Physician Assistant Charles Stephenson, while the clinic itself suffered mostly water damage, the Masonic Hall in which the clinic was housed was damaged extensively. The Cross Plains Medical Center will be temporarily relocating to the Brownwood Regional Home Care Office at East Highway 36 and Avenue B. Efforts are underway to determine whether the clinic can return to its original location or

whether a new site will be necessary.

"We are committed to remaining in Cross Plains and we will continue to provide complete family medical care with as little interruption in services as possible," Stephenson said. "Our telephone number 725-7106 will be transferred to the new location and we hope to be back in full operation as soon as possible. Patients can also call us at 725-6166, which is the phone number for Brownwood Regional Home Care. We appreciate the community's support and pledge our assistance in the rebuilding effort to come."

Howard House Will Not Be Open - Postal Cancellation Still Planned

Due to storm damage the Howard house will not be open as planned on Friday, June 11. However, the special postal cancellation will be available at Cross Plains Library on Main Street

from 2:30 to 4:00 p.m.

Original manuscripts and items from the Howard family home will be on display. Refreshments will be served.

Members of Project Pride state that repairs will begin immediately and tours will continue to be available by appointment.

Memorial Day weekend is remembered as a time to honor United States Veterans, but this past Sunday, May 29, will long be remembered as the day tornadoes ravaged the communities of Cross Plains and Cottonwood. The peacefulness of a very warm day was abruptly altered when the sky darkened and residents knew a storm was on its way. Many noted a green color tint which indicated hail. With very little warning folks took shelter in closets, bathtubs, rooms in the center of their homes, and cellars.

Residents in the area hardest hit on West Highway 36 recall hard rain, large hail, the shaking of their homes and businesses, and powerful winds. Some heard the freight train sound which usually accompanies a tornado. It was later determined that six tornadoes were tracked on radar with vertical winds up to 200 miles per hour.

Amanda Sowell, an employee at Collum's Restaurant, related seeking shelter in the restaurant's freezer at the request of owner, Dusty Finn. Sounds like a cold place to be, but the steel walls provided great protection.

During this time, the roofs of Lawrence Farm and Ranch Supply, Inc., the former Exxon Station, Cliff's Texaco, Lakeway Grocery, Cross Plains Grain and Peanut, Jack's Place, and Village Market were partially or completely removed.

Several mobile homes were destroyed completely while others sustained damage.

Houses were stripped of roofs, shingles, porches, carports, shutters, etc. as the roaring winds and heavy rain prevailed for an estimated 20 to 25 minutes. Trees were tossed around like fence posts and uprooted in every neighborhood. Some of the trees were 100 years old and residents are sorrowful for their loss. The rain soaked ground allowed the trees to be pulled up in the twirling winds. There are very few large trees remaining in town.

The Cottonwood Community was probably hit first in the storm and they experienced lots of hail. Vehicles were beat by the hail and windshields were shattered. Hail the size of tennis balls were reported in Cottonwood and Cross Plains.

Mike and Ava Tollet, Cottonwood residents, rode out the storm in their mobile home with hail crashing windows and the walls actually breathing in and out. Mike stated that at one point the air conditioner was pulled out of the window and they seem to get a little relief. It was noted that windows were sometimes forced from the walls by the terrific pressure. A metal roof covering the top of their mobile home was lifted up and thrown several yards to the east of their house. The awning was cemented into the ground and all the poles were sucked up seemingly effortless. At the same time plastic flower pots were not moved from a rock fence in front of the residence.

"I can't remember being so scared," Mike remarked. "I told my Mom to just hold onto me and I would hold to her if the house went." Similar stories were repeated by eyewitnesses to the terrible storm.

The Cottonwood Baptist Church had multiple windows broken from the hail and the rain drenched pew cushions and song books. Rev. Knox Waggoner and his wife took refuge in the basement of the church.

The fact that so many community members were at church when the storm hit certainly made a difference. Prayers for safety were answered as no fatalities occurred.

The full impact of the storm was not realized until Monday morning and the area resembled a war zone. It was shocking to see such destruction. The townspeople wasted no time cleaning up the debris. Everyone was out in their yards cutting up the broken trees; salvaging what they could and evaluating their individual situations.

Gene Dillard, Cross Plains Mayor, and Judge Bill Johnson are the emergency directors for Callahan County and they have been working on various problems which follow such a natural disaster.

Justice of the Peace Rolan Jones has coordinated disaster help through his local office. Joe Crabtree, a representative of the Bureau of Emergency Management, is in Cross Plains to determine the amount of damage. Crabtree and Jones have viewed the disaster from the air and driven around the county and they feel that 90 percent of the homes and businesses received some damage. Crabtree is employed through the Department of Public Service which has sent additional troopers to aid the county. Their services have been greatly appreciated.

Jones noted that the assistance from the Texas Department of Transportation, the City of Eastland and Santa Anna, volunteer fire departments from Cisco, Baird, Clyde and Eula, West Texas Utilities crews, Taylor Electric crews, GTE crews, local city employees and county employees has proved invaluable. "It is amazing how many volunteers have come from neighboring cities to assist during this difficult time. Some tourists passing through have actually cancelled their vacations to lend a hand," Jones remarked.

The French Robertson Prison has provided crews of prisoners to help clear trees and brush throughout the town.

They will remain in the community moving from house to house assisting with the cleaning process.

The Crystal Ice Company has donated the free ice and bottled water was provided by Dr. Pepper Bottling Company, Dyess Air Force, Brownwood Fire Department, K-Mart, and KEAN delivered donated water from Abilene concerned citizens.

The volunteers from the Abilene American Red Cross have provided a great service by serving breakfast, lunch and dinner to local residents. Being without electricity, drinking water, and gas, the Red Cross volunteers have been very helpful to the community.

If the tests on the water samples are acceptable Tuesday and Wednesday, residents should be able to drink and cook with it by Thursday. There are still homes without electricity and telephone service, but it is amazing how quickly they restored service for the large area.

KEAN has brought several loads of clothing, bedding, food, etc. which are available to those who need these items at the Cross Plains Community Center.

Our "Caring Community" feels very fortunate for all the kind assistance and thankful for their lives.

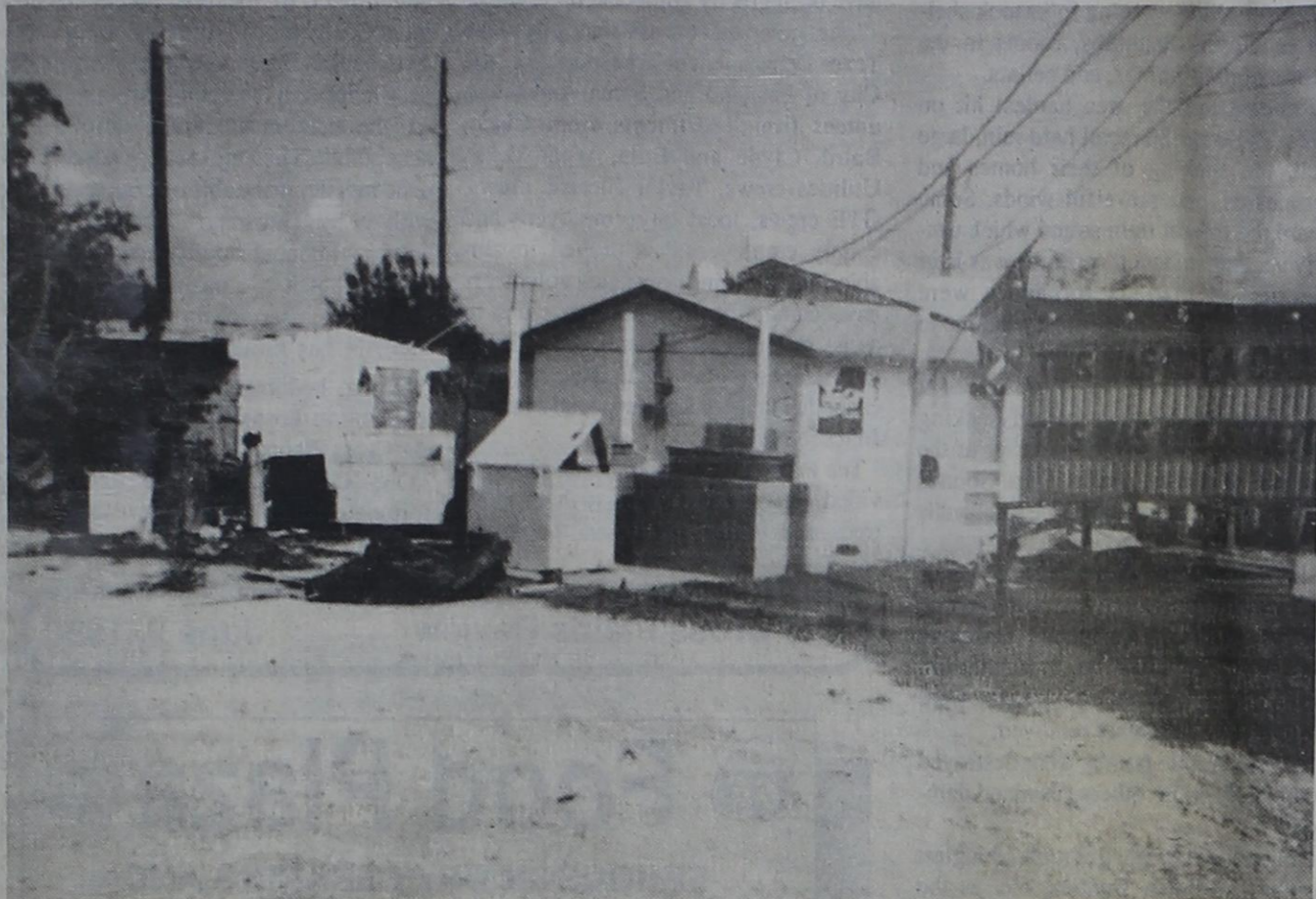

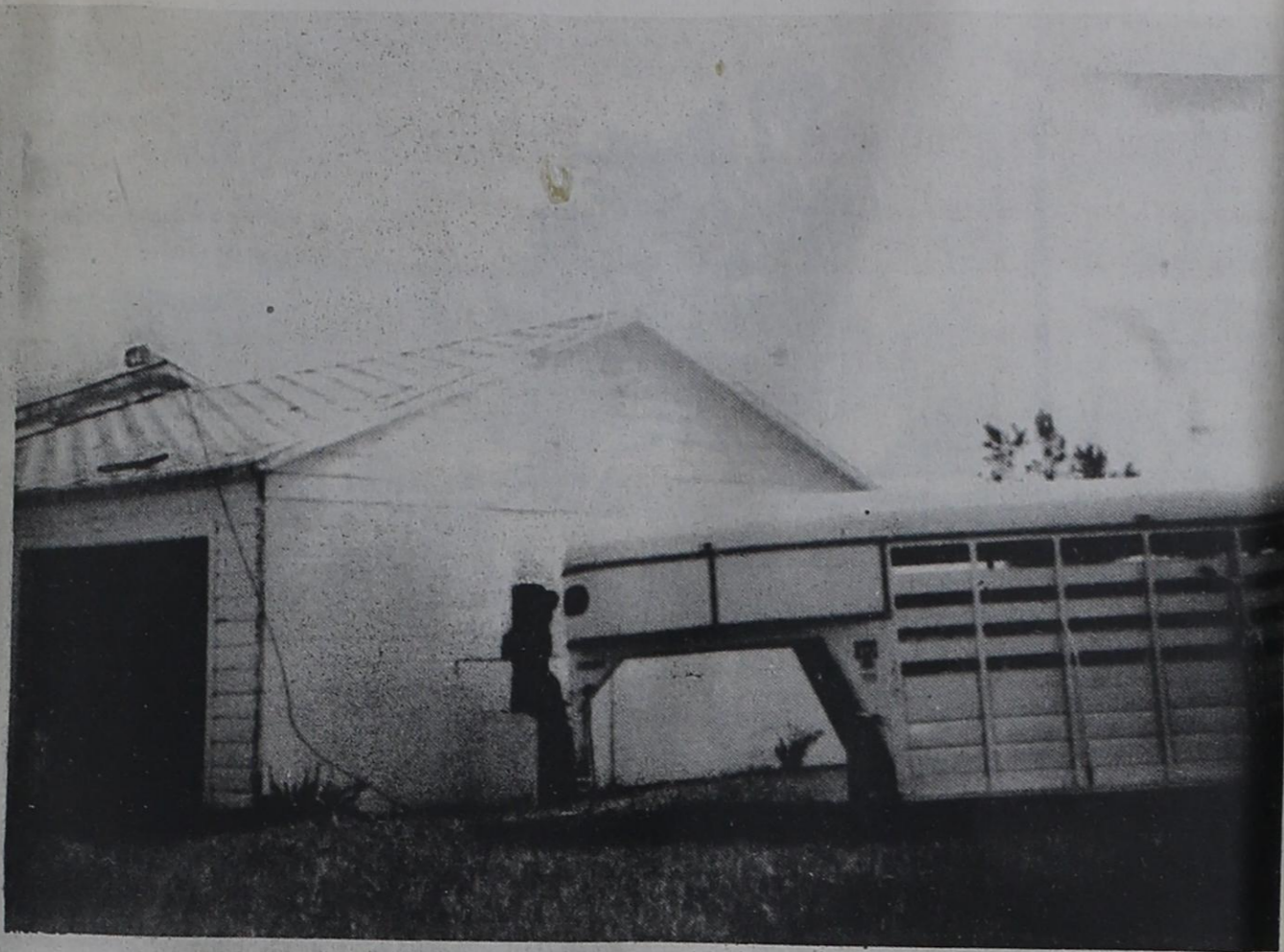

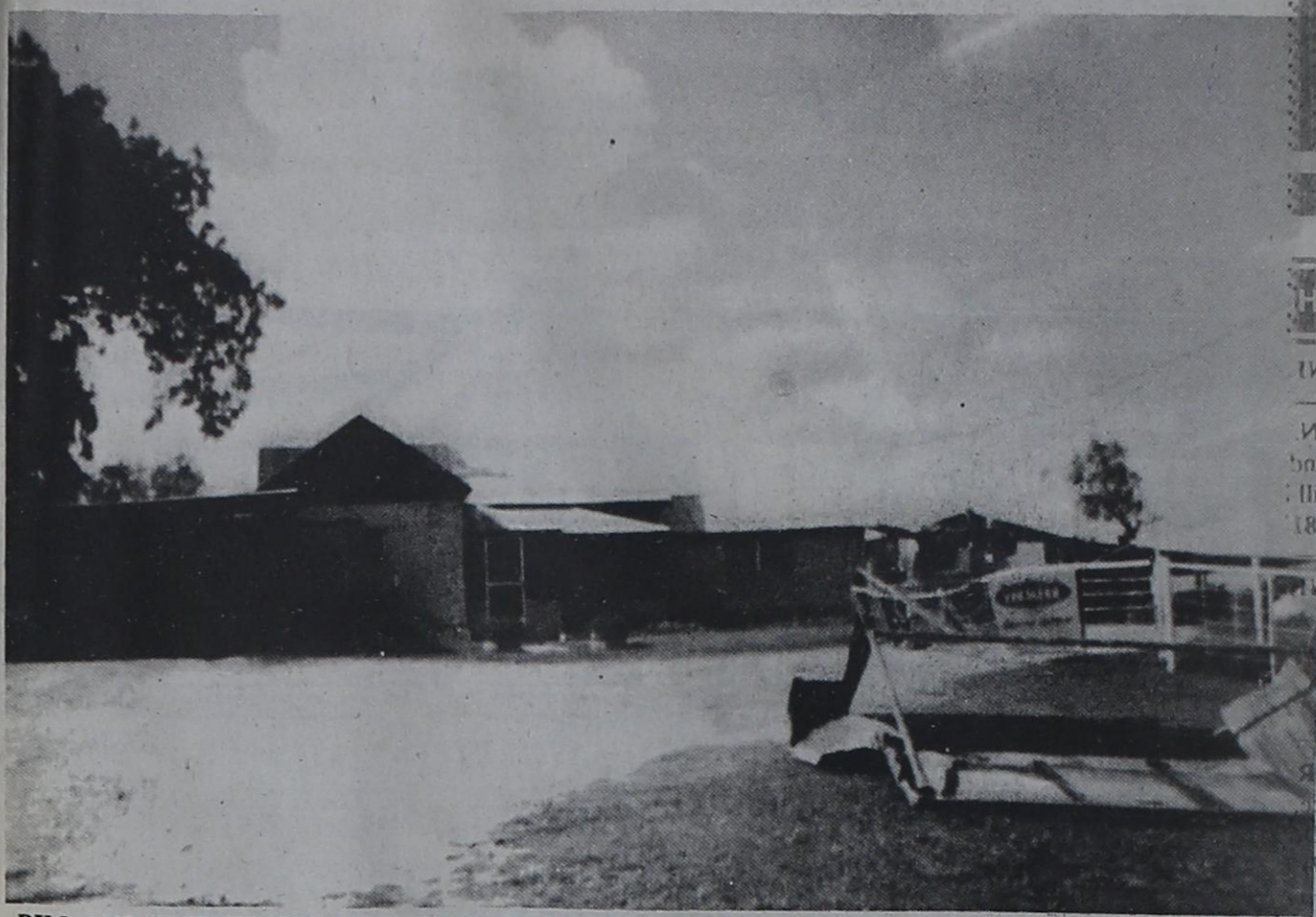

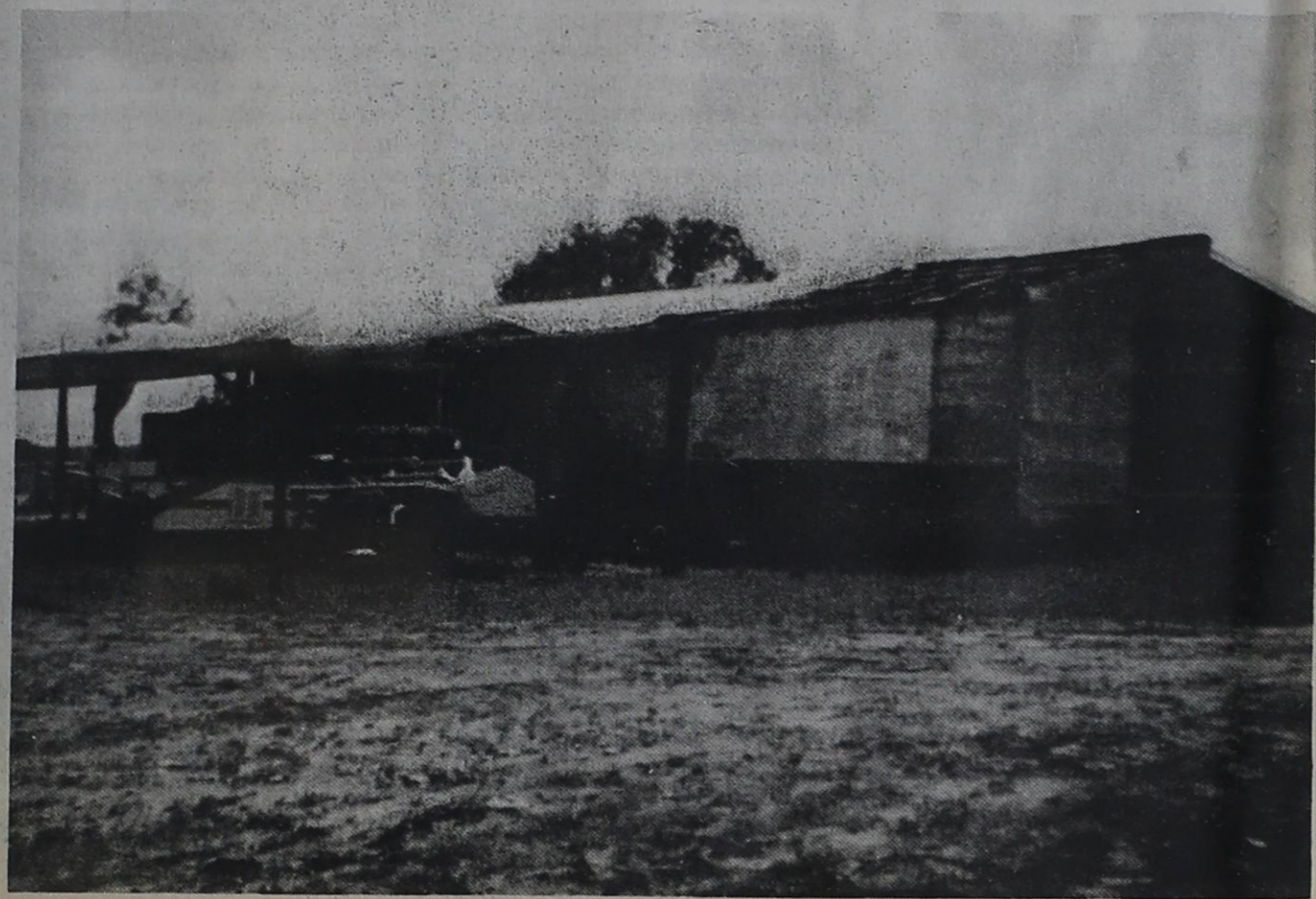

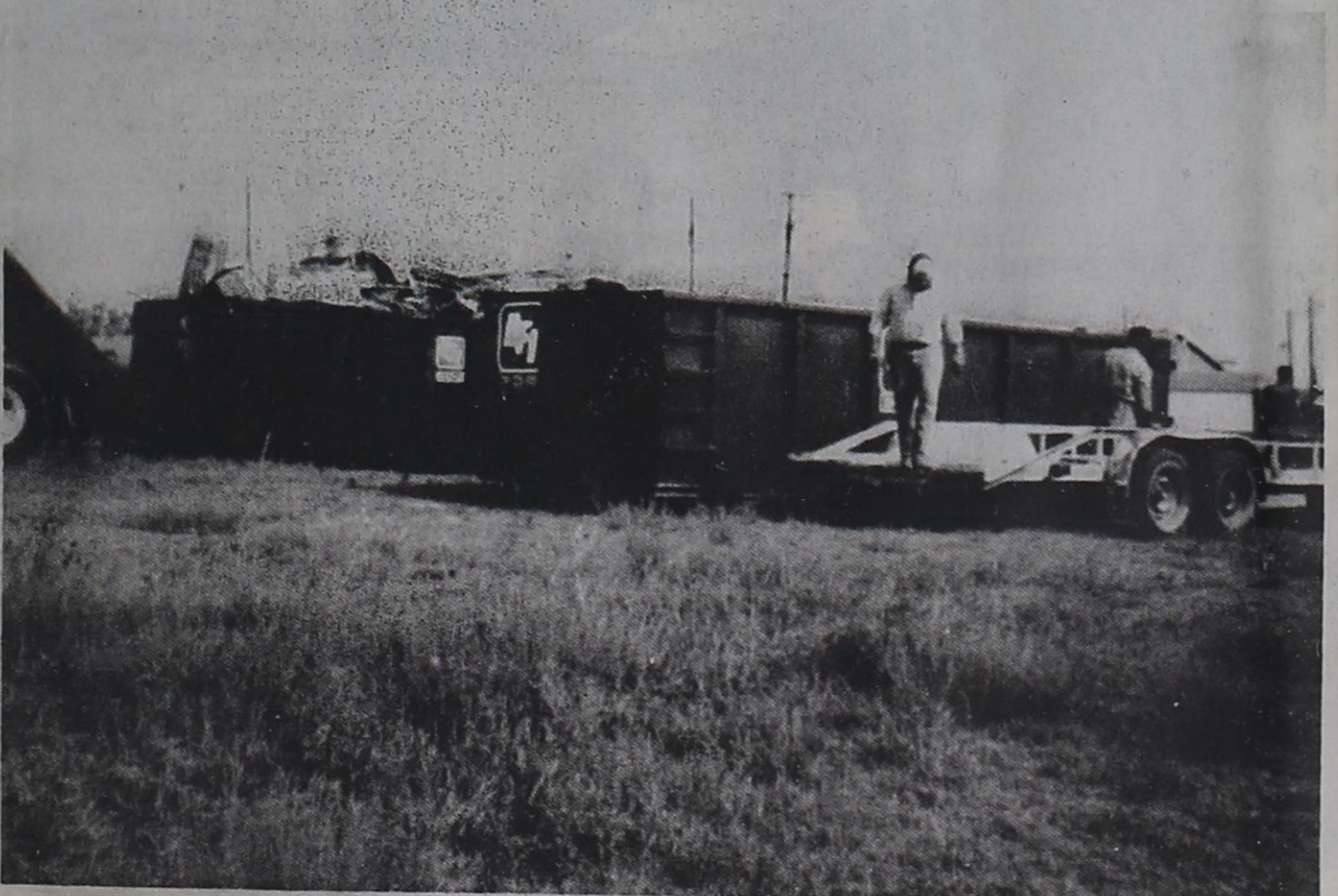

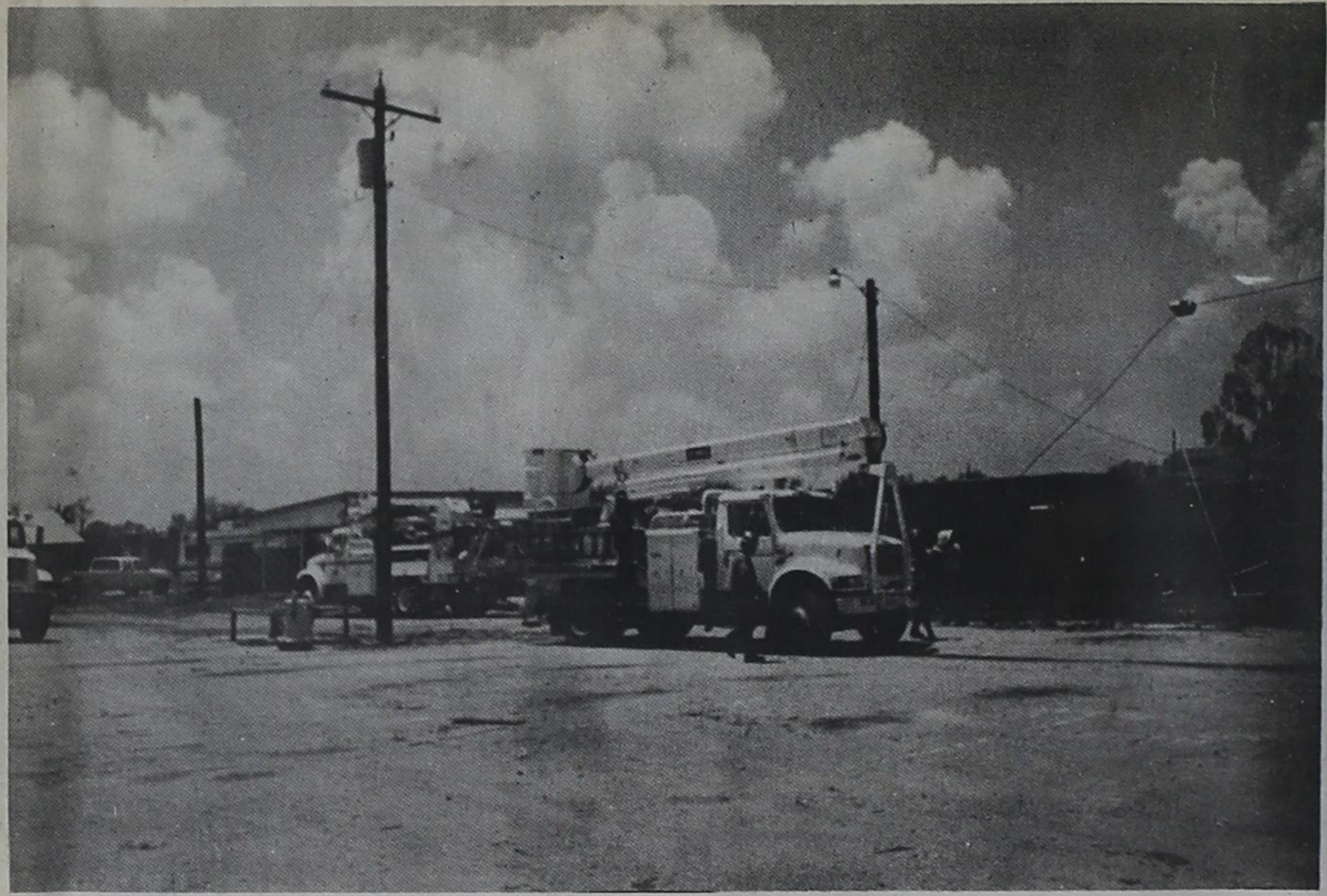

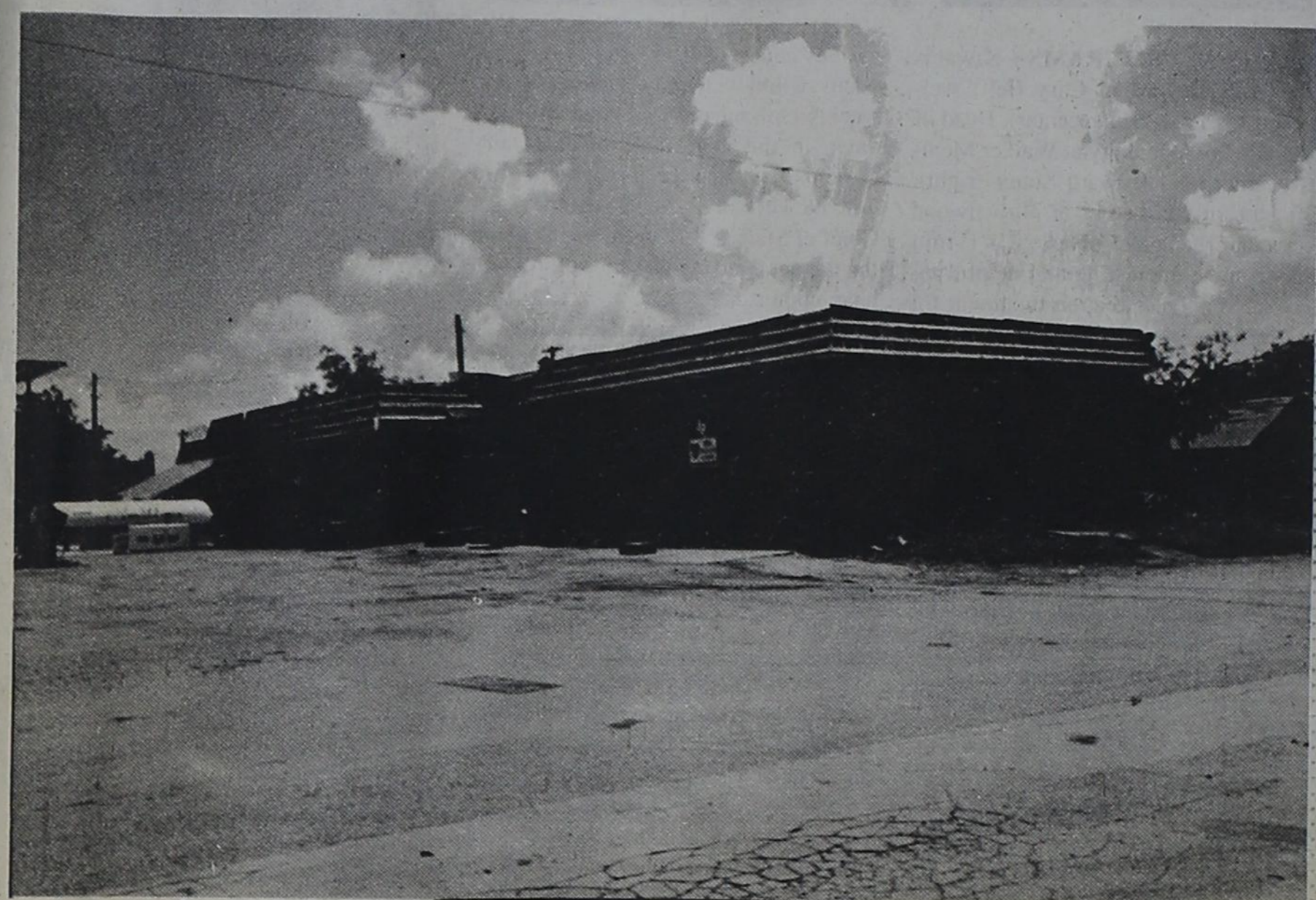
