## "The Stephenville Area Office <br> hare per contract

 recently notified the Baird Field Office that funds have been allocated for the Great Plains Conservation Program,"said Clint Rollins, District Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service in Baird. Under the Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP), a landowner enters into a contract with the Soil Conservation Service in which various conservation practices are cost-shared. Practices that are eligible for cost-share in Callahan County include cross
fencing, diversions, grass planting, fencing, diversions, grass planting,
terraces, waterways, livestock tanks, erraces, waterways, livestock tanks,
ivestock pipelines, livestock water livestock pipelines, livestock water
wells, and critical area shaping and planting to stabilize severely eroded areas. Also cost-shared is brush management, both mechanical and chemical aerial application. These practices are cost-shared at a rate The Soil Conservation Service provides technical assistance to
landowners in developing a GPCP contract. A schedule to install the desired conservation practices is then developed with the landowner, the time period will range from 3 to 10 years. Two years of proper management wil be required following the last costhared practice.
Rollins urged anyone interested in the Great Plains Conservation Program to
