## HOW 'BOUT THEM BUFFALOES Congratulations Varsity, JV, & Jr. High

### 1996 General Election Results

Republican candidates carried all but the county sheriff position in Callahan County after election results from the Tuesday, November 5 General Election.

Eddie Curtis was the only Democrat candidate to win election in Callahan County, according to the 4,762 ballots cast from the General Election.

Curtis, the incumbent county sheriff, won four of the seven voting precincts and carried the early voting box to claim his second term as the county sheriff.

Curtis won the Baird, Cross Plains, Putnam and Oplin voting boxes as well as the early voting box. Curtis won with 54 percent of the vote.

Republican challenger Paul Jaworski won both Clyde voting boxes as well as the Eula voting location. He received 45 percent of the total votes cast.

Republican candidates won all the other races in Callahan County.

Republican Bob Dole received 52 percent of the vote for U.S. President in the county, while Bill Clinton took 34 percent of the vote. Ross Perot, the Reform Party candidate, received 11 percent of the votes cast. Clinton won re-election to a second term as U.S. President.

Nationwide, Clinton won 49 percent of the vote, Dole had 41 percent and Perot took eight percent of the total vote.

For U.S. Senate, Phil Gramm received 64 percent of the county votes to challenger Victor Morales with 32 percent. Gramm also won the statewide race for United States Senate with 55 percent of the vote to Morales' 43 percent.

Bro. Meador has preached throughout this country, Canada, and foreign fields.

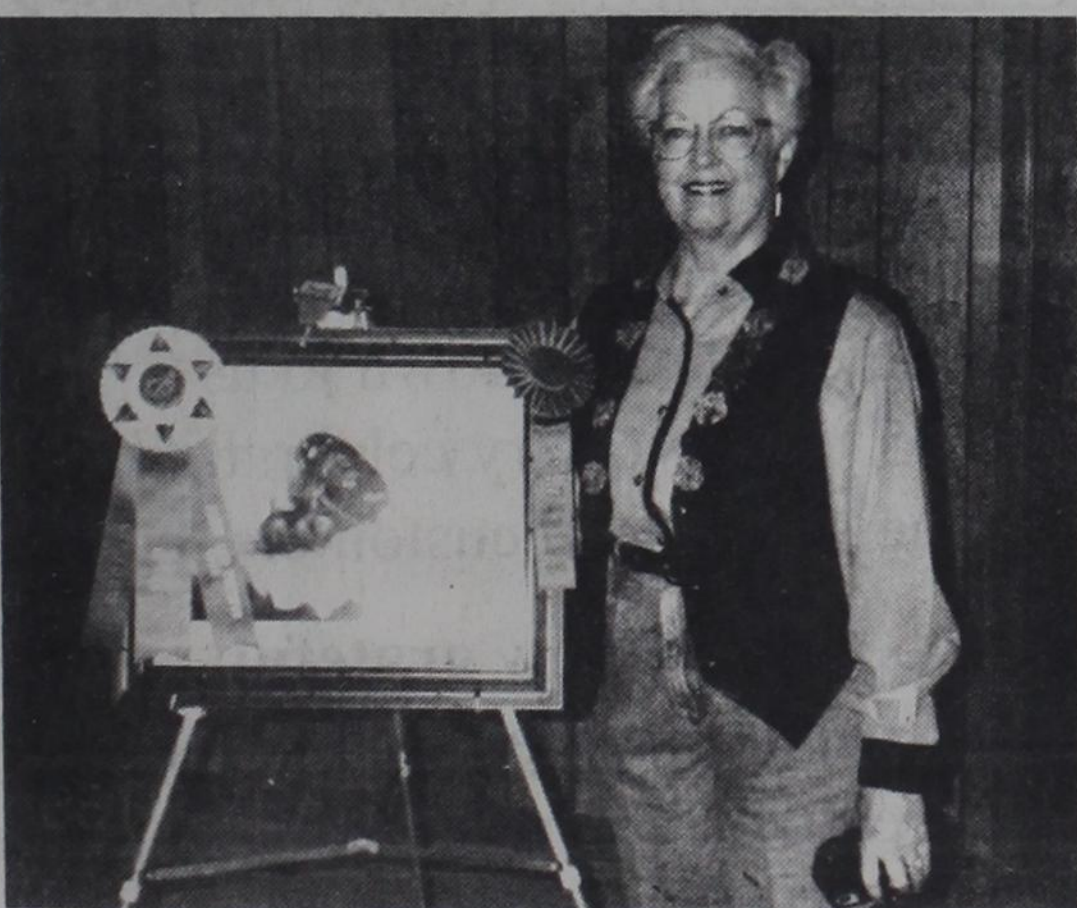

Special attraction at the musical this month will be Santa Claus. He will be there from 7:30 - 8:00 p.m.



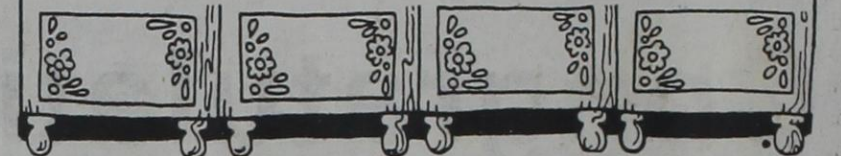

## "Turkey Time's Approaching"

I've noticed some beautiful yards in Cross Plains this fall. Loads and loads of beautiful chrysanthemums in all sorts of hues. Also several lawns and houses decorated for fall; Halloween and Thanksgiving. Some themes reminiscent of harvest times, tiny bales of hay, haystacks, pumpkins, apples, gourds, onions dried corn, garlic, etc. All together they create a luminescent beauty of harvest, health, and the heart and soul of the town. Makes you just want to break into song with "Shine On Harvest Moon."

We're still working on harvesting and drying our produce from our herb garden. Those English peas just taste so much better in the winter cooked with a little rosemary.

My daughter has been helping me clean for the holidays. Soon it will be time to decorate and start the cooking. Not too long after that it'll be Christmas shopping on the agenda.

Our son Mark, of Austin, is coming home for Thanksgiving. Our younger daughter Allison is now residing here. Check out the lovely colorful flowerbeds in front of the Elementary School! The Cross Plains Gar-

den Club last season advised and assisted Mrs. Kathy Purvis' 4th grade class in the planting of these flowers. The students did a marvelous job and in my opinion, are deserving of congratulations.

If you'd like something different for your holiday bird, try the following recipe for "Herbed Turkey Dijon."

One turkey, massage into turkey breast and legs, the juice of six lemons, one cup of Dijon mustard, one cup low salt soy sauce, 2 teaspoons black pepper or to taste. Sprinkle inside and out with seasoning salt. Stuff with lemon rinds and lots of fresh herbs (or dried if you don't have fresh). Also layer top of turkey with fresh herbs. Suggested herbs are sage, thyme, basil, mint and garlic. Add liquid to bottom of pan, water or broth, about two and 1/2 cups. Bake at 350 degrees (15 minutes per pound of turkey). Check periodically and baste about every 45 minutes to an hour, adding liquid if needed. Serve on large platter, garnished with lots of parsley and marachino cherries or cranberries washed and partially dipped in powdered sugar.

In preparation for the Thanksgiving holiday, next column I plan to include a new recipe for pumpkin soup and a recipe for "Harvest Pie," which is the best I've ever eaten. If either of these sound interesting to you tune in for my next column. Make this Thanksgiving Dinner unusual.

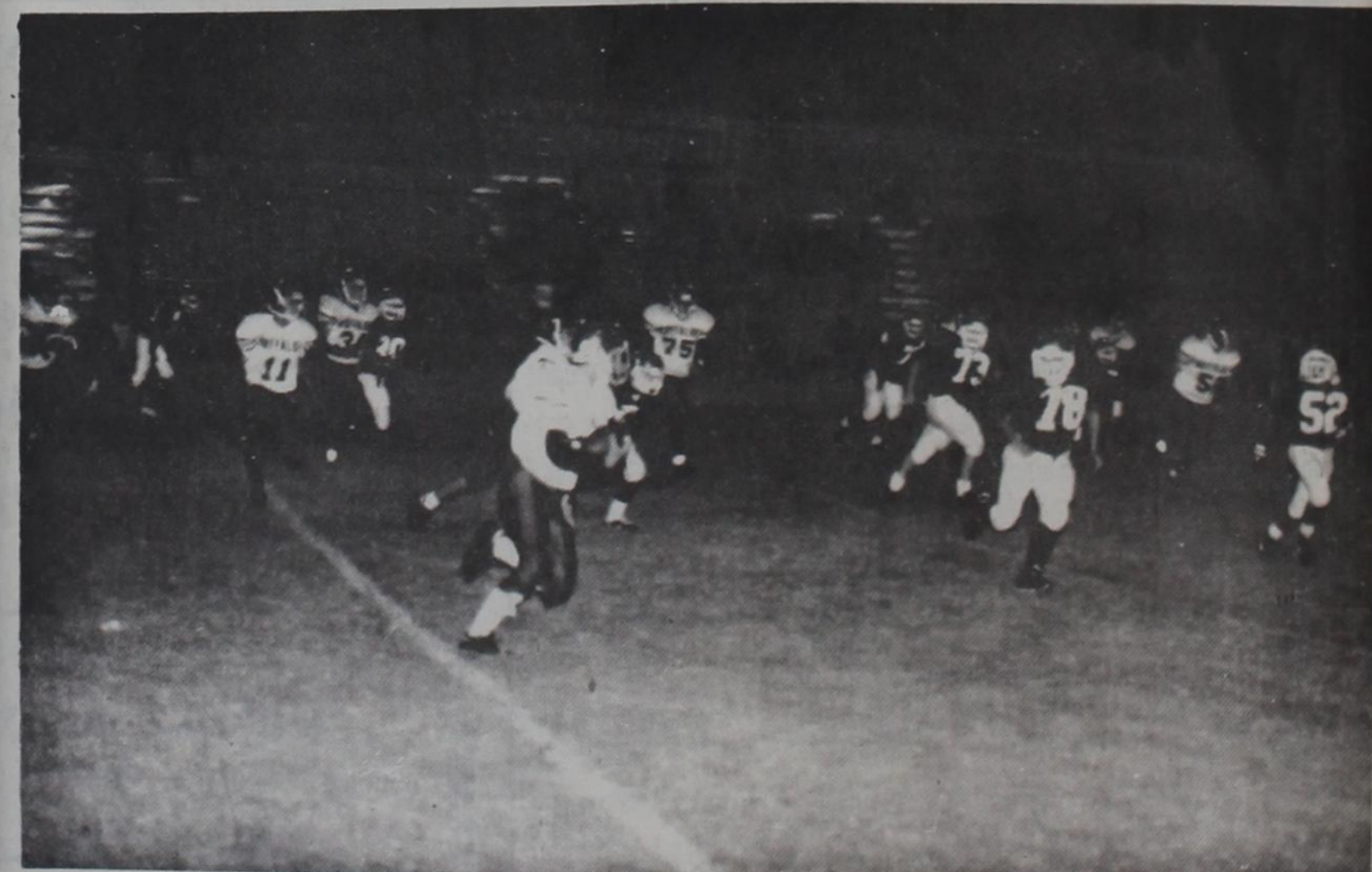

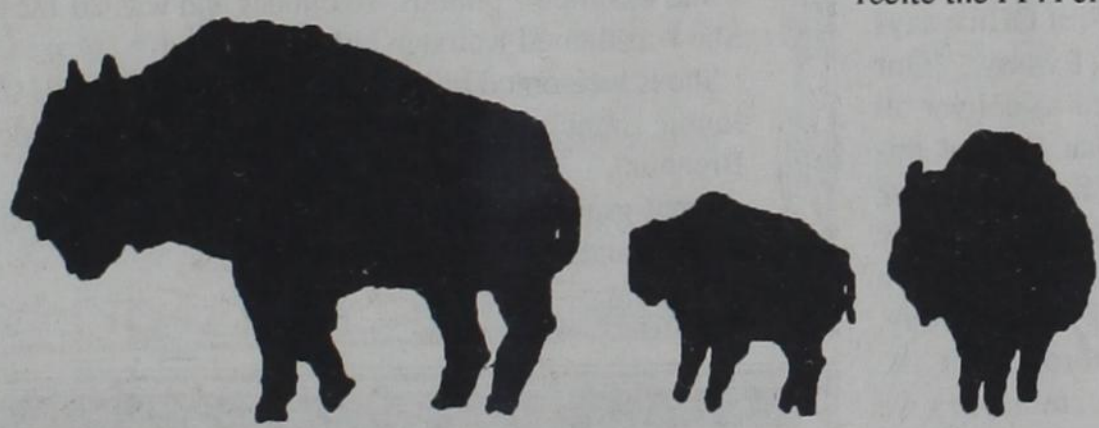

they loved every minute of it.

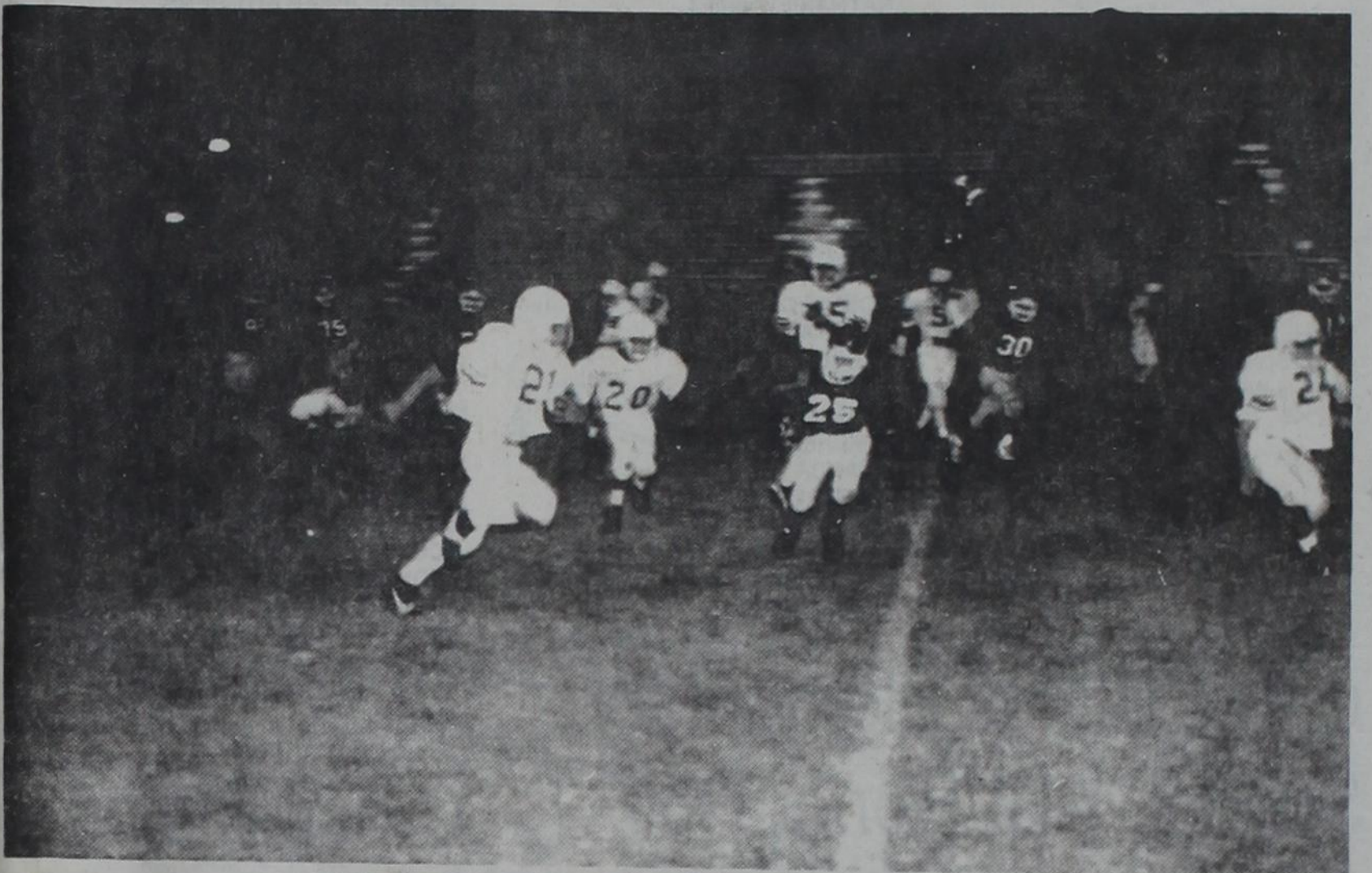

## Common Childhood Illness Billion Dollar Problem

"Otitis media or inflammation of the middle ear is the chief reason parents take children to the doctor," said Dr. Ellen Friedman, head of pediatric otorhinolaryngology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "And winter is the peak season for these visits, although otitis media can occur at any time."

Middle ear infections strike more than 80 percent of children by age 3 at an annual cost of more than \$1 billion, according to the National Center for Health Statistics. Children ages 6 months to 3 years are especially at risk.

Friedman suggest parents watch for early indicators of this painful and potentially dangerous infection.

"At the first sign of fever, fussiness, tugging or rubbing of the ears, upper respiratory infection, nausea or vomiting, or any combination of these, parents should suspect middle ear infection," she said.

Middle ear infections occur when bacteria invades the middle ear causing inflammation. This results in a painful buildup of infected fluid behind the eardrum due to blockage of the eustachian tube leading from the sinuses to the middle ear.

Untreated middle ear infections can result in serious complications such as a ruptured eardrum, meningitis, brain abscess, or even hearing loss. Early treatment may prevent such serious complications.

"Antibiotics are the main therapy although persistent cases may require special antibiotics or surgical drainage," Friedman said.

In more serious cases, ear tubes may be surgically inserted to help relieve fluid buildup and frequently occurring infections.

Although there is no fool-proof way to avoid middle ear infections, Friedman suggests that parents:

- \* Avoid exposing children to passive smoke. Smoke can cause cilia, hair-like "fingers" in the inner ear that propel mucous, to stop working.
- \* Choose breast-feeding over bottle-feeding.
- \* Avoid exposing children to colds, flu or other viruses, although this is often not easy or realistic.
- \* Place their child in a smaller daycare facility, or avoid daycare settings if possible.
- \* Make sure their child receives the full course of antibiotics.

## ELECTION

Republican Rudy Izzard captured 54 percent of the county votes for U.S. Representative. Democrat incumbent Charles Stenholm received 43 percent in the county. Stenholm won re-election for U.S. Representative of the 17th District with 51.8 percent of the vote to Izzard's 47.1 percent.

For the Railroad Commissioner position, Republican Carole Rylander received 66 percent of

the county votes. Democrat Hector Uribe took 25 percent of the county vote totals. Rylander, the incumbent, also won the statewide race with 58 percent of the vote to Uribe's 39 percent.

For the office of State Representative, Jim Keffer, the Republican candidate, received 47 percent of the total county votes to Democrat incumbent John Cook's 47 percent. Districtwide, Keffer upset the incumbent with 52 percent of the vote to Cook's 47 percent.

For State Senate, Republican Troy Fraser carried Callahan County with 49 percent of the vote to Democrat Rick Rhodes' 48 percent of the vote. Districtwide, Fraser won election to the State Senate with 52 percent of the vote to Rhodes' 48 percent.

For the 11th Court of Appeals, Republican incumbent Jim Wright carried Callahan County with 66 percent of the vote. Democrat Martin Peterson won 13 percent of the vote in the county. Wright also won re-election in the district with

83 percent of the vote to Peterson's 17 percent of the vote.

There were 703 ballots checked for a straight Republican Party ticket. Some 665 ballots were marked for a straight Democrat Party ticket.

Of the 4,762 total votes cast, 1,310 ballots were cast by an early vote.
