Minutes of the previous meeting were approved with the following correction: It was stated: "Jerry Cassle moved to rescind the following four ordinances," however, it should have read, "Ray Womack moved to rescind the following four ordinances": followed by, "Jerry Cassle seconded and motion carried."

Bob Hill, City Judge, presented the judge's report. The council asked the judge to continue to give the judge's report in the same format as presented in October. By general consent the council accepted the judges report as presented.

A social worker was visiting inmates of a penitentiary in an effort to rehabilitate, and noticing especially one bright-faced, honest-looking, young man who really seemed so out of place, she asked him, "Why were you sent here?" The prisoner replied, "Well, I was accused of taking a very fine watch from the jewelry store where worked. My lawyer put up a good fight -- had character witnesses for me, presented evidence that I was not even at the store on the day the watch came up missing!"

"I don't understand," said the social worker, "why did you get put into prison?" With somewhat reluctance, the prisoner replied, "My defense broke down when they found the watch in my pocket."

That is pretty incriminating evidence, isn't it?" Almost as bad as getting caught with your hand in the cookie jar -- pretty hard to convince another you weren't going to snitch a cookie -- especially if you already have cookie crumbs on your face! Seems the best thing to do in cases like either of these is to admit wrong -- admit the truth -- and plead for mercy...

But admitting wrong is one of the most difficult things to do. Everybody needs to be able to, however -- even learn how, if necessary -- and say "I'm sorry" and "I was wrong" when so. Husbands, wives, parents, children, bosses, employees, students, teachers, kids, grown-ups -- all of us do things wrong and make mistakes, and the one thing worse than making a mistake is an unwillingness to be honest enough to admit it.

How much different it would have been if Judas had been willing to repent. If only Sapphira had "fessed up" instead of continuing the lie. Acts 5:1-10. Jesus had a hard time getting Peter to say "I'm sorry" -- but what a great worker he became after doing so! The same is true about Paul.

The next time it seems easier to deny a mistake, check in your pocket and see if there's a "watch" there, then admit it, and grow from it by saying "I am wrong" and "I am sorry."

"FESTIVE FALL" Colorful Leaves, and Holiday Recipes

Last weeks column contained a recipe for an appetizing but different roast turkey. This week I wish to share with you my favorite fall dessert: HARVEST FRUIT PIE." Mix together and put in a pie crust (unbaked):

3 Granny Smith apples, peeled and either finely chopped or sliced

1 cup cranberries freshly washed and de-stemmed.

1 cup raisins (light or dark) or 1 cup crushed pineapple, drained

1 cup sugar 2/3 cup brown sugar

1 tsp. cinnamon

1/4 tsp. nutmeg and 3 Tablespoons

2 Tablespoons butter, dabbed over fruit. Top with crust. Either cut a small two inch circle in the center of the top crust or cut 4 slits to let out steam. With a pastry brush or cheese cloth; and using either milk or melted butter, brush top crust evenly. Then sprinkle sugar and cinnamon over top crust. Bake at 400 degrees for 45 minutes.....ENJOY!

Suggested menu for Thanksgiving. Begin with Enticing Pumpkin Soup, then for your Entree', Herbed Dijon Turkey, apple-cranberry mold, potatoes either Irish or sweet yams, zucchini with tomato sauce, rice stuffing and for dessert Harvest Fruit Pie. About 30 minutes before the meal, serve cranberry juice cocktail, chilled and with a twist of lemon or orange. After or with dessert serve hot coffee, if you wish to appear sophisticated, serve the collec in demitasse cups.

ENTICING PUMPKIN SOUP (a curried soup from pumpkin)

Choose a round pumpkin with a flat bottom so it won't tip as you scrve.

With a large sharp knife, slice off the top fourth of the pumpkin and set aside. Scoop out seeds and stringy pulp. Replace top of pumpkin. Place pumpkin on a 15x10x1 inch baking pan. Bake in a 375 degree oven for 50 to 60 minutes or until the pumpkin flesh can be scooped out easily. (Pumpkin will NOT be tender at this point). Cool slightly for easier handling. Scoop out and reserve pumpkin flesh, leaving about 3/4 inch thickness of flesh on pumpkin walls. Cut flesh into chunks (should have about 4 cups). Do not remove any flesh from bottom of shell.

Discard pumpkin top. In a large pot combine the 4 cups might "C" "U" THERE!

pumpkin flesh, 1 tsp. Curry powder, and 1/2 tsp. cumin. Bring to a boil with 3-14 1/2 oz. cans chicken broth, 2 baking apples, peeled, cored and coarsely chopped. 1 carrot chopped, 2 tsp. grated ginger root (or 1 tsp. powdered ginger). After bringing to a boil and reducing the heat, cover, and simmer for 10 to 12 minutes or til vegetables are tender. Cool slightly. Blend or process mixture, a third at a time, in a blender or food processor 'til smooth. Place pumpkin shell in a 3 quart casserole. If pumpkin is to be removed from the casserole before serving, line the casserole with a double thickness of heavy foil to help lift pumpkin later. Pour soup into shell, bake uncovered in a 375 degree oven for 20 minutes.

Meanwhile in a skillet cook 6 slices of bacon until crisp. Remove and drain bacon reserving 4 Tablespoons drippings in skillet. Cook 1/4 onion and 2 Tablespoons sugar in drippings until onion is tender. Finely crumble bacon. Stir bacon and 1/2 cup of croutons into the skillet. Sprinkle bacon mixture atop soup in pumpkin. Ladle soup into bowls to serve. Makes 8 to 10 side dish servings. (about 8 cups)

Aren't the fall leaves lovely? Plus they're so colorful, the browns of all shades, and yellows, golds, yellow greens, bright greens, oranges, reds and burgundies and other colors and some in between hues. Just sets the scene for creating some Thanksgiving memories.

As a small child about age 4 years we lived briefly in Fort Worth. My favorite fall activity at that time was to go down to the park and stomp ALL THROUGH the dried and drying leaves. I loved the crackly sensation and the beautiful crunchy sound the leaves made when I walked through them. I still love to walk through the crackly, crunchy, colored leaves these fifty some-odd years hence. It brings back memories and a mist of tears to my eyes for all those things that used to be and are no longer. But I'm most thankful that I can still walk through FALL LEAVES.
