## Cross Plains High School Buffaloes Bi-District Champions

The Cross Plains Buffaloes again shut-out their opponents, the Bronco Longhorns, and won the title of Bi-District Champions. Cross Plains now advances to the second round of the State Football Playoffs. The last time the Buffs won Bi-District was in 1988 against Wall. That year the Buffaloes were Runner-Up in District and proceeded to the playoffs.

Last Friday as the stands began to fill, you could feel the excitement and enthusiasm of each person present. A huge crowd of Buffalo fans expressed great spirit throughout the contest.

The 1st quarter of the game ended up scoreless, although the Buffaloes dominated -- snapping the ball 20 times on offense and only allowing the Longhorns 1 first down. The Buffaloes drove the ball to the 1 yard line but were unable to score.

The 2nd quarter started with Cross Plains in control of the ball. The Buffs

began moving the ball from the Longhorn 46 yard line, and 10 plays and 46 yards later Sean Jones pushed over for the TD of 1 yard. The extra point failed. Later in the 2nd quarter the Buffaloes put together another drive, this time starting on their own 14 yard line. A big play in that drive came when Quarterback Jarad Richards threw to Joseph Turner for a 32 yard gain. With 30 seconds remaining in the half, again QB Richards passed this time to Dusty Hargrove for the TD. The play totaled 15 yards and the two point conversion failed.

The Buffaloes, unable to score during the 2nd half, played tough defense only allowing the Longhorns 3 first downs and 69 yards rushing. The Longhorns ended the night with only 106 yards total offense. The defense was inspired by the efforts of Hugo Mauricio with 7 tackles, 5 assists, 1 recovered fumble, and 1 sack. Also playing tough on defense were Kevin Nickerson with 5 tackles and Justin Hopkins 4 tackles and 7 assists.

The Cross Plains offense rushed the ball 50 times for 177 yards. Running Back Jody Fortune handled the ball 30 of 50 times for 115 yards, and was hit hard numerous times by the Longhorns. Sean Jones ran the ball 9 times for 29 yards and 1 TD. Fortune has been one of the work horses in the backfield and I am pretty sure this game put him over 1,000 yards for the year. Fortune will be the first to say it is due to the blocking linemen who open up many holes.

QB Richards was 8 for 12 in the passing department for 133 yards. Turner led the receiving with 2 receptions for 50 yards. Hargrove closely followed with 4 receptions totaling 49 yards and one was a TD. This week the Buffaloes advance to the Area Playoff game in Breckenridge. This game will be a stepping stone for the Buffs as they will play the Munday Moguls. Munday is now ranked 4th in the state and will be a tough competitor for Cross Plains. If the Buffaloes put together a good

game offensively and defensively they could come away with another gold football this week.

Again, I salute the town for the support you give to the sports programs and the young athletes that participate. I encourage each of you to show your support by attending the game in Breckenridge which begins at 7:30 p.m. See you there!!!

## CITY COUNCIL MINUTES

This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. All members were present. Minutes of the previous meeting were approved with the following correction: It was stated: "Jerry Cassle moved to rescind the following four ordinances," however, it should have read, "Ray Womack moved to rescind the following four ordinances": followed by, "Jerry Cassle seconded and motion carried."

Bob Hill, City Judge, presented the judge's report. The council asked the judge to continue to give the judge's report in the same format as presented in October. By general consent the council accepted the judges report as presented.

The council discussed the litter problem at the school personnel and beginning December 1, 1996, there will be a closed campus which will not allow students to leave the school ground during lunch, so this should reduce the problem.

Discussion was held at length concerning the meter deposit for renters. It was noted that city policy is to terminate service if utility is two months past due. It was also noted that if the delinquent bill is ONLY minimum it exceeds the current \$75

deposit required to renters. Therefore after careful consideration, W.C. Pringle moved to increase renters' deposit to \$100. James Nichols seconded and motion carried.

By general consent the council agreed to advertise for bids for the installation of a new metal roof for the Senior Citizens Center.

Ray Womack moved to purchase the SAVIN copy machine and the maintenance agreement to begin after the expiration of the 90-day warranty. Edwin Weiss seconded and motion carried.

Jerry Cassle moved to pay the bills, Edwin Weiss seconded and motion carried.

Edwin Weiss moved to go into executive session. Ray Womack seconded and motion carried.

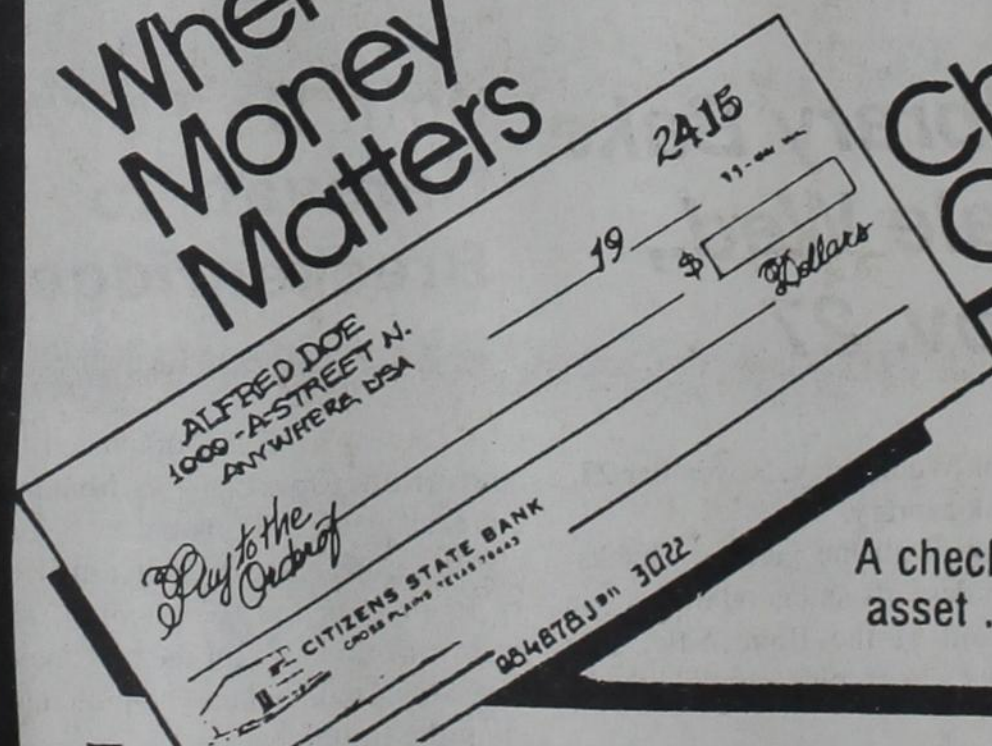

## Quips, Clips & Comments

### "FESTIVE FALL"

Colorful Leaves, and Holiday Recipes

Last weeks column contained a recipe for an appetizing but different roast turkey. This week I wish to share with you my favorite fall dessert: HARVEST FRUIT PIE." Mix together and put in a pie crust (unbaked):

3 Granny Smith apples, peeled and either finely chopped or sliced

1 cup cranberries freshly washed and de-stemmed.

1 cup raisins (light or dark) or 1 cup crushed pineapple, drained

1 cup sugar

2/3 cup brown sugar

1 tsp. cinnamon

1/4 tsp. nutmeg and 3 Tablespoons flour

2 Tablespoons butter, dabbed over fruit. Top with crust. Either cut a small two inch circle in the center of the top crust or cut 4 slits to let out steam. With a pastry brush or cheese cloth; and using either milk or melted butter, brush top crust evenly. Then sprinkle sugar and cinnamon over top crust. Bake at 400 degrees for 45 minutes.....ENJOY!

Suggested menu for Thanksgiving. Begin with Enticing Pumpkin Soup, then for your Entree', Herbed Dijon Turkey, apple-cranberry mold, potatoes either Irish or sweet yams, zucchini with tomato sauce, rice stuffing and for dessert Harvest Fruit Pie. About 30 minutes before the meal, serve cranberry juice cocktail, chilled and with a twist of lemon or orange. After or with dessert serve hot coffee, if you wish to appear sophisticated, serve the coffee in demitasse cups.

ENTICING PUMPKIN SOUP (a curried soup from pumpkin)

Choose a round pumpkin with a flat bottom so it won't tip as you serve.

With a large sharp knife, slice off the top fourth of the pumpkin and set aside. Scoop out seeds and stringy pulp. Replace top of pumpkin. Place pumpkin on a 15x10x1 inch baking pan. Bake in a 375 degree oven for 50 to 60 minutes or until the pumpkin flesh can be scooped out easily. (Pumpkin will NOT be tender at this point). Cool slightly for easier handling. Scoop out and reserve pumpkin flesh, leaving about 3/4 inch thickness of flesh on pumpkin walls. Cut flesh into chunks (should have about 4 cups). Do not remove any flesh from bottom of shell. Discard pumpkin top.

In a large pot combine the 4 cups

pumpkin flesh, 1 tsp. Curry powder, and 1/2 tsp. cumin. Bring to a boil with 3-14 1/2 oz. cans chicken broth, 2 baking apples, peeled, cored and coarsely chopped. 1 carrot chopped, 2 tsp. grated ginger root (or 1 tsp. powdered ginger). After bringing to a boil and reducing the heat, cover, and simmer for 10 to 12 minutes or til vegetables are tender. Cool slightly. Blend or process mixture, a third at a time, in a blender or food processor 'til smooth. Place pumpkin shell in a 3 quart casserole. If pumpkin is to be removed from the casserole before serving, line the casserole with a double thickness of heavy foil to help lift pumpkin later. Pour soup into shell, bake uncovered in a 375 degree oven for 20 minutes.

Meanwhile in a skillet cook 6 slices of bacon until crisp. Remove and drain bacon reserving 4 Tablespoons drippings in skillet. Cook 1/4 onion and 2 Tablespoons sugar in drippings until onion is tender. Finely crumble bacon. Stir bacon and 1/2 cup of croutons into the skillet. Sprinkle bacon mixture atop soup in pumpkin. Ladle soup into bowls to serve. Makes 8 to 10 side dish servings. (about 8 cups)

Aren't the fall leaves lovely? Plus they're so colorful, the browns of all shades, and yellows, golds, yellow greens, bright greens, oranges, reds and burgundies and other colors and some in between hues. Just sets the scene for creating some Thanksgiving memories.

As a small child about age 4 years we lived briefly in Fort Worth. My favorite fall activity at that time was to go down to the park and stomp ALL THROUGH the dried and drying leaves. I loved the crackly sensation and the beautiful crunchy sound the leaves made when I walked through them. I still love to walk through the crackly, crunchy, colored leaves these fifty some-odd years hence. It brings back memories and a mist of tears to my eyes for all those things that used to be and are no longer. But I'm most thankful that I can still walk through FALL LEAVES.

We were saddened this week by the loss of Mr. Cole Tillotson, husband of Mrs. Helen Tillotson, a longtime member of our Garden Club. Our thoughts and prayers are with her and her family at this time.

Every time you walk through those pretty, noisy, crunchy, crackling leaves, think of me, could be I just might "C" "U" THERE!

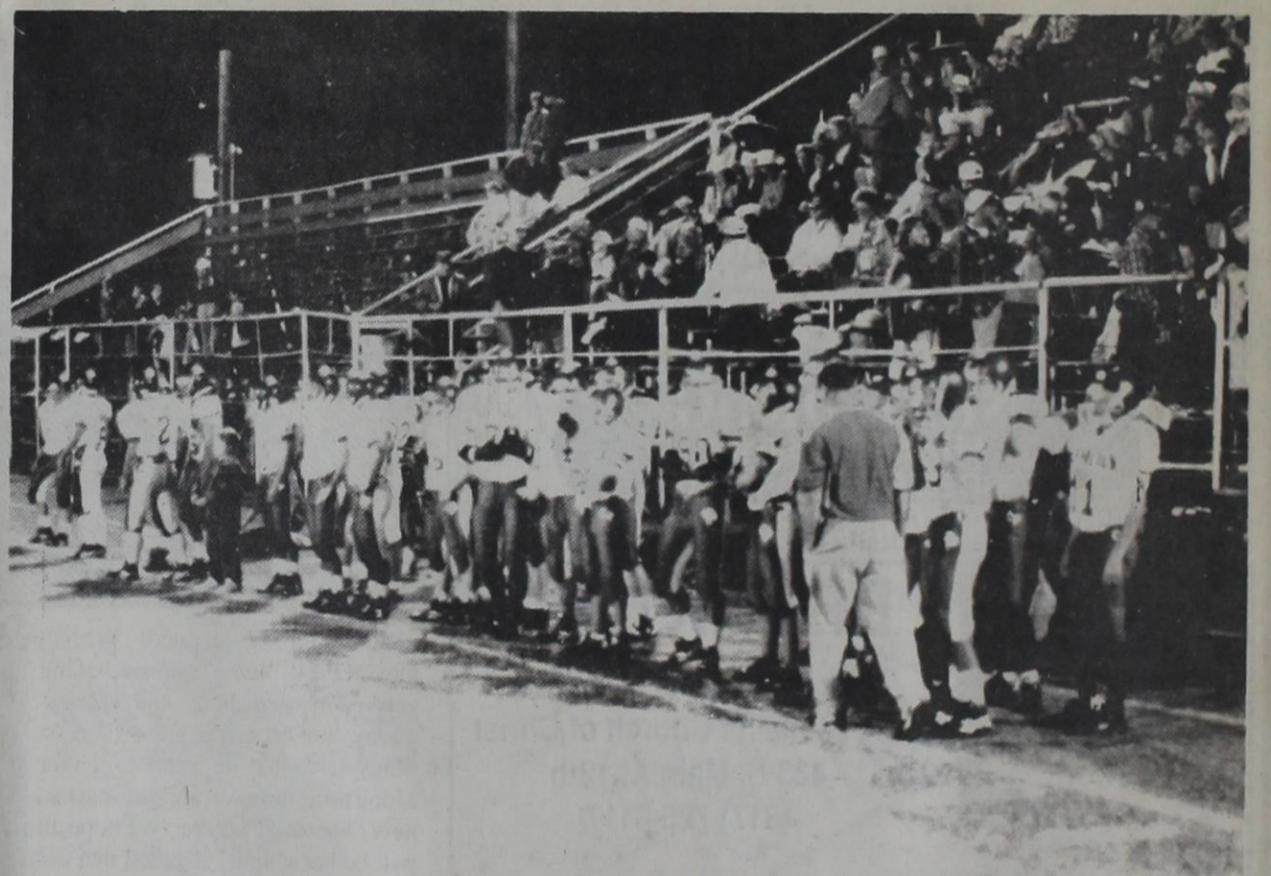
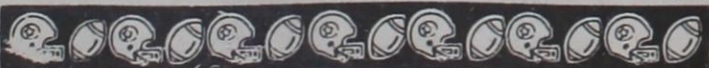

For example, click the icon for the Texas post office murals of the New Deal to discover beautiful images of Texas history in more than 60 locations. A corner of the THC's site, called "Fun Stuff," visits some of the more personal moments in history. This month, the column takes a look at vintage America as seen from the automobile. Roadside architecture from the golden years of the automobile are fast disappearing, but there are still some choice nostalgic holdouts on the trail.

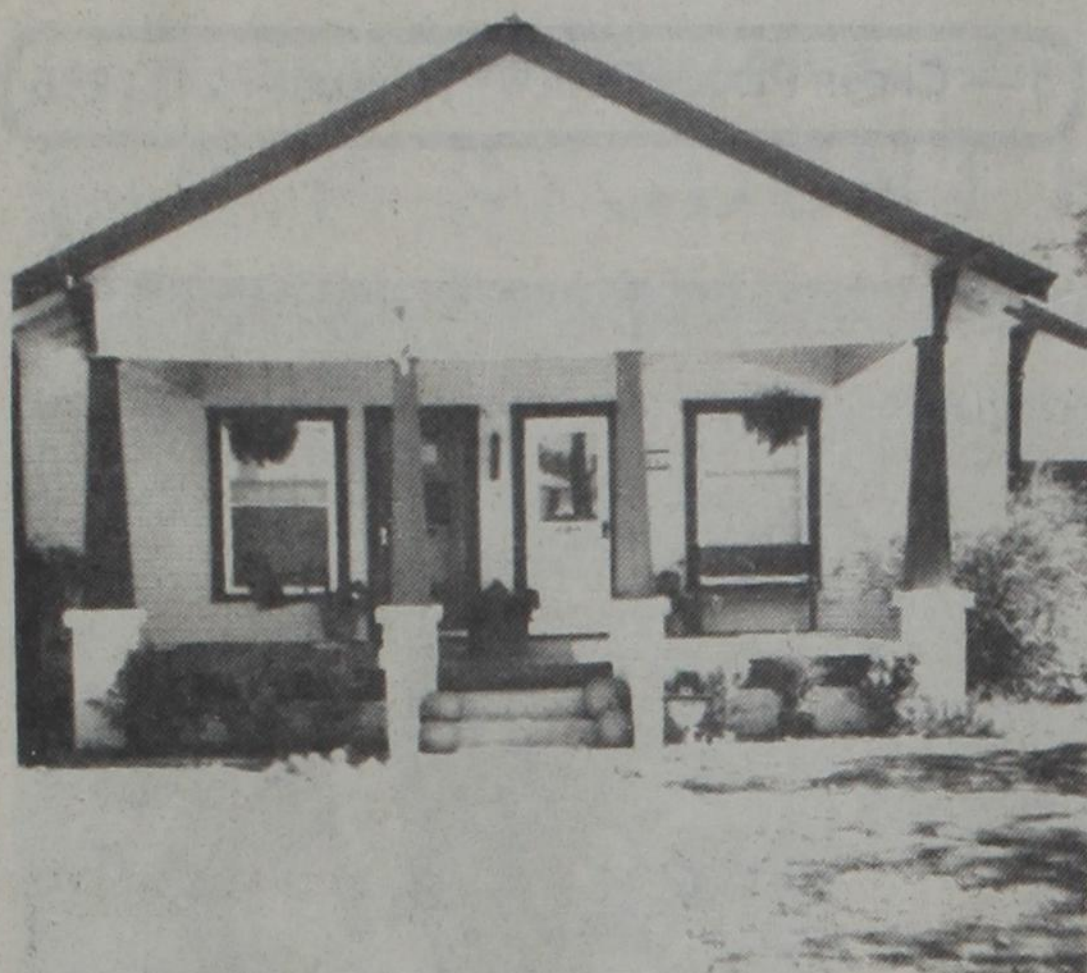

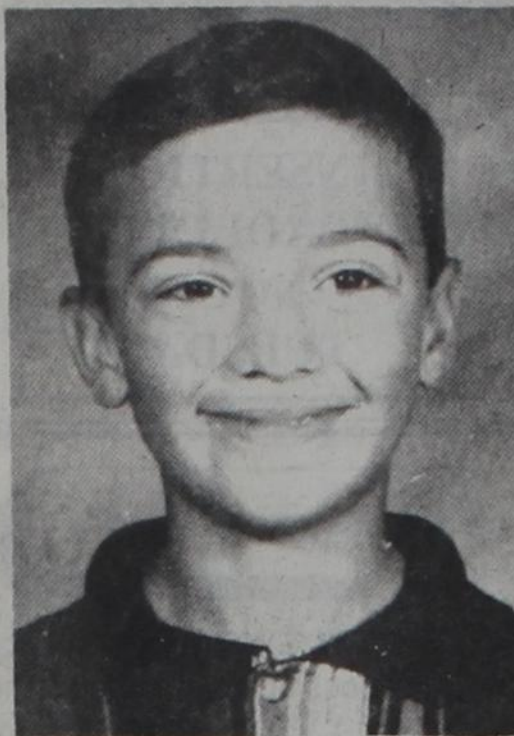
## CJC Band & Wrangler Belles Preparing To Represent Texas

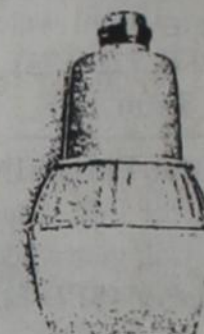

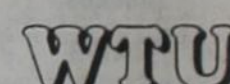
