Stabilization and Research Keys to Healthy Energy Industry

| By Governor william P. Clements, Jr. <br> There are two key words to the future of petroleum in Texas: Stabilization and research. And you really can't have research and reap its benefits until you have stabilization. <br> How do we stabilize the industry? An oil import fee, which I and many others support. is not likely to win approval anytime soon. But there are a number of incentives that can help. Incentives such as: <br> - A tax credit for exploration and drilling expenditures. <br> - Restoring the percentage depletion allowance to its historical level. <br> - Eliminating the altemative num tax on oil and gas investments. <br> - Allowing the deduction of geological and geophysical costs under the federal Tax Code in the same manner as we do for intangible drilling costs. <br> These are the types of measures that can help stabilize the oil and gas industry which would help attract new infusions of capital and encourage an aggressive exploration program. A stable atmosphere can set the stage for the future, which brings us to our sconnd "key" word: Research. <br> Even through Texas is the nation's most thoroughly explored region for oil and gas, it still contains the larg. est known resource of unrecovered oil and gas in the United States. Texas is nowhere near the end of its productive capabilities. <br> If we can enhance the technological momentum that began in the early 1980s, our oil resource base is capable of sustaining our 1985 production level for the next 45 years. The natural gas resource base has similar capabilities. <br> The Bureau of Economic Geology at the University of Texas at Austin spent more than four years studying oil reserves trapped in the state's major producing reservoirs. Based on this inventory, the bureau now estimates that about 110 billion barrels of oil remain in those known, proven reservoirs. That's about twice the amount of oil ever pro- | duced in Texas. <br> Of that amount, 35 billion barrels are considered mobile and cconomically producible at current prices. The remaining 75 billion barrels are immobilc, $=$ made of residual oil and tar and heavy crude, and more cost-sensitive to produce. <br> But a major enhanced recovery effort can improve our exploration effisiency, which. in turm. can reduce the cost and offset some of the impact of low prices that may persist for several ycars. <br> The botom line is this: We can. capture these "trapped" reserves as we broaden our recearch and understanding of these reservoirs. <br> We in Teras can play a leading role in the transfonnation from an exploration-based industry to one that will excel through new production and development strategies. We can show the world how to maximize recovery from known fields. <br> What's more. Texas can lead the way in maintaining U.S. lechnological and economic competitiveness in the global oil and gas market. <br> During my recent trip to Washington, the assistant secretary of the Department of Energy and 1 signed an agreement that committed the federal govermment to such a rescarch program in Texas. The department agreed to share our cost as we pursue scientific and technological advances, and we are already hard at work identifying potential projects for funding. <br> The Department of Energy also agreed to finance sturt-up of the Geoscience Institute, which the Bureau of Enonomic Geology will administer. The Institute is a national consortium of universities and state agencies .- all dedicated to a comprehensive enhanced recovery effor. <br> Yes, enhanced oil and gas recovery reserach is vital to a robust petroleum future. But it's also critical to our national security. It is imperative that we become more efficient in our production to help tolster the industry and stem our growing depedence on imported oil. |
