TAX PROPERTY **EXEMPTIONS**....On November 7, 1995, Texas voters approved a constitutional amendment to increase the amount of exemption from property tax for disabled Veterans. The exemptions have now been published and range from \$5,000 for no less than 10% disability to \$12,000 for 70% or more disability. A Veteran of 65 years of age or more and with not less than 10% disability qualifies for the \$12,000 exemption also. Provisions are also made for widows and dependent children of deceased Veterans.

The Callahan County Appraisal District (915-854-1165) advises that Veterans who were already receiving the exemption have been upgraded to the new rates. If you have a rating of at least 10% you might want to contact the Appraisal Office and discuss the exemption.

KUWAIT LIBERATION MEDAL---- The Department of Defense has recently approved the Kuwait Liberation Medal offered by the Government of Kuwait. To be eligible, a servicemember must have served in the Southwest Asia Theater between August 2, 1990 and August 31, 1993. To obtain the medal, Veterans should submit a request including

full name used during service, Social Security number, dates of service, and their current address along with a copy of their DD 214 to: National Personnel Records Center, ATTN: VSE, 9700 Page Blvd., St. Louis, MO 63132-5200.

The medal bears the Coat of Arms of the state of Kuwait with the inscription "1991 Liberation Medal" written at the top in Arabic letters. The reverse side is the map of Kuwait on a rayed background. The ribbon is patterned from the flag of Kuwait and consists of red, white, and green strips with a black trapezium centered on the top of the three stripes.

RUNNING LATEII----The American Cotton Museum is engaging in an oral history project over the next year and needs assistance in locating Texas World War I Veterans. The goal of the project is to locate and interview as many of the Doughboys as they can within the next year. Since there are only a few hundred left in the State and their average age is right at 100, time is of the essence. They are especially interested in combat Veterans, but anyone who served from 1914-1919 falls within the scope of their project. The goal of this project is to accumulate as many interviews as possible in the next two years and use that information as the raw material for a book and possibly a documentary film

HOMELESS GRANTS The Department of Veterans Affairs is accepting, from public and nonprofit private groups, applications for funds from the department's Homeless Providers Grant and Per Diem Program to develop programs that help Veterans recover from homelessness. Grants awarded under the program can provide up to 65 percent of the cost of acquiring, constructing or renovating facilities to be used for housing or as service centers. Vans needed in support of these groups may also be acquired with grant funds.



"Uses for Herbs"

Herbs have a variety of uses. Normally the first one people think of is as food. This writer has included in this column several times recipes, using herbs. Herbs can be used either fresh or dried. If your recipe calls for dried spices such as sage, marjoram, rosemary, oregano etc., etc. and you plan to use fresh herbs instead, you must greatly increase the amount of fresh herbs. i.e., if the recipe calls for one tablespoon of dried, you need to use a cup to a cup and 1/2 of fresh herbs to maintain the right flavor. Mint leaves may be used to decorate cakes and other desserts; can be used to compliment drinks such as iced tea, lemon or orangeade, mixed drinks etc. and used decoratively both in the drink or on the glass.

... Another use for herbs is as a room freshener. Several herbs may be gathered such as basil, mint, peppermint, rosemary, fennel and many others, tie them into a bundle, enclose in cheesecloth, add a dainty bow or ornament and hang. They can be hung in the kitchen, hall, entrance way, or bedroom and your house will smell so good and fresh. Another way is dry some of the herbs, mix the dried leaves of the herbs with some rose petals and other dried flowers

such as alyssum or any sweet smelling flower and you have created your own potpourri. Sometimes you may want to add a cinnamon stick or so or dried sliced fruit to your potpourri. Display in a tiny basket or other decorative receptacle. It'll be lovely in any room in your home.

A local restaurant makes use of some of the herbs this writer grows by creating fresh, sweet smelling bouquets from them and placing them on each table; creating a lovely table decoration as well as being aromatic. They also use some of the herbs in cooking. They have also made use of some of Rolan Jones herbs also, i.e. cilantro. Rolan has several herbs in his garden which I do not have.

Herbs produce lots of flavor allowing persons to cut down on the amount of salt in their diets. Cutting down on salt intake lowers blood pressure, thus reducing the risk of stroke or heart attack.

Many herbs can be used medicinally which we will discuss in next weeks column. That is to say, it will be discussed as many old-timers used to express it, "If the spirit is willing and the creek don't rise!"

New Law Affects Social Security **Benefits For** Stepchildren

Beginning July 1, 1996, a stepchild can receive Social Security benefits on a stepparent's earnings record only if the child depends on the stepparent for at least one-half of his or her financial support. This dependency requirement is the result of a law enacted on March 29.

The new law also requires that the stepchild's benefits end if the stepparent becomes divorced from the child's parent after June 30, 1996. The child's benefits terminate in the month following the month the divorce becomes final.

The divorce must be reported to Social Security as soon as it becomes final. Each year, the Social Security Administration will notify stepparents who have a child (or children) receiving benefits on their record to remind them that benefits will be terminated in case of divorce.

If you need to report your divorce, call or visit any Social Security office, or call the toll-free number 1-800-772-1213 between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. on business days. The lines are busiest early in the week and early in the month, so it's best to call at other times.





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
