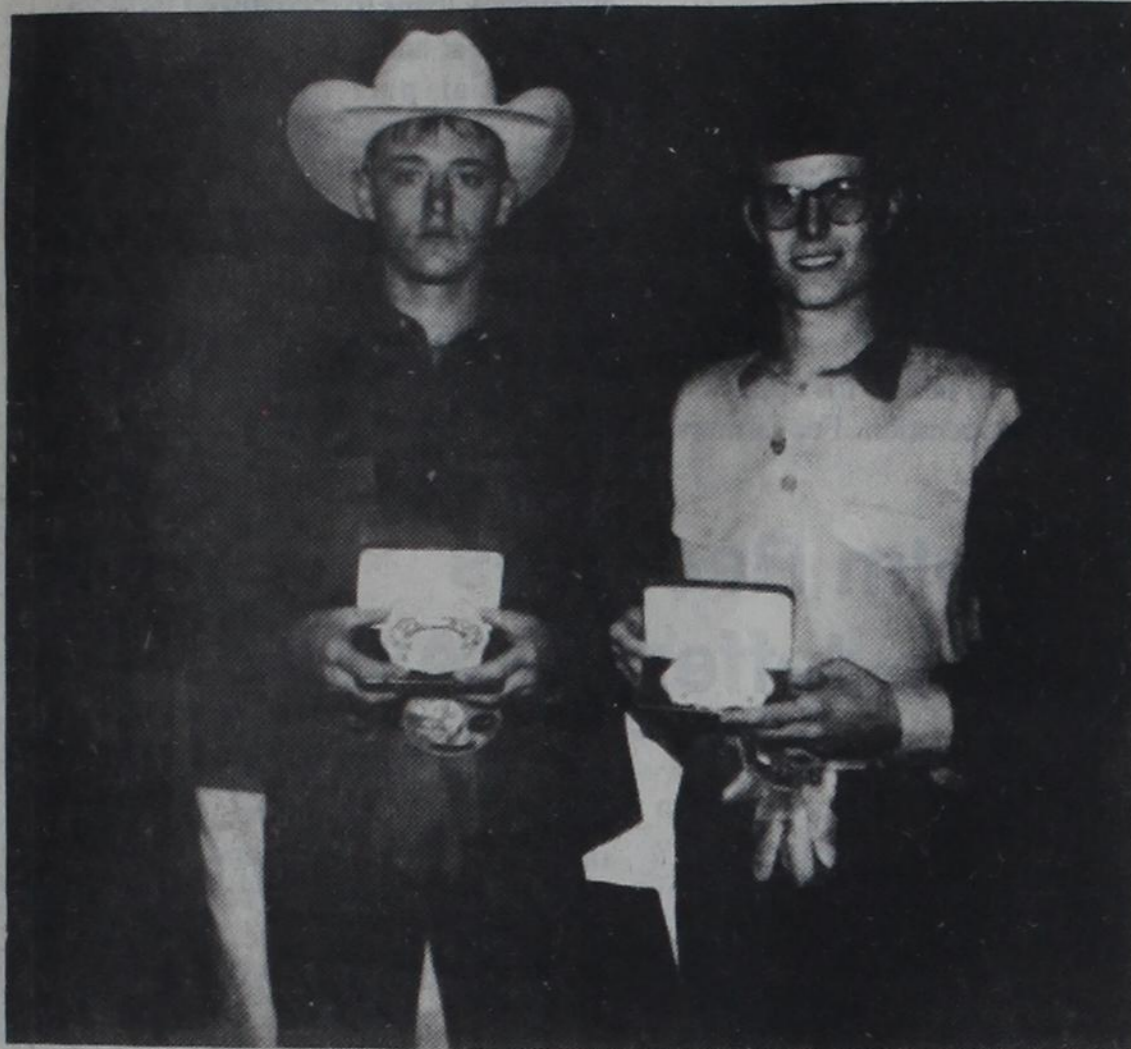

Cross Plains Junior Rodeo Results

The 20th Annual Cross Plains Jr. Rodeo brought a total of 160 contestants to the three night show. From Lubbock to Fort Worth and Oklahoma, cowboys and cowgirls from the age of 3 to 19 participated in barrels, poles, flags, roping, steers, bareback and bull riding. When all the dust was settled Saturday night 8 All Around Montana Silversmith Buckles were awarded to the high point boy and girl in each age group and the champion header and heeler of the team roping.

8-year-old Chelsi Hodges of Breckenridge and Savannah Koenig of Cross Plains tied for the 10 and under All Around Buckle. They had a strong race from start to finish with Savannah winning two 1sts and a 2nd in flags, consistent 4th's in the poles and placing each night in the barrels.

Chelsi ran strong in the barrels with a 1st, 2nd, and 3rd, placed two 2nds in the poles and placed 3rd, 4th and 5th in the flags.

5-year-old Blain Parrish of Hamilton was a crowd pleaser in the 10 and under boy division. His barrel, pole and flag

runs would make many of his older counterparts green with envy. He took home the 10 and under All Around Buckle to add to a growing collection. Blain's 3-year-old sister Brandi will soon be following her brothers footsteps. Brandi has leukemia that is now in remission and she has been a poster for Children's Miracle, who thanks to Ophelia Merrill and Dairy Queen, will be receiving the proceeds from the rodeo concession.

Let's Talk Football

To talk football, we have to talk to new Cross Plains head football coach Cord Woerner. Woerner came to Cross Plains last spring via Howard Payne (one year as graduate assistant); assistant at Early high school (1 year); assistant at Kilren high school (1 year); back to assistant at Early (2 more years); and the last 2 years as assistant defensive coordinator at Lubbock Cooper, where he also was head boys track coach and power lifting coach. So why did he come to Cross Plains? For three reasons. He has coached in 2A, 3A and 5A schools and wanted to work within a 1A system. He also feels that with the experience he has had in a variety of good programs, he says he's ready to put to use what he has learned in his own program; and thirdly, he wanted to work with Boyd in what they both feel is a good situation.

Woerner's overall program for football this year is to work hard on developing very strong basic skills which he says will result in a good strong understanding of the program in which the kids will be comfortable and confident.

As of yet, Woerner doesn't know exactly how many boys will be participating in the program, but is hoping for about 40 in high school (which will allow for a full JV schedule) and about 45 in junior high. He won't know the numbers or the roster until "two-a-days" had started (August 3). Nor has he made any decisions on positions. He says he has no preconceived ideas as to positions and will wait until he sees what talent is available. "Two-a-days" will run from August 3 to August 14 from 8-10 a.m. and 11-1 p.m.

Cross Plains will be in District XIV this year with Santa Anna, Evant, Gorman, Rising Star, and Lometa (in that order). Woerner is looking at Gorman and Rising Star being the toughest games in district.

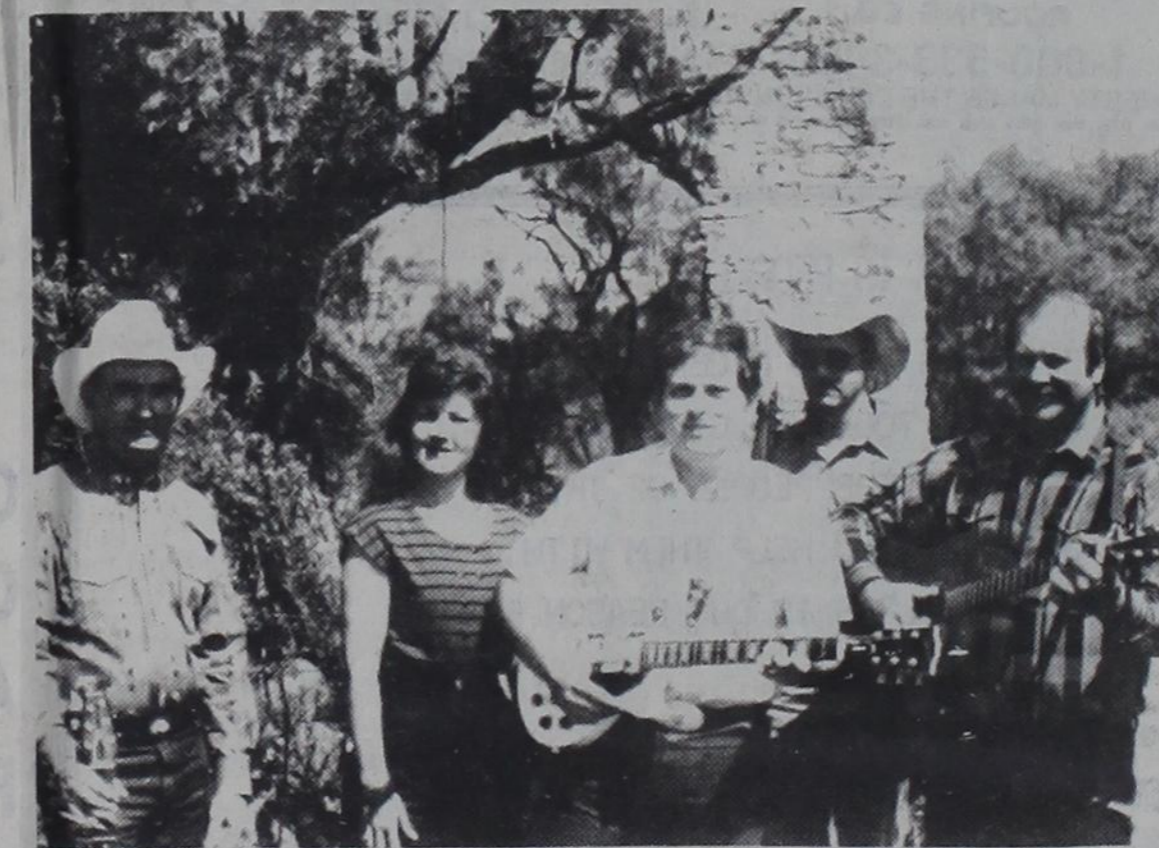
Woerner was reluctant to give any specifics about the types of offense and defense he plans on using, but said he would run a multiple offense, trying to balance the running and passing game. Defensively, he will base out of "50" front.

Two scrimmages are scheduled: The first one at Hawley (2A) on August 18, time to be announced. The next scrimmage is here with Water Valley (1A) on August 25, time also to be announced. Homecoming is scheduled for Saturday, October 29 against Rising Star beginning

at 7:30 p.m.

When asked how he felt the Buffaloes would do this year, he said "If we stay healthy, maintain eligibility, and keep a positive attitude, we should do very well."

Woerner is married and has two children, Thor 4 years and Zed 1 year. His wife, Kim, taught 4th grade reading at Lubbock last year and will be teaching a 3rd grade class of Cross Plains this year.

New Athletic Director Has Positive Outlook

Coach Bill Boyd began his coaching career seven years, and has been the head boys basketball coach at Cross Plains High School for the past three years. This year he will be the Athletic Director for Cross Plains I.S.D. According to Boyd, he has always felt that Cross Plains had the potential to be successful and wanted to be part of the program. As Athletic Director he hopes to help see that happen.

In his new position, Boyd feels he has put together a very strong, compatible staff to handle the athletic program for the '94-'95 school year. This year, the staff includes some new and some familiar faces:

Mack McConal — Junior high/high school girls and boys cross country; the tennis teams; and will scout football games.

Mitchell Atchley — Assist junior high/high school football; assist junior high and J.V. girls basketball.

Kevin McLean — Assist football; assist junior high/high school boys basketball; assist baseball and track; head golf.

John Starcher — Assist football; head varsity girls basketball; junior high girls track; assist high school track.

Cord Woerner — Head football; head baseball.

Bill Boyd — Assist football; head high school boys basketball; head boys and girls track.

Coach McLean filled in last spring when Monte Jones took over as head coach at Novice. Boyd has known both McLean and Woerner for many years, back to their high school days at Marble Falls, and has a great deal of confidence in their abilities to contribute to a successful program.

Boyd's immediate goal is to work towards getting Cross Plains in the football playoffs this year. He would like to increase participation in the athletic program and continue working towards improving academic performance in the athletes (by offering additional tutoring for students with a 75 or lower). He also anticipates improving the athletic facilities.

Coach Boyd has also worked with his staff in creating a new, improved version of an athletic disciplinary policy which he hopes will improve the overall quality of the program. As Coach Woerner stated, "Expectations will be much higher."

Applications For Emergency Farm Loans Are Being Accepted At the Farmers Home Administration

Applications for emergency farm loans for damage and loss caused by tornado, hail and rain are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Abilene, Texas, FmHA County Supervisor Bruce R. Bailey said today.

Callahan County is one of 8 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy as eligible for loans to cover part of actual physical losses resulting from the tornado, hail and rain on May 29, 1994.

Mr. Bailey said farmers may be eligible for loans for physical losses, the damaged or destroyed physical property must be essential to the successful operation of the farm; and if not repaired or replaced, the farmers would be unable to continue operations on a reasonably sound basis. The financing necessary to recover from the physical loss must be actually needed to permit the applicant to continue the operation. For farmers

unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until March 8, 1995 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Mr. Bailey said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Abilene, TX is open from 8:00 to 12:00 and 12:30 to 4:30 Monday through Friday.

Stenholm Receives Thomas Jefferson Award

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Charles Stenholm has once again received the food distribution industry's Thomas Jefferson Award, in honor of his support for the principles of free enterprise.

This award is presented to those Members of Congress whose voting record consistently supports sound fiscal policy, minimal government regulation, free trade, and other Jeffersonian principles of government.

The biennial Thomas Jefferson Awards program is sponsored by the National-American Wholesale Grocers' Association (NAWGA)/International Foodservice Distributors Association (IFDA), a trade group comprised of more than 300 food distribution companies across America.

"As our industry has looked to Capitol Hill over the past two years for leadership on important economic and regulatory issues, Charlie Stenholm has been a visible, effective presence," said John Block, President of NAWGA/IFDA.

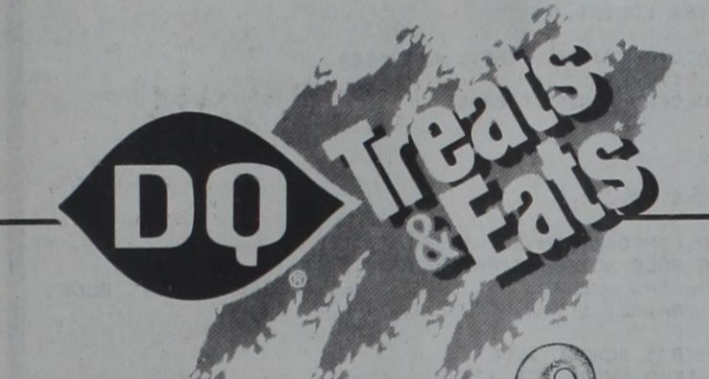

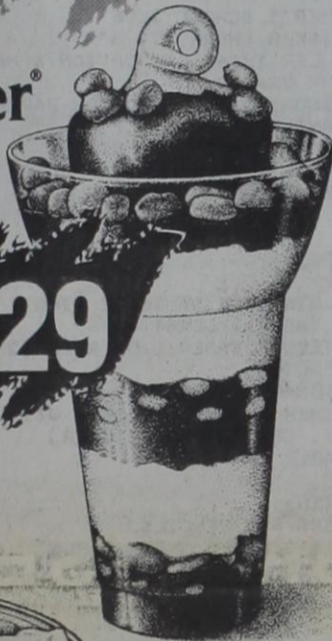

You've seen a sign like the one I saw recently. It was in front of a business—a restaurant, motel or most any kind of business. The sign read: "Under New Management." When I saw the sign I assumed they had probably changed some things—their prices, maybe remodeled, added some features. But it was a pretty sure thing that some things had been changed.

It's that kind of change that's called for when a person becomes a Christian. He or she should be "under new management"! There should be some "remodeling." Jesus referred to it as being "born anew," John 3:3. Paul wrote, "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; old things have passed away; behold, all things have become new," II Corinthians 5:17.

What if you went into a place you had frequented for a long time. They have this sign up—"Under New Management"—for the first time. You stop and go in as you have so many times before—but you don't see any changes. The same people, the same menu, the same prices, same food—everything's the same; no change at all! You'd wonder whether there was really any "new management"!

I'm sure that Jesus wonders the same thing when one claims to have become a Christian, or claims to be a Christian of long standing, and yet there is no change! He shared a parable once, which had special application at that time, but which can be applied to the subject at hand. He said, "Men do not put new wine into old wineskins..." 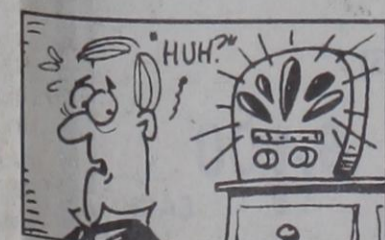

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Social Security's Toll-Free Number Available At Night And On Weekends

If you're like other busy people, finding time to take care of your personal business during the day is often a problem. That's why Social Security's toll-free phone number gives you service at night and on weekends, in addition to normal business hours.

When you call 1-800-772-1213 on your touch-tone phone at night and at any time during weekends and holidays, you get a recorded menu of choices that lets you take care of certain kinds of Social Security business. You can ask for:

- An application for an original or replacement Social Security card.
- A form to obtain a record of your earnings and an estimate of your future

Social Security benefits. This is called a **Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement**.

• A document verifying that you receive Social Security benefit payments, Supplemental Security Income, or both. You may need this document to show proof of your income to other agencies.

You can also call to ask for these forms during daytime hours 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on business days. Our phones are busiest early in the week and early in the month, so if your business can wait, it's best to call at less busy times — such as nights and weekends, or later in the month.

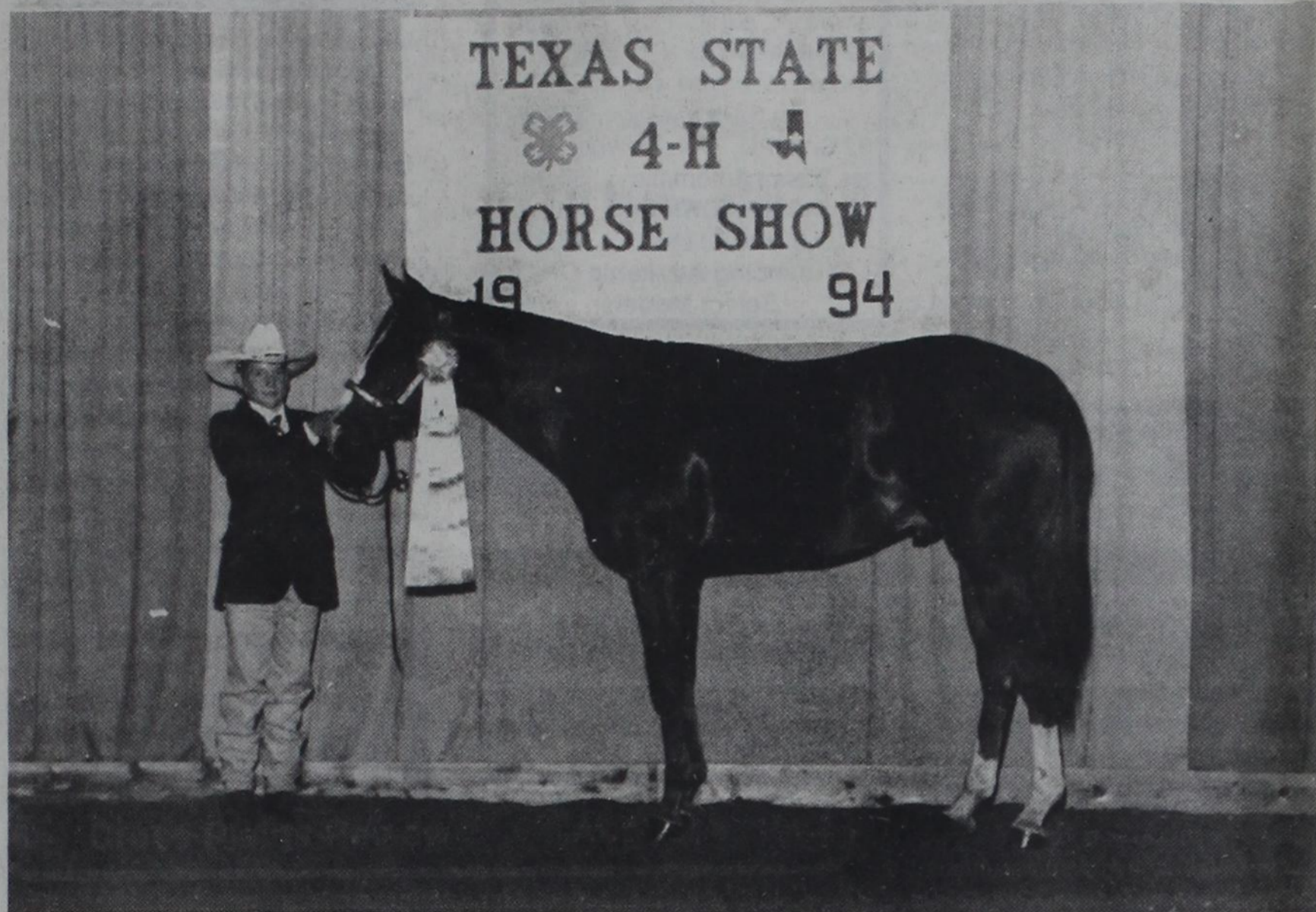
Shifting your call to less busy times helps not only you, but all callers. About

one of every five calls made during peak periods are to request one of the three documents listed above. So if those calls are shifted to less busy times, other callers stand a better chance of getting through without a busy signal.

Other services available to callers at night and on weekends include recorded information about Social Security programs and the opportunity to order popular Social Security leaflets.

Monday, July 25, appointed a committee of four county officials to review health insurance proposals and make a recommendation to county commissioners.

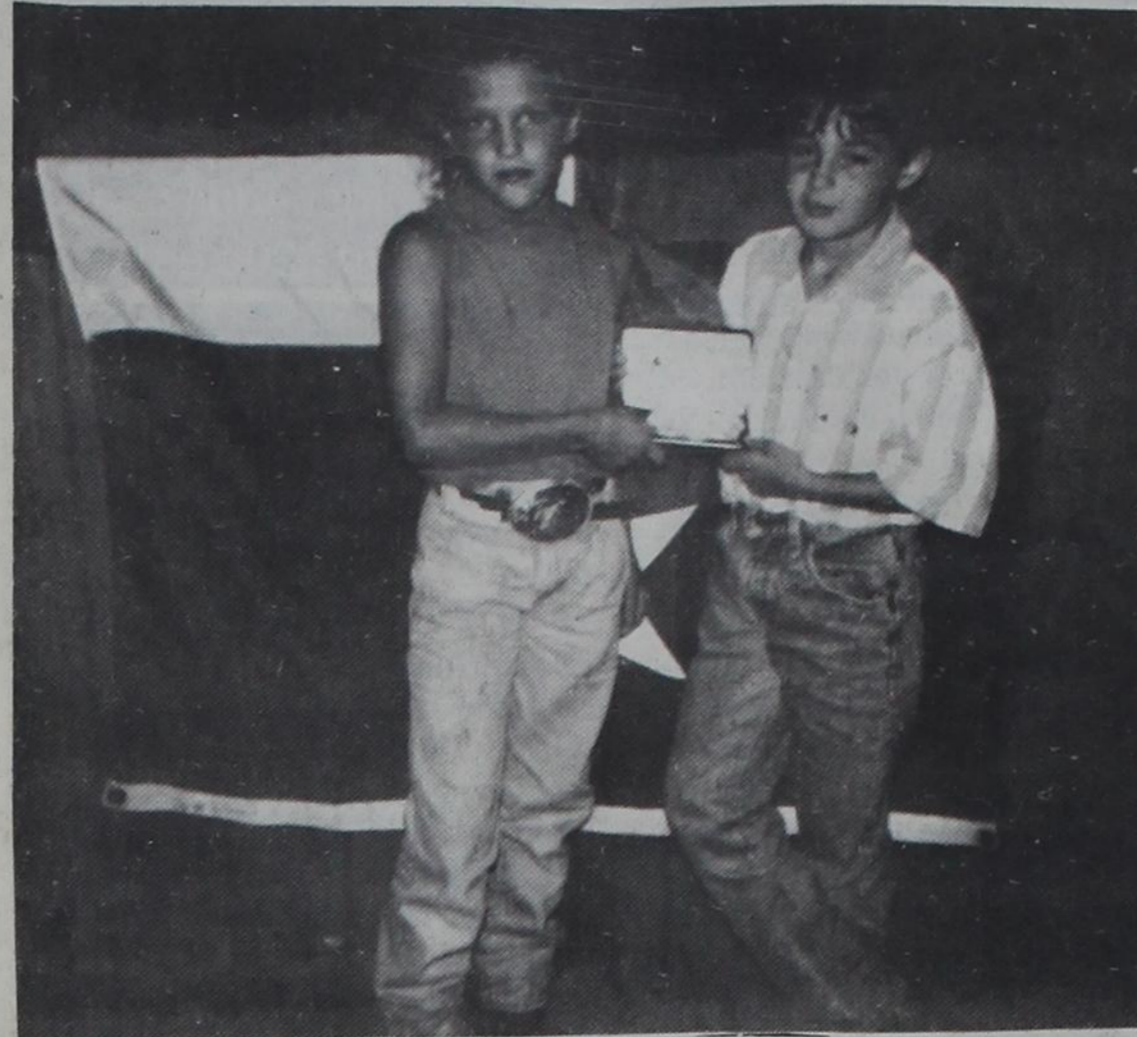
