Applications For Emergency Farm Loans Are Being Accepted At the Farmers Home Administration

Applications for emergency farm loans for damage and loss caused by tomado, hail and rain are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Abilene, Texas, FmHA County Supervisor Bruce R. Bailey said today

Callahan County is one of 8 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy as eligible for anons to cover part of actual physical and rain on May 29, 1994.
Mr. Bailey said farmers may be eligible for loans for physical losses, the damaged or destroyed physical property must be essential to the successful operation of the farm; and if not repaired or replaced, the farmers would be unable o continue operations on a reasonably sound basis. The financing necessary to cover from the physical loss must be o continue the operation. For farmers
unable to obtain credit from private commerce
"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until March 8, 1995 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Mr. Bailey said.
FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmer who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and wo farming partnerships, corporations or majority interest.
