

New Laws Passed By 70th Legislature

There is a 72-hour waiting period from time of issuance of a marriage license until the wedding. Any marriage occuring before this 72-hour waiting period may be voided.

Parks and Wildlife fines have been raised up to \$500 for each violation plus a restitution charge. The restitution fee is the cost of the game animal or endangered species as computed by the Parks and Wildlife Department.

regulating the processing and treatment of refuse, garbage, rubbish, or junk dumped, deposited, or left within 300 yards of a public highway. A person commits an offense if he violates a rule adopted under this subsection.

(g) An offense under this section is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$200. If it is shown on the trial of the defendant that the defendant has previously been convicted of an offense under this section, he shall be punished by a fine or not less than \$100 nor more than \$1,000, by confinement in jail for not more than one year, or by both. Each day of a continuing violation is a separate offense. A county or district attorney may bring suit for injunction to prevent or restrain a violation of this section. A person affected or to be affected by a violation is entitled to enjoin the violation.

SECTION 3. (a) The change in law made by this Act applies only to the punishment for an offense committed on or after the effective date of this Act. For purposes of this section, an offense is committed before the effective date of this Act if any element of the offense occurs before the effective date.

(b) An offense committed before the effective date of this Act is covered by the law in effect when the offense was committed, and the former law is continued in effect for this purpose.


Noble Flora Wagner
