

# Vote Tuesday, **November 5 In The General** Election

Callahan County voters will go to the polls Tuesday, November 5 to elect a U.S. President, U.S. Senator, U.S. Representative and a number of statewide offices.

Voters in the county will also decide the fate of two candidates seeking the office of Callahan County Sheriff.

Seven voting locations throughout the county will be open from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. There are two voting locations in Clyde-Precinct #1 voters will vote at the Clyde Lions Club and Precinct #6 voters will vote at the Southside Baptist Church.

Judging from the early voting turnout, the number of county voters casting ballots this year will be higher than in previous elections. Through Monday, 433 voters cast early ballots at the Clyde Justice of the Peace office. Early voting for the November 5 General Election will continue at Clyde, Baird and Cross Plains through Friday, November 1. Locally, county voters will choose its sheriff for the next four

years. Incumbent County Sheriff Eddie Glen Curtis (Democrat) faces challenger Paul Jaworski (Republican).

Other races of interest include U.S. President where six political parties have candidates on the ballot.

There are four candidates seeking the office of U.S. Senator and three seeking the U.S. District 17 Representative seat.

Four candidates are seeking the office of Railroad Commissioner. There are also contested races for: Chief Justice, Supreme Court; Justice, Supreme Court, Place 1; Justice, Supreme Court, Place 2; Justice, Supreme Court, Place 3; Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1; Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2; Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 3; State Senator, District 24; State Representative, District 60; and Justice, 11th Court of Appeals District.



## Wayne Easterling

ODESSA-Wayne Easterling answered the final alarm on Thursday, October 24, 1996. Those of us who loved him will miss him sorely. Those who did not have missed a great adventure.

Services for Wayne were held Saturday, October 26, 1996, at 10 a.m. at the Chapel Hill Baptist Church with the Rev. Jimmy Braswell officiating. Internment was at 4 p.m. at Pioneer Cemetery near Cross Plains.

Wayne was born on May 24, 1942, in Texarkana, Arkansas, to John and Elsie Easterling and soon had two younger brothers, Tom and Floyd. He graduated or was let out from Odessa High in 1960, and joined the United States Air Force. He served two years in the Air Force Combat Central Team, part of that time with the Military Allied Command-Vietnam-Special Operations Group as a recon officer. Stateside he was stationed at Pope Air Force Base in North Carolina and attended Columbia University. After his discharge he attended and graduated from the Dallas Institute of Mortuary Science and returned to Odessa to begin his funeral service career. Over the years, locally, he worked for Chapel of The Roses, Rix Funeral Home and later for Easterling Funeral Home with his brother, Tom. In the meantime, Wayne joined the Odessa Fire Department in 1973 and was instrumental in forming the emergency medical services, which became a model for other cities across the state to do the same. He worked up to the rank of captain and many a rookie heard tales of the "Old Man" for the 14 years until he resigned in 1987. He maintained his paramedic certification until 1991. In 1976, he married Sidney McClure and together they set out to raise his five children and her son, Shannon.

In 1987, they opened Easterling Funeral Home in Odessa and operated it until health problems forced them to sell and re-group.



**Medications Can Lead To Tooth** Decay

Medications that have side effects which include dryness of the mouth can lead to dental decay, according to a report in American Family Physician. Among the drugs that can cause dryness are antidepressants, antihistamines, some cold remedies, water pills, and blood pressure medications. Whatever the cause, if you have a problem with dry mouth, it important to get frequent dental checkups, and to clean and floss your teeth often. It also helps to keep your mouth moist with sips of water, chewing gum, or to use an artificial saliva product.



And when Jesus saw that he (the rich young ruler) became very sorrowful, He said, 'How hard it is for those who have riches to enter the kingdom of God! For it is easier for a camel to go through a needle's eye than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God," Luke 18:24-25. What think ye of these statements from Jesus? Those who heard Him then thought, "Who then can be saved?" -- for they certainly couldn't imagine anyone being able to "go through a needle's eye."

There are two things, especially, which need to be noted. First, Jesus said it was hard -- difficult -- for a person who is rich to go to heaven, not that it was impossible. And it is hard, for various reasons. With the greater abundance of riches comes the greater responsibility of stewardship. With riches comes the greater temptation to want more and more and give less and less to others. Luke 12:13-21. The Bible is checked full of teaching -- warnings and admonitions -- about the tremendous temptations that accompany wealth. Actually, however, Proverbs 30:8b-9 says it well; "Give me neither poverty nor riches...lest I be full and deny You, and say, 'Who is the Lord?" Or lest I be poor and steal, and profane the name of my God." Second thing to be noted: To their question of "Who then can be saved," Jesus answered: "The things that are impossible with men are possible with God." Do you catch the import of that? Rich or poor, if we're not "with God," we can't be saved. He can provide the wisdom, patience, gratitude, and all other qualities needed to deat with riches (or poverty). It's like Paul said in writing the Christians at Philippi: "I can do all things through Him who strengthens me," Philippians 4:13. If we want to be rich and saved both, we'd best stay very close to God. (Of course the same thing is true if we're poor -- if we want to be saved, we must stay very close to God.) With God, we can be saved! Rich or poor, we must let God help us "through the needle's eye."


# **Cross Plains Has** Winners In **Coleman's Fifth Annual Art Show Held Recently**





# More Is Not Always **Better**

More is not always better, especially when it comes to supplementing children's diets with vitamins.

Over-the-counter supplements can be potentially toxic and megadoses can be harmful, warns Dr. Kathleen J. Motil at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center.

"Too much iron can be fatal, and there are cases where excess vitamin A and D can damage the kidneys, heart, and brain," said Motil, an assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine.

Vitamins are available in two forms: fat soluble and water soluble. Fat soluble vitamins include A, D, E, and K. Water solubles include B-1, B-2, niacin, B-6, B-12, and vitamin

Water soluble vitamins are easily absorbed by the intestinal tract and flushed out of the body during urination if not needed, Motil explained. Fat solubles, on the other hand, are more difficult to absorb and tend to be stored in the body. "The fat soluble vitamins are the

worry," Motil said. "Reactions vary from person to person. some people are more sensitive to fat soluble vitamins."

In general, Motil believes that vitamins are unnecessary if a child is healthy and consumes a well-balanced diet.

She suggests the USDA's food guide pyramid as a reference.

The pyramid recommends 2 to 3 servings a day from the milk group, 2 to 3 servings of meat, poultry, fish or eggs, 3 to 5 servings of vegetables, 2 to 4 servings of fruit, and 6 to 11 servings from the bread/cereal group.

"Even the most finicky cater will get enough vitamins and minerals with a varied diet including meat, dairy products, grains, and fruits and vegetables."

There are exceptions, however. Motil believes supplements are appropriate for premature infants, children on restrictive diets including vegetarian dicts, and for children under the care of a physician for specific medical reasons such as a chronic illness, teen pregnancy, or eating disorders.

A pediatrician may also recommend a fluoride supplement, available alone and in combination with vitamins, if there is insufficient fluoride in the drinking water.

Motil urges parents to consult their pediatrician or a registered dictitian who specializes in children's nutrition if they are concerned about their child's eating habits.





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# Vote '96

You get your ticket weeks in advance. Your seats are never as close as where you really wanted, but that makes little difference. After all, your ticket not only means you see the action, it guarantees you're part of it. Then you notice some prime seats where no one will sit. Who gets a ticket to a big event and then opts not use it?

In attendance-keeping, they are known as the "no-shows." People who buy tickets and then for some reason don't attend. No-shows can prevent an event from touting itself as an official sellout. For that reason, you'll hear boos, hisses, and catcalls when the number of no-shows is announced at some sporting events. In many respects, Texas elections

vary little from this scenario. You get your voter registration card (your ticket) weeks in advance. Most of us are never as close to the political action as we'd like, but on election day that makes little difference. Our vote makes each and every one of us a vital part of the action.

And like any big event, organizers always hope for a 100 percent turnout (a "sellout," if you will) on election day. However, over the years, the political arena has been anything but full. Empty seats are easy to find.

So where are the "Boos" for the noshows on election day?

Let's face it. booing the election day no-shows is no longer fashionable. Yes, it's certainly chic to complain about "the system," but taking an active role in changing it?

That's for the other guy to worry about. The right to vote, once a patriotic duty, has become as important to some people as a weekend chore that never seems to get done. "Yeah, yeah. I'll do it -- if I get around to it."

With 1996 being a Presidential election year, that fact alone would be enough to spark voter interest across our state. And considering Texans will also have the final word on one U.S. Senate seat, all 30 Congressional seats, all 150 seats in the Texas House and approximately half the seats in the Texas Senate, you can understand why 1996 is viewed as a significant election year - and why voter participation is as important as ever.

However, if a 20-year trend holds, more than a quarter of the registered voters in Texas will opt to sit out this Presidential election year. In hard numbers, that's more than two-anda-half million people. Since 1976, voter turnout in the November General Election has surpassed the 70 percent mark only once. As Secretary of State, that's a trend of voter apathy that disturbs me.

Upon being appointed by Governor George W. Bush, my goal has been to continue the strong legacy of my immediate predecessors in the area of voter registration. Secretaries of State including Jack Raines, George Bayoud, John Hannah, and Ron Kirk have all worked to assure every Texan eligible to vote gets the chance to register to vote.

Passage of the National Voter Registration Act has made registration a relatively simple process. A record 10,540,678 Texans are registered to vote this election year, representing approximately 77 percent of the eligible voting population. With registration made easy, the challenge is now on assuring those registered to vote will show up at the polls.

The answer to voter apathy has proven elusive. Feelings of isolation from government, negative campaigns, the overwhelming number of elections have all contributed to the problem. All have added to the perception, "What does it matter?"

If you are concerned about how state and federal government utilize your tax dollars, your vote is crucial. If you consider jobs and the economic future of our children a priority, your vote is significant. In 1996, as in every election, your vote still matters.

Democrat or Republican, Libertarian or Independent: your political affiliation is not the issue. What matters is that you let your voice be heard on election day. The sounds that resonate from the ballot box are ones that cannot be ignored in Washington, in Austin, in county courthouses or in city halls.

Your voter registration card is your ticket. The political arena has plenty of seats. With so much riding on the outcomes in 1996, it's time we start booing the election day no-shows again.

## Area Code Changes For Houston Suburbs Nov. 2

IRVING-The suburban areas around Houston now in the 713 area code will be assigned the new 281 area code beginning at 12:01 a.m. November 2. The central Houston area, defined primarily as the area inside Beltway 8 (Sam Houston Parkway), will retain the 713 area code.

The area code change is the second in Texas in as many months. The suburban areas surrounding Dallas changed from the 214 area code to 942 September 14. The central Dallas area continues to have the 214 code.

To ensure calls are completed to the party called, GTE urges callers to use the proper area code when calling numbers in the Dallas area, and in the Houston area beginning November 2. Some seven digit numbers are already assigned in both the 214 and 972 area codes in Dallas, and the 713 and 281 area codes in Houston.



Most calls will be completed for a six month period in both areas when either the new or old area code is dialed. ## "Redwood" She died from the same disease that **Conservation District Officials Pass Resolution to Request Single Cost-Shared Items Under 1996 Farm Bill**

FORT WORTH-Because agricultural producers for various reasons are unable to commit to longterm contracts, conservation district officials want the National Association of Conservation Districts and the United States Department of Agriculture to urge Congress to create a provision in the Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP) under the 1996 Farm Bill to allow for an annual program where single cost-shared items can be administered.

The 1996 Farm Bill establishes EQIP to combine the functions of several existing USDA conservation cost-share programs: the Agricultural Conservation Program; the Great Plains Conservation Program; the Colorado River Basin Salinity Control Program; and the Water Quality Incentive Program.

"EQIP provides technical and financial assistance to producers to implement conservation measures and plans, with 50 percent of the funds being targeted to livestock water quality practices," said Memo Benavides, President of the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts. . "Under the new EQIP program, provisions are only for long-term contracts of 5-10 years. Many producers have completed land improvement projects on their own and may only require assistance for a single cost-shared item."

Conservation district officials want to require that any single cost-shared item to be completed would have to be part of an overall conservation plan to insure that all resources are addressed.





Merchants collect the state and local sales tax and send it to the Comptroller's office with their tail returns. The state keeps its 6 1/percent share and returns the local one percent sales tax each month to local governments. Cities and counties may levy a combined tail of up to two percent above the state's sales tax. Clyde, Baird and Cross Plains all collect 1.50 per cent in local sales tax.

The October checks include taxes collected on August sale and reported in September by businesses filing monthly sales tai returns with the state. Businesse file sales tax payments either monthly, quarterly or annually de pending on the amount of sales ta they collect.

All local sales taxes must be ap proved by local voters and may b used for any legal city or count expenses. Most areas put the money in their General Fund and use it for normal operations like fire fighting, maintaining roads and law enforcement, Sharp said Some cities use up to an additional one percent city sales tax to help fund local economic development and to reduce property taxes.



Big Country area counties oil and gas production for July 1996 include: Brown, 172,692 MCF of gas and 16,804 barrels of oll; Coleman, 234,807 MCF of gas and 33,823 barrels of oil; Eastland, 597,480 MCF of gas and 37,168 barrels of oil; Jones, 64,933 MCF of gas and 100,550 barrels of oil; Runnels, 189,258 MCF of gas and 76,323 barrels of oil; Shackelford, 544,730 MCF of gas and 103,864 barrels of oil; Stephens, 921,421 MCF of natural gas and 324,512 barrels of oil; and Taylor County, 47,281 MCF of gas and 74,479 barrels of oll.


## Jaworski **Asks For Your Vote**

# It's Never Too Late To **Prevent Heart Disease**

It's never too late to prevent heart disease, says a geriatrics expert in The DeBakey Heart Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"Even if you are 70 years old, exercising and eating right can decrease your heart disease risk," said Dr. Robert Luchi, a professor of medicine and director of the Huffington Center on Aging at Baylor. "But the earlier in life you start, the better." Heart disease is the leading cause of death of Americans and is more common in older people. The risk dramatically after age 75.

add physical activity to their lifestyle can significantly improve cardiovascular performance," Luchi said. "Walking, water aerobics, and dancing are good ways to improve blood circulation and make you feel good."

Medications like "clot-busting" streptokinase and aspirin can help prevent blood clots that cause heart attacks. Studies have shown that postmenopausal women who take estrogen supplements seem to be protected against heart attacks. According to Luchi, adults should have an annual check-up by age 65 and have a stress test before beginning an exercise program. Luchi says it's important to know heart attack warning signs:

In some older people, a heart attack can occur with few or no symptoms. "Heart attacks come in different forms -- from no symptoms to severe pain," Luchi said.

If any symptoms appear, Luchi says don't ignore them

"Get evaluated early, even if you have mild pain," he said. Heart attack treatment is best when given early. And remember, by making

Coronary artery diseases, such as atherosclerosis (artery blockage), often take up to 40 years or more to progress to a heart attack. And, like high blood pressure, heart disease is not necessarily a natural part of aging, Luchi said.

"It's not normal for blood pressure to rise with age. But when it does, it's still treatable," he said. "By lowering blood pressure, you can reduce the risk of death from heart attack and stroke."

The key is making healthful lifestyle choices, such as eating lowsalt, low-fat and low-cholesterol foods, not smoking, and watching your weight.

Among the best choices? Exercise. "Recent studies have shown that sedentary older adults who gradually



# **Heartworms Growing Problem In County**

HEARTWORM: A growing problem in Callahan County area with increase mosquito numbers.

Dogs with heartworms are being diagnosed on a regular basis in our area. Thirteen cases nave been diagnosed since the first of the year and more cases are sure to be found before the end of the year. Many of these cases would not have been found until clinical signs of heart disease were evident, but increased awareness of the problem has increased the testing for heartworms. Our area was once thought to be a low incidence area, but with the rapid increase in the numbers of heartworm cases we must take a more aggressive progressed, symptoms can approach to the problem.

Heartworms are on the increase: Mild winters with increased rainfall resulting in more mosquitoes and year around exposure; owners traveling with their dogs either to or from areas with severe heartworm problems; owners more aware of the problem which results in more testing of infected dogs. Heartworm checks and preventatives must be initiated to decrease the incidence of the which can prevent infective larvae disease.

\*Since it's possible for an infected dog to have adult heartworms without microfilaria, an x-ray examination and other lab tests may be needed to confirm heartworm infection.

\*After the disease has include frequent coughing, sluggishness, rapid tiring and finally, labored breathing.

\*If caught in time, a series of injections of an organic arsenical drug can be used to kill heartworms. Then another drug can be used to get rid of the microfilaria.

- the Texas Association of Business and Chambers of Commerce.



- Welfare reform, reduce dependency on government, and discourage illegitimacy;
- Strict penalties for violent juvenile crime;
- Tougher action against violent adult criminals;
- Property tax relief with no state income tax;
- Strict term limits for elected officials;
- Reduced spending and lower taxes; and
- Local control of schools.
