"Too much iron can be fatal, and here are cases where excess vilamin A and D can damage the kidncys, seart, and brain," said Motil, an asistant professor of pediatr aylor College of Medicine.
Vitamins are available forms: fat soluble and water soluble Fat soluble vitamins include A, D, E and K . Water solubles include B-1 B-2, niacin, B-6, B-12, and vitamin
Water soluble vitamins are easily absorbed by the intestinal tract and llushed out of the body during uriation if not necded, Motil ex plained. Fat solubles, on the othe and tend to be stored in the body. "The fat soluble vilamins are the worry," Motil said.
"Reactions vary from person to person. some people are more sen In to fat soluble vitamins." In general, Motil believes that viamins are unnecessary if a child is

Resolution to Request Single Cost-Shared Items Under 1996 Farm Bill

FORT WORTH-Because agricultural producers for various rea-
sons are unable to commit to longerm contracts, conservation distric officials want the National Associa on of Conservation Districts and Agriculture to urge Congress to create a provision in the Environ mental Quality Incentive Program EQIP) under the 1996 Farm Bill to allow for an annual program where ingle cost-shared items can be ad inistered. The 1996 Farm Bill establishes QiP to combine the functions of ost-share programs: the Agricul-cost-share programs: the Agricul
tural Conservation Program; the Great Plains Conservation Program the Colorado River Basin Salinity Control Program; and the Water Quality Incentive Program.
"EQIP provides technical and fiancial assistance to producers to Indiement conservation measures funds being targeted to livestock water quality practices," said Memo Benavides, President of the Asso ciation of Texas Soil and Wate Conservation Districts. "Under the new EQIP program, provisions are only for long-term contracts of 5-10 years. Many producers have comtheir own and may only require as sistance for a single cost-shared sistanc.
item."
Conservation district officials wan orequire that any single cost-shared item to be completed would have to be part of an overall conservation plan to insure that all resources are addressed.

It's never too late to prevent hear disease, says a geriatrics expert in The DeBakey Heart Center at Baylo College of Medicine in Houston. Even if you are 70 years old,
exercising and eating right can exercising and eating right can
decrease your heart disease risk," decrease your heart disease risk, medicine and director of the Huffington Center on Aging at Baylor. "But the earlier in life you start, the better."
Heart disease is the leading cause of death of Americans and is more common in older people. The risk for heart failure increases dramatically after age 75 . Coronary artery diseases, such as ateros take upis (artery blockage), often take up to 40 years or more to
progress to a heart attack. And, like progress to a heart attack. And, like not necessarily a natural part of aging, Luchi said.
"It's not normal for blood pressure torise with age. But when itdoes, it's still treatable," he said. "By lowering blood pressure, you can reduce the
risk of death from heart attack and risk of death
stroke." stroke."

The key is making healthful life-
style choices, such as eating lowstyle choices, such as eating low-
salt, low-fat and low-cholesterol foods, rot smoking, and watching your weight.
Among the best choices? Exercise. "Recent studies have shown that sedentary older adults who gradually
add physical activity to their life style can significantly improve cardiovascular performance," Luchi said. Walking, water acrobics, and dancing are good ways to improve blood circulan and make you feel
good good."
Mredications like "clot-busting" streptokinase and aspirin can help prevent blood clots that cause heart attacks. Studies have shown that postmenopausal women who take estrogen supplements seem to be protected against heart attacks. According to Luchi, adults should
have an annual check-up have an annual check-up by age 65 and have a stress test bef beginning an exercise program. Luchi says it's important
