The gusty March winds have blown in like a lion once again, and spring is nearly upon us. The yards dotted with yellow daffodils, budding fruit trees, in white and pink, and the brilliant yellow Forsythia bushes already look dazzling.

The crab apple tree in my front yard is just about to bloom and display all its beauty. Makes you get in the mood to plant flowers and make plans for the yard.

If you are a flower and nature lover, you might be interested in viewing the Highland Lakes Bluebonnet Trail which tours seven lakes and countless fields of wildflowers.

It's sure to be a wonderful weekend escape to the lake and hill country of Texas. The bluebonnets, primroses, Indian blankets and Indian paintbrushes create a colorful exhibit of nature's artwork.

The Bluebonnet Trail winds from Austin west to Llano, passing through Lake Travis, Marble Falls, Burnet, Buchanan Dam, Lake Buchanan, Lampasas, Kingsland, and Canyon Lake.

The different communities along the Trail colaborate with their own crafts, arts, festivals, dancing, races, music, and more, allowing visitors to learn more about the heritage and lifestyles of the Texas Hill Country.

Trail dates are two consecutive weekends, April 9-10 and 16-17.

Some of the highlighted events along the Trail include: the fifth annual Burnet Bluebonnet Festival, on April 7, 8, and 9, featuring a parade, carnival and dances; the Lampasas Bluebonnet Festival, with a fish fry and antique car expo, on April 9 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.; the eighth annual Kingsland Bluebonnet Festival on April 9 and 10 featuring a volksmarch, the Bluebonnet Classic Bicycle Tour, and remote car races. Every community features a special arts and crafts

The Bluebonnet Trail is designed as a do-it-yourself tour, enabling you to enjoy the sights at your leisure, spending more time where you are most fascinated. Or, if you prefer, join a group of bluebonnet admirers on a bus or van tour. The tours will depart from Austin on the mornings of April 9, 10, 16, and 17, returning the same evenings. The tours, for \$35, include splendid wildflower fields, arts and crafts, community festivals, and a luncheon on the Trail. Reservations are necessary.



MINUTE MUSINGS

I awoke this Monday morning with cold feet — I had to get up earlier than usual, in order to get warm. I was up early enough to hear Harry Holt's bad news — "good-bye to the fruit crop". I could be saddened by that news, but I've been inured by similar experiences in the past. All my trees were in bloom, very pretty.


As part of the continuing participation by Cross Plains I.S.D. in the statewide "Drug-Free Schools" program, each of the students in grades Kindergarten through 12th grade have been asked to create a project relating to this topic.

The purpose of the contest is to encourage research and to stimulate the production of media, which discourages the use of illegal drugs (including alcohol) by Texas youth.

According to the information sent to the school from Region XIV Education Service Center, there are 7 categories from which the students can choose to enter a project. They include bumper stickers, videotaped commercials, music video, information video, posters, short stories, or essays. The separate grade divisions are: K-3, 4-6, 7-9, and 10-12.

Students are encouraged to do these projects individually and using a minimal amount of class time. The deadline for entries is Wednesday afternoon, March 23.

The school district can then send a maximum of 8 entries per category, up to two in each grade division to the Service Center for Regional awards. There will be a first, second, and third in each category, and Best of Show Award given at this level. Those entries are then eligible for state com-

Local Student Selected To Compete In O.N.S. Typing Contest

Michelle Williams, a junior at Cross Plains High School, has been selected to compete in the Olympia National Scholastic Typing Contest.

The typing competition will occur at the state and national levels. Each participating school will select one student to represent it in the state championship. The typing test for this level of competition will be administered by designated business education teachers at each school. All official entrants will be awarded certificates of participation. The winner from each state will receive an Olympia electronic portable typewriter, a certificate of award, and the opportunity to compete against other state champions in the national championship.

The competition for the national championship will take place in April at each contestant's school and will be performed on Olympia typewriters supplied by Olympia. Students in the national championship competition will compete for cash awards of \$500 for the designated national champion, \$350 for the 1st runner-up and \$200 for the 2nd runner-up.

The contest is sponsored by Olympia USA, Somerville, New Jersey, a leading marketer of electronic typewriters for the school, home, and office. Olympia distributes its products through a national network of franchised Olympia dealers.

A spokesman for Olympia stated that more than five thousand high schools from across the nation are represented in the contest.

CAT-E Test Taken

CAT-E stands for "California Achievement Test-E edition." This particular test is designed to measure achievement in the basic skills. Mrs. Watson is unsure of when the results will be sent back.

students, trying to make holes in the ozone layer! It's that time of year when he has his students order and build themselves a rocket and then fire them from their launch site on the football field.

Each year the students spend a few class days constructing their rockets. Then after their patient construction, it's time for their flight and go off to the launch site.

According to Coach McConal, the rockets are propelled by a cartridge which contains a substance comparable to gun powder. An igniter is placed in the cartridge and a cable is run from there to a battery, and from a safe distance a button is pushed, and off they go!

Some of the rockets are capable of traveling up to 1,500 feet in the air. There were 26 rockets made (including one made by Coach McConal) and 26 successful launchings. The rockets are reuseable since on their way down a parachute is ejected allowing the rocket to land more gently and a new cartridge can be used.

Coach says that this project comes at a time when they have been studying space exploration. It gives them a chance to construct something themselves and see the results of their




