Callahan County voters turned out in good numbers Super Tuesday to name a 1 margin but agreed that they should keep the present sheriff in office. In obviously the hottest county race in the Democratic Primary, Brad Harris of Cross Plains defeated County Attorney Bob McCool in his bid for reelection, voting box in the process.

A run-off developed in another hotly contested race, that for county commissioner of Precinct 1 (Clyde). The incumbent, Genc Kitchens, received the most votes, 511 , but will have to face Roy LaFoy Jr. in a run-off due to his 368 votes. The third candidate, George Wright, made a strong showing with

253 votes and forced the run-off. In the sheriffs race, incumbent Bill Skinner received 2,060 votes and will not have to face a run-off from challengers Dahyl Bradshaw of Eula, who got 08 votes, or Mack West Sr. of Clyde, who received 656.
