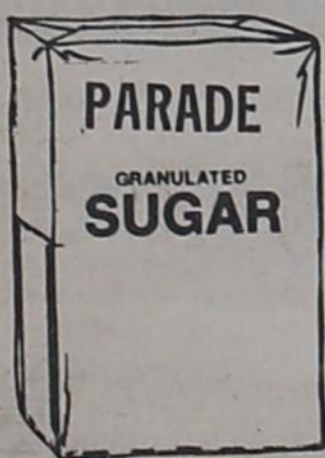

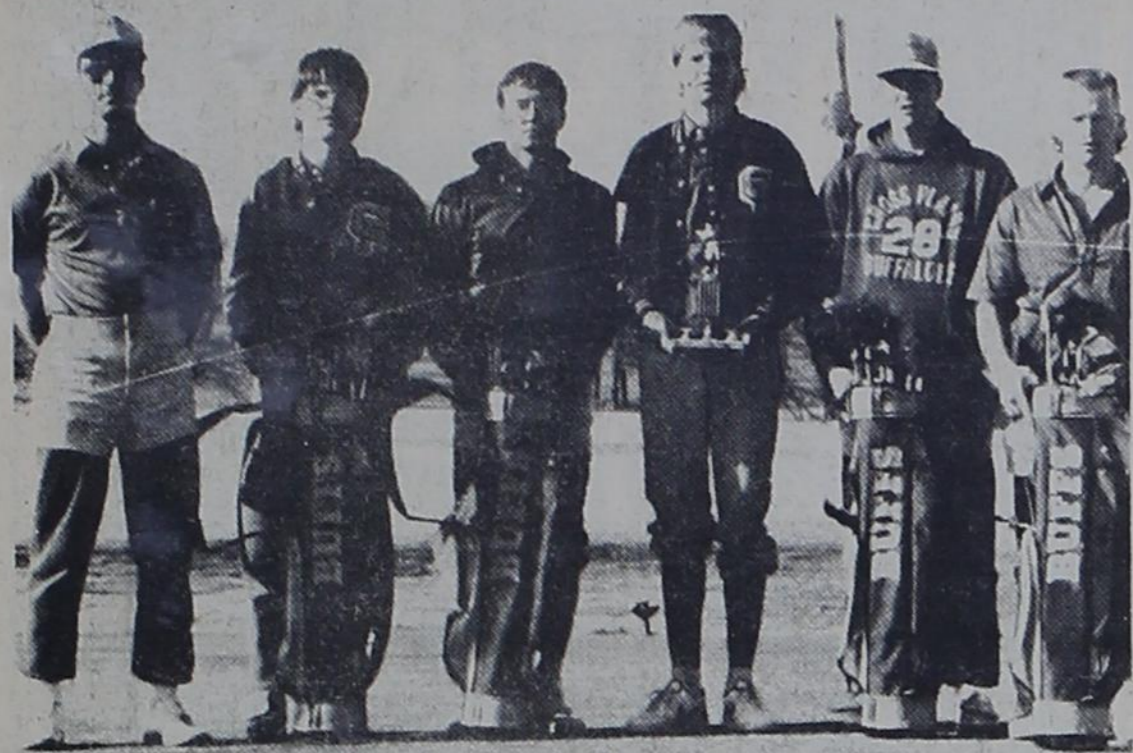

## Cross Plains Golfers Do Well In First Tourney

It was a rather cool and windy day, not ideal conditions for a golf tournament, but the first tournament hosted by Cross Plains went well. There were a total of 8 teams that competed in the tournament held at Lakewood Recreation Center on Tuesday, March 8. Among the teams competing were Coleman, Gordon (2), Eastland, Breckenridge, Early, and Rising Star (2).

Gordon placed first with a team score of 387. Taking second was Coleman. The Cross Plains golfers, with a team score of 415, received the 3rd place trophy.

Individual awards went to a golfer from Gordon with a low score of 87. Second place medalist, also from Gordon, turned in a score of 93.

The tournament had to go into a 2-hole sudden death playoff when Gordon and Coleman both turned in a 387.

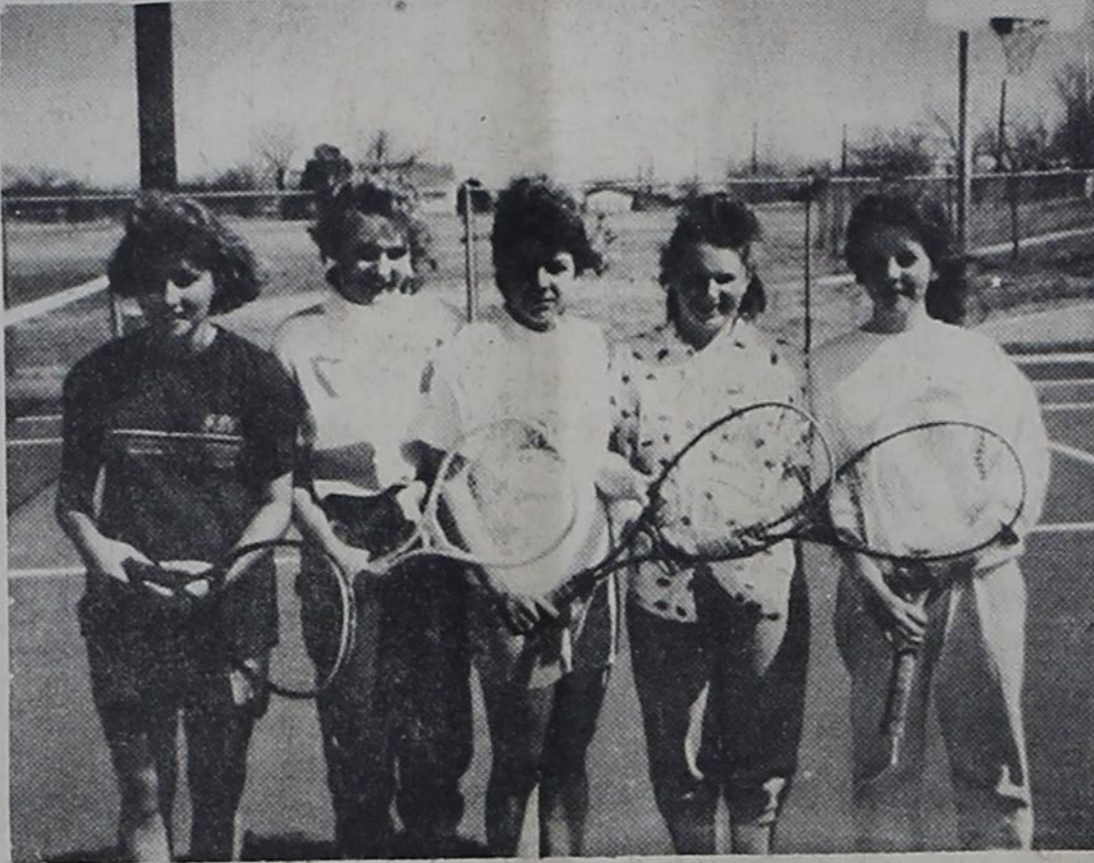

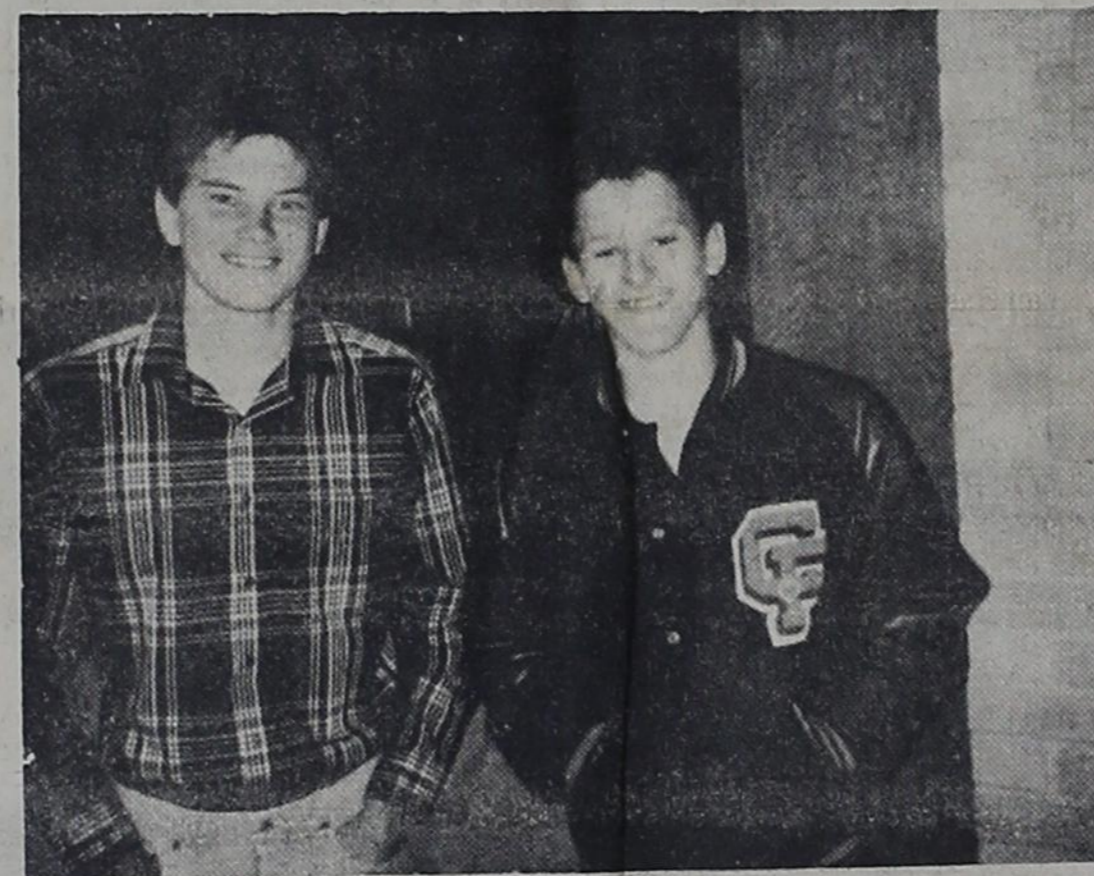

In boys singles, Cross Plains did not have anyone competing. In boys doubles, though, the team of Chad Bagley and Reggie Brown barely missed taking 3rd place when they lost to a team from Brownwood 6-2, 6-3.

In the first round, Brown and Bagley defeated another Brownwood team 9-8. In the second round, Cross Plains was defeated by a Santa Anna team 8-6.

In the girls bracket, Cross Plains' Jeannie Barclay took second place in the tournament by defeating Breckenridge 8-4 in the first round; Santa Anna 9-7 in the second round and then lost to Santa Anna in the finals 6-1, 6-3.

The Cross Plains girls doubles team swept first and second place in the tournament. In the finals, the team of Cindy Engle and Michelle Williams ended up playing Cross Plains' team of Trudy Newman and Sharon Walker for the Championship.

Engle and Williams finally took top honors defeating Walker/Newman 7-6, 6-2.

In round one, Walker/Newman defeated Santa Anna 8-5 and Breckenridge 8-3.

In earlier games, Williams/Engle defeated Brownwood 8-0 and Breckenridge 8-1.

## Local Student Selected To Compete In O.N.S. Typing Contest

Michelle Williams, a junior at Cross Plains High School, has been selected to compete in the Olympia National Scholastic Typing Contest.

The typing competition will occur at the state and national levels. Each participating school will select one student to represent it in the state championship. All official entrants will be awarded certificates of participation. The winner from each state will receive an Olympia electronic portable typewriter, a certificate of award, and the opportunity to compete against other state champions in the national championship.

The competition for the national championship will take place in April at each contestant's school and will be performed on Olympia typewriters supplied by Olympia. The test will include a timed writing and a timed production test of standard business letter, a tabulation from a rough draft, and a full-page memorandum.

Students in the national championship competition will compete for cash awards of \$500 for the designated national champion, \$350 for the 1st runner-up and \$200 for the 2nd runner-up.

The contest is sponsored by Olympia USA, Somerville, New Jersey, a leading marketer of electronic typewriters for the school, home, and office. Olympia distributes its products through a national network of franchised Olympia dealers.

A spokesman for Olympia stated that more than five thousand high schools from across the nation are represented in the contest.

## CAT-E Test Taken

The K-8 and the 10th grades at Cross Plains finished taking their CAT-E tests last Tuesday, March 8; Wednesday, March 9; and Thursday, March 10. For K-8, the teachers administered the test. But for 10th grade, the test was given by Mrs. Ann Watson, the counselor.

The Kindergarten through the 6th grades took their tests in their classrooms; the 7-8 went to the cafeteria for theirs; and the 10th grade met in the library.

CAT-E stands for "California Achievement Test-E edition." This particular test is designed to measure achievement in the basic skills. Mrs. Watson is unsure of when the results will be sent back.

students, trying to make holes in the ozone layer! It's that time of year when he has his students order and build themselves a rocket and then fire them from their launch site on the football field.

Each year the students spend a few class days constructing their rockets. Then after their patient construction, it's time for their flight and go off to the launch site.

According to Coach McConal, the rockets are propelled by a cartridge which contains a substance comparable to gun powder. An igniter is placed in the cartridge and a cable is run from there to a battery, and from a safe distance a button is pushed, and off they go!

Some of the rockets are capable of traveling up to 1,500 feet in the air. There were 26 rockets made (including one made by Coach McConal) and 26 successful launchings. The rockets are reusable since on their way down a parachute is ejected allowing the rocket to land more gently and a new cartridge can be used.

Coach says that this project comes at a time when they have been studying space exploration. It gives them a chance to construct something themselves and see the results of their work.

Farabee went on to say that the legislature must use state dollars more effectively. "We don't need to spend more money; we need to be smarter about the money we spend."

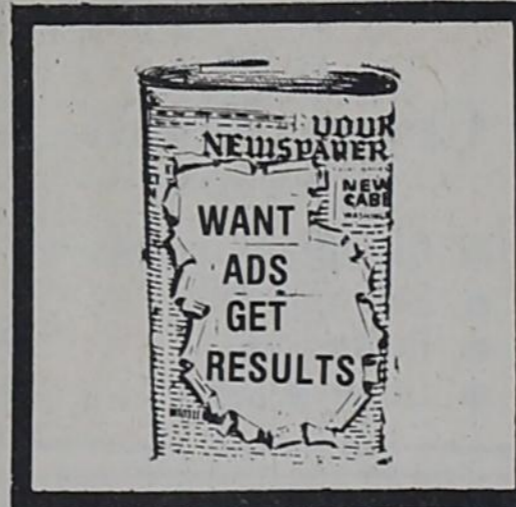
"Providing health care for those who cannot afford it is essential. As chairman of a Legislature Task Force, I led the fight to put together a more cost effective health care program for our state."
