

Robert E. Howard, fantasy writer and creator of Conan, The Barbarian, made his home in Cross Plains from 1919 until his death in 1936. The Howard home, which owned and maintained by the Project Pride group, served as both home and office Howard during this period. This year marks the 60th anniversary of his

death. A dinner is scheduled at the Community Center on Friday evening at 7:00 o'clock. Deadline for ticket purchase is Monday, June 10. Locally Known Woman Suffers Compound Fracture To Leg

Nancy Palmer, executive secretary to Clyde CISD's superintendent, sustained a compound fracture of her left leg Thursday evening, May 30 while treating a horse.

The accident happened around 7:00 p.m. Thursday evening at her residence northeast of Clyde.

According to Nancy's husband, Charlie, she was assisting her son Michael who was treating a horse for ear ticks. He said Nancy was using a nose "twitch" on the horse when the animal reared and came down on her left leg below the knee, breaking both lower leg bones. She also suffered a deep gash in her shin where the horse's hoof hit

Charlie, local manager for West Texas Utilities Company, said he was out working at the time of the accident. The accident happened just after an afternoon thunderstorm passed through Clyde which knocked electricity out to several parts of town. Nancy was transported by Citi-

Nancy was transported by Citizens EMS to Abilene Regional Medical Center where she currently remains. Surgery was performed Monday afternoon on her injured leg. Charlie said, according to the doctor the shin wound was "as contaminated as he had ever seen."

Charlie said it was just a freak accident. He said the horse which caused the injury is a gentle animal. Palmer said he purchased the horse from Bob Gallagher of Clyde.

Palmer said he didn't know when Nancy would be released from the hospital, but doctors want to make sure no infection occurs. "She needs everyone's prayers," Charlie said of his wife.


It is my opinion that we were all glad to experience the rain, we were just a smidgen over awed at the abundance of it in so short a time.



Limits On Breast Cancer Drug Recommended

The National Cancer Institute recommends that doctor limit use of the drug tamoxifen in the treatment of breast cancer to five years. New studies have found there is no benefit for longer use. Tamoxifen, sold under the name Nolvadex, is prescribed for women who have had surgery for breast cancer that had not spread to the lymph nodes and who had a type of cancer fueled by estrogen. Tamoxifen remains one of the most potent weapons against breast cancer and the limit to five years should in no way diminish its use.

Fort Griffin Fandangle Begins June 20

The 58th season of the Fon Criffin Fandangle of Albany, is scheduled for June 20, 21, 22, 27, 28, and 29. The nationally known musical historical show will begin under the Texas sky each evening at 8:30 p.m. in the Prairie Theater just outside town. The Fandangle parade, featuring some of the favorite sets such as the stagecoach and the steamdriven calliope, will begin at 6:00 p.m. on Thursday, June 27. Barbecue suppers are served each evening on the courthouse square.

There is something in the Fandangle for everyone - music, dancing, drama, pageantry. Underneath the wide range of variety of the show lies the theme - the portrayal of the feelings of the western pioneers as they met life day to day. The show is entirely original. Careful research is done to insure that the look and feel of the whole production remains as authentic as possible. However, Fandangle history is told with a light touch, one that speaks of the humor of daily life as well as the fears and calamitics.

The Fort Griffin Fandangle is a gentle satire of life at the famous fort seventeen miles north of Albany and of the lively and lusty town of Griffin, often called "The Flat," which sprang up nearby. The fort was situated on a hilltop for protection from bands of marauding Indians. The town nestled between the bottom of the hill and the Clear Fork of the Brazos River and during the 1870's and 1880's was the scene of the wildest of westerns. Doc Holliday lived in Griffin before he went to Tombstone. Big Nose Kate spent a night in jail for trying to burn down a hotel to help Doc escape the law. Louic Deno, the gracious lady of the gambling table, saw her lover

shot to death there. Wyatt Earp stayed only a few days, remarking to Doc that "Griffin is too wild for me." While the Fandangle portrays the soldiers and offers glimpses of the wilder side of life, it also shows the other sides - the Buffalo hunters who spent weeks hunting and skinning; the cowboys who drove the herds up the Western Trail to Abilene, Kansas; the mother who feared Indians, disease, loneliness; the young man "gone to Texas' and the girl he found there; the children and the old folks; the Indians in their kingdom and in their realization that all was lost. The spectator is transported into yesteryear. He is there with frontier history as it happened.

Fandangle scripts were written by playwrite and author Robert Nail, who also envisioned the show and produced it from 1938 until his death in 1968. The show has never been out of Albany hands. Betsy Parsons, who grew up in the Fandangle, is in her third year as director of the production, continuing in the traditions that utilize the best talents of many of the people of Shackelford County,



Interest Rate For Veterans Land Loans Lowered to 6.65 Percent

AUSTIN -- The Texas Veterans Land Board (VLB) has reduced interest rates on land loans to Texas veterans to 6.65 percent interest.

The board set a 6.65 percent interest rate for loans up to \$20,000 on a 30year term. On loans up to \$40,000 the new rate will be 8.85 percent on a 30year term. A 5 percent minimum down payment is required.

The rates had been 7.64 on loans up to \$20,000 and 9.80 on loans up to \$40,000.

"This reduction reflects the board's commitment to keeping interest rates for veterans well below market rates in general in both our land and housing program," said Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, VLB chairman. "And it reflects the VLB's intention to react quickly and efficiently to market conditions."

In addition to the land program, Texas veterans can receive both home and home improvement loans a total of \$110,000 low-interest loan package.

Since all Texas yeterans loans are funded by bond sales and there are no discount points charged, loan costs under the program have consistently been among the lowest in the nation with rates that usually range from a point to a point-and-a-half below market rates. Small Ices on each loan cover the costs of administering the program and the bonds are retired as the borrowers pay off their loans.

Mauro said the VLB programs have never been more popular with Texas veterans.

"This cost-effective method of financing allows this great program to function at no cost to the taxpayers," Mauro said. "At the same time, VLB loans stimulate the Texas economy by creating new jobs in construction and real estate in every region of the

"Texas veterans know that our loan programs are far and away the best deal in today's home and land buying market," he said. "No other state has anything that compares with these special benefits. It's a special way of saying 'thanks' to our veterans for the sacrifices they've made in the service of our country."

The VLB made nearly 150,000 loans to Texas veterans totaling \$2.5 billion since the program began making loans in 1949. Economists estimate that for each dollar through the program six dollars are created in the economy, which means Texas has benefited by more than \$14 billion in the overall VLB ripple effect.

Last November Texas voters approved a constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of a additional \$500 million in bonds to finance low-interest housing loans for Texas veterans. The measure won landslide approval from Texas voters with 59.7 percent statewide.
