

'National Age Day'

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article was provided by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service and written by Mary Mahoney. It commemorates National Agriculture Week and the dedication of farmers and ranchers. We appreciate your contributions to agriculture and to the strength of the nation.

COLLEGE STATION - One might say that urban dwellers, farmers and ranchers are "partners."

Their partnership involves their dependency on each other for the products and services essential to their busy lifestyles and businesses, according to Dr. Carl Anderson. Anderson said that's a major reason why business and consumer groups will have an opportunity to join in a special observance honoring food and fiber providers of the nation in March. The occasion will be National Agriculture Day on March 20, said Anderson, a Texas Agriculture Extension Service economist. Anderson said dates for National Agriculture Week, planned in conjunction with Ag Day, have been set for March 19-25. National Agriculture Day is timed to coincide with the arrival of spring, the season of growth and development, and is tied to the March equinox, Anderson said. He said the two observances are intended to give state and national recognition to the people, organizations and businesses responsible for producing the "most abundant, highest quality and most reasonably priced food and fiber supply in history.' Anderson said that all groups work together in processing and marketing food and fiber products. In addition, they are all consumers of these products. He said movement of food and fiber from its place of origin to supermarkets and family tables provides jobs and income for about one-fifth of the work force. "One of every 40 Texans is a farmer or rancher. In addition, about 20 percent of the state's retail trade business is closely associated with agriculture production and marketing of food and fiber products," Anderson said.

Foreign Student Travels Here Researching Howard's Life And Works

Patrice Louinet, 20-year-old college student from Limoges, France, was in Cross Plains Monday and Tuesday of last week, having traveled 4,000 miles to visit the hometown of Robert E. Howard, world-renowned author.

Howard, as longtime resident of Cross Plains will remember, was the son of a beloved country doctor who practiced medicine in this area from 1913 until his death in 1944.

The young writer was distressed over the impending death of his longsuffering mother and on the morning of June 11, 1936, he ended his life with a pistol bullet to the brain. His mother died the following day and funeral for the two was held on a hot Sabbath afternoon two days later.

In the 53 years since that suicide at the Howard home in the western edge of this little city, fame of the man who to make a copy available to the local library. These and other Howard creations are enjoying wide popularity not only in the United States but also in France, Great Britain, Germany, Scandanavian countries, Japan, Australia, and New Zealand.

The young French collegian came to Cross Plains from Houston where he had visited with Glenn Lord, literary agent for the Howard legatees, and the man responsible for many of Howard's works being brought to light. The Frenchman talked with Cross Plains people who had known Howard, photographed the Howard homesite and researched archives here and in Brownwood. Upon returning home he plans to do a graduate memoir on Howard and has promised

Emergency Care Attendant Classes Well Attended

An Emergency Care Attendant (ECA) Class is currently being taught at the Cross Plains Community Center. Ten new students are enrolled and approximately six or seven ECA and EMT personnel are continuing their education hours.

An air trainer was used to demonstrate air-way maintenance and breathing techniques such as mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. Methods to relieve choking were displayed. Ray Dillard of Abilene was also present for the annual inspection of the ambulances and classes for the Department of Health for the State EMS System. He is with the Regional Office of the Texas Department of Health. All requirements were met and Dillard commented that he was impressed with classroom procedures.

Local Library Awarded 60-Volume Set Of Classic American Literature

The Library of America series now available through the generosity of the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, the Texas Committee for the Humanities and local donors.

The Cross Plains Public Library has been awarded a 60-volume set of The Library of America, the series that American Heritage magazine called "The most ambitious effort ever undertaken to put the best of American literature into the hands of the general reader."

The Cross Plains Library is receiving the award after submitting an application to The Library of America and obtaining a pledge of \$250 from Charles and Lou Rodenberger. The Cross Plains Library is one of more than 1600 across the country that have already acquired this important collection of American literature with funds from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation and matching funds pledged in their local communities. For libraries in Texas, each \$250 raised locally is being matched by \$250 from the Texas Committee for the Humanities and by \$500 from the Mellon Foundation.

Books Shipped As Available

The Cross Plains Library will receive the 36 volumes already published in the Library of America, over 46,000 pages of the best writing our country has produced. Thereafter, the remaining 24 volumes will be sent in regular shipments over the next five years for an average total of five volumes a year. Each volume will have a bookplate acknowledging the generosity of the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, the Texas Committee for the Humanities, and the Rodenbergers. A certificate will also be sent to the library for display.

Series Begun Five Years Ago The Library of America is a nonprofit publishing program that began in 1982 in an unprecedented effort to restore America's literary heritage by publishing the collected works of America's major authors in a uniform, hardcover series. Seed money for the program was provided by the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Ford Foundation. Volumes already published include the works of Henry Adams, Willa Cather, James Fenimore Cooper, Stephen Crane, Theodore Dreiser, W.E.B. Du Bois,



No Smoking **Ordinance** In Effect

Callahan County Commissioners passed an ordinance Monday, February 27, at the court's regular meeting, that bans smoking during all commissioners court meetings.

The no smoking ordinance goes into effect immediately and applies to commissioners and all visitors during the commissioners meetings.

Although the new ordinance does not apply to any other courthouse departments, Callahan County Judge Mack Kniffen said that offices of other elected county offices have no smoking signs posted.

Judge Kniffen said that commissioners had received several comments from visitors stating the court meetings were becoming unbearable due to all the smoke.

Other items brought before commissioners court include:

- Met with Callahan County Tax Assessor/Collector Wauneta Estes. Jeff Brown, a representative of the county's delinquent tax collection firm, and Callahan County Attorney Brad Harris concerning the commissioners legal position on waiving penalties and interest on taxpayers' delinquent taxes. The commissioners agreed that the court would continue to go by the law and hear any dispute concerning delinquent taxes.

- Approved a motion to allow Precinct #1 (Clyde) to lease a dozer to the City of Clyde. The dozer lease to the city is approved only after County Attorney Brad Harris agrees there is no conflicting laws that prevent it. Clyde's dozer had broken down but by the time commissioners court met, the City of Clyde had made other arrangements to lease a dozer.

- Commissioners agreed that each commissioner and the county judge will appoint one person to five member Compete County Committee for the 1990 Census.

- Passed a motion that states any county employee, who receives a car allowance, that goes a whole month without working, will not receive the car allowance for that month.





Each volume in the series includes a number of works by a single author and contains between 1000 and 1600 pages. In many cases, an author's complete writings will be published in as few as three or four compact volumes. The books are printed on acid-free paper, have sewn bindings covered in cloth, and are extremely durable. Texts are accurate, unabridged, and authoriative.

The Library of America volumes are generally sold through bookstores at \$27.50 per volume, except for the Jefferson, Parkman and Franklin volumes which are \$30 each, and by subscription for \$21.95 per volume. All volumes in the series include a detailed chronology of the author's life and career, a brief essay explaining the choice of texts and some useful notes for the general reader.





Over the months, then a year and now almost two, our friend, Shawn, shared much with us....his hopes, desires, hurts, and dreams.


