The heat stress index is a numerical table by which the National Weather Service rates the degree of discomfort
a person may experience at a given temperature and humidity, It does not allow for wind and shade variables, which are capable of influencing an individual's tolerance. However, the reading is helpful in planning precaustroke. considered very dangerous on the heat stress index. Most people can tolerate high temperature alone, but in combination with humidity it can cause an
individual's cooling mechanism, perspiration, to work overtime. Failure to replace fluids and salts
lost through perspiration can result in lost through perspiration can result in
