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Houston Livestock Show And Rodeo Generous With Scholarships

Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo presented more than \$1 million worth of scholarships to Texas youth. The "Million Dollar Scholarship Banquet" was held in the Astrodome, as over 200 students were handed scholarship certificates assuring them a chance at continuing their educa-

An example of a successful former Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo scholarship winner is Fred McClure. He is currently the Texas Air Corporation government affairs staff vice president.

He used his Houston scholarship to get a degree in agricultural economics from Texas A&M University, where he was elected student body president and graduated summa cum laude. Before going to Texas Air, he was special assistant to President Ronald Reagan for legislative affairs.

Hal Hillman, Show president, noted that McClure was just one of the young people that they were proud to be a part of their lives and futures. "We're doing our part to ensure the future of agriculture by making sure that the best students, in terms of academic and leadership abilities, have a chance at a college education," Hillman stated.

This year, the Houston Show committed to one hundred \$8,000, fouryear scholarships, 50 each to the Future Farmers of America (FFA) and 4-H; 73 one-year, \$2,000 scholarships to Go Texan counties and Metro Go Texan areas around Houston; one four-year, \$8,000 scholarship to a Go Texan sweepstakes-winning county; four one-year, \$2,000 scholarships to the Texas Christian University (TCU) Ranch Management Program; two doctoral assistantships at Texas A&M University at a total cost of \$22,000; 20, \$6,600, one-year graduate assistantships at 12 Texas universities; two \$2,000, one-year dedicated endowed scholarships; one \$4,000, oneyear veterinary medicine assistantship; three one-year, \$2,000 school art scholarships; and, one four-year, \$8,000 school art scholarship.

The Show also presented 13 Texas universities with endowment funds, providing a basis for more financial aid for students.

Including scholarships, junior show auction payments, research funds and other agricultural and educational programs, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo contributed \$3,300,920 to Texas youth in the 1988 fiscal year.

The generosity shown through these scholarships, endowment funds, etc. give students in our state a great opportunity to further their education in times when finances are often dif-

ficult. The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo can be proud of their accomplishments, and I know the many recipients are appreciative of the assistance.

Little League baseball was first organized in Cross Plains some 36 years ago in 1952. The first baseball diamond was located on the property owned by Tom Bryant which now serves as the site for the Federal Housing Authority apartments.

The original organizers consisted of Minnie Dallas, Katie Oliver, Ella Faye Merrill, Ruby Latson, Mrs. Flinn, and the late, Shorty Mon-

Minnie Dallas said, "With the help of all the men in the community who helped build the fields, install lights, serve as coaches, umpires, etc. the existence of a Little League team became a reality.'


Mrs. Dallas recalled most of the funding was received through donations while she worked at a cafe in Cross Plains. She stated that many oil men and workers contributed to its success. She also said that the late Neal Dillard contributed the first \$100 to the Little League.

Since the 1988 baseball season is completed it seemed appropriate to salute the history of the organization. I am sure that the players today are appreciative of those brave enough to start the project, and those willing to continue making it worthwhile throughout the years.

VA Programs Have Positive Effect On **Local Economy**

Veterans Administration (VA) expenditures in Texas have had a positive effect on the local economy during Fiscal Year 1987, according to Waco VA Regional Office Director Stephen L. Lemons.

"The \$1,909,390,261 that the VA expended in Texas during Fiscal Year 1987 went directly into the local economy," Lemons said. He noted that Texas veterans receiv-


ed \$1,040,076,680 as compensation for disabling injuries or diseases incurred while in the armed forces, or as pensions for wartime veterans with limited incomes; \$95,632,799 for readjustment and vocational rehabilitation benefits; and \$98,685,050 for insurance and indemnity payments. An additional \$53,677,711 was expended for facility and construction and \$621,318,021 for medical services and administrative costs in Texas.

"The Veterans Administration proudly serves those who served our country," Lemons said. "The value of services and benefits provided to veterans doesn't stop with them, as there's a multiplying effect when this money is spent in the community."

Estimated VA expenditures for Callahan County veterans totalled \$1,544,945. This figure includes \$1,371,356 for compensation and pension, \$89,105 for readjustment and vocational rehabilitation, and \$84,475 for insurance and indemnities.

Many Dads Deserve Thanks, Some Sould Be Ashamed

By JIM MATTOX **Texas Attorney General**

It seemed an appropriate time for us to thank the thousands of noncustodial fathers who support their children with regular child-support payments. Many of you are separated from your children by painful divorces, and perhaps, by many miles; yet, your support cuts across the distances. It is a steady reminder to your children of your love and concern

for their well-being. Unfortunately, you responsible parents are outnumbered by the irresponsible parents who fail to make

child-support payments. The Attorney General's Office of Child Support Enforcement works overtime to track down these deadbeats who refuse to support their

children. Historically, the courts have given custody of the children in divorce cases to the mothers. Consequently, most of our cases involving failure to

pay child-support are against fathers. Our statistics show that 40 percent of the women with children in need of child support don't even have a court order for child support. Of the women with child support awards or agreements, 26 percent receive no payment, and another 26 percent receive some payment, but not the full amount. Nationwide, only about 30 percent of non-custodial parents make regular child support payments. That's

a national disgrace.

Because the job of enforcing child-DONALD R. DUKE

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support laws is so overwhelming, I have had to focus my efforts and public pleas on those who fail to pay. Our aim is to stimulate voluntary compliance through public education, and occassionally making an example out

support. Sometimes we have to put people in jail, because a law without enforcement is no law at all. And nothing stimulates voluntary compliance like

of the more aggravated cases of non-

the real possiblity of going to jail. Each time we conduct arrests, voluntary compliance increases by about five percent. That equals approximately \$1 million for the

children. Our public education and enforce-

ment efforts have paid off. Since the Attorney General's Office took over the child-support enforcement responsibility in 1983, our childsupport collections have risen to \$70 million in fiscal 1987 from the \$18 million that was collected the year before I took over the program. That is more than a 300 percent increase. We expect collections to top \$100 million

by the end of this year. We are proud of our accomplishments, but very aware of how much more needs to be done. Our caseload has doubled to 335,000 applicants who need help getting childsupport. Unfortunately, we have the resources to handle only about 60,000 cases at a time. Therefore, clients sometimes have to wait months for help. We have asked the Texas

Legislature for more resources. It is a tragedy that so many custodial parents are having to bear sole responsibility for supporting their children, while the non-custodial parents are able to improve their standard of living by avoiding all legal and moral responsibility for their children. One study discovered that non-custodial parents are making higher and more consistent new car payments than

payments for the support of their Public opinion must be changed about those who neglect and abuse their children. The failure to pay child support is another form of child abuse. it deprives the child of his basic needs for proper nutrition, shelter, and

clothing. I want to acknowledge and congratulate those responsible parents who consistently contribute to their children's lives. Others need to follow your example, because we want your numbers to grow.

A dinner will be held Saturday night and don't forget club dinner Tuesday, June 28, at 7 p.m.


The club has purchased a new greens mower that promises faster and better greens. Come out and see the improvement. Lakewood is also in the process of air conditioning the building for everyone's comfort.


