A few days ago Miss Brown parked her car in front of The Star office and called to the editor to come out as she had something in the car to show

us and there we found a miniature frame garden with pants just coming up but she had two baskets of vegetables that had grown in the frame gardens of Mrs. M. D. Farrar at Enterprize and Mrs. Clyde Johnston of Eula. She had fresh tender spinach, lettuce, collards, mustard, turnips, beets and radishes crisp and delicious. When asked what she was carrying these vegetables around for she told us she had just talked to the Homemaking Club at Baird High School on frame gardens and had shown this splendid assortment of fresh vegetables which were grown in a real frame garden.

Miss Brown said, "They are a fine bunch of girls interested in their work, well trained and I enjoyed talking to them."

When asked about growing these fresh vegetables Miss Brown said anyone who wants to and has a plot of ground 5x20 feet and a few pieces of lumber

and are willing to work just a little bit can have one of these nice gardens.

Seeing is believing and one would never believe such vegetables could be grown on such a small plot of ground surrounded by a frame at this season of the year. Miss Brown says that if anyone is interested in a frame garden should drive out to Mrs. Jim Barkers home the second rock house on the highway west of Clyde. Mrs. Barker also has a plot of strawberries also grown in the same manner as her vegetables frame garden.

Last Lord's Day we had a good crowd and two were identified with us at the morning service. Had several out of town visitors present for the morning services.

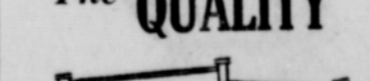

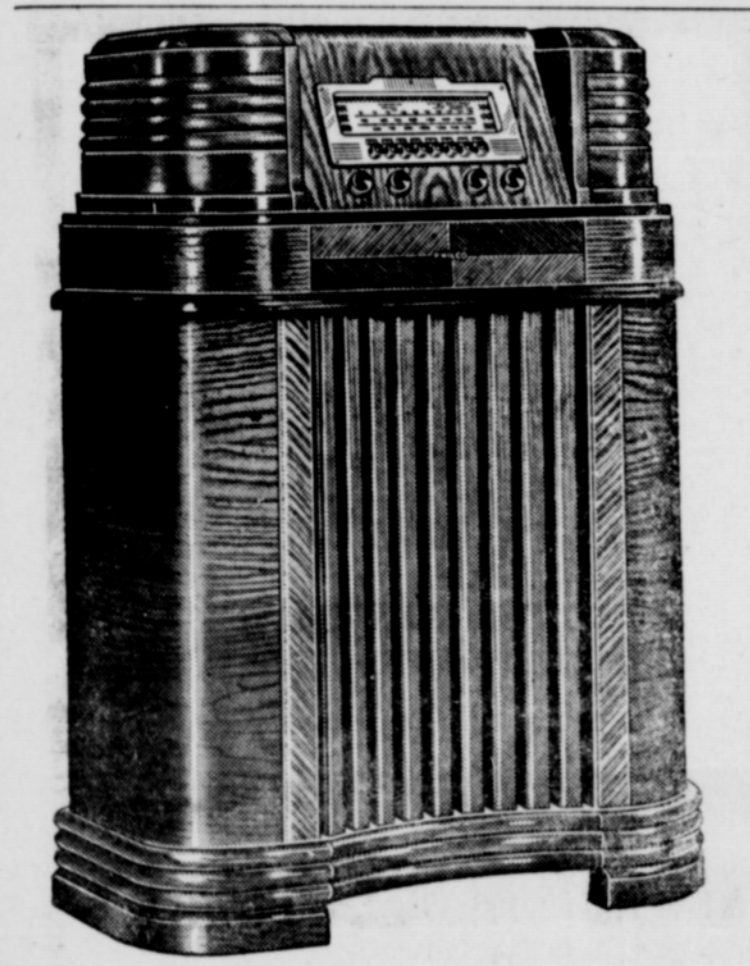

ACHIEVEMENT DAY

Achievement Day with home demonstration clubs in the county is progressing well. Each club holds one during the month of November in any manner the members desire to show the work they have done during the year. Clyde Helping Hand held theirs by visiting each club member in the form of a tour. The members had on display many interesting things they had accomplished. Mrs. Bertie Barker being the first home visited had new curtains in her living room and dining room; an adequate Home Food Supply consisting of canned fruit, vegetables and meats, hooked mats, waffle weave mats and several pieces of needle work. Mrs. R. N. James had new cheese cloth curtains in her bedroom, a candlewick spread, canned fruits and vegetables, a lovely dining table center piece of persimmons drew many compliments.

Mrs. Chas. Holden, had a new coat of paint on her home, a new roof and several rooms papered, new curtains in dining room around 750 quarts of canned fruits and vegetables, two poultry flocks and a radio that she had purchased with cash received from the sale of tomatoes. Mrs. Hal Broadfoot had new candlewick curtains, and spread. Mrs. Stallings had 1000 quarts of can new foods on display. Mrs. Newsome had a new ventilated cellar, a poultry flock that produced 4206 eggs the month they were 6 months old, the breed English White Leghorns, 295 in number; Mrs. Kate Brown, Mrs. John Savage and Mrs. Nix's homes were visited late that afternoon and each of these ladies had quilts, rugs, needlework, and canned foods on display.

Denton Club visited Mrs. Virgine Cole, home food supply demonstrator and viewed a very complete home food supply. Mrs. Cole had 67 varieties on display. Canned fruits, vegetables, meats, jellies, preserves, pickles, relishes, honey and potatoes, tomatoes, dried beans, peas, apples, peaches and pears, home grown wheat flour, white and whole wheat, corn meal and a display of poultry products, dairy products and fat hogs waiting for a cold spell to arrive to furnish the family with fresh meat as well as cured meats for the winter months. Mrs. Cole well demonstrated that a live at home program is one of the best programs that any farm family can invest in.

The Union Club met at their new club room and each of the 18 ladies present told of her accomplishments. Mrs. J. A. Yarbrough brought a display of canned fruits and vegetables, a table spread, and a 3 to 1 book case that she had done as part of this year's program. There has been several frame gardens in that community and 5 other ladies are planning to build this year.

Each club of the county extends to anyone interested an invitation to attend their Achievement Day programs.
