Ruby was married to Charles D. Ballew September 22, 1922 in Rising Star. They were married for 59 years when Charles preceded her in death September 21, 1981. Her first son, Dr. Charles H. Ballew, was killed in an airplane crash December 29, 1965. Her daughter, Jeannine Ballew Childers, and son-in-law, Victor Childers, live in Rising Star.

Ruby is survived by six grand-children: Victor Michael Childers, Charles Shannon Childers, Charles Timothy Ballew, Deborah Anne Ballew, James Christopher Ballew, and Malinda Lou Ballew. Her four great-grandchildren are: Benjamin Childers, Mitchell Childers, Charles Ballew, and John Thomas Ballew.

Ruby attended the Rising Star Public School System, and when she was 15 years old she rode the train to Denton to join her sister, Irene, and her cousin, Helen Tyler Jackson, in attending North Texas Women's College. After one year she received her Teaching Certificate and at age 16 began her teaching career at Coyote Peak near Rising Star. She attended Abilene Christian College and Daniel Baker College where she received her Bachelor's of Science in Education May 31, 1937. She received her Master's of Education from Hardin-Simmons University in August of 1949.

Ruby taught in the Texas Public Schools for 39 years before her retirement in 1968. Ruby and her husband, Charles, owned and operated Ballew's Cash Grocery from the 1930's to the 1950's. After they sold the grocery store, they were ranchers.

LIEUTENANT RICHARD CAMPBELL, WITH THE HIGHWAY PATROL SERVICE IN ABILENE, SAID, "WE HAVE NOT SEEN THE BUSSES MAKING THEIR RUNS FOR THREE MONTHS AND SOME DRIVERS MIGHT NEED TO BE REMINDED OF THE LAW ABOUT STOPPING FOR A BUS THAT IS LOADING OR UNLOADING SCHOOL CHILDREN."

HE SAID, "ALL DRIVERS ARE REQUIRED TO STOP FOR SCHOOL BUSSES WHEN THE
BUS IS STOPPED TO LOAD OR UNLOAD SCHOOL CHILDREN AND HAS ITS OVERHEAD RED
LIGHTS FLASHING." CAMPBELL STATED THE LAW APPLIES ON CITY STREETS
AS WELL AS THE RURAL HIGHWAYS. HE ALSO STATED THAT DRIVERS MUST STOP
WHEN APPROACHING THE BUS FROM EITHER DIRECTION.

THE ONLY TIME A DRIVER CAN LEGALLY PASS A STOPPED SCHOOL BUS IS FOR
THE FLASHING RED LIGHTS TO BE TURNED OFF OR THE BUS DRIVER MOTIONS
A VEHICLE TO PROCEED OR FOR THE BUS TO RESUME MOTION. ALSO, NO STOP
NEED BE MADE IF THE BUS IS TRAVELING THE OPPOSITE DIRECTION ON A DIVIDED
HIGHWAY. CAMPBELL WAS CAREFUL TO POINT OUT THAT IN EITHER OF THESE
SITUATIONS, A DRIVER NEEDS TO REMAIN ALERT FOR STUDENTS WHO COULD DART
OUT FROM THE BUS TO CROSS THE ROADWAY.

LIEUTENANT CAMPBELL FURTHER STATED, "WITH THE START OF SCHOOL, DRIVERS NEED TO BE EXTRA CAREFUL AROUND OUR SCHOOLS. 

The potting dates are precise because bulbs need 13 weeks' exposure to cool temperatures and an additional 31/2 weeks in a warmer, sunny room to bring them to bloom.

Here's how to do it:

Select a 6-inch-diameter container with a drainage hole in the bottom. Cover hole with a large pebble to prevent the soil from washing out. Fill container halfway with a loosely packed mixture of one-third potting soil, one-third peat moss, and one-third sand.

A 6-inch pot will hold six tulip or hyacinth bulbs set fairly close to each other. Gently place the bulbs on the soil, pointed tips up, so they are even with the pot rim. Add more potting mixture to within half inch or so of the rim, so the bulb tips are barely exposed. Water thoroughly.

Store pot in a dark, cool location (35 to 48 degrees Fahrenheit) for the 13 week cool rooting period. During this period, check bulbs frequently and water if potting soil feels dry

After the rooting period, bring potted bulbs into a warm room (60 to 65 degrees) and place in a sunny location. The bulbs should grow steadily from then on. Water ever few days or when soil feels dry.

Bulbs do not always perform on schedule. So, if they remain tightly budded a day or two before Christmas, speed the blooming process by placing them in a warmer location. Or if they seem ready to open too quickly, return the containers to the cooler location.
