'O Christmas Tree'

It was my pleasure to visit the Christmas exhibit at the Old Jail Art Center at Albany. On display were eleven trees decorated in an 18th Century theme in the Jones Pavilion. Ten clubs from the Albany community were represented in the exhibit.

The first tree on the tour was near the entrance of the center and it was dressed by Clint Hamilton, an individual. A very striking tree featuring large golden sun medallions trimmed with orange lace was very unique. Purple garland with purple Christmas balls and strands of gold stars embraced the greenery. Large blue metallic bows set off the total look. Artificial branches matching the tree covered the base.

The Lioness Club expressed their feelings with a warm, homey interpretation with large cotton print bows accented with red apples and pine cones. Red berries were scattered throughout the branches and a huge red bow topped the creation. A child's red tocking chair with a stuffed homemade doll, a basket with pines cones and red berries, and wooden blocks completed the country style.

Red gingham bows and wooden ornaments of many types brightened the tree decorated by the Bluebonnet Story Club. A large gingham bow graced the top of the tree. A toy baby bed, red rocker, and dolls offered a simplistic view in keeping with 18th Century

celebrations. The Shackelford County 4-H Club's creation was appealing with its homemade ornaments. Santa Clauses made of red construction paper with cotton for the white fur were cute, but the angels made of white doilies were really elegant. Then using natural items, they hung green apples all around and garland of popcorn laced the tree. To set it all off were red satin bows, including a large bow at the top with strands flowing vertically. Their charming tree had gifts beneath, along with twin rocking doll cradles with dolls.

A very elegant tree was presented by the Albany Study Club. The entire tree was covered with miniature wicker baskets, fans, and brooms with pink net and flowers. Potpourri, pink flowers, mauve ribbons, and burgundy trim created a soft feminine appearance. Dried beige baby's breath was placed among the branches. Beige lace and baby's breath topped the tree with vertical beige lace lenths reaching to the bottom. The beige lace encircled the tree base with miniature ornaments laying about.

Xi Pi Lambda had an original idea featuring the Sun Bonnet Sue quilt pattern as the main ornament. If you are not familiar with this pattern, it is a girl with a bonnet and full skirt. The print on her dress was peach and seafoam green. Miniature grapevine wreaths wrapped in peach ribbon and a candle in the center accented the country look. White handmade crocheted snowflakes filled the spaces between. Each one was an individual true to natural snowflakes. White baby's breath within the branches added a natural touch. A print bow matching Sun Bonnet Sue topped the tree. A wooden bowl of pecans, a toy rocking horse, and a China doll sat on the peach skirt beneath the tree.

The most authentic tree in the col-

lection was displayed by Xi Chi Pi.

County Jail Food Error

County resident Mrs. Mary Van Der Linden met in Commissioners' Court Monday, November 28, with Callahan County Sheriff Bill Skinner and County Commissioners to apologize to the officials about a statement she had previously made concerning the cost of meals at the county jail in Baird.

In a story in the November 23, 1988 editions of the *Cross Plains Review*, Mrs. Van Der Linden, of near Cross Plains, said that from figures she obtained, a little over \$6 is being spent on each meal served at the jail.

She apologized to officials November 28, saying that meals actually were costing \$4.50 per day per prisoner. That figures to \$1.50 per meal. She also mentions the mistake in a "Letter to the Editor" in this week's Cross Plains Review.

In the November 23 article, Mrs. Van Der Linden also contended that deputies and other lawmen and officials are being allowed to eat free at the jail. It was reported that deputies from Cross Plains not only eat at the jail free, but charged the county

mileage to and from the meals.

After meeting with Mrs. Van Der Linden, County Commissioners did not take any action concerning the deputies or other county officials eating at the jail free of charge.

Other items addressed by county commissioners included:

—Met with Carl Shouse, an official of Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation. Shouse informed County Commissioners that the two bridges in Callahan County Precinct

#2 (Baird), that had been previously condemned, had now passed inspection and that the state would be posting load limit signs on the two structures.

—Commissioners approved a motion that all tin horns, used in roadway construction, ordered by individuals, through the county, were to be paid for in advance to the order being placed.

—Commissioners passed a motion to retain the lease of the John Deere motor grader that County Commissioner Eugene Kitchens had made for Precinct #1 (Clyde).

-Commissioners reviewed 14 applications that were submitted for the Justice of the Peace job in Precinct #1 (Baird). The opening was created when former Justice Bobby Curtis resigned after pleading no contest to official misconduct. Curtis was fined \$750 plus \$105.50 in court costs and resigned from the Justice of the Peace job. Curtis was accused by his ex-wife of taking property in exchange of fines levied in his JP office. Curtis, along with 13 other people, applied for the JP job opening. Others submitting their applications were: James Edward King II, John H. Whitecotton, Virginia Tollett, Ron Abernathy, Bryan Hatchett, Todd Newton, Don M. Burns, Bill Denman, Deborah L. Smedley, Tommy Joe Higgins Sr., Jeannine Willeford Elkins, A.E. Dyer Jr., and Mark S. Lucas. County Commissioners will interview the applicants on January 6, 1989 and make an appointment for the position on January 9, 1989 during their regular Commissioners meeting.

After researching Christmas trees of the 18th Century, they discovered a most unique collection of ornaments. They also featured the Williamsburg Christmas of decorating in horizontal rounds. The top round consisted of real limes, then real lemons, actual cotton bowls, real tangerines, chili peppers, dried okra pods, real red apples, and turkey feathers. Turkey feathers made a headdress for the top. A quilt was used for the tree skirt, with a stuffed boy and girl doll in Amish style sitting in a little wooden chair beneath the tree.

The next tree was covered with silver and gold metallic bows, papier-mache' roses, and silver and gold beaded garland. Potpourri bags, rocking horse ornaments, and baby's breath were distributed throughout the tree. A huge gold bow crowned the tree, and the skirt was silver metallic paper.

Lee's Legion Chapter of the DAR exhibited another authentic interpretation consisting of real oranges, tangerines, and dwarf apples with cloves pressed into them making designs. They were also wrapped with plaid ribbon which gave the effect of Christmas balls. Cinnamon sticks with each fruit made this the most fragrant of trees. A red bow headed the tree, with a red and black plaid wool tree skirt beneath.

Yet another lovely expression of Christmas was presented by the Amity Club of Moran. Beautiful beige crocheted angels, baskets, doves, and wreaths were accented with mauve and burgundy ribbon. White pearl garland whisped around the tree and the branches held white candles. Tiny bouquets of silk rose buds in mauve. and baby's breath and dusty rose silk poinsettias were scattered about. Even stuffed birds matching the decor looked almost real perched on the branches. The top of the tree featured mauve ribbon with dusty rose lace, a stuffed bird, and berries in mauve. An antique wicker doll buggy, China doll, quilts, and blankets sat beneath the tree. Another China doll, a wooden train, wooden rocking horse, child's rocker, and a handmade rabbit seat cushion balanced the other side.

Albany Garden Club's tree was very original. Fresh red carnations, red velvet knots, handmade red cardinal stuffed birds, red holly berry bunches, and red glitter balls made it very red and Christmasy. Two large red bows topped off this beautiful tree while many red bows covered the bottom in yet another unique idea.

Each club portrayed its own personality making every tree an individual work of art.

Also on display at the Old Jail Art Center was a selection of nine paintings from the Kimbell Museum of Art in Fort Worth, representing 18th Century English paintings. Most of the paintings were portraits reflecting deep rich colors. The elaborate dress

of the time was beautifully captured.

The texture of the canvas revealed many coats and glazing procedures. A close observance noted tiny little cracks due to aging. The large antique gold frames with intricate carvings were perfectly suited.

My personal favorite was "Infant Saint John the Baptist with Parents." The exhibit will be on view through January 3. You would enjoy the other sculptures and art work in the center, as well.

I would like to thank my aunt, Billie Patterson, and my cousin, Treca Peacock, for inviting me to this special exhibit. Many hours of time and energy went into the preparation of the displays. The exhibit was just gorgeous!



Students Urged To Apply For Private Grants, Scholarships


Graduate, Undergraduate, and College-bound Students in need of supplemental funding for college are urged to write to the Scholarship Bank for information on private scholarship



Plan For Indoor Exercise During Winter's Uncertain

Weather

"Winter's cold, rain, and snow bring many people's outdoor exercise programs to a halt; yet a regular exercise program may be more important during the winter than at any other time of year," according to Diane DeMarco, executive director of the National Exercise for Life Institute.

The extra activities and stress of the holidays, coupled with fewer hours of sunlight and the hassle of nasty weather and long days indoors, can bring on cabin fever and "the blues."

However, regular exercise stimulates the brain's production of the hormone norepinephrine, which is related to emotional stability. Exercise may also stimulate substances in the brain called endorphins. These chemicals are referred to as "natural opiates" because they give a natural feeling of well-being.

"Regular aerobic exercise is important because it helps you to maintain and improve your flexibility, strength and endurance. It also improves your mental acuity and helps you to manage stress," said Dale Moss, M.S., clinical exercise physiologist at Abbott Northwestern Hospital in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

People who live in 'winter cities,' where the average January temperature is 32 degrees Fahrenheit, especially need to plan for winter exercise activities, noted DeMarco. Cities in this category include Minneapolis, Chicago, Spokane, Washington and Kansas City, Missouri. However, parts of Arizona, New Mexico and Texas average between 40 and 80 days of snow cover per year.

"Even in warmer parts of the nation, people can't rely on being able to pursue their regular outdoor exercise activities year-round," said DeMarco.

"The exercise people select

should be something they enjoy, and be endurance-based," noted Moss. "Cross-country skiing, of course, is the Cadillac of aerobic exercise," he added.

Fitness experts agree that cross-country skiing is the world's best exercise because it uses all of the major muscles in the body. Even in snow-belt states, however, cross-country skiing is not always available.

In fact, it was the exceptionally cold winter of 1975, plus temporary lack of suitable snow, that inspired cross-country ski enthusiast Ed Pauls to invent the NordicTrack cross-country ski exercise machine.

"NordicTrack simulates the motions of cross-country skiing, but it also became popular with non-skiers because it provides a convenient, total-body workout," said Pauls, a mechanical design engineer and the chairman of NordicTrack. "Today, 75 percent of all NordicTrack owners have never cross-country skied," he added.

"NordicTrack gives the benefits of an aerobic workout, but without the trauma of running or jogging," noted Roy Bergman, M.D., F.A.C.S., Liaison to National Governing Bodies, United States Olympic Committee on Sports Medicine.


Dr. Bergman also noted that NordicTrack can be used indoors. "A lot of people won't run if it's raining outside. And if you can use something inside, you're much more likely to keep up the program year-round, and avoid becoming sedentary," Dr. Bergman added.

People who use in-home equipment tend to want to get the maximum workout in the least amount of time. "The NordicTrack gives a complete aerobic workout, and tones the entire body, in as little as 20 minutes a day, three days a week," said Pauls.





Texas A&M Singing Cadets At Coleman January 12




Singing Cadets come from every part of the country, from the University's 12 colleges, and from A&M's military and non-military segments. 



Social Security Improves Telephone Services For Cross Plains



Newsworthy A Trends

Coming: A Law Like California's?

Two years after California passed Proposition 65-the Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act—the state is struggling to deal with a thicket of problems brought about by the law itself. Voters of states that are considering passing similar laws should pay close attention to what is happening.



The Governor of California called Proposition 65 "poorly drafted, unfair and transparently political."

The law was designed to warn people about the presence of carcinogens or reproductive toxins. Its supporters, however, failed to note that almost everything contains natural carcinogens and toxins and that Federal laws already regulate man-made pollutants, the National Center for Policy Analysis points

Here's what some proponents said about Proposition 65 that persuaded citizens to pass it two years

Jane Fonda: "I want to drink water without endangering my life or the lives of my children."

Whoopi Goldberg: "I would like to drink a glass of water without little sea monkeys in it. The bottom line is, your children are going to die from the toxins in the water." Not everyone was for Proposition

The 34,000-member California Medical Association: "Proposition 65, while well-intentioned, is a bad law."

Others pointed out it was poorly drafted, wouldn't do the job and would ultimately raise the price of food. It's something to think about.
