Down Home

EDITOR'S NOTE: In preparation of Memorial Day this year, please read this compelling composition by Billy E. Kirby, DAV National Commander, and remember the true meaning of this day. The price of freedom was paid by the loss of many loved ones and we must not forget the sacrifices made by American men and women for this privilege.

Every time I see our flag, I see the blood of our soldiers, airmen, sailors and Marines — blood spilled for freedom yet caught within its blazing field. I see their valiant spirits reflected in its many stars. On Memorial Day, I see in our flag what I can never forget — their sacrifice.

Yet, more than a symbol of their deaths, it stands for their fighting spirit. It is the spirit of men I served with. They are men who didn't come home — a sergeant, a commanding officer, a friend — men who I'll never forget. It's a fighting spirit so valiant, so unbreakable, it inspires poetry and song.

Now, I'm no poet — but inside, I too, feel the pride which inspires a poet to write a tribute to our fighting men — a poet like Francis Scott Key.

In 1814, Francis Scott Key watched as the hopelessly out-gunned and outnumbered men of Fort McHenry, Baltimore, were bombarded by the British Fleet. The battle raged through the night. It wasn't until the morning sun broke through the mist that he knew our men had survived the vicious attack.

There, caught in the gleam of dawn's early light — as if to mock the enemy — was the American flag still flying high and proud over the fort. Francis Scott Key was so inspired, he wrote a poem in tribute to the brave men of Fort McHenry. It's a poem in which he stated:

"...And the Star-Spangled Banner in triumph shall wave..."

These words are as true today as they were when he wrote them. Thousands of young men and women wear the uniforms of our Armed Forces. They too are prepared to defend this country and all that it stands for. And tragically, they too, have spilled their blood.

A month ago, 47 sailors aboard the Battleship Iowa paid the ultimate price for our freedom. Do not let their sacrifice be for nothing. Help our young to understand that the flag is not just an interesting exhibit in a museum. Help them to see that the power and beauty of our flag extends beyond an abstract idea.

Past or present, those we honor on Memorial Day purchased freedom. It's important that we mourn them, I know I will. But it's more important that we honor their service and the lessons they taught.

Francis Scott Key understood this, to make his voice heard he wrote a poem. It speaks of the American flag and how it embodies the American spirit.

He wrote a poem that is heard around the world as America's National Anthem. On Memorial Day, let's use that gift to both honor our fallen and to teach those for whom our defenders gave so much.

Summary Of May 18 School Board Meet

The following action was taken by the Cross Plains School Board during their regular meeting on Thursday, May 18, 1989.

After the opening prayer and approval of the minutes from previous board meetings the board:

1. Listened to a presentation on the equipment needed for the elementary computer program and to update the high school computer lab. The board requested another report in June as to a final wrap-up cost of computers and related expenses.
2. Listened to a presentation on student insurance. There will be a decision made in June as to the selection of the company to carry the student insurance for the 1989-90 school year.
3. Discussed the need for stage curtains in the auditorium. No action taken at this time.
4. Approved a portion of the requested band budget and tabled the athletic budget until the June meeting.
5. Tabled the Band Booster Club Policy pending clarification of certain sections.
6. Appointed Rex Beggs as the Legislative network member with the Texas Association of School Boards.
7. Approved continuation of the drug dog program for the 1989-90 school year.
8. Approved the spring semester final exam schedule.
9. Results from the 1988-89 TEAMS test was presented to the board. This year's scores were excellent and a report will be sent to the paper for publication at a later date.
10. A new school bus was ordered for delivery during the 1989-90 school year.
11. Ron Bagley and Charles Chesshir were appointed as delegates to the Texas Association of School Boards meeting in October.
12. The June board meeting was set for Wednesday, June 21, 8 p.m. The change was necessary due to administrative and community activity conflicts.
13. After the superintendent's report and financial report the board voted to pay the bills for the past month.
14. In personnel matters the board accepted one resignation and then hired the remainder of the auxiliary staff for the 1989-90 school year.

The U.S. Post Office will be closed Monday, May 29, in commemoration of Memorial Day. Joe E. Hanke, Jr., local postmaster, stated that there would be no mail deliveries of any type. There will also be no window service.

Peanut Fall Transfer Requirements Important

D.B. Warren of Gorman, Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association Director, has suggested that peanut growers make plans at planting time to qualify for fall transfers.

Warren pointed out that a fall peanut quota transfer can be approved only if the transferring farm planted sufficient acres to be expected to produce the full effective quota, and the total production for the farm was less than the effective quota due to reasons beyond the peanut producer's control.

It was explained that effective quota means all of the farm quota including undermarketings. In 1988, producers were only required to plant their basic quota which does not include undermarketings.

Warren said that producers may wish to reduce their effective quota to assist in meeting their planting requirements. Adjustments in the effective quota can be accomplished by making a spring transfer of poundage quota from the farm. However, he suggested that growers interested in executing such spring transfers check with the County ASCS office immediately to determine the deadline for spring transfer.

"Extended Warranties"

They may only extend your costs

The Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division has received numerous complaints about "extended warranty" contracts on new and used cars. Complaints include the following:

- **Slow service.** Extended warranties often involve a "warranty company" that must approve claims for major repairs before the work is done. Sometimes it takes days for the claims representative to inspect the automobile.

- **Claims denied for technical reasons.** Claims have been denied because the repairs, although covered by the warranty, were completed before they were authorized by the warranty company's representative. In other cases, covered repairs have been refused because they were not reported within the time required by the contract.

- **Limited coverage.** Some extended warranties cover only very limited parts or problems.

Despite these problems, comprehensive extended warranties issued by reliable dealers can help make repair costs more predictable. Before buying an extended warranty or service contract, consumers should carefully consider the cost, what is

covered, and how claims are paid.

Buy What You Need.

- * If the car comes with a warranty, an extended warranty or a service contract may involve a costly duplication of coverage. Carefully compare both contracts before buying a second one.

- * If you are buying a used car, watch out for a clause saying that only defective parts are covered. Chances are that all defective parts were replaced under the original warranty. To be worth much, the "extended warranty" must also cover the failure of non-defective parts.

- * An "extended warranty" may cover only specific repairs. Without some coverage of major mechanical repairs, the policy may not be worth the cost.

Read The Fine Print.

- * Does the extended warranty cover what the dealer promised? If not, do not sign it. Get all promises in writing.

- * Many "extended warranties" are actually service contracts between you and your dealer. If the "warranty company" does not pay a valid claim you should look to your dealer for payment and repair.

- * Extended warranties often have "deductible" amounts. Some have a charge for each service visit and may not completely cover towing or rental car expenses. There may be transfer and cancellation charges.

- * There may be consumer requirements. Some dealers refuse to honor a contract if the car owner doesn't have receipts to prove the car had regular maintenance. Extended warranties will not pay claims caused by misuse and negligence.

- * Some contracts require that all repairs and services be done by the dealer who sold the car. Consider the possibility that problems may develop while you are travelling or after you move from the area.

If you have a complaint about an extended warranty or any other consumer problem, call your nearest Consumer Protection Office in Austin, Dallas, El Paso, Houston, Lubbock, McAllen, or San Antonio. The Attorney General's Office is the people's law firm. We're here to help you.

1990 Census Of Population Soon

The 1990 Census of Population and Housing is less than one year away, thus the U.S. Bureau of the Census must begin its preliminary operations early. During 1989, for example, approximately 10,000 temporary census workers will be hired to help prepare a master address list for use in delivering the 1990 census questionnaires to every household in the nation.

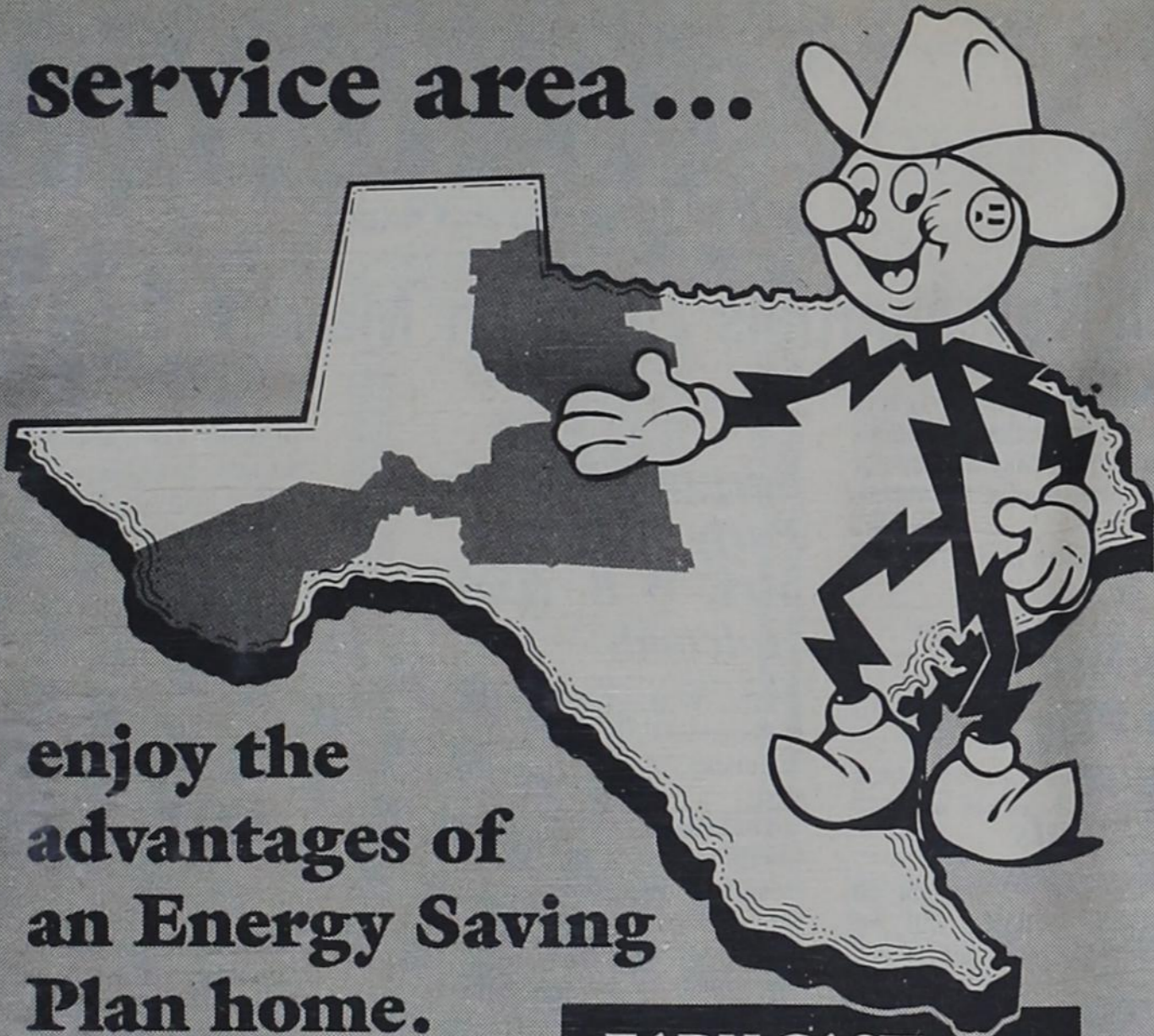
These workers will go door-to-door in about half the counties in the United States beginning this summer. They will take note of correct addresses and sometimes talk to residents about their housing unit. Temporary census workers will be hired to work in their own communities.

There have been some instances during past censuses when unauthorized persons have impersonated census employees for improper activities. Prevention of these incidents are anticipated.

During the coming census operations, law enforcement officers may get inquiries from householders about strangers in their neighborhood claiming to be Census Bureau employees. Law officers will be able to identify census employees.

The 1990 census is vitally important to the future of your community and local government. From census statistical results will come the information needed to apportion the seats of the House of Representatives and to restrict the state legislature and local governing bodies. Billions of dollars in federal and state assistance to local governments will be allocated based on 1990 census results. Public and private developers will use census information to plan such projects as schools and shopping centers.

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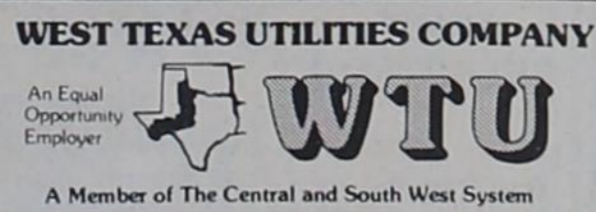

Pattern Your Turkey Gun

The amazing comeback of the wild turkey is one of modern wildlife management's brightest success stories. Only three or four decades ago, wild turkey populations were dwindling and the outlook was dim.

Today, there are huntable populations and seasons in 47 of the 50 states, and the national wild turkey population exceeds 3.8 million birds.

This means an ever-growing number of sportsmen now have the chance to hunt wild turkeys in areas where turkeys were scarce or non-existent not so long ago. Most hunts are spring season for gobblers only, this being best to protect the turkeys from over-harvest.

Spring gobbler hunting is not a wing-shooting sport. The shot is taken at a bird on the ground and preferably standing still. If that sounds un-sporting, consider that a mature gobbler might weigh 20 pounds or more and is remarkably tough to bring down. Body shots are not reliable and neither is shooting a flying turkey in "the all over." Wounding a turkey truly is unsporting.

Shotguns are preferred, but for spring turkey hunting they are used like rifles. The hunter takes deliberate aim on the vulnerable head and neck of the gobbler. Multiple pellet hits to the brain and spine area are necessary for a clean, humane kill.

In deference to the turkey's large size, most hunters prefer a large gun. A 12-gauge, 3-inch magnum with a full choke is considered optimum. Some turkey hunters opt all the way up to the big 10-gauge. Whatever gun one selects, it should throw a lot of lead to the right place.

Since a turkey gun is used like a rifle, it should be "sighted in" like a rifle. That is, you should know where and how far it throws a turkey-taking pattern.

To verify your turkey gun's performance, you will need large sheets of paper, "turkey head" targets (available from several ammunition companies and call manufacturers) and a safe place to shoot.

Check your center of impact: not all guns shoot exactly where they "look." Shoot at a turkey head target or other aiming point on a large sheet of paper at about 30 yards. If your pattern is hitting right where you're aiming, well and good. If not, consult a competent gunsmith about correcting the situation.

Next, to determine pattern density, start placing the turkey head targets farther and farther away. From this you can ascertain how far away your gun delivers a pattern of adequate density to cleanly harvest a gobbler. You want several pellets in the head and neck every time. That single "golden BB" at 60 yards should not be relied upon when the chips are down.

Failing to properly pattern my gun almost cost me the first gobbler I called up. That lesson taught me that no matter how well you hide, call and do everything else, you must make your shot count to be successful.

CUTTING HOURS COSTS EMPLOYER IN UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

Dear Commissioner Nabers: Our company has a policy of cutting employee hours during the slow season. We have operated this way for many years and all of our employees know the situation when they are hired. Recently one of my workers filed a claim for unemployment benefits. I protested the claim and was shocked when I got a decision saying she was entitled to benefits. This person is still working for us. How can she draw benefits when she is still working?

Dear H.Y.: Your employee evidently qualified for PARTIAL benefits based upon her separation from full-time to part-time work. The unemployment law provides for compensation to employees who have suffered a substantial cut in their working hours. It works like this: The benefits amount for the claimant is calculated as if he or she were totally unemployed. Then, the benefit amount is increased by 25 per cent. Then, the claimant's earnings are deducted from the total benefit amount and he receives the remainder. Benefits awarded under these circumstances ARE CHARGEABLE to the employer if the employer is in the claimant's base period. It does not matter that the employee understood at the time of hire that hours would be cut due to seasonal fluctuation in business.

Partial benefits are available only when a claimant has suffered a cut in hours. If you hire a worker for regularly scheduled, part-time work, that worker cannot supplement the part-time job with unemployment benefits at the expense of your company. For example, if an employee has two part-time jobs and loses one of those jobs, he may file a claim for partial benefits, naming the part-time employer from whom he separated. If you are the other part-time employer and wages from your company are in the base period, you should receive a Notice of Maximum Potential Chargeback. Under these circumstances, you would notify the Commission that the

employee is a regularly scheduled part-time employee, has suffered no cut in his part-time hours, and continues to work for your company in a part-time capacity. There will then be no chargeback to your account for any partial benefits the claimant may receive. Do not hesitate to contact your local TEC office or my office for clarification on a claim involving partial benefits.

Dear Commissioner Nabers: I am a small food store owner, unincorporated, and my son works for me after school and in the summer. I have been

paying unemployment tax on him, but someone told me recently that I don't have to. What is the rule on this?

— E.W.
Kyle, Tx.

Dear E.W.: If your son is under 21 years of age, his services for you are exempt from taxation under the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act. You should contact your local TEC tax office or write to Austin regarding getting a tax credit or refund. Of course you can opt to cover your son under the unemployment system if you wish, but you are not required to do so.

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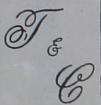
