'How One Man Learned The Bible'

John Lee, who was a prisoner of the Japanese for four years during World War II, sometimes astounds his golfing buddies at Lakewood Recreation Center between Cross Plains and Rising Star. He often quotes the Bible, reciting lengthy verses as though reading from the Holy Writ. John is known to be a moral man but not outwardly religious. It is, therefore, surprising to hear him utter lengthy verses with no difficulty of recall. If they didn't know that he is a retired soil conservationist, they might believe him to be a preacher or a theologian.

A friend said to him recently, "John, you know the Bible well. Do you read it often?"

"No," he replied, "I don't read the Bible much. What I know about it comes from my wartime experiences."

He elaborated, explaining that prisoners of war had no cigarettes and he was cursed with an insatiable desire to smoke. A crude type of tobacco (called wog) was available to POW's, but there was no paper with which to roll a cigarette. John still possessed the New Testament, given to him at the Reception Center when he was inducted into the army. Its pages were thin and about the right size to make a cigarette. One by one, he tore the sheets from that little book and smoked many times.

"I felt remorse about what I was doing," he says, "and as each page was removed I tried to memorize the words on both sides of the sheet before rolling a cigarette."

C.P. Leads County In Percentage Increase Of Sales

The City of Cross Plains leads all Callahan County towns in the percentage of increase in sales over last year. The town is reported to have sales tax collections running 9.45 percent higher this year than in 1988. The town has received \$9,067.39 so far in 1989, while the 1988 tax rebate amounts to \$8,284.21.

Cross Plains payment for the month of February was 4.34 percent higher than the same month last year. The February 1989 payment to the town was \$6,460.63, while the February 1988 check amounted to \$6,191.63.

Retail sales in the City of Clyde for 1989 remain about the same as last year, according to city sales tax payments reported by State Comptroller Bob Bullock on Monday, February 13.

Bullock said that sales tax payments to the city in 1989 are 3.14 percent ahead of last year. The City of Clyde has received \$16,826.74 so far in 1989, while \$16,314.73 was reported in 1988.

The one-percent tax payment to the city for the month of February was \$11,660.33, which is 3.63 percent lower than the February 1988 payment of \$12,099.52.

The City of Baird is showing collection of the 1989 one-percent city sales tax 4.36 percent behind the 1988 sales tax payments. The town has received a total of \$6,490.43 so far in 1989, while sales tax figures were \$6,786.59 in 1988.

The town's monthly sales tax payment for February 1989 was 10.84 percent lower than the same month in 1988. The February 1989 payment was \$5,081.60, while the February 1988 check amounted to \$5,699.52. The City of Putnam is reporting

1989 sales tax collections 12.12 percent lower than 1988 tax payments. The town has received payments of \$1,734.98 so far in 1989. Payments to the county town in 1988 were reported at \$1,974.33.

Statewide, collections of the one-percent city sales tax are running 14.25 percent ahead of last year. The one-percent collections in 1989 in all of Callahan County are 2.28 percent ahead of 1988 tax totals.

Comptroller Bullock on Monday sent a late Christmas present to Texas cities, counties, and Mass Transit Authorities by way of checks totaling nearly \$225 million in local sales tax allocations.

"The cities alone got a 12 percent increase over last year's checks, and 8 percent — more than half — is due to higher sales during the holidays," Bullock said.

Bullock added that about \$670 million was deposited in the state's coffers because of the strong returns, and state lawmakers could put the unexpected extra \$150 million towards planning the 1990-91 state budget.

"The growth in collections from the broadened tax base has evened out now. That means these increases are a direct result of a strong economy and greater consumer confidence," Bullock said.

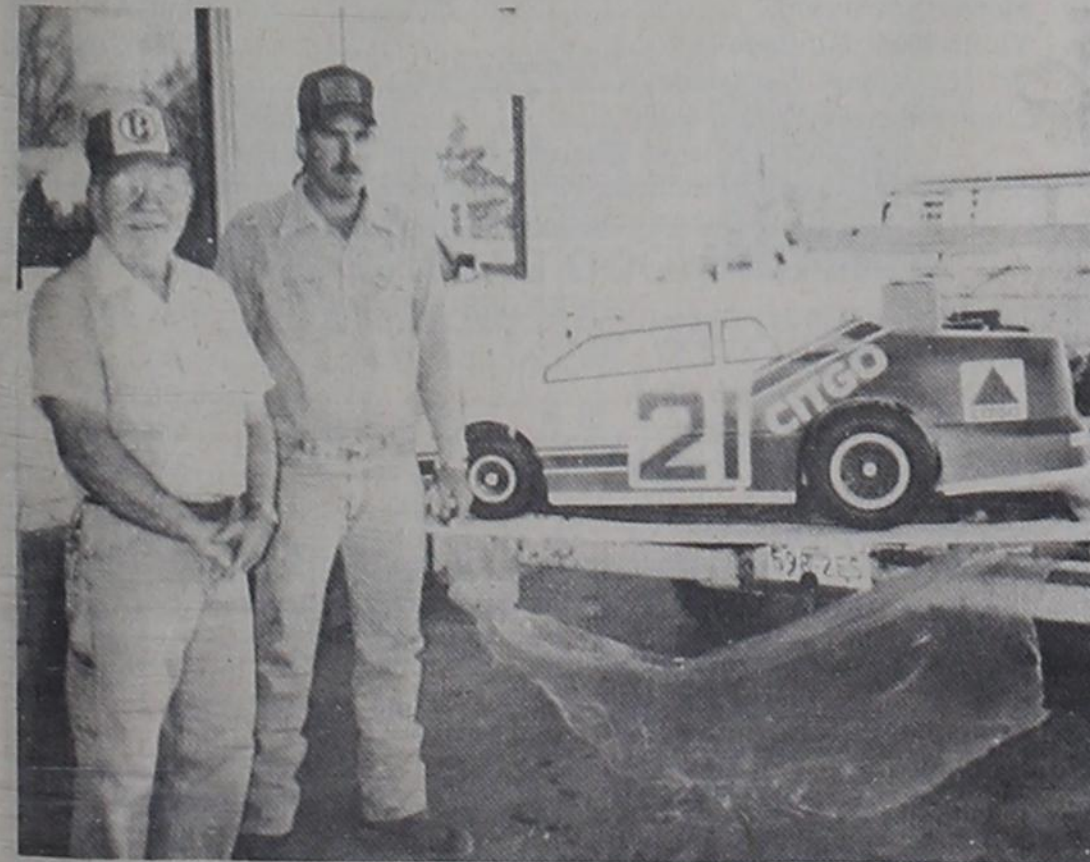
Checks totaling \$145.1 million were sent Monday to 1,048 cities that collect local sales tax at either one or one and one-half percent.

February's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in December and reported to the Comptroller's office by January 20. Also included in this month's allocation are sales tax collections reported by quarterly and yearly filers

'Christ In The Passover' Presented Locally

What do the Jewish Passover and Jesus' Last Supper have in common? Alan Tannenbaum, staff evangelist with Jews for Jesus, will answer that question as he presents "Christ in the Passover" at the Cross Plains Senior Citizens building on March 8 at 7 p.m.

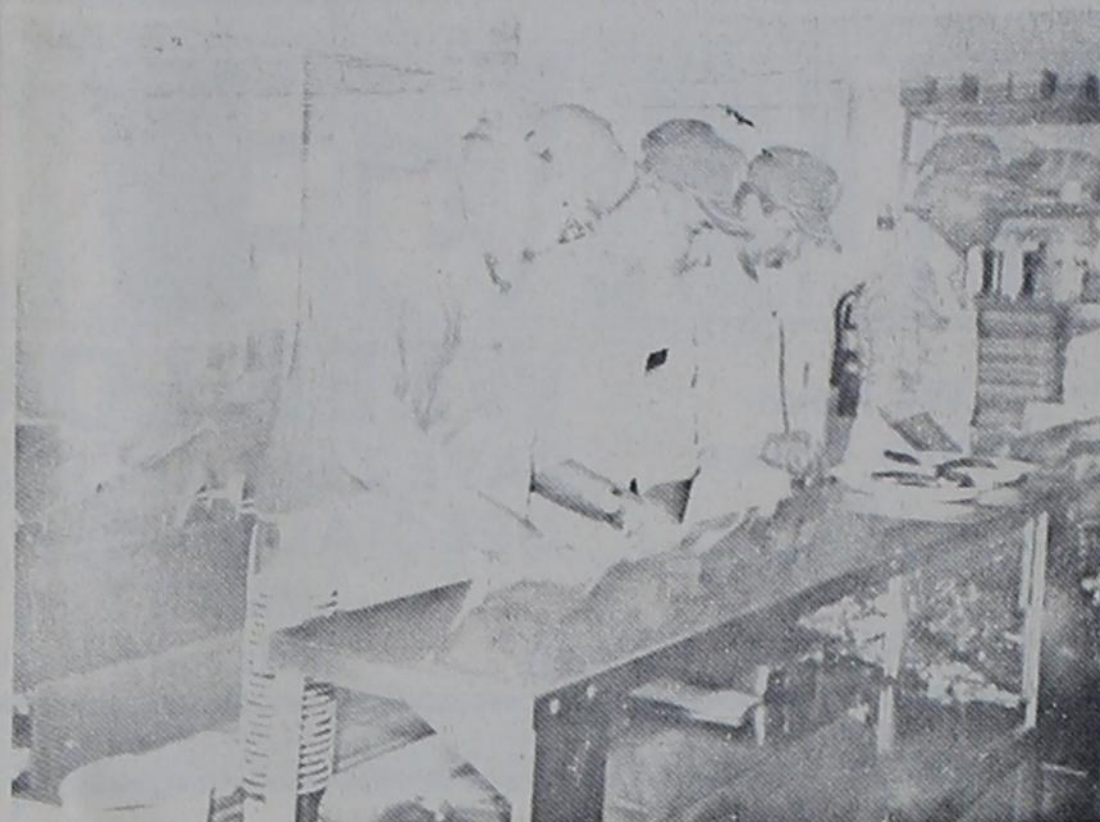
The purpose of the "Christ in the Passover" presentation will enhance the Christian understanding of the New Testament by showing the Jewish background for the Communion celebration.

A table is set with the traditional Jewish Passover items, including foods which will be explained but not eaten. This presentation was originally written in 1956 by Moishe Rosen, the founder of Jews for Jesus.

Dr. Rosen contends that some of the most important elements of Christian doctrine, such as the Trinity, the principle of substitutionary atonement, and salvation through a personal relationship with the Messiah, are implied in the Sedar (Passover feast) as observed by Orthodox Jews today.

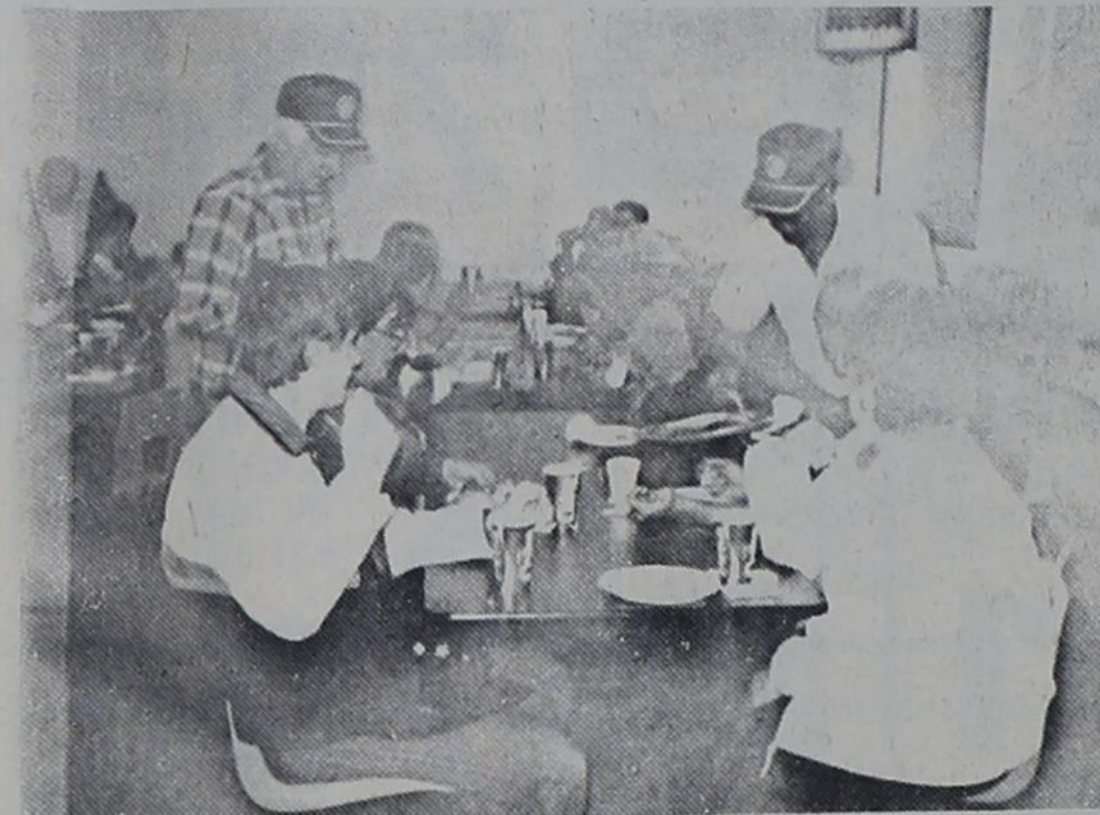
You will hear Alan Tannenbaum share how he came to trust Jesus Christ as his savior. Then time will be given for questions that you might have concerning Passover, Judaism, or any other questions that Alan can answer.
