Run-Away Van Strikes Elementary Building

Friday, July 14, at 2 p.m. a 1981 Ford truck driven by Rusty Bill Wells was pulling a 1966 International van down North Main Street, when the van came unhooked from the hitch. The unmanned vehicle traveled across the corner school yard of the Cross Plains High School and past the drive-way between the school buildings before slamming into the south side of the Cross Plains Elementary building (housing the sixth grade classroom).

The 1969 Ford truck, driven by Grier Rayborn Knox of Cisco, was traveling with Wells. The driver witnessed the mishap and in his efforts to back up to see what had transpired, sheared the utility pole with guard light in front of the elementary building off with the ground. An electrical wire was then lying on the pavement. Traffic was diverted from the

area for approximately 15 minutes until West Texas Utilities repaired the damage.

A couple of indentures were made in the side of the building and further damage has not been determined.

Special Public Meeting Called On Landfill Issues Friday

A special public meeting has been set by the Cross Plains City Council at 6:30 p.m. at the Community Center on July 21 to discuss current landfill issues.

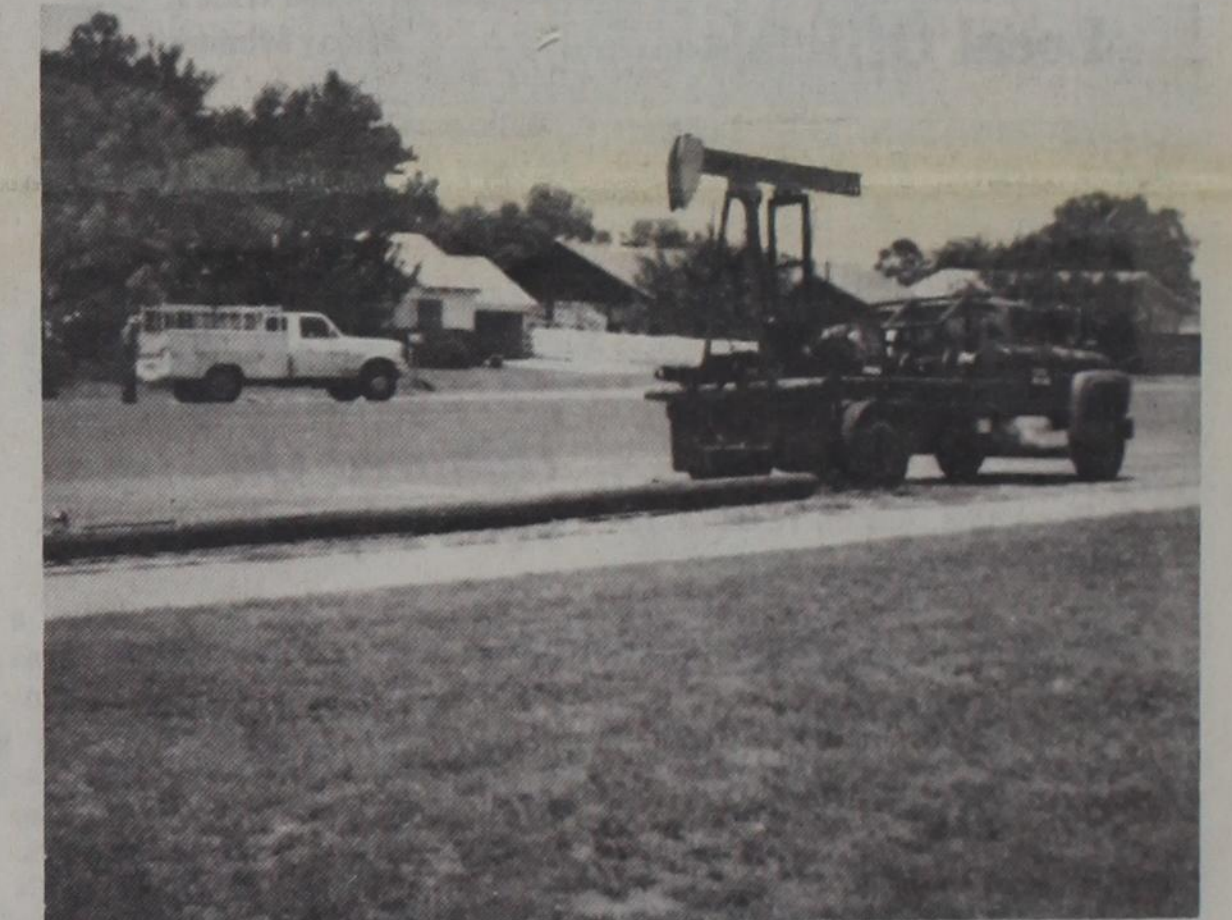
Due to the rising cost of operation and new EPA regulations being placed upon the landfills, the City Council feels it necessary to close our current landfill and contract its refuse to a privately operated area landfill. It is the intent of the city to close the landfill as of August 31, 1989.

As of this date no contract has been signed as to who will haul the city's

refuse. However, it is expected that the cost of garbage pickup will increase approximately 60-65 percent.

The City Council has passed the first reading of the Trash Service Ordinance, making trash service MANDATORY of all residential and commercial customers within the city limits of Cross Plains.

Further information on this issue will be available at the Public Meeting. Any interested person is encouraged to attend the meeting and ask questions concerning this matter.

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

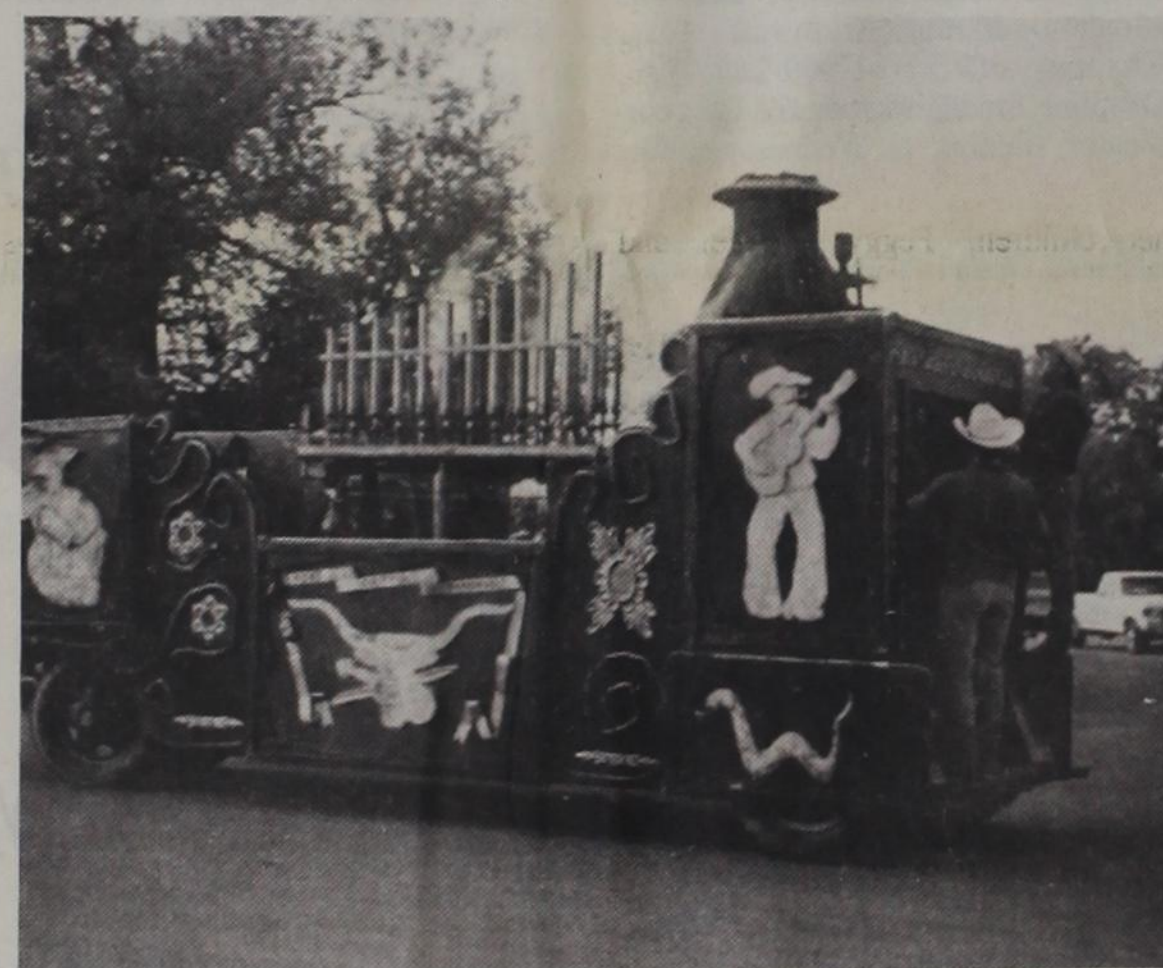

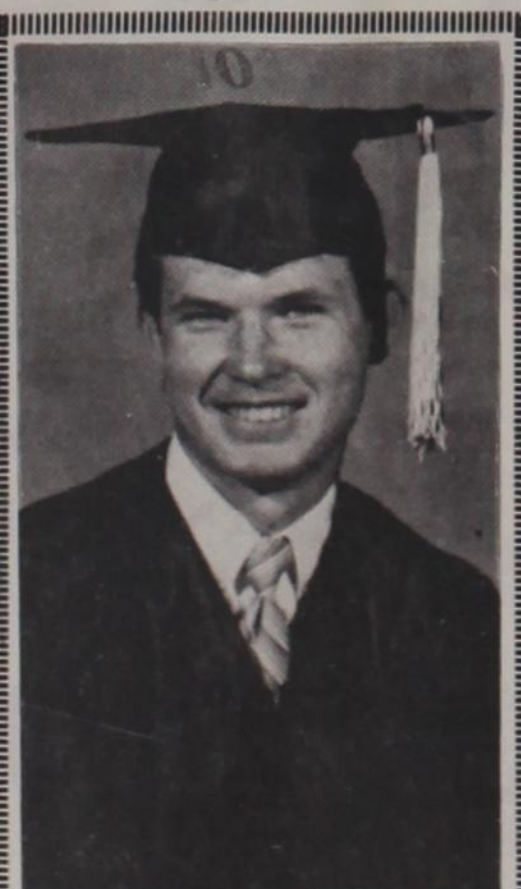

Dear G.C.L.: Yes, there are definitely some new laws that will affect employers and also employees. This is a short list because of space constraints. If you want to receive my monthly newsletter on such issues give us a call at 1-800-TEC-MARY. There is no charge.

New legislative changes include the following:

- As part of the comprehensive AIDS/HIV package passed as SB 959, the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act was amended. The amendment allows a disqualification from benefits if a worker leaves a job voluntarily rather than provide services included within the course and scope of his employment to anyone infected with a communicable disease.

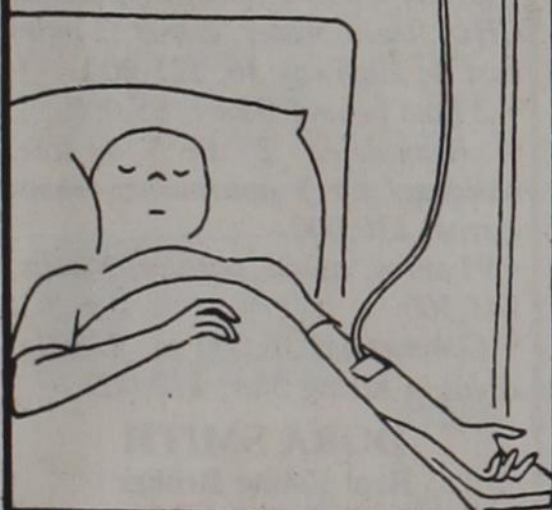
- Also to be disqualified from benefits will be a claimant who was discharged from his last work because of his refusal to provide services within the scope of his employment to an individual infected with a communicable disease.

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Heed The Hazards Of Hot Weather

Summer traditionally is a time for fun in the sun. The Texas Medical Association warns that hot, humid weather may pose severe health problems, ranging from the less serious heat fatigue or heat exhaustion to the potentially fatal heat stroke.

To avoid heat-related illness, drink plenty of water and juices, bathe or shower frequently with cool water, and use fans and air conditioners liberally. When outside, wear lightweight, light-colored, loose-fitting clothing; cotton is best. Avoid vigorous activity during the hottest part of the day, noon to 4 p.m., and wear a hat or use an umbrella when in the sun.

In hot weather or during strenuous exercise, the body cools itself through perspiration. Cooling occurs when perspiration evaporates from the skin. However, when challenged by long periods of intense heat, the body may lose its ability to cool. Hyperthermia is the result. Poor ventilation, improper clothing, and the lack of fluids can contribute to this.

Heat fatigue, the least serious of heat-related illnesses, causes weakness. Symptoms include cool, moist skin and a weakened pulse. The person may feel faint or dizzy. Mild hyperthermia can cause heat cramps — muscle spasms in the abdomen, arms, or legs after strenuous activity. With both heat stress and heat cramps, body temperature usually remains normal.

Heat exhaustion, caused by the body's loss of water and salt, is a more serious warning that the body is overheating. Symptoms include thirst, giddiness, weakness, profuse sweating, loss of coordination and appetite, and nausea. Body temperature

often is elevated, but usually no higher than 101 degrees.

Heat fatigue, cramps, and heat exhaustion may be treated in several ways. Victims should lie down in a cool place, preferably air-conditioned, and drink water or fruit and vegetable juices. Alcohol and caffeine should be avoided. Victims also should shower, bathe, or sponge off with cool water. If left untreated, heat exhaustion can progress to heat stroke.

Heat stroke can be life-threatening, and immediate medical attention is required. Heat stroke usually is preceded by headache, dizziness, nausea, confusion and even convulsions. The victim may be flushed, but may not be perspiring. The pulse generally is strong and rapid, and the body temperature may reach 104 degrees Fahrenheit and keep rising. The person may lose consciousness. In this situation, keep the victim cool, but do not attempt to render aid. Expert emergency attention is required for suspected heat stroke.

Prevent serious heat-related illnesses by making sure the proper precautions are taken. With sound judgment and an ounce of prevention, the summer can remain a time of fun and leisure for everyone.

Texas Legislators Get JOBS Done; Action to Stimulate Economic Recovery

In short, the Texas JOBS Plan will sharpen our edge as we compete nationally and internationally for new investments. It will create new jobs for Texans, foster greater diversification for a better future and widespread opportunities for the years to come.

Tick Problem Continuing In County

The tick problem is continuing to cause various diseases and illnesses throughout the Callahan County area. An infestation of ticks can cause great discomfort to a dog, contribute to generalized skin problems, create anemia leading to the death of the dog and pose a serious threat by transmitting diseases from infected to non-infected dogs.

Tick-borne diseases have been diagnosed with increasing frequency in the last few years. With the spread of these diseases into new areas, including the infection of humans, the frequency of their diagnosis is expected to continue to increase. Suspicious dogs should be tested so that infected dogs can be treated to eliminate the reservoir of the disease and prevent its spread to other dogs.

Even though, we are seeing these tick-borne problems, the most common complication in our area is severe infestation resulting in anemia and occasionally death.

If dogs become infested with ticks they should be dipped, sprayed or powdered as frequently as recommended to kill the ticks. If dogs have access only to a limited area, a tick eradication program should be followed in that area to eliminate ticks that may be harboring the disease organisms. All label instructions on any dip, spray or powder should be strictly followed for safety and effectiveness.

Your veterinarian will be able to help you with a disease control and tick elimination program.

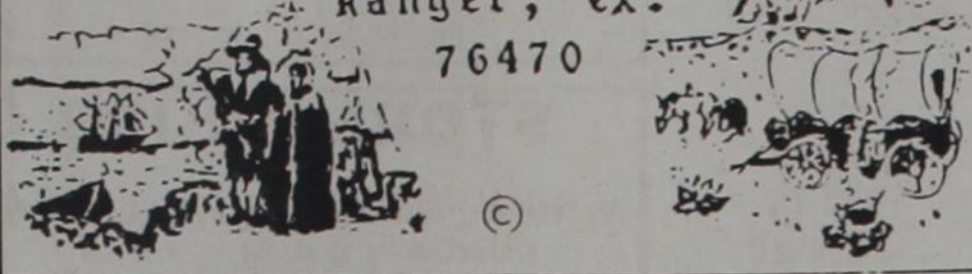

...NEED BIRTH CERTIFICATE? Somehow your birth was never recorded. In the early 1900s this was not uncommon. Or maybe the birth was recorded in the county but there was a courthouse fire and records destroyed.

If there is someone who knew your folks at the time and can verify your birth, then you can go to the county of your birth and see the County Clerk about an affidavit birth certificate.

ANOTHER SOLUTION is through the Census Bureau. In most cases a Federal Census record is accepted as proof of birth and in place of a birth certificate.

Census records, of course, are taken every ten years and all years through and including 1910 have been released for public viewing in larger libraries which have genealogy or in most other libraries through interlibrary loan.

If your birth occurred AFTER 1910, you will have to write to: U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of Census, Personal Census Service Branch, Pittsburg, Kansas 66762. You will need to send the following information: Name of your parents, your date of birth, county, town, and street if known, where your family resided in the first Census year FOLLOWING your birth. Census years are from beginning in 1790, every ten years.

EXAMPLE: David Baldwin was born 16 April 1912 — father, David E. Baldwin; mother Maude E.; and in 1920, the family was living on Queen St., town of Portsmouth, Norfolk County, VA.

If your family was living in another household, i.e., grandfather, aunt, uncle, etc., you would need to know the name of Head of Household.

The Census Bureau will copy the information from the record, giving name of parents, your name as son or daughter, and your age at time of Census, and your State of birth. And the paper will have U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census seal.

There will be a fee for this service. In 1981 it was \$12, but the Bureau will notify you.

...Mrs. Lamar CHAMBERLAIN, 1130 Line Street, Grenada, MS 38901, is researching the Mississippi family of William SIMPSON b. 1822, S.C., and Rachel Jane Ester (BRADBURY) SIMPSON b. 7 Aug. 1828 (MS?). Where in S.C. did the SIMPSONS live? Who were parents of William? Rachel's father was Isaac S. BRADBURY, but who was her

mother? On the 1831 ARMSTRONG CENSUS ROLL, (Indians owning land), we find Isaac BRADBURY and William HURLEY, 7 in family living on the John PITCHLYN, Jr. place, close to Columbus, MS. Was Rachel's mother part Indian? The mother must have died before 31 Oct. 1833, as this is date of Isaac's 2nd marriage. Was William HURLEY related? William SIMPSON and Rachel were married 4 Dec. 1845, probably Oktibbeha Co., MS. They also lived in Yalobusha Co., MS. Sincerely appreciate any help and information of this family.

Each individual has been extracted from the microfilm copy of this census, and gives all pertinent information about each that is shown on the record. There is an easy to follow coding system using the alphabet. Although on the beginning page the letters were shifted over one space during printing. It is still easy to read and has saved heading space allowing the author to include more information in a one line entry. 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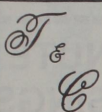
