

Who Is Elegible To Vote?

With City Council and School Board Trustee elections coming up on May 6, there may be some confusion as to who may vote in the elections.

The requirements for voting for a councilman are to be a registered voter and reside within the city limits of Cross Plains. These eligibility qualifications were obtained from personnel at the City Hall.

Wauneta Estes, Tax Assessor and Collector at Baird, provided the eligibility requirements for the school board election, which include:

(1) Must be 18 years or older. (2) Must be a citizen of the United

(3) Must not have been determined mentally incompetent by a final judg-

(4) Must not have been finally convicted of a felony or, if so convicted, has received a certificate of discharge by the Board of Pardons and Paroles or completed a period of probation ordered by a court and at least two years have elapsed from the date of the receipt or completion or have been pardoned or otherwise released from the resulting disability to vote.

(5) Must be a resident of the state of

(6) Must be a registered voter.

(7) A registered voter who changes residence to another election precinct in the same county if otherwise eligible, may vote a full ballot in the election precinct of former residence through the 90th day after the date of the change of residence or until the voter's registration becomes effective in the new precinct, whichever occurs first, in an election in which the ballot contains an office or proposition stating a measure on which the qualified voters of both the former and new precincts are eligible to vote.

Estes pointed out the fact that Cross Plains is located in four counties including Callahan, Brown, Eastland, and Coleman. On the school board election voters should vote in the school district in which they reside, regardless of the county you live in. If a person owned property in various counties, you would only vote in the school district in which you resided.

If you have any questions as to the school district which you reside, you may contact your county tax assessor for clearification.

Exercise your right to vote and cast your ballots in the upcoming city and school board elections.


Al-Anon Group Forms Locally

Recollections Of Early C.P. Picnics

In the long and colorful history of this area few events ever commanded more attention than did the annual Cross Plains Picnics of bygone eras. They were held regularly from the early 1880's until the advent of World War II.

As a country editor attending and writing about this yearly celebration for much of a lifetime, many newsworthy occurrences are remembered or recorded in the yellowed, old files of the Review. There is the story of a "mystery couple" being married on the grounds during the depression days of the 1930's; there's an account of a baseball game in which Jeff Clark hit a homerun into a boxcar and the ball not being found until the following day, when the train pulled into De Leon. Local people claim it to be the longest homerun ever hit, feats of Babe Ruth and Mickey Mantle notwithstanding.

Andy Hudson, an early-settler in these parts, who incidentally was reputed to have attended the first rodeo ever staged in America at Pecos City back before the word rodeo came into use - they were called Wild West Shows then — recounted a happening at the 1903 picnic. He and Bill McDonald left the grounds and stroll-

ed into a Liveoak thicket to take a drink of whiskey. They were in the midst of a bushy clump when Andy stumped his toe on something and nearly fell. He looked down to see what had tripped him and saw a dead man, face down, sprawled in the undergrowth.

Instead of being alarmed the two men sat down on a log and had a few drinks. They talked about what action should be taken and a decision was reached. Instead of going to the crowd and spreading the news they decided 'o seek out Sheriff T.A. (Al) Irvin, Justice of the Peace Joe Summers, and a few leading citizens like Jim Coffman, Frank Harlow and Dr. R. Robertson, all of whom were on the grounds. When the group had been gathered Andy and Bill led the way to

Sheriff Irvin turned the body over and immediately identified the dead man as Willie C. Strickland, postmaster at the Cross Plains office. Dr. Robertson made a cursory examination and declared the man had died from a heart attack. Temporary management of the post office passed to Joe Baum, who served a short while and resigned. He was followed by Mrs. Nettie Newton, the only woman

'Taylor-Made Band' On The Move

The local high school band, under the direction of Randy Taylor, caps a highly successful year by leaving tomorrow to March in the Fiesta Flambeau Rey Feo Parade in San Antonio Saturday night. Yesterday, the band competed in the U.I.L. Concert and Sight Reading contests in Abilene. Full results of this competition will be published next week.

The Fiesta Flambeau Parade is billed as "America's Greatest Illuminated Night Parade," and is just one of a series of parades held in conjunction with the Fiesta San Antonio. The Fiesta celebrates the establishment of the Texas Republic in 1836. Winding through downtown San Antonio, past the viewing stand in front of the Alamo, the parade will be viewed by over 400,000 street spectators. It will also be telecast, but will probably have to be picked up locally by satellite.

Traveling to San Antonio in chartered buses, the band will go by way of Austin and will tour the state capital on Thursday. After an early departure Friday morning, the 41 band members and ten adult sponsors will spend a day and half sight-seeing and shopping in San Antonio.

Senior members will enjoy a special night out with dinner in the Hemisphere Tower on Friday night.

Although the parade starts promptly at 8 p.m. Saturday, Mr. Taylor has no idea when the local group will March. The parade is several hours long and if the band doesn't move out until 11 p.m. or so, they won't be home until the wee small hours of Sunday morn-

Mr. Taylor feels that trips such as this are vital to the building of a strong band program. The students are not only exposed to Texas history and other cultures, they improve social graces by dining in nice restaurants and by staying in nice motels. A lot of team-work goes into any trip as the members take responsibility for their own gear as well as helping with band equipment. As the group travels and works together, they grow in their respect for each other and in their desire to remain in band throughout high school.

Mr. Taylor, in a letter to band parents prior to this trip, expressed his thanks "to the many fine people associated with the school for supporting the band this year. The school board, the administration, and the people of Cross Plains have all done their part in helping the band grow both in size and in quality, and for this, I'm grateful."







Thirty-nine years ago some of the oldest residents of this area were interviewed and their remembrances of early-day picnics were recorded. Highlights of what they said follow:

Mrs. J.G. (Jack) Aiken: "First picnic I ever attended was in 1883. Jack and I left our children with Grannies Aiken and Teague and came to the celebration. Jack entered tournamentriding and won first place. John Westerman was one of the judges and it was that day that I met his wife, who is now my neighbor. My husband and I spread our dinner with Bob Teague and his wife and several other couples."

Pete Moore: "First local picnic I recall was in 1884. It was in a bend of the creek, just north of the highway bridge. I had been at the picnic and started home when I saw the McDaniel house was afire. I rushed back to the grounds and spread the alarm. Everyone left and came to fight the blaze. Our efforts were much in vain, though, for all that was saved was a sewing machine."

Mrs. J.C. McDermett: "I well remember the picnic of 1883. We spread dinner and among the people who ate near us were members of the Coffman family, the Barrs, Will and Sam Sparks and others. It was at this picnic that I met Mrs. Alice Young, who was to be my neighbor for more than 50 years. A friend was buying her a glass of lemonade, served from a a program at those early-day picnics. The people didn't require it, they came mainly to see one another and enjoy old-fashioned visiting. There was some fiddle music, though, with Bob Ford playing much of the time."

I've been to nearly all the picnics since that time and the one that stands out most in my mind was in 1925. My husband had gone blind and the committee gave him permission to sell tobacco and confections on the grounds. We worked real hard and when we counted up that night we found that we'd made \$65. That seemed like an awful lot of money."

Ask any old-timer what he or she remembers of a Cross Plains Picnic in the long ago and the chances are you will see a countenance brightened by a devilish smile and you'll be in for a few minutes of interesting listening.





What's Happening? — Preliminary Report Shows 82,000 Dropouts In 1987-88

More than 82,000 Texas students in grades 7 through 12 dropped out of school during the 1987-88 school year, according to a report presented to the State Board of Education in March.

The preliminary report, prepared by the Texas Education Agency, is based on data submitted by each school district through the Public Education Information Management System (PEIMS). It showed 82,883 students dropped out of Texas middle and high schools during the last school year.

The report, mandated by House Bill 1010 of the 70th Texas Legislature, is the first statewide count of dropouts. Under House Bill 1010 and Board rules, a dropout is any student who is absent 30 or more days without an excuse or official transfer or any student who is not enrolled for the first 30 consecutive days of the school year at his or her appropriate grade.

Of the 82,883 reported dropouts, 34,809 were white, 13,614 were black, 33,005 were Hispanic, 1,281 were Asian and 174 were American Indian.

The largest concentration of dropouts was reported for the 9th grade, where 24,168 students left

Of the 82,883 dropouts, 8,015 were identified as special education

The report showed more than 37 percent of all the dropouts occurred during the summer months.

While most districts reported dropouts, some may have misinterpreted the dropout definition. Before the report is final a number of school districts will be contacted to verify reported numbers and identify problems in filing accurate reports.




