The mailing of the 100th publication of the group was the occasion for last week's visit, so that the items would have a Cross Plains postmark. As in 1986, all came bearing gifts for the library — 19 Howard or Howard-related books. Thanks to REHUPA, the Howard Collection continues to grow.

Visiting the Howard house was the highlight of the visit, since in 1986 we could not go inside. Some REHUPANS have volunteered to take vacation time to help when actual work begins on restoring it for a Cross Plains/Howard Museum.

These are professional men with Howard in common, who appreciate him for the fantastic imagination, the poetic language, the adventure of his poetry and his tales, and who have a feeling for the captive that he was in a world which understood him not at all.

We would like for Cross Plains peo-

ple to know these men as we expect to see more of them in years to come.

The money raised by the chamber and historical group will go toward Clyde's railroad museum and chamber office located on North First and Cherry Streets. The building is to be restored to its original beauty of the railroad's section foreman's house. The King Royal Brother Circus will present a widely varied program of almost two hours duration. The circus will erect the huge canvas tent at the Clyde Community Park, located on FM 604 north of Clyde. The shows are scheduled for 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. Friday, November 17. Pre-sale tickets are now on sale at a reduced rate. Tickets are available at Olney Savings, Clyde Journal, Jon Herod, C.P.A., Leonard's Auto Supply, Peoples State Bank in Clyde, Cross Plains Review, or from a chamber of commerce director. Reduced rate tickets are \$3.00 for children under 11 years of age and \$5.00 for adults and children over 11. Pre-sale tickets will be available through the day prior to circus day. Tickets can also be purchased, at the park gate, the day of the circus, but at the price of \$4.00 for children and \$6.00 for adults.

Ella Dean Celebrates Her 90th Birthday

On Saturday, October 21, Ella Dean celebrated her 90th birthday at the Church of Christ Activity Center in Cross Plains with close friends and relatives. Her children, Bob and Nelda Dean, Betty Haslam, and Laverne and Cowan Hutton hosted the affair. Sixty guests were served.

Each guest brought a long stemmed silk flower which was placed in a vase for a birthday bouquet for Mrs. Dean. Some of the highlights of the occasion was the appearances of some old friends and neighbors from San Angelo. The Deans were neighbors to these five sisters in Runnels Co. from 1937 to 1940. Also Gail Dean, a nephew from Ft. Worth, a niece and husband, Frank and Wanda Crawford of Graham, and Addie Brumfield of Eastland were present. Most members of her Sunday school class attended the celebration. She received telephone calls, flowers and best wishes from Georgia, Oklahoma, and Missouri.

Mrs. Dean was born Cynthia Ella Gurley on October 21, 1899 in Reagan, Tennessee. She came with her family to Texas by train before she was a year old, getting off the train at Round Rock.

Her father was a farmer and she was her father's "plow boy". Due to a drought in 1917, she and her family left Texas for Oklahoma to pick cotton. They traveled in two covered wagons and a Model T Ford car. Ella drove one covered wagon and team. A dresser in the wagon served as a seat, as they traveled over rough, rocky unpaved roads for 13 days.

She met her husband, Delma Dean at Davis, Oklahoma, after he was discharged from the Army in World War I. They were married in Paulsvalley, Oklahoma on July 31, 1919. Ella hoed cotton for fifteen cents an hour to buy material for her wedding dress. Her mother-in-law made the dress for her. She and her husband returned to Texas in 1922 where they farmed in Runnels County. They moved to Pioneer, Texas in 1940 and ran the Dean Grocery and Texaco Station. Her husband died in 1972. After his death she moved to Cross Plains where she now lives.

Ella took her first elevator ride as a child at the State Capital Building in Austin. Her mother made Ella and the other children sit flat on the floor for fear they would fall down the shaft. When they rode the merry-go-round at the County Picnic, their mother made them ride in the 'cage' instead of on the hobby horses. Ella says she is still "mad" about that. She loved horses. The first car she ever remembers seeing was owned by a doctor at Indian Gap, Texas in about 1908, that looked like a carriage.

Mrs. Dean made a trip to Branson, Missouri in 1986 with her daughter and husband, Laverne and Cowan. While there they went to a car museum. As they were looking at an early Model T Ford, some man remarked that there probably wasn't any one there old enough to remember how to drive one like it. Mrs. Dean spoke up and said, "Oh yes, I can drive it!"

Mrs. Dean has 3 children, 9 grand-children, and 17 great-grandchildren. She loves life, always happy and laughing. Her hair is still naturally dark. Someone at her birthday party asked her how it felt to be a 90-year-old brunette!

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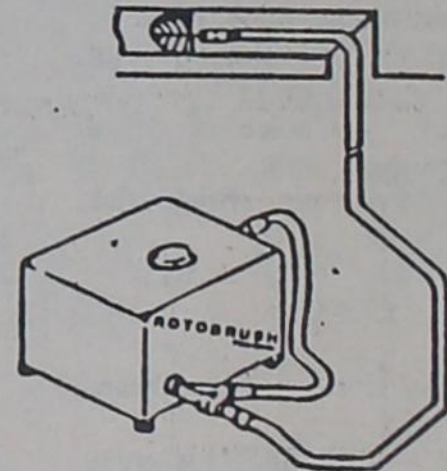

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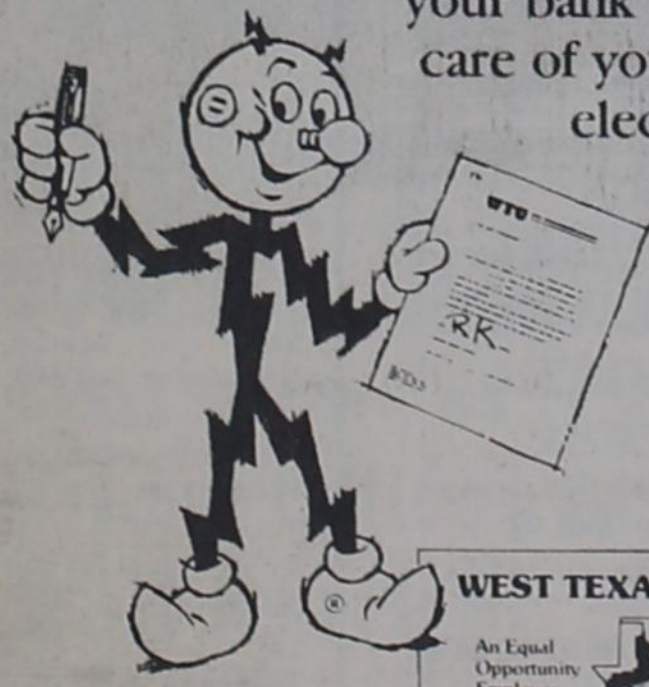

Clyde Volunteers Killed By Fires Immortalized

CLYDE — A dream Jean Gilmore has fought for has finally come true. Jean has led the fight to have the names of four Clyde volunteer firefighters who lost their lives in the line of duty inscribed on a memorial in Austin.

Since May, Jean has contacted scores of Austin officials to get the OK for the inscription. She then had to tackle a fund-raising drive that isn't quite complete.

But stonemason, Jim Stasswender called her Oct. 26 and told her the names were added to the monument that day.

"I was nearly in tears when he called," she said Wednesday. "It's been a long time coming."

Jean and about 20 other Clyde residents traveled to Austin Saturday for a 2 p.m. dedication service.

Roy Pheamster of Edinburg, a Church of Christ minister and member of the fire department when the men were killed; and Don Haley, a resident of Clyde and the chief of the department when the mishap occurred, will speak.

The men are Marc K. Gilmore, Ira R. Akers, Roy L. Goin and Charles W. Rose. Marc is Jean's brother-in-law.

Gilmore, Akers and Goin were killed in an oilfield explosion while fighting a fire in February 1974, and Rose died when the fire truck in which he was passenger overturned south of Clyde on Farm Road 604 in August 1974.

The monument, which stands on the Capitol grounds, is dedicated to volunteer firefighters.

"The statue depicts a volunteer firefighter with a frightened baby in his left arm and a lantern in his right arm," she said.

At the base of the monument is inscribed: "To the memory of the volunteer firemen of Texas who have lost their lives in service."

The monument was erected in 1896 by the Firemen's Association of Texas.

Jean said only about \$50 of the \$875 needed for the stonemason's work has been raised. Donations are being accepted at Olney Savings in Clyde to the Fire Department's Memorial Fund.

Unfortunately, the State Firemen's and Fire Marshal's Association said it wanted to use as little space as possible on the monument, because the space available is shrinking. So the names of the Clyde firemen have been engraved in a smaller type than the older names.

Almost 4.5 Million People Received PEBES In First Year

In August, the Social Security Administration marked the first anniversary of its most successful drive to inform members of the public about their Social Security coverage. Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

The Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement (PEBES) was introduced to the public on August 4, 1988. Since then almost 4.5 million people have sent for and received their PEBES.

Reactions have been overwhelmingly positive, Hammons said. "Why didn't they do this years ago?" is a commonly heard remark.

PEBES offers a year-by-year breakdown of posted earnings and the estimated FICA taxes paid. It also shows estimates for disability, survivors, and retirement benefits at ages 62, full retirement age (currently 65), and 70.

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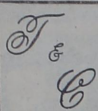
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
