## 19 Baird Pre-School Students Complete Training Course

BAIRD — Nineteen members of next year's first grade class recently completed a four-week training course designed to prepare them for the fall school term. The objective of the school was to allow the children to make the emotional and social adjustments necessary for school before they are exposed to formal learning situations.

The classroom was designed in centers, where each child worked individually and at his own rate of speed; although each child was allowed to choose the center to work in, he was encouraged to try every

center before choosing one. There were centers for creative art, listening, games and toys. In addition, the child had access to books, puzzles, clay, word-picture games and raised alphabet letters and numerals. There was individual flannel boards and felt cut-outs where he could tell and create stories.

The group was brought together for instruction in phonics and the basic elements of set construction. Exercises in singing, finger play and rhythm band were also included in the activities. A period of play and recreation rounded out the day's activities.

The teacher, Mrs. Sidney Foy, and administrators, are enthusiastic about the progress made by the children during this period. Their progress will be further evaluated on August 5, 6 and 7 when teams of experts from Region XIV Education Service Center in Abilene will be in Baird to administer tests to the group.

## Robert Griggs Awarded Air Medal And Commendation in Vietnam

BAIRD — Sp. 4 Robert L. Griggs III was recently awarded the Air Medal in Vietnam for distinguished services performed there last fall. Sp. 4 Griggs is the son of R. L. Griggs Jr. of Baird and Mrs. Mattie Buckner of Albuquerque, N. M., and a grandson of Mrs. R. L. Griggs Sr. of Baird.

Accompanying the medal was the following citation:

By Direction of the President, the Air Medal is presented to Specialist Four Robert L. Griggs III, United States Army, who distinguished himself by meritorious achievement, while participating in sustained aerial flight, in support of combat ground forces in the Republic

of Vietnam. During the period 3 September 1968 to 9 December 1968, he actively participated in more than twenty-five aerial missions over hostile territory in support of operations against Communist aggression. During all these flights, he displayed the highest order of air discipline and acted in accordance with the best traditions of the service. By his determination to accomplish his mission, in spite of the hazards inherent in repeated aerial flights over hostile territory, and by his outstanding degree of professionalism and devotion to duty, he has brought credit upon himself, his organization, and the United States Army.

Byron Richardson, 51, Cross Plains City Marshall, was reported to be in critical condition Wednesday at noon, after undergoing surgery in Hendrick Memorial Hospital about mid-

morning for gunshot wounds received at 4:50 a. m. Wednesday.

Richardson, former Callahan County Judge, was shot twice in the side by a man whom he had just given a warning traffic ticket. He was first taken to Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital in Coleman and then transferred to Hendricks.

A pickup, driven by Richardson's assailant, was reportedly stopped in Cross Plains. After Richardson had issued the citation for failure to have a Texas driver's license, he started to get into his car as the man opened fire from his pickup with a gun believed by investigating officers to be a .22 caliber rifle. The gun had not been located at noon Wednesday.

A suspect, Curtis Sherman Goad, was arrested in Cisco at 8:45 a. m. by Cisco Chief of Police Brymer and Patrolman Morgan Fleming.

Goad, a 26 year old painter who had been living in Cross Plains about a month, was taken to a doctor's office in Cisco for treatment of a hand injury reported to be a gunshot wound received in the scrape with Richardson. After treatment he was brought to Baird by Texas Ranger Sid Merchant where he was jailed pending filing of charges.

Goad's wife, Sherry Lanele, was reportedly with him at the time the citation was issued in Cross Plains, and when he was taken into custody at Cisco.

Richardson was elected Callahan County Judge in May, 1962 and served one 4-year term. He had been living in Cross Plains since 1966.

## THIRTY-FOUR ESTIMATED TO BE KILLED OVER LONG WEEKEND

AUSTIN — Colonel Wilson E. Speir, Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today the DPS Statistical Services Bureau estimates that 34 persons will be fatally injured in traffic accident in Texas during the 78-hour July 4 holiday period.

The holiday period is considered to run from 6 p. m. Thursday, July 3, to midnight Sunday, July 6. During this time, the Department of Public Safety will activate a special "Operation Motorcade" and will place all available uniformed patrolmen on duty to enforce traffic laws in an effort to reduce accidents and assist motorists.

Speir urged all Texans to plan their holiday trips so as to allow ample time to travel without speeding or driving too fast for conditions. He also cautioned motorists to watch for pedestrians, especially on parks and beaches during the holiday period.

The DPS director also warned that the department will vigorously enforce state laws relating to driving while intoxicated. "Drinking drivers are involved 40 to 50 per cent of the fatal rural traffic accidents in Texas, and I urge all drivers to avoid the use of alcohol prior to operating a motor vehicle," Speir said.

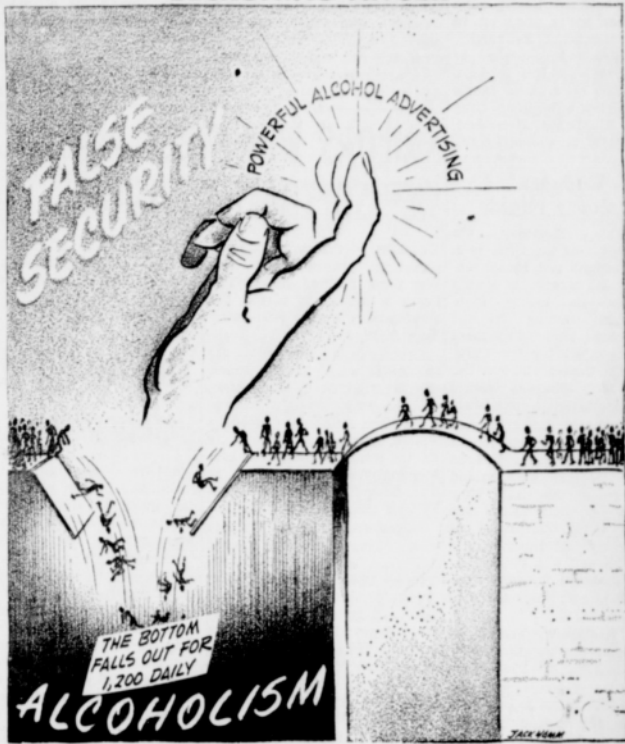

### Holden Receives Health Dept. Citation

AUSTIN — An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Harold Holden, plant operations specialist for the Clyde water distribution system. The citation reflects the regard in which Holden is held by state water officials.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water Utilities Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department Sanitary engineers.

State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by the health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and state.

The engineers said the attainment is evidence of Holden's efforts to better prepare himself for the duties of his profession.

### August 1 Deadline For ASCS Crop Certification

Final date to certify Cotton, Peanuts, Feed Grain and Diversified Acreage is August 1, 1969. Now that planting of these crops is nearing completion, producers are urged to certify their acreage now. Where payments are to be earned, none can be computed until the crop acreage is reported. Therefore, a delay in reporting is a delay in payments.

Extreme care should be taken when reporting crop and diverted acreage. There is no chance to adjust an acreage after it is reported and certified. Over and under certification could cost you a large amount or even the entire payment or price support advantages. If you are not sure of your correct acreage you can have it measured before you certify. Final date to request and pay the cost of measurement service is July 15, 1969.

Acreage diverted under the Feed Grain and Wheat programs may not be grazed between May 15 and October 15. If livestock are found on the diverted acres it could cause a serious reduction in program payments. When both grazing and diverted acres are in the same field, the diverted acres must be clean plowed to the extent that no grass or weeds are available for grazing. This will mean replowing diverted acres periodically. Noxious weeds must be controlled.

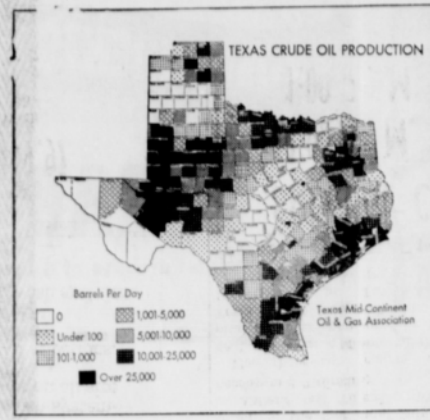

# OUR HEALTH

**Question: What are "sun sores"?**

**Answer:** Sun sores, also called "fever blisters" or "cold sores" are painful blisters that erupt periodically on the lips, mouth and nose. They are actually virus infections medically known as herpes simplex and they are triggered by overexposure to the sun, a common cold, gastric upset, tooth trouble or simply by hormonal changes that occur before menstruation. There's not too much that can be done for them and they usually clear up in a week to ten days. Dusting with anti-septic powder and dosages of Vitamin B help speed the healing and a dermatologist can prescribe antibiotic ointments to fight infection. Since herpes simplex is viral in origin, it's possible to get immunization for a recurrent condition. Consult a doctor about this—and don't try to self-medicate, cover-up, or wash away the sores. It shouldn't be done.

**Question: Is baldness hereditary?**

**Answer:** In many cases, the premature loss of hair or a generally thinning condition can be traced back via family lines. But some cases of baldness are due to conditions over which we do have some control. The leading causes of

baldness are seborrhea (excessive dandruff), nutritional deficiency, scalp infections, hormone imbalance, impaired circulation, injury to the scalp and body infections or disease and, of course, heredity. Many doctors consider seborrhea a prime culprit and, in fact, two British skin doctors in a study of 344 cases of premature baldness found that 320 cases were associated with the seborrheic condition. For persons for whom dandruff is the important factor in their balding, there's good news because this condition can be controlled. Coping with dandruff starts with the use of specially formulated antandandruff shampoos like Sebulex. It immediately removes loose dandruff and excess oil and its penetrating action softens and removes crusty scales from the scalp. In baldness cases due to hormone problems or dietary deficiencies, a qualified dermatologist can often suggest a regimen or medicines that can reverse—even reverse—the balding process. In all cases, a doctor, not the local barber or hair-stylist, is the one to see. With all the talk about hair today and how much of it there is around, it might be startling to find out that there's a definite trend toward baldness. Doctors predict that after puberty over 80 percent of men lose their hair to some degree—and between 15 and 20 percent of women. Though baldness has traditionally been a standing joke, to those involved, it's a laughing matter!
