Baird Bears Chalk Up Third District Win Friday

BAIRD- Friday night, the Baird Bears scored 24 points in the second quarter to take a 38-20 win against Jim Ned. The win lifts Baird's district record to 3-0. Their season record is 5-2.

Baird got off to a slow start, but made up for it in the second quarter. The defense played well and kept the Bears in the game during the first quarter. Coach Edmiston was well pleased with the team effort. He feels that they are really playing well together as a team.

Jim Ned's Jerry Don Atwell, put the Indians out in front in the first quarter on a 41 yard interception return. The kick failed.

Daryl Harris tied the score for Baird. Alan Bohannon put the Bears on top to stay with the extra point.

Jim Ned quarterback Mart Riley was intercepted on the Indians ensuing possession by Grant and after the Bears were stopped for three downs, Alan Bohannon kicked a 32 yard field goal.

On Baird's next possession, Harris threw a deep pass to Larry Segura who caught the ball between two Indian defenders for a 50 yard gain. Harris took the ball in from one yard out and Bohannon kicked the point after to give Baird a 17-6 lead with 5:50 remaining before half-time.

Baird scored again before half-time.

Austin ran for 35 yards and then 13 yards for a touchdown. Bohannon's kick made it 24-6 at half-time.

Jim Ned scored again in the third quarter on a 62 yard touchdown drive. The run for two points was successful.

Baird scored twice in the fourth quarter to extend its lead to 38-14. Austin recovered a fumble, and then the Bears needed to drive on 23 yards as Will Morgan took it in over the goal line.

The last Baird touchdown was set up by an excellent display of running by Greg Austin. He began at his own 43, veered right and sped to the one yard line before he was pulled down. Harris scored his third one yard touchdown two plays later to make it 37-14. The extra point was good.

Atwell scored again for Jim Ned in the fourth quarter.

Baird had 16 first downs, 253 rushing yardage and 50 passing yardage. They completed 1 of 5 passes. The Bears had 4 penalties for 22 yards.

Jim Ned had 13 first downs, 160 rushing and 78 passing yardage. They completed 4 out of 16 passes and had 4 penalties for 29 yards.

Baird will play Roscoe Friday night, November 2, at Roscoe. Everyone come on out and support the Baird Bears.

Clyde City Police to Take Over Ambulance Service

COUNTY- Clyde City Council members voted unanimously Monday night to accept the resignations of four citizen EMS employees and abolish the CEMS committee, citing lack of funds. M.D. Ellis and Robert Martin did not approve the action taken by Clyde City Council to accept the resignations.

There were approximately 70 citizens present at the meeting of the CEMS governing committee. These citizens were in favor of keeping the ambulance service as it is now with the same personnel.

The citizens of the surrounding area feel that the people will continue to donate money to EMS until the governing agents can find an acceptable solution to the funding problem. There is already at least \$1,000. in the Baird Bank and the People's State Bank in Clyde.

The Clyde City Police Department will assume ambulance service responsibilities, effective October 31, under the direction of Clyde Police Chief William H. Bing Miller. Three additional employees will be hired to work with the police department, but they will perform mostly paper work.

The new ambulance service set up by Clyde City Council is supposed to be funded by the same three governing agencies with Clyde Giving \$650. a month, Baird \$500., and the county \$650., but according to Robert Martin and Billy Parker, the

City of Baird and the County Commissioners have not yet been approached.

The citizens attending the EMS meeting had several of their own ideas about what could be done to prevent the abolition of the CEMS and the firing of the four paramedics. Suggestions included increasing city taxes, adding 50 cents to citizens monthly water bill, holding a bond issue, personal contributions and voting in new City Council person next year.

During the CEMS meeting the ambulance made two emergency calls.

The CEMS committee will try to get Clyde City Council to back off abolishing the committee and have it reappointed with the exception of Tommy Tucker, and put Paul Dugan in his place. Members of the CEMS committee are Callahan Commissioner, M.D. Ellis, Baird City Councilman, Robert Martin, Clyde City Councilman, Tommy Tucker and Clyde Fire Chief Don Haley, chairman of the CEMS.

The CEMS committee is striving for the service to become a non-profit organization, that way it would be under a board of directors and not three different governing agencies.

The job of the CEMS is a full time job. It will be too hard for the Clyde Police Department to work two full time jobs.

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

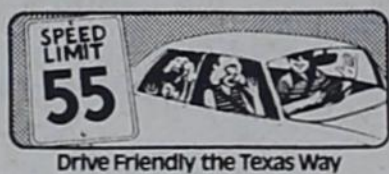

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Letter to the Editor:

Dear Editor:

Away back in December of 1941, I took on a new job. There was a little mustached guy in Berlin, Germany who wanted to become dictator of the world but free thinking people, accustomed to living in a democratic society where the majority ruled, elected to stop the ambitious Hitler so, we were in World War II, fighting the potential dictatorship and protecting our heritage of freedom and rule by the majority of the ruled. It took nearly four years of fighting and lots of hardships but we won.

And now, about 34 years later, in the little town of Baird, Texas, it appears to me that the principle of majority rule for which we fought was in vain. August 28 a petition bearing the signatures of nearly half the registered voters in Baird was presented to the City Council asking for a referendum so the citizens of Baird might be given an opportunity to express their opinions concerning the sale of the Municipal Power Plant and Distribution System. That's been over two months and nothing has been done by the Council in regard to that petition. That inaction might be a legal prerogative of the Council but it certainly is not a moral one since the Council is supposed to represent the people.

Anyone can attend a Council meeting and if any matters of finance are discussed they can easily ascertain that the City's financial position is not too good. There is a simple solution to that problem. I feel certain, in fact, very certain, that WTU will still give about what they offered last year for the generating and distribution facilities of Baird. Sell the d--n thing to them and get out of the electrical business...tighten some belts, and take care of City business as it should be done, and not adhere to the misguided thinking of a small minority which thinks that Baird could not exist without the light plant. There are less than 100 municipally owned electric plants in the State of Texas and they are getting out as fast as possible in the smaller towns because it is not economically feasible to operate. Now, I repeat what I have said before. In my opinion buying current from WTU wholesale and retailing it to you Baird consumers is going to prove too costly through an antiquated distribution system. So, you'll be paying too much, either for electricity or other City services.

I attended the City Council meeting on October 23 and mention was made of Art. 1436A Rev. Civ.

Stat. Ann. I suggest the Council study that Article and also Article 230 of the National Electrical Code. That might open your eyes to the position you are in.

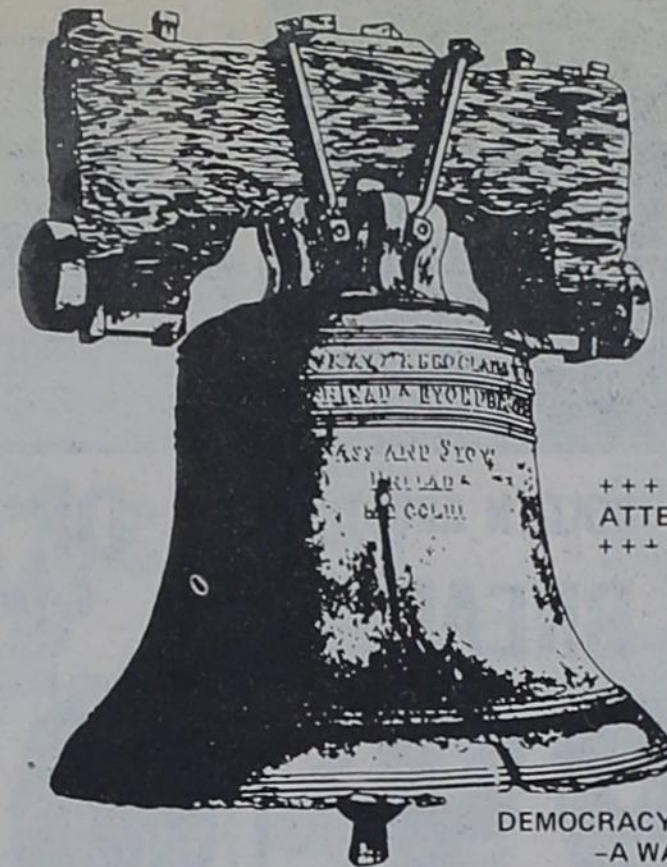

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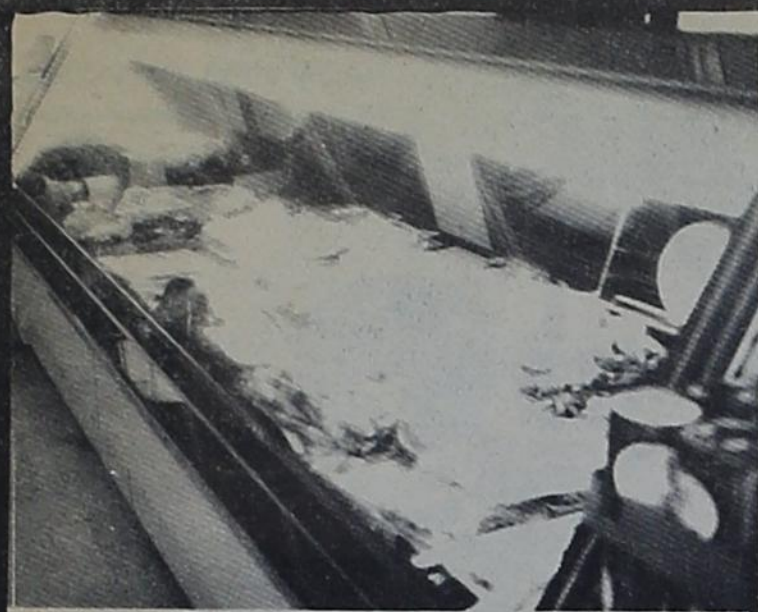

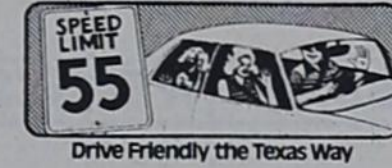
Mabry Tatom Expires Thurs.
